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ZIAD ANDREW SHEHADY SWORN IN AS MAYOR OF SPRINGFIELD

On Tuesday night January 3rd at 7 pm, Ziad Andrew Shehady was sworn in as a member of the Springfield Township Committee. Minutes later, Judge Jonathan Rosenthbluth swore Mr. Shehady in as Mayor of Springfield. This was not a new experience for Ziad, as he was Mayor in 2010, the youngest in New Jersey at the time. He has served on the Committee from 2008-2010 after winning his first election in November 2007. He recently won reelection to the Committee by a margin of 59 yotes last November.

Surrounded by his family, with his mother holding the bible,

Ziad took the oath of Office and immediately got down to the business at hand. Appointments to key governmental positions followed quickly; Township Attorney, Municipal Judge and many other Boards and positions were filled as is the procedure for the Township each year at the reorganizational meeting. Ziad commented to the Patriot "It is good to be back on the Committee and an honor to serve as the Township's Mayor once again. I look forward to moving Springfield forward and making a positive change in my community"

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REMARKS BY ZIAD ANDREW SHEHADY AT THE SPRINGFIELD TOWNSHIP COMMITTEE ANNUAL ORGANIZATION MEETING



Good evening! On behalf of the Township Committee, I thank you all for coming to the Springfield annual organization meeting. Your support is humbling and encouraging. I would not be here today without the help and effort of countless residents who I am grateful to call my friends. I am happy to work together with all of you for the benefit of our community.

I would also like to thank the veterans, all volunteers and all municipal employees in attendance this evening. And a special thank you Judge Jon Rosenbluth for administering the Oath of Office as well as my sincere thanks to our special guests.

Finally, I want to thank Jerry Fernandez and Marc Krauss for their faith and confidence in me. I am excited to be part of the Township Committee again with you and together with Commit-

teemen Rich Huber and David Amlen, I am confident 2012 will be a productive year. It is an honor and a privilege to serve Springfield as its Mayor.

In keeping with my campaign promise to restore open government and effective representation, I would like to take this opportunity to make a few announcements.

I am designating the Township Committee meeting next week on January 10th at 7 p.m., as a "Goal Setting Meeting" for members of the Township Committee to present their priorities, initiatives and goals, for the Township Administrator to present his goals, for Department Heads to present their departmental goals, and to give the public an opportunity to offer their input and feedback.

It is no secret that much progress was halted in 2011. The Township Committee was able to do nearly twice as much with smaller government. In an effort to streamline government, our schedule will return to two public sessions per month – we will meet on the 2nd and 4th Tuesdays of every month at 7 p.m. It is clear that there is a lot of work ahead of us but I take this job very seriously and I promise to work tirelessly for you. I am hopeful that this governing body will make a greater effort to communicate with the public through the use of the Township website and the local television station. We also have several infrastructure improvements and projects that require our attention including road work, traffic and safety, flood mitigation, electric grid maintenance and, of course, the athletic turf field. I am looking forward to picking up where we left off in 2010 by continuing to work on the Springfield Downtown through the Business Improvement District and reactivating the volunteer Springfield Improvement Team.

I am reviving a tradition I started in 2009 by scheduling Open Office hours so that I can meet with residents when it is convenient for them. My first as Mayor will be this Sunday, January 8th at 2 p.m. followed by Monday, January 16th at 9 a.m. and Sunday, January 29th at 2 p.m.

I would also like to extend an invitation to an observance in honor of Martin Luther King, Jr. on Monday, January 16th at 10 a.m. here in Town Hall.

Thank you all, once again, for attending. Best wishes to everyone for a healthy, prosperous and happy new year. God bless Springfield and God bless America.

Police Chief's Column *Chief John P. Cook*

In the past persons who were the victims of bunco scams or confidence schemes were looked upon as being complicit in the fraud acts committed against them under the old adage of "you can't cheat an honest man". Today that saying is no longer true as fraud scams are designed to target unsuspecting persons through sophisticated cons with the use of modern technology. Fraudsters nowadays know that it is very possible, and at times extremely easy, to "cheat an honest man" so in order to enable town residents to recognize a fraud scam attempt the police division offers the following preventative tips.

Most fraud scams that specifically target residents are done via the internet or via the telephone are designed to obtain either money from or the personal identity information of the intended victim. This will be an attempt to have monies wired to the fraudsters or obtain credit account numbers or identity information such as a Social Security number.

- Any mail received or an internet e-mail or even a telephone call that indicates a resident is a winner of any type of sweepstakes or foreign lottery where some type of monetary fee is required to be paid this is an outright scam. If you did not enter any sweepstakes or participated in any foreign lottery, there is no way you can be a winner. Whenever fees are required to be paid in advance in order to collect the supposed prize, this is a scam to con you out of your money.
- If you are selling an item over the internet or if you advertise some type of service that you perform, be wary of persons who contact you wanting to purchase items you've listed for sale or wanting to pay you for the services you offer where the subject pays by check which is payable to more monies than were agreed to. This scam specifically wants the intended victim to believe that the check was made out in the inflated amount by accident and will attempt to have the victim wire any monetary difference before the actual check is discovered to be counterfeit. The suspects will always be out of state or in a foreign country but wil claim to be in the process of moving to Springfield. The scam targets persons selling any item from a car to a couch or offering services from babysitting to piano lessons.
- Do not give out personal information to callers who claim to be representatives of your bank or any business you may have a credit account with. The fraudster may also pose as a law enforcement official with the call pretending to be some type of investigation into fraud on your account. This is done to con you into giving out a Social Security number or other personal information when the caller asks you to prove your identity. This same scam, known as "phishing" can involve bogus emails purporting to be from a financial institution or government agency and is intended to con you into divulging your identity information.

In short, to prevent falling for the myriad of fraud schemes one old adage is as true today as it was years ago, and that is... "if something seems too good to be true, it probably is".

Please eat a meal one hour before donating and drink plenty of water.

People with a fever or sore throat should wait until they are feeling better before donating, and there is a 24-hour deferral for teeth cleanings and fillings. For those who have recently traveled outside of the United States and for other eligibility questions, please call the blood center at 973-676-4700, ext. 132. If you require any additional information, please contact Bridget Schindo at 973-676-4700 ext. 155, during regular business hours.

The Blood Center of New Jersey (BCNJ) is an independent, non-profit organization supplying blood and blood components to hospitals in 15 counties in New Jersey for over 60 years. BCNJ conducts an estimated 250 drives a month and must recruit approximately 100,000 blood donors annually in order to serve the hospitals and patients in our community.

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
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

2011 Busiest Year on Record

The 2011 Fire Department run totals were the highest on record -- 38% higher than 2010 and 22% higher than the five year average. Total fires were 40% lower. First Responder Medical Calls were 40% higher than 2010 and 23% higher than the five year average. Service Calls were 38% higher, which is attributed to Hurricane Irene's watercraft rescues and flooded buildings and the October Snow Storm causing multiple power lines down. Mutual Aid given to surrounding communities increased 31% due to increased multiple alarm fires and decreased manpower in the region.

Some notable incidents in 2011: 2nd Alarm structure fire in multi-family residence on South Springfield Avenue; 2^{nd} Alarm residential structure fire on Henshaw Avenue where units arrived to fire conditions involving a motor vehicle with fire extension into the building; a passenger vehicle traveling the wrong direction on Route 78 which struck a tractor trailer headon causing one fatality and two injuries; a childbirth in a Morris Avenue parking lot; 2nd Alarm basement fire in the Park Place Condominium Complex contained to the area of origin and no injuries; medical service for a patient in cardiac arrest -performing CPR and administering an AED shock which

regained the patient's pulse; a declared state of emergency for Hurricane Irene - 189 incidents including 80 residents removed by boat from 35 homes; 34 snow storm related incidents in October; 2nd Alarm response to Route 78 East at Exit 49B for an overturned tractor trailer with heavy entrapment. The

extrication took 1 hour 36 minutes with assistance from Summit, Millburn, Union and Elizabeth Fire Departments; Springfield assisted Elizabeth several days during the 8th Alarm Burrie Biscuit warehouse fire.

In 2011, Fire Prevention Code Enforcement Life Hazard Use inspection activity increased by 61% which met the NJ Division of Fire Safety requirement for providing a yearly periodic inspection to all LHUs. In July, a new Non-Life Hazard Inspection program was implemented. It is anticipated that businesses in the entire town will be initially inspected and new, un-registered properties will be added to the annual cycle.

All residents are reminded that the Springfield Fire Department will continue looking to reduce risk through collaborative efforts and community support. Have a fire-safe 2012.

Completing its third year, the Springfield Luminary Fund is pleased to announce that it has raised \$5,496.04 for this year's contribution to local Springfield organizations.


