

On Saturday evening July 4th, to a near record crowd of over 3,000 spectators, Springfield once again hosted its annual Fourth of July Celebration, Take Pride in Springfield. As usual, the Fourth of July Committee Chairmen Scott Seidel and John Cottage spent the day before, and the morn-

ing of, looking at various weather forecasts.

According to Cottage, "When I checked just days before, it was a perfect forecast. Then as the 4th approached, rain was introduced, and predicted to be constant all day and into the night." Seidel noted that "we prepared our postponement plan which involves moving the entire celebration to the next clear night - in this case, Sunday the 5th. It involves rescheduling two bands, including people who flew in from the west coast to perform, sound mixers, petting zoo, rides, food vendors and volunteers." "Not something we want to do if it can be at all avoided," stated Cottage, mentioning that "only once since Scott and I have been doing this since 1978 have we postponed the celebration and it was a mess--it's like doing it twice." At 10 am on the 4th the decision needed to be made, forecasts showed some rain but a potential for clearing in the early evening. The call was made to go on the 4th! It turned out to be a beautiful summer evening with cool temperatures and low humidity--perfect for the celebration.

Message from the Mayor

Hello Springfield Friends and Neighbors,

This year's 4th of July concert and fireworks on Meisel field were some of the best I've seen in Springfield. As Deputy Mayor Margaret Bandrowski and I walked around the field in the hours before the fireworks show, we met so many people and shared some great conversations with Springfield residents and also with many people from the surrounding area. When asked why they chose Springfield, almost everyone exclaimed what a great town we have

and that our 4th is the best around. I took such great pride in hearing this. Knowing that people are recognizing the wonderful community in which we live is truly one of the best parts of being Mayor.

We continue to make progress on key projects in Springfield. Last month we accomplished two very momentous tasks in that the Township Committee finally passed two ordinances on downtown redevelopment. Ed has served as Township Administrator for Springfield in the past and has also been our township attorney and member of the Township Committee. A long-time Springfield resident, Ed will be perfect filling this position while we search for a permanent replacement for outgoing Township Administrator Anthony Cancro. On that note, we wish Anthony Cancro all the best in his future endeavors.

On behalf of the Springfield Township Committee, I wish you a safe and happy summer. Also, I urge you to attend town hall meetings and bring your input to help us make the best decisions for our community. The Township Committee meets in regular session at 7:30 p.m. on the second and fourth Tuesdays of every month in the Municipal Building. MAKING IT EASIER TO GET A CONSTRUCTION PERMIT IN SPRINGFIELD

The Township of Springfield is making it easier to apply for construction permits with a new cloud-based system called GovOnline.

The Township is implementing GovOnline to offer business owners, residents, and contractors the ability to apply for construction permits online, 24/7, from the comfort of their homes or offices. GovOnline also allows the Township staff to communicate with the applicants in real-time, facilitate internal reviews, streamline the application process, and improve transparency as the applicants can now track their application status online and receive alerts via phone and email. Springfield's Engineering Department, which oversees Building office and construction permits, is pleased to offer such a service to residents and valued customers.

"The need to make the construction permitting process easier, faster, and more efficient is essential in supporting the Township's vision to achieve realistic growth while maintaining a business-friendly municipality." according to Springfield's Mayor David Barnett. The online permitting system allows its users to submit their applications, make payments, and request inspections online. By doing so, this eliminates several trips and telephone calls to the department which only operates during certain office hours.

Contractors that manage hundreds of projects could use GovOnline to organize and track their projects for multiple clients throughout the entire project cycle.


"GovOnline will, over time, dramatically reduce the administrative workload for every construction permit request. The Construction office no longer has to re-enter the application information, which saves valuable time and resources," according to Sam Mardini, Springfield's Director of Engineering. In the near future, inspections can be captured using mobile devices while maintaining accurate and up-to-date records for each permit from start-tofinish

The Springfield Engineering Department is also planning to expand the positive project experiences to include online zoning permit applications. THREE MORE RAIN GARDENS BEAUTIFY SPRINGFIELD

The new 3-part front rain garden at the Jonathan Dayton High School is a functional and educational celebration of water, stone, and plants as expressions of New Jersey's unique geographies. "The high school's three zone 'Jersey Rain Garden' represents the distinct types of geology and plant communities found across the state; moving from the higher ground near the main entrance (to the right) the rain garden portrays the landscapes of the Valley and Ridge and Highlands. The middle garden shows the Piedmont and the left hand, lower garden the Coastal Plain. Plant communities found in New Jersey's hardwood wetlands, floodplain forests, shrub wetlands, shallow emergent marshes and high salt marshes are represented along with types of geology found in each zone," according to Tobiah Horton, Assistant Professor and Extension Specialist at Rutgers and designer of all the rain gardens recently built in Springfield as a result of the Township receiving a grant from Sustainable Jersey. All of the gardens have been collaborative construction projects involving townspeople, town workers, school participants, and heavy lifting by the DPW and the Board of Education Facilities crew.

The plants are native selections from the Pinelands Nursery in Columbus and Pleasant Run Nursery in Allentown. All of the stone (granite, limestone, sandstone and glacial erratics of various composition) is sourced locally from New Jersey quarries (supplied by Wicki Stone in Great Meadows), except basalt salvaged from the Springfield's own defunct Houdaille Quarry.




"Anthropogenic" or human-made stone is not ignored either, in the Piedmont garden (middle garden) an area of broken concrete or "urbanite" forms one of the weirs that control the flow of stormwater across the gardens. This construction in reused concrete (from the town transfer lot) demonstrates the 'green infrastructure" concept of pavement removal or modification to reduce stormwater runoff and encourage infiltration. On average, the 3,100sf JDHS Jersey Rain Garden will capture and infiltrate the first 1.5 inches of rainfall (90% of all storms). This will prevent direct runoff and associated pollution, erosion and flood contribution of approximately 10.5 million gallons of stormwater annually into Van Winkle Brook and the Rahway River. Tested even before completion during last month inundation that flooded Mountain Avenue in front of Town Hall, the garden filled with water and fully drained as designed in less than 24 hours (the mosquito breeding cycle requires more than 72 hours of stagnant ponding). Beyond the stormwater function, it is hoped that the new garden will become a useful teaching tool as well as a unique, progressive, and inspiring daily welcome to students, teachers, and visitors.

"We are glad to partner with the Township of Springfield in building these beautiful rain gardens that illustrate three types of New Jersey geography and plant communities." according to Matt Clark Business Administrator for the Springfield Board of Education. Keep on the lookout for the final garden to be installed between Van Winkle's Brook and the parking lot for the Motor Vehicles Commission. As a rain garden/stream edge restoration, this next garden will invite visitors to consider the linked issues of impervious surfaces, channelized streams, and frequent flooding. "Springfield has a unique opportunity to invite its streams back into the fabric of daily life through edge enhancements that may also lessen impacts from heavy storm events. Green infrastructure such as rain gardens and edge improvements that consider flooding, access, and economic potential of redevelopment next to an environmental amenity could restructure the town's relationship to its many creeks and rivers," comments Rutgers' Ĥorton.

Springfield resident Ana Harper was honored with the Susan G. Komen North Jersey's "Promise of One Award" at Affiliate's May 20th Volunteer Recognition Dinner at the Essex House in West Orange. The Promise of One award recognizes the power "one" person has to advance the Komen promise to save lives and end breast cancer forever. It is given to a volunteer who goes above and beyond the call of duty and consistently strives to further the position of the Affiliate within the community while keeping the mission at heart.

Ana was 39-years old and 6-1/2 months pregnant with her 3rd child when she was diagnosed with triple-negative breast cancer in 2013. Her daughter Hanah heard her parents discussing the mounting medical bills, and was inspired to help.

Without telling her mother, 12-year-old Hanah initiated a one-month "Ribbon Pledge Campaign" at her school, St. James the Apostle School in Springfield, and raised \$600. Right before spring break, the school sent a check home with Hanah in an envelope with Ana's name on it.


Ana and her husband decided to donate the funds to Komen North Jersey, because, Ana said, "although we need it, we are sure that there must be someone out there who needs it more." She said that they wanted to make a difference, and that if by donating the money, one or two women would now have access to a mammogram, then it would be worth it.

Last November, Ana traveled to South Carolina and spoke with great power and conviction on behalf of Komen North Jersey at the Flash / Splash fundraiser sponsored by the New Jersey State Firefighter's Mutual Benefit Association and the New Jersey State Police Benevolent Association to benefit our Affiliate. In April, she was one of the beautiful survivor models in the Fashion Show at Komen North Jersey's pre-race survivor event at Lord & Taylor Westfield.

Her daughter Hanah was one of this year's Kids for the Cure Ambassadors, representing Union County. Ana personally raised over \$2,000 for this year's Race for the Cure, and her team, Chase Life, raised almost \$6,000. GRILLING SAFETY TIPS

Fire in the grill, under hot dogs and burgers, is a welcome sight at the family cookout. But fire anywhere else can make your summer kick-off barbecue memorable for all the wrong reasons. Each year an average of 8,800 home fires are caused by grilling, and close to half of all injuries involving grills are due to thermal burns. While nearly half of the people who grill do it year-round, July is the peak month for grill fires.

To keep you and your family safe while grilling, follow these general guidelines:

- Propane and charcoal BBQ grills should only be used outdoors.
- The grill should be placed well away from the home, deck railings, and out from under eaves and overhanging branches.
- Keep children and pets away from the grill area.
- Keep your grill clean by removing grease or fat buildup from the grills and in trays below the grill.
- Never leave your grill unattended.
- Check the major connection points between the gas (propane) tank hose and the regulator and cylinder, and where the hose connects to the burners. Tighten if loose.
- •Check the gas (propane) tank hose for the potential (gas) leaks. To do that:
 - 1. Apply a light soap and water solution to the hose using a brush or spray bottle.
 - 2. Turn the propane tank on. If there is a gas leak, the propane will release bubbles around the hose (big enough to see).
 - 3. If there are no bubbles, your grill is safe to use. If there are bubbles, turn off the tank and check connections, and then have your grill serviced by a professional before using it again. If the leak doesn't stop, call the fire department immediately.

When the grill is on:

- As you are cooking, if you smell gas, turn off the gas tank and burners.
- If the leak stops immediately, get the grill serviced by a professional before using it again.
- If the smell continues, move away from the grill and call the fire department immediately. Do not move the grill.

Charcoal grills:

- There are several ways to get the charcoal ready to use. Charcoal chimney starters allow you to start the charcoal using newspaper as a fuel.
- If you use a starter fluid, use only charcoal starter fluid. Never add charcoal fluid or any other flammable liquids to the fire.
- Keep charcoal fluid out of the reach of children and away from heat sources.
- There are also electric charcoal starters, which do not use fire. Be sure to use an extension cord for outdoor use.
- When you are finished grilling, let the coals completely cool before disposing in a metal container.

The grant application was prepared by Assistant Recreation Director Heather Re and Recreation Director Adam Lieb, along with cooperation from other municipal departments.

TOWNSHIP COMMITTEE RECAP

Meeting of Tuesday, June 23:

The meeting was held on the 235th anniversary of the Battle of Springfield. At this meeting, an ordinance was read for the first time which will create a new Recreation Council; this will consist of representatives of the organized sports clubs, among others stakeholders (such as the Seniors), and will replace the previously appointed Recreation Committee. A check for a \$65,000 grant from the County was presented by Freeholder Vice-Chair Bruce Bergen. The funds will be used for a new Rain Garden at Municipal Lot No. 1 as well as other projects. Other resolutions included those for the purchase of new pump and ladder truck for the fire department (thanks to Chief Carlo Palumbo for his success in these negotiations), and a shared Animal Services agreement. The resignation of Anthony Cancro as Township Administrator was accepted and former Township Administrator Edward Fanning was appointed Interim Administrator. A resolution approving a conditional redeveloper agreement for the Morris Ave. lot was tabled.

Police Chief's Column Chief John P. Cook

I ask that all recipients of the Springfield Patriot Times take just a few moments to read over these suggested tips on how to prevent your becoming a victim of a crime. While there is no fool proof way to guarantee that a crime is not committed against you, these tips may help protect you, your family, your property and personal identity information.

- Whether you leave your home for a day or only an hour remember to make sure to lock all doors and windows. Most house burglaries are commonly referred to as "break-ins" but burglars routinely walk around your home trying all doors and windows to see if one was inadvertently left unlocked so they do not have to break into your home. Remember that a closed window is not a locked window.
- Remember to always lock your car, especially in your driveway overnight and make sure the windows are closed. Cars in driveways become a frequent target of thieves who merely walk about residential areas late at night where they simply try door handles to find unlocked cars that they will then rummage through.
- Never leave valuables inside of your car overnight in your driveway as every year residents who have their cars burglarized, either by leaving it unlocked or by the thief forcing entry into it, will report the theft of cellular phones, wallets, handbags, laptop computers or tablets, cameras, GPS units and other valuables.
- Consider installing motion sensor lights around your home as an added deterrent.
- Be wary of persons at your door soliciting various types of home repair work as some may do a good job but many are just looking to con you out of your money. Some door-to-door thieves may try to con you into paying for home repairs that will wind up costing you more money to undo what they supposedly repaired. Others may try to lure you into your backyard under the guise of doing work on a neighbor's tree or requiring help retrieving a lost pet but these pretenses are done to afford additional suspects to enter your unlocked front door to commit thefts.
- You should not walk along the street or through parking lots, to or from your car, while using a smart phone as your attention is on the phone and not on the thief who will run up to snatch your phone, sometimes by physically assaulting you.
- Remember that whenever you receive a telephone call, an e-mail or a letter that indicates you have won some type of monetary prize, lottery or sweepstake and you are required to pay some type of fee to collect your prize winnings...this is a scam to con you out of money. Legitimate prizes require no payment of any fees.
- Be wary of e-mails you may receive from a bank you have a debit or credit card account with or a store where you may have used the card where the e-mail is to alert you to possible fraud on your debit or credit card account. Instead of blindly contacting the number listed on the e-mail or clicking on the supplied link you should contact your bank or the store via the numbers on your debit or credit card. Fraudsters will create very realistic looking e-mails

to con you into calling them under the guise of being your bank or a store in order to extract your full account number and or personal identity information.

- If you receive a telephone call from the IRS saying you need to pay some type of back tax immediately to avoid arrest, this is a scam. If the telephone caller says he or she is a law enforcement officer and you must immediately pay bail for a criminal charge signed against you or you will be arrested, this is a scam. If you receive a call indicating you failed to appear for jury duty and you need to pay a fine immediately or risk being arrested, this is a scam. No law enforcement or governmental agency will call threatening an arrest unless you make some type of payment where the requested payment demanded is to be made by either your debit or credit card account number or by your going to a store to purchase a prepaid MoneyPak card or to send your payment via a Money Gram or Western Union wire transfer. If you receive any of these types of calls, you should look up the telephone number for the supposed agency and contact the IRS or the police agency to verify if the call you received was legitimate. Remember that when an actual reason exists where a warrant will be issued for your arrest the only time you will be afforded an opportunity to pay your bail will be after you're arrested.
- If you receive a call from someone purporting to represent the electric company or the gas company where you are instructed to make a payment for an overdue bill or your service will be immediately shut off, you should get the information the caller gives you and look up the phone number yourself for the named utility company and contact them to verify if the call you received was legitimate.
- If you sell anything on-line or if you advertise any type of service or business on-line and you receive a check from a purported buyer or customer where the check is made out for more than the agreed upon price, AND you are requested to wire the overpayment back to the remitter, this is most likely a scam where the check you initially received is counterfeit. Ask your bank to examine the check.
- Be wary of telephone calls where you are told a relative, usually reported to be out of state or in a foreign country on vacation, has been involved in a motor vehicle accident or has been arrested and you are asked to wire money for bail or for hospital bills or to pay damages. Nowadays thieves will obtain names and other information for your relatives off of social media sites such as FaceBook to use when calling you. If you receive such a call merely get all of the contact information from the caller and hang up. Immediately call your relative who is supposedly on vacation in order to verify that the call you received is a scam.

These are just but a few tips on how to prevent some of the more prevalent crimes and scams that some township residents unfortunately fall victim to every year. If you are in doubt of a suspicious call, email, or person, please contact the police department so that an officer can meet with you to offer our assistance.

UNION COUNTY AWARDS SPRINGFIELD \$65,000 INFRASTRUCTURE GRANT

The Township of Springfield received a \$65,000 grant from the Union County Board of Chosen Freeholders on June 18, 2015 for their application to the 2015 Infrastructure and Municipal Aid Program.

According to Deputy Mayor Margaret Bandrowski, "This County grant will fund three critical projects that will improve our downtown areas which the Township has been focusing on the last few years. We are very grateful to the County for seeing the value of these projects."

The projects include:

1. Downtown Bus Shelter Renovation and Streetscape Improvement - The bus shelter is located at the corner of Morris Ave and Mountain Ave in Springfield. It is a highly visible and used bus shelter which is in serious need of replacement and reconstruction. The funding will be used for the design of a new bus shelter, demolition of the existing bus shelter, replacement of damaged sidewalk and curb work, new landscaping and new bus shelter(s).

2. Riverwalk Rain Garden Improvement Project - The Township received a grant for the Together North Jersey, Connecting People, Places and Potential, Morris Avenue Vision and Mobility Plan, which the County assisted in preparing and supported. The grant promotes: traffic calming and traffic flow; pedestrian/bicycle improvements; stormwater management and sustainable infrastructure; relocation/improvements for traffic stops, all intended to create a more "walkable downtown." To implement one of the recommendations, a portion of the Van Winkle Brook along Mountain Avenue will be cleared. This project is called the "Riverwalk Rain Garden Improvement Project." The Township is requesting Infrastructure Aid funding to build a rain garden in the rear section of what the Township calls Lot 1, adjacent to the NJ Division of Motor Vehicles on Center and Hanna Streets. The stream embankments will be cleared of invasive species and replaced with native stream bank vegetation on both sides, and the streetscape area will be landscaped to make an attractive streetscape /riverwalk pedestrian walkway. The rain garden will help with excessive water flow from parking Lot 1 into the garden and not into the storm sewer system. Several bike racks and benches will also be installed along the walkway.

3. Decorative Garbage and Recycling Containers for Downtown - The Township will install decorative garbage and recycling containers in the downtown areas along Morris and Mountain Avenues, replacing old and unsightly containers. The Township will purchase 30 garbage and recycling containers to be used in both avenues of the downtown.

The \$1,500,000 County Infrastructure and Municipal Aid grant initiative was made available as a result of the sale of the county-owned Runnells Hospital. Funding was made available to twenty-one municipalities in the County of Union on a competitive basis.


