Message from the Mayor

Dear Springfield Residents,

So we all survived the PGA Championship. The Championship went off very well and it had an amazing finish. It was a job well done by many agencies and people. The State, Federal and Local authorities all did an amazing job. I would like to thank them all. The Springfield Police, Fire department and our Axillary Police worked tremendously hard during that week, long hours and many different issues, that they handled so well it went unnoticed to the general public. It was evident the amount of time and hard work that went into years of planning by

all the agencies, Baltusrol and the PGA. Thank you to the residents of Springfield for your patience and understanding as our little town hosted an event that brought hundreds of thousands of people into it and was watched all over the world.

The Committee itself has been working very hard and we will have two meetings in August on the 9th and 23rd. We will be voting on a bond to make major improvements to our municipal pool. This is something I have championed for, for many years. Over the past few years we have spent nearly a million dollars on mostly repairs to the pool. The pool is a utility that has generated a profit every year, and that profit has been used to pay debts and to help offset our taxes. We have an opportunity to replace an aging building with a new building and add a spray park for our children. Since I have been in office we have steadily increased revenue to our municipal pool by improving our camps and allowing multiple ways to visit the pool that never existed. This is a way to generate revenue that does not include taxing the residents. Surrounding communities have wonderful pool facilities and many are on a waiting list. My feeling is that with these improvements we will not only pay off the bond with pool utility funds but we will increase revenue by tapping into a market of residents who do not attend the pool because of the age of the facility.

Redevelopment is also still moving forward, we believe that demolition of the Lyons Building should begin soon. This project will bring 140 units and store fronts to our downtown. This will begin before the end of the year with 2 other smaller projects in the horizon. By the next Major event at Baltustrol our downtown will be ready to offer more to those visiting our town.

Police Chief's Column Chief John P. Cook

THE POLICE AND THE COMMUNITY NEED TO WORK TOGETHER TO COMBAT CRIME

In my Patriot Times column this month I would like to again highlight by example the need for the police and the community to work together to prevent crime in Springfield. Between late June and early July the Springfield Police Department investigated a series of house burglaries that appeared to have been committed by the same suspect. Unlike many house burglars who stealthfully examine the exterior of a house to search for unlocked doors or windows to enter the home, this burglar merely kicked in a rear door. Once inside a home, the thief went directly to a master bedroom to take jewelry and then calmly exited and walked away from the area.

I would like to briefly explain what occurs when a crime such as a house burglary is reported to the police and how the community can assist. When the house burglary occurs the initial police officers who respond will be uniformed officers from the patrol division. The duties of these officers are to check the home and apprehend any intruder who may still be at the scene or in the area, as well as to check the surrounding homes and to safeguard the crime scene for the detectives. The detectives will attempt to retrieve evidence such as fingerprints that may lead to identifying the suspect.

Police officers will routinely canvas the area of a house burglary. This entails talking to neighbors to ascertain if they had seen anyone or anything suspicious during the time frame when the crime was committed. This is vital as many times people see someone or something but either do not want to call the police for fear that they are overreacting or do not realize that what they had seen earlier was of any significance. The canvas will also be made to locate nearby homes with external cameras that may have captured any images of the suspect either going to or fleeing from the scene of the crime.

Lastly a police K-9 scent tracking will be attempted by requesting the assistance of the Union County Sheriff's Office K-9 Unit. Scent tracking can tell detectives how an actor approached the house to break into and how the burglar fled. In the recent burglaries the dog tracking showed that the suspect would approach houses by entering into the back yards of houses on an adjacent street and then hopping over fences to enter the rear yards of the homes broken into.

Five separate houses broken into during a two week period, with these houses being in varied residential neighborhoods all across the township, indicated to detectives that the suspect was most likely residing locally as opposed to a transient burglar who will go from town to town committing crimes. The fact the burglar only took items that could easily be placed in a pocket most likely indicated the suspect was walking to and from the crimes and would therefore walk about residential neighborhoods looking for a house to hit as he blended in with anyone else you might see walking along our streets.

With each crime the detectives collected more evidence. This included footage from cameras that residents had at their homes that they immediately gave to police after hearing about a burglary being committed in their neighborhood, while patrol officers and detectives in unmarked cars drove around residential areas.

On July 12th a resident was in her backyard when a male entered and, when confronted, he very calmly stated that he was there to tell her that he had

stopped her recycle can from rolling down the street and with that he said good bye and walked away. This resident, having read a recent notification about the burglaries and what to look out for, sent out by the police department via the CodeRED Notification System, immediately called the police and gave a very detailed description of the subject which enabled us to quickly locate and detain him.

The subject was identified as the suspect sought for the five house burglaries and he was found to be local to the area as he had been staying at a motel on Route 22 since the end of June. He would walk about residential areas looking to break into a house in order to steal gold jewelry that he could later swap for heroin. This subject was charged with numerous counts of burglary, theft and criminal mischief and is currently in jail.

My officers and detectives are highly trained at their jobs and know how to protect the residents and businesses of Springfield. However, to more efficiently solve crimes that are committed, and deter crimes from even occurring, the police and the community need to work together. By calling the police to report suspicious activity such as someone seen cutting through backyards, soliciting door to door without a permit, or ringing a door bell but walking away, members of the public can alert the police to possible criminal activity in our residential neighborhoods that might otherwise go undetected.

Springfield, like every other community, large or small, is touched by the drug epidemic affecting our country and the resultant crimes that people commit to get money to buy illicit drugs. This arrest shows that information from the public can enable your police department to identify and stop criminal activity right in their own neighborhoods.

The arrest of this serial house burglar was the product of good police work, but more importantly, it was the direct result of the assistance from community members, whether it be someone who reported suspicious activity or someone who turned over surveillance footage from their home security camera system. Law enforcement agencies must rely on the members of the public and the business community to observe and report anything that may seem suspicious, unusual, or out of the ordinary. This is commonly known in police jargon by the catch phrase of.....SEE SOMETHING, SAY SOMETHING......In closing I cannot stress how important it is for the community to call the police and never feel that observations you make about something that you may feel is suspicious is not worth reporting as you may "bother" the police or that nothing will be done. Only by working together can the community and the police stop those persons who seek to commit crimes in Springfield.





SPRINGFIELD EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT TAKES TO THE AIR

On Monday evening, July 18th, a truck carrying containers of acid rolled over on Route 24/78 Eastbound in town. Springfield Fire Chief Carlo Palumbo requested Emergency Management to utilize its drone to fly over the accident and view the scene from above in order to evaluate what resources would be needed without putting any firefighters in harm's way. Wally Schultz, OEM Deputy Coordinator was on scene with Auxiliary Police Chief Angelo Palumbo assisting the Springfield Police Department and New Jersey State Police with traffic control. As traffic in town was very congested, they provided a route for drone operator John Cottage, Jr. to access the site. OEM brought the drone to the scene and in minutes had an excellent view from above of what had transpired. OEM Coordinator Scott Seidel stated "This was our first practical use of our drone. We have flown it at special events, such as the fireworks, but this is really what we purchased it for. If we helped safeguard a firefighter from having to approach the scene and evaluate it on the ground, it has paid for itself!" OEM plans to train members of both the Police & Fire departments in its use as it is available for both agencies to use at anytime.

WHAT TO DO IF YOU'RE **BASEMENT FLOODS**

If your basement has flooded, there are some really important things you should know. When in doubt, don't enter the flooded area until you are told it is safe by a qualified professional to do so. Call 911

First and foremost, consider your family's health and safety.

Entering a wet basement could be hazardous! Before you enter your basement, consider the following:

- Electrical Shock When your basement is wet, there is a legitimate risk of electrical shock. If you are positive that you can safely do so, turn off your home's power at the main breaker switches.
- Gas leaks Protect yourself against gas leaks. If you smell gas, leave the house right away and then contact Utilities Kingston immediately by calling 613-546-1181.
- Pollutants Sewage can contain bacteria and transmit disease and the floodwater in your basement may have originated from the sanitary sewer and contain raw sewage. Wear protective items including gloves, safety glasses, a face mask and be sure to wash thoroughly after any contact with sewage or items touched by sewage.
- Chemicals Cleaning may expose you to a wide range of contaminants, including those from the cleaning agents being used, as well as those that may have entered from flood waters. When you get to the cleaning stage, be sure to ventilate well and limit your exposure to contact and exposure as best you can.
- Structural damage While this is not that common, a flood with certain conditions may weaken walls or even ceiling structures. If there is any concern that structural integrity has been compromised or you simply don't know, leave the area and call 911.

Depending of the nature of the flooding, also consider...

- If the flooding is due to a burst water supply pipe in your home, and if you are safely able to do so, shut off the main incoming water valve as this could help minimize the damage. You will probably know this is the case because the water will be clean, and likely coming down through the house from an upper level. In the future, make note of where this shut-off is and keep access clear.
- If the flooding is due to a sewage backup (or you are not sure), do not flush the toilet, run a washing machine, dishwasher or any other feature with a drain since this is likely to increase the flooding. Report your backup to the municipality.

In the event there is major flooding in the area, Keep in mind you may not be the only resident experiencing the emergency. The Springfield Fire Department is capable of assisting and pumping basements that DO NOT have sump pumps. Documentation of flood locations helps municipal staff determine if any work is required on the municipal infrastructure.
