HUNDREDS GATHER FOR THE SPRINGFIELD MEMORIAL DAY CEREMONY AND PARADE

A large crowd gathered at Veterans Park on Monday, May 25 to commemorate the Memorial Day Observance. The ceremony, planned by Parade Coordinator Geri Ann Bujnowski, with the assistance of Linda Donnelly, appeared to be the largest in recent Springfield History.

The program started with an introduction of the Township Committee and Union County Freeholder Bruce Bergen. Geri Ann Bujnowski introduced the veterans. Gerry Gebauer, Commander of the American Legion Post #228, introduced this year's Grand Marshall, Herb Quinton. This year's special guest speaker was Colonel Edward Chrystal Jr., Commander of the New Jersey Army National Guard's 50th Infantry Brigade Combat Team.

The parade started at Veterans Park and proceeded to Jonathan Dayton High School. While the exact date and origin of the first observance of Memorial Day may not be known for certain, it was originally referred to as "Decoration Day" after the Civil War and then to "Memorial Day" in 1882. The observance became officially named by federal law in 1967. On June 28, 1968, Congress passed the Uniform Monday Holiday Act, moving four holidays, including Memorial Day, from their traditional dates to a specified Monday, creating a three-day weekend. This change moved Memorial Day from its traditional date of May 30 to the last Monday in May effective in 1971.

TOWNSHIP ADMINISTRATOR ANTHONY CANCRO LEAVES SPRINGFIELD

Anthony Cancro, Township Administrator, will be leaving his position with the Township in early July after just over five years with Springfield. He instituted many new policies, programs, procedures and received grants for the Township. In addition, he instituted regular monthly department head staff meetings, supported efforts for the Green Team to become eligible for Sustainable Jersey certification, built rain gardens, and sponsored health seminars and training sessions for Township employees. Anthony championed many town-wide improvements and was a tireless advocate for downtown redevelopment and making Springfield a better place to live, work and raise a family. He has been a tremendous help in producing this newspaper by submitting numerous topical and timely articles. The Staff at the Patriot Times will miss his input and participation and wishes him well in his new position.

JDHS PRINCIPAL TO RETIRE AFTER A DECADE OF SERVICE



Elizabeth Cresci, principal of Jonathan Dayton High School since September 2005, will be retiring at the end of June. She has served as principal of the high school for

a decade, and in that time has brought innovative programs to the school, and led the school to its designation as a high performing high school at the state and national levels.

Mrs. Cresci has been responsible for many programs at the high school, including the Dayton Collegiate Academy (DCA), part of the state School Choice program. The DCA is a rigorous academic program designed for outstanding students who take on the challenge of Advanced Placement courses beginning in their freshman year. She also created the Transition Summer School, designed for incoming ninth graders who are given the opportunity to learn skills and strategies to make them successful in high school and college.

Mrs. Cresci also served as principal at Highland Park Middle and High School, where she received the Bell Weather Award for outstanding academic improvement by a high school in 2005. She began her career as a teacher in a private school on the lower East side of Manhattan before moving to New Jersey to teach English at East Brunswick High School in 1986. Mrs. Cresci has served as Humanities Supervisor for Monroe Township Schools, and assistant principal at Ridge High School in Bernards Township.

Mrs. Cresci lives with Alfred, her husband of 31 years, in Piscataway, NJ. Her retirement plans include time with Alfred and a tour of all the baseball stadiums in the country.

Message from the Mayor



Hello Springfield Friends and Neighbors,

Watching the township progress with the seasons has been one of the most interesting and rewarding aspects of being Mayor. As our Department of Public Works duties change from snow removal to mowing lawns, and Recreation opens the township pool and prepares for summer camp, our community is constantly moving forward. As Mayor, I feel that it's the Township Committee's responsibility to continue to evolve our township while preserving the beautiful, safe, and wonderful place we call home. It is with this thought in mind that I'd like to share this month's message.

Now that it's summer all eyes are on recreation. For several years, I've been pushing for needed improvements at the pool and we've been able to make significant changes without using tax-payer dollars. Now we need to look to the long-term future of this great facility and I'm glad to share with you that the Township Committee has been looking at plans to create a destination that can be used all year around. It is important to me to have indoor rooms for camp and meetings, a spray park and great new activities. I also think that this facility should be open and available to the community, for spring, fall and winter activities. I hope to have more news on this topic very soon as we are currently working on plans. Additionally, we're building a new Recreation Council made up of representatives from many of the clubs and teams in Springfield, which will allow the Township to be even more responsive to community needs.

In other news, last month Committeeman Fernandez and I completed and presented the 2015 municipal budget. In this budget, we were successful in minimizing the tax burden to residents by controlling spending and overtime. We were able to maintain the current high level of municipal services and minimize the use of our surplus. Additionally, we were able to fund new fire and public works vehicles and equipment, road paving improvements, library improvements and flood prevention upgrades.

Finally, I've mentioned downtown redevelopment in each Mayor's message this year as it's an area that I am extremely passionate about. When I took office two and a half years ago and became the liaison to the Business Improvement District, I made it my priority to finally bring change to our Morris Avenue district. Working with the BID, property owners and the Township Committee, we passed two major plans to redevelop properties along Morris Avenue. I'd like to thank everyone involved who got us to this landmark point. For the remainder of my term, I will continue to work to improve other properties in our downtown.

On behalf of the Springfield Township Committee, I urge you to attend town hall meetings and bring your input to help us make the best decisions for our community. The Township Committee meets in regular session at 7:30 p.m. on the second and fourth Tuesdays of every month in the Municipal Building. The Committee's regular Tuesday meetings are televised (you can find the link at the municipal website http://springfield-nj.us/).

JUNIOR POLICE ACADEMY DEADLINE FOR APPLICATIONS IS JUNE 30, 2015

Springfield Police Department Chief of Police John P. Cook has announced the dates for the 2015 session of its Junior Police Academy. The academy will be running two one-week sessions from July 13 - 17, 2015 (Session 1) & August 17 - 21, 2015 (Session 2), which will be held at the Springfield Police Department. Classes will run from 8:00 am to 2:00 pm daily. Please note on the application which session you would prefer first. We will try and accommodate requests on first-come first-served basis.

This will be the 2nd year of this program, designed to provide area youth with the opportunity to gain an understanding of the role of the Police Officer. While other youth academy programs provide a day camp setting, the Springfield Police Junior Academy has been modeled after today's police academy. Those accepted to the program will undergo physical training and daily training in Drill and Ceremony, and will be instructed in criminal investigation techniques, evidence recovery, patrol practices and effects of alcohol and drugs. In addition, the cadets will participate in field trips to the Union County Police Academy and attend demonstrations from various specialized units that are available to law enforcement, such as the police canine unit, SWAT team, and the bomb squad.







After developing a free continuing education course on Breast Cancer Care, she has helped more than 85 nurses complete the course and 94 percent of those nurses passed the CBCN® test. Since the course began, the certification rate has doubled among the Breast Center nurses, approaching 80 percent.

MAY 2015 INSTRUCTORS MEETING

On May 9 a group of instructors assembled in the main studio of Hwang Karate of Springfield for an instructors meeting. Kwan Jang Nim Hyul Chun Hwang, the current head of the Moo Duk Kwan, addressed this group. For two hours, the Kwan Jang Nim Hwang spoke of the history and philosophy of the unique Korean based martial art. It was founded by his founded his father Kang Jang Nim Hwang Kee in 1945.

The art grew in the years between the end of the 2nd World War and the Korean War. After 1953 the Moo Duk Kwan entered its prime period of growth. This period saw the introduction of many Moo Duk Kwan traditions. It also saw the introduction of the Dan Bon system to maintain discipline and seniority within the art. This period ended in 1961 with the Military Coup in South Korea. The leader of this coup was the South Korean general Park Chung-Hee.

Kwan Jang Nim also said an assistant instructor is responsible for helping students connect to the proper spirit of the art. They are also expected to display good spirit in class, which will inspire others in the class. Afterwards the assembled group moved to the room next door to the main studio to watch archived video footage from the third United States Soo Bahk Do Moo Duk Kwan Federation national championships.

MEN'S HEALTH SCREENING

An important health screening event is offered to Chatham Borough, Chatham Township, Madison Borough and Springfield Borough adult male residents in June. Adult men are encouraged to attend the men's health screening on Monday, June 15 starting at 6:00 p.m. There is no fee for this service. Appointments are required and can be made by calling 973-593-3079 ext 1. by June 1, 2015.

Dr. John Dalena from Summit Medical Group will perform testicular, prostate, and colo-rectal examinations for the men's screening. Men aged 15-35 are at risk of developing testicular cancer, whereas prostate cancer is more common in men over 55. Colo-rectal cancer is most frequently found in men over the age of 40. Yearly check-ups are recommended for all men.

The screenings are offered by the Madison Health Department in their offices at the Madison Civic Center, 28 Walnut Street with parking behind the building. Entrance is through the glass doors on the side of the building and down the stairs to the offices on the right.

All residents of Madison, Springfield,

All residents of Madison, Springfield, Chatham Borough and Chatham Township may participate annually in this screening. Participants should have their physician's name, address and telephone number ready when they call.

HISTORIC CANNON BALL HOUSE OPEN TO VISITORS JUNE 20

Springfield's Historic Cannon Ball House (CBH), located at 126 Morris Ave., will be holding an open house on June 20th to commemorate the 235th anniversary of the Battle of Springfield. This conflict was the final major battle of the Revolutionary War to be fought in the northern colonies. Many artifacts from this occurrence are on display at the CBH, including the missile that gave the structure its name. The CBH is an ideal site to learn more about this battle and its historical significance.

Back in 1986, were you a student in one of Spring-field's middle schools? Do you remember entering an essay contest, on the topic of "What America means to me," run by the Springfield Heritage Day Committee? If you do, then your letter is probably among the nearly ninety letters that will be on display from this contest. Anyone interested in perusing the handwriting of his or her younger self is encouraged to come visit. Finally, to mark the 150th anniversary of President Abraham Lincoln's death this year, a small display of Lincoln related books and memorabilia will be on display upstairs. So one day shy of Father's Day, come experience the eighteenth through twentieth centuries at the historic Cannon Ball House. House Hours: Saturday, June 20th from ten to noon.

Facts & Figures

- Cylinder tanks for equipment such as stoves and ovens must be located outside of the home.
- Never store or use propane gas cylinders larger than one pound inside the home.
- Never operate a propane-powered gas grill inside the home.
- Have propane gas equipment inspected periodically by a professional for possible leaks or malfunctioning parts.
- Carefully follow the manufacturer's instructions when lighting a pilot.
- If you smell a strong odor of gas, leave the area immediately and call the fire department from outside the home

An Overfilling Prevention Device (OPD) is a safety device incorporated into the filling valve of a propane cylinder (i.e. those used on gas grills, RVs, etc.). The device shuts off the flow of gas to a cylinder after 80% capacity has been reached. This limits the potential for release of gas when the cylinder is heated, averting a fire or possible injury.

As of April 1, 2002, OPDs are required on all propane cylinders between 4 and 40 pounds propane capacity. Cylinders of this size manufactured after September 30, 1998 were required to have an OPD. A typical gas grill cylinder holds about 20 pounds of propane. Propane cylinders with OPDs can be identified by a triangular hand-wheel (pictured right). Some earlier model cylinders were produced with a round hand-wheel but "OPD" is stamped on the brass valve body

hand-wheel but "OPD" is stamped on the brass valve body.

After April 1, 2002, propane cylinders not equipped with an OPD must be retrofitted with the device before refilling can occur or properly disposed of and replaced with an OPD-equipped cylinder.

Many propane dealers will retrofit older cylinders with an OPD. As there is a charge for this, it may be more economical to replace the entire cylinder, especially if it is rusty. In many parts of the U.S., exchange cylinder racks can be used to swap an empty cylinder without an OPD for a full cylinder equipped with an OPD, for a nominal fee, eliminating the need to dispose of the cylinder or to have it retrofitted.

Dispose of propane cylinders safely. Questions about safe disposal should be answered by local fire departments, hazardous waste collection sites, or propane re-fillers.

SPRINGFIELD RESIDENT AND FORMER B29 CREW MEMBER TOURS VINTAGE AIRCRAFT AT AIR SHOW





On June 3 at the Air Show at Morristown Airport, a number of World War II aircraft were displayed, including the last flyable B29 bomber in the world. This B29 is similar to the "Enola Gay" and the "Bockscar" aircraft, the two planes that bombed Japan and ended World War II in the Pacific. Joseph Messina of Springfield, NJ, was one of three B29 Crew Member's on

hand at the air show that flew on a B29 during the war. They sat in their old seats on the plane, Flight engineer, Bombardier and Tail gunner. Joe, a long time resident of Springfield for 57 years, presently retired, is the Vice President of the St. James Seniors Group. He left NJIT before graduating and enlisted as an Army Air Corps Cadet, serving as a 2nd Lt Maintenance Officer preparing P47 fighters for training and overseas service. Later a call was made for volunteers to be trained and replace the many B29 crew members lost in combat and training accidents. He trained to be a 1st Lieutenant Flight Engineer whose duty it was to take from the pilot all the controls and instruments not needed to fly the plane. He had control of all the mechanical, electrical, and hydraulic systems and was the third officer in the cockpit. While he survived the war with no training accidents, ironically, after the war, as a business passenger on a Constellation commercial aircraft, when attempting to land at LaGuardia Airport, one of the four engine propeller blades reversed pitch prematurely when all four should have reversed at the same time to slow the plane down. The plane spun around, tore off part of a wing and caught fire. Fortunately the fire extinguisher worked well, he received some burns but others were more seriously injuried.

BE WARY OF CUSTOMER DIVERSION THIEVES WHEN SHOPPING IN RETAIL STORES

In my Patriot Times column this month, I would like to highlight the need for shoppers to always secure and safeguard their wallets or handbags while inside of retail stores as there are thieves who specialize in stealing these items from you while shopping. You will see from this recent arrest how the observations of members of the public with the cooperation of retail stores, both where a wallet is stolen and where the victim's stolen credit cards are later used, by making their surveillance camera footage available can enable your police to identify and apprehend a suspect engaged in a diversion theft.

On 03/18/2015, the Springfield Police Department was contacted by an individual who reported having been a victim of a pickpocket type of theft that had taken place at a local supermarket. Detective Foster Ziegler conducted an investigation in which he reviewed the store surveillance video to follow the victim's travels throughout the store and was able to observe that the female shopper was the victim of a wallet theft that was committed by two female suspects.

The female shopper was confronted by a female actor who then diverted the shopper's attention by asking questions about various types of produce in order for a second female actor to take the victim's wallet from her handbag that was left in the shopping

Detective Ziegler and Detective James Mirabile began following up on locations where the victim's stolen credit cards had been used at various retail stores in Union where in excess of \$4,000.00 in merchandise had been fraudulently purchased by the same 2 actors who had been observed at the supermarket confronting the victim.

Based upon surveillance camera photos of both suspects, detectives issued alerts with the photos seeking information from other police agencies that may be able to recognize either suspect. One suspect was identified by detectives from the Watertown NY Police Department as being Justine Peterkin, a resident of Pennsylvania. Peterkin has committed these types of diversion thefts throughout New Jersey, New York and Pennsylvania.

On 04/23/2015 Peterkin was positively identified as the suspect who had stolen the wallet and subsequently used the stolen credit cards. The Springfield Police Department issued an arrest warrant for Justine Peterkin, age 25 of Philadelphia PA, charging her with theft, credit card fraud and theft by deception.

On 05/09/2015 Peterkin was located and arrested by Springfield police officers in East Greenwich Township in Gloucester County. She was remanded to the Union County Jail in lieu of \$40,000.00 bail and her case is pending in the Union County Superior

Detective Lieutenant Judd Levenson stated, "This type of pickpocket theft is quite common in retail stores especially supermarkets where female shoppers often leave their handbag unattended in the shopping cart while they search for or retrieve items from shelves. Diversion thefts such as this will

frequently be committed by two actors where one will engage a victim in conversation to divert the victim's attention while the second will quickly walk by to grab the wallet out of the handbag and then exit the store. This type of theft is committed in less than one minute.'

According to Chief John Cook, "This arrest was the product of good police work coupled with the cooperative efforts of the public, the business community and police agencies working together. The observations relayed by the shopper allowed detectives to locate suspects on the store surveillance camera system and these persons were further located on store surveillance cameras at businesses where the stolen credit cards were used. The photos then disseminated to other police agencies resulted in the thief being identified. This type of highly transient crime involved a 'professional' diversion thief from Pennsylvania coming to Springfield to commit a crime, being identified by a police department in New York and eventually tracked to and arrested in southern New Jersey.

Shoppers must always be in possession of their handbag and never leave it unattended in a shopping cart, even for just a minute. If shoppers utilize store coupons they should use a separate wallet designed to hold coupons that can be left in the top part of a shopping cart for easy reference so the handbag can be snapped shut and held onto or kept within your sight while shopping. Do not leave a handbag unattended in a shopping cart as you walk over to retrieve items off a shelf but instead always take the cart with you to that area as you can see that it only takes a store diversion theft team a matter of seconds to distract a shopper and remove a wallet from an unsuspecting shopper.

NEW UPDATE: MAYORS COUNCIL RAHWAY RIVER WATERSHED FLOOD CONTROL URGE GOVERNOR AND STATE LEGISLATURE TO FUND ORANGE RESERVOIR MODIFICATION FOR FLOOD CONTROL IN 2016

Mayors representing communities along the Rahway River urged in a letter to Governor Chris Christie and members of the New Jersey State Legislature to begin funding in FY 2016 the construction of parts of the Rahway River Flood Control Mitigation plan.

Over \$100 million of damages was faced by residents along the Rahway River during Irene and no improvement in the situation has yet been done. The Rahway River Flood Mitigation Plan has significant flood mitigation benefits including modification to the Orange reservoir to store more water during peak storm conditions; there is proposed channelization improvements from Lenape Park through Cranford; and investigations are ongoing for improved storage in the Robinson Branch part of the Rahway River. The current federal process includes a selected final plan in 2016 with recommendation to Congress for funding in 2017.

The Mayors believe that major aspects of the federal/state study have reached conclusion that could be implemented by the State of New Jersey in advance of the final study's conclusion. A memo of understanding would be required with the US Army Corps of Engineers for the state to accelerate the funding to implement. For example, the Orange Reservoir modification which would permit more storage during storm events could be an immediate benefit to communities from Millburn to Rahway.

SPRINGFIELD TOWNSHIP EARNS AA+ BOND RATING

"Standard & Poor's has affirmed our 'AA+' rating for our existing General Obligation (GO) debt," according to Mayor David Barnett. "We are very proud of this accomplishment. There is a lot of hard work that went into this," said the Mayor, who cited the "great work of our Treasurer/CFO, Administrator and all of our staff who have worked diligently to help Springfield achieve the AA+ rating."

The rating affirmation was driven by several factors:

- STRONG FINANCIAL CONDITION: Springfield's financial condition is very sound as a result of management's prudent budgeting practices and maintenance of ample reserve levels, providing the Township with a high degree of financial flexibility.
- STRONG SOCIOECONOMIC INDICA-TORS: The Township benefits from its location within commuting distance of major employment areas. Residents are well-educated professionals and exhibit above-average wealth levels.
- DEBT LEVELS ARE VERY MANAGE-ABLE: Overall debt levels are moderate and manageable.

"The strong bond rating that we received is a credit to the fiscal policies developed by the Mayor and Committee," said Anthony Cancro, Township Administrator. "They have worked very hard to responsibly manage the Township in order to make Springfield a premier place to live, work and raise a family. These efforts have been acknowledged by the rating agency."

The Township has continued to maintain its strong overall budgetary performance. The Township closed fiscal 2013 with a small deficit of roughly \$180,000, or just 0.6% of current fund expenditures. For fiscal 2014, Springfield adopted a \$30.7 million current fund budget that included the use of \$2.8 million of current fund balance. The Township managed spending in light of weather-related expenses and received nearly all of its projected state and federal reimbursements. The introduced fiscal 2015 budget includes a \$3 million appropriation of surplus reserves; a level in-line with prior years. The Township's revenue profile is stable with property taxes generating about 75% of current fund revenue. Supporting the Township's finances is very strong liquidity, with total government available cash of 37.5% of general fund expenditures and well in excess of 120% of governmental debt service at the end of 2013.

Springfield Township, with an estimated population of 16,000, is located in central Union County in the New York-Newark-Jersey City metropolitan statistical area, which is broad and diverse. The Township has a projected per capita effective buying income of 176% of the national level and per capita market value of roughly \$154,000. Overall, the Township's assessed value (AV) has been stable the past five years. Baltusrol Golf Club, a nationally recognized golf course that has hosted the U.S. Open seven times, is the Township's leading taxpayer, accounting for 2% of AV. The Township is just seven miles from Newark and 19 miles from New York City. Given its location and easy roadway access, residents find employment throughout the diverse New York-New Jersey employment bases. The county unemployment rate was 6.8% in 2014.



SPRINGFIELD AND UNION RESIDENTS EARN EAGLE SCOUT RANKING

Troop 73 is proud to announce that two of their Scouts recently achieved the ranking of Eagle Scout: Tyler Locke of Springfield, and Aaron Scheiner of Union. The Eagle Scout Rank is the highest rank attainable in the Boy Scout program of the Boy Scouts of America. The title of "Eagle Scout" is held for life, thus giving rise to the phrase "Once an Eagle, always an Eagle."

In order to earn the Eagle Rank, a Scout must be active in the troop, earn at least 21 merit badges, 13 of which are required Eagle badges, assume leadership positions in the troop and complete a service project to benefit the community. The Eagle-required merit badges that both Tyler and Aaron earned are Camping, Swimming, Emergency Preparedness, First Aid, Family Life, Citizenship in the Community, Citizenship in the Nation, Citizenship in the World, Personal Management, Personal Fitness, Environmental Science, Cooking, and Communications. An Eagle candidate must also conceive of, plan, budget, and execute a leadership service project, which must first be approved by the Munsee District's Patriot Path Council, and then signed off upon satisfactory completion.

Tyler's Eagle Project encompassed site improvements at the historic Cannonball House in Springfield, including planning, obtaining materials through donations, organizing and supervising work parties of volunteers to create pathway upgrades in the garden area, refinishing and repainting the flagpole, adding and painting some fencing, and adding a brick walkway from the driveway to the flagpole area. The walkway included grading the grounds, and all aspects of the project needed to be done while keeping everything period-authentic.

For his Eagle Project, Aaron worked with the Presbyterian Church in Springfield, NJ to locate, identify, and record information for US military veterans interred on the grounds. At 488,000 square feet, the cemetery has well over 2,000 potential gravesites. Through planning and organization of work parties, Aaron was able to identify 195 veteran resting sites, including veterans from the Revolutionary War, the War of 1812, the Spanish-American War, World Wars I & II, the Korean War, and Vietnam. Aaron was able to provide the Church not only with documentation, but also with an updated site map showing the locations. In addition, he was able to obtain donated printed maps that the Church will be able to use both for visitors and for various Veteran functions, such as placing flags on Memorial Day. TOWNSHIP COMMITTEE RECAP

Workshop May 11 The meeting opened with a presentation my the Townships's Redevelopment attorney, Matt Jessup, about the two Redevelopment Ordinances up for approval on the following night. A discussion was held following a request made by Dr. Leonard Bielory, Chair of the Board of Health, that the township approve a resolution in support of the State Senate and Assembly bills which would tighten up regulations allowing parents to opt out of mandatory vaccinations for children. The Committee, with one exception, was not in favor. There was also discussion regarding a draft Request for Proposal for the leasing of Sarah Bailey (this will be presented at the Regular May 26 meeting). The Committee, again with one exception, was not in favor of a resolution in support of Union County's decision against the proposed Pilgrim Pipeline. There was an extended discussion regarding the status of extended hours for the Chisholm Teen Center and also regarding a request for proposal for an attorney to handle time sensitive COAH matters.

Regular May 12 The meeting opened with announcements about the Memorial Day Parade to be held on May 26, two public Budget Hearings prior to Township Committee approval, and Proclamations were made in support of Emergency Medical Services Week and EMS Services for Children Day, both of which were accepted by Liz Fritzen, President of the Springfield First Aid Squad. Mr. Jessup made his presentation concerning the two Redevelopment ordinances on the agenda. A major bond issue was passed for improvements and equipment for the year. An ordinance increasing fees for sidewalk openings was passed on first reading, as was Ordinance 2015-13 adopting the Redevelopment plans for the Morris Ave lots (4 votes in favor, one abstention) and Ordinance 2015-14 for the Church Mall property (3 in favor, 2 abstentions). A number of resolutions were passed, including the contended resolution to hire the Special counsel for the COAH matter. Vendor application fees were waived for the Farmers Market, as were Permit fees for the Townwide Garage Sales in June and September.

The annual Civic Day will be held on Tuesday, June 9, at 2 pm; on the day, students from FMG will accompany various township officials for the morning and after lunch will participate in the regular Township Committee Meeting which will be held at 2 pm. All residents, especially Seniors, are encouraged to attend the meeting.

Workshop Meeting June 8 Meeting began with presentation of two proposed plans for a re-do of the building at the Municipal Pool, one a renovation of the current building which would add a second floor and meeting room and the other a single story new construction which would also include a meeting room. Both plans include



a possible splash pool either in addition to or in place of the current kids pool. Other Recreation items included a discussion of extended hours at the Chisholm Center and a proposal for a newly structured Recreation Council to replace the Rec Committee. Also discussed was a proposal for the lease of a portion of the parking lot (a single space) for telecommunication use. Reports from department heads were reviewed and there was a lively discussion of the meeting between Deputy Mayor Bandrowski and Committeeman Fernandez with County representatives regarding the conditions at the Meisel Field, the pond, and the needed clean-up of the Rahway River.

Regular Township Committee Meeting June 9 This special meeting was held at 2 pm to mark the annual Civics Day during which selected 7th graders from FMG spend the day with township employees and then participate in the Township Committee meeting itself. It always a great day for all of us. The usual reports were made and approved. There were three ordinances up for a second reading, one involving Street Openings (approved) and the remaining two involved final approvals of the Ordinances enabling the Township to move forward by entering into negotiations for the Redevelopment of the designated property along Morris Avenue and the designated property on Church Mall. Both of these were passed with 4 yes votes and one abstention each. Among Resolutions passed was one recommended by the Board of Health authorizing a new contract with Madison for services of the Department Health. Sgt. Jonathan Rachel reported on several traffic concerns throughout the township which will result in new Stop signs at a couple of intersections and other possible traffic calming actions. Mr. Cancro announced that Springfield has submitted a number of Actions to Sustainable Jersey which, once accepted will make the town one of a small number of certified SJ communities in the state and will be beneficial in determining our eligibility for applicable grants for environmental needs.
