#### Message from the Mayor



I am proud to welcome everyone to the second edition of the Springfield Patriot. It is my pleasure to report that every single person who commented on our town's new paper had very positive things to say.

The purpose of this paper is to provide facts and information to the residents of Springfield. So with that in mind, I would like to let everyone know of some events and projects that are being reviewed by the township committee.

First, it has been brought to our attention that the historic Cannonball House is in need of major repairs. The house is the property of the Historical Society, and they are currently looking into what the cost will be to make the repairs. Since the township committee cannot provide funding for this, on behalf of the Historical Society, I would like to ask that anyone interested in helping through donations, or any other means, contact Margaret Bandrowski, of the Society, at 973-376-4784. Hopefully, if we all work together, we can preserve this valuable piece of our town's history.

Second, the township committee has made a concerted effort to begin beautifying Springfield by allocating more money toward fixing the infrastructure of our town. We are paving more roads and hope to begin with our plan to systematically place decorative crosswalk pavers at various locations throughout town. We were planning on the crosswalk pavers program to begin in September on Mountain Avenue and Caldwell Place; however the county is now suggesting we wait until next year when they repave Mountain Avenue. A decision will be made in the coming weeks as to how we will proceed.

The township committee is also actively communicating with the major property owners on Morris and Mountain Avenues, to develop plans with them for improvements in those areas. We have already met with them once to discuss what the town can do to encourage them to incur the expense of these improvements.

And finally, the township committee was approached about one year ago by a private group who asked for permission to build a multi-purpose turf field in front of Dayton High School through private funding. Since the area in which they are interested in building is owned by both the Board of Education and the township, it will take a cooperative effort for this to occur. But beyond that, it is the steadfast belief of the township committee that this undertaking must be presented to us in a logical and pragmatic manner. This means that the funding for this project cannot come from taxpayer dollars, either during the construction phase or thereafter. And based on that, the township committee provided the group with a list of questions that we need answered to our satisfaction before we can provide our approval.

I can say without any hesitation that the majority of the township committee, if not everyone, is fully behind this project as long as it is presented in the manner I have explained above. We do not believe the taxpayers of Springfield should be burdened with an additional expense, but we also recognize the value and benefit a turf field facility could bring to our town. It is our responsibility to represent every resident of Springfield which is why we insist on this project being presented with detailed planning and financials.

I look forward to seeing more people attend our township meetings on the second and fourth Tuesday of each month. And I hope everyone enjoyed the summer and we can now look forward to the changing of the leaves in fall.



#### JON DENNING NAMED "STATE CHAMPION FOR NEW JERSEY"





#### WATERSHED POLLUTION **DEMONSTRATION OFFERED**

Springfield is in the Rahway River Watershed. This means that all rain falling in Springfield ends up in the Rahway River, which enters the town where it crosses Morris Ave. at Washington Ave. Along the way, from rooftops, driveways, lawns and roads, the rainwater picks up human activity pollutants, such as fertilizers, pesticides, oil, pet droppings, and household cleaners, carries them into the Van Winkles Brook, Bryant Brook, and other streams, and eventually deposits them into the Rahway River.

This polluting effect is dramatically demonstrated by the Springfield Environmental Commission with the aid of a 3-dimensional model likeness of the town. Audiences, especially children, will enjoy spreading common pollutants (simulated, of course) on the roads and lawns of the township model. Then a volunteer rainmaker can delight in sweeping this nasty stuff into the model's streams, destroying plant and animal life.

This 30 minute hands-on environmental demonstration is offered by the Springfield Environmental Commission to local groups with members of all ages. It could be an entertaining supplement to a regular meeting.

#### Police Chief's Column Chief William Chisholm

As a service to the community, the police department would like to make the residents aware of some issues that arise throughout the year.

#### **BICYCLES**

During the warmer weather months there is an increase in the number of bicycles that are being operated in the township. Additionally, due to the increase of gas prices and a greater interest in physical fitness, we see an increase in the number of riders. First and foremost, the issue of safety should be considered by all riders. All bicycles should be inspected by a qualified bicycle shop to determine if there are any defects or repairs that should be done.

All bicycles should have an audible warning device, appropriate reflectors and when being ridden at night a lamp on the front with a white light visible for a distance of 500 feet and a red light visible from the rear for at least 500 feet.

Parents are reminded that any person under the age of 17 years shall wear an approved bicycle helmet while operating a bicycle on public roadways. This applies to any passenger who rides while in a restraining seat which is attached to the bicycle or in a trailer towed by the bicycle. Adults should seriously consider wearing a helmet to reduce the chances of injury in the event of a fall.

Bicycle riders shall adhere to all of the rights and subject to all of the duties applicable to the driver of a vehicle. Every person operating a bicycle upon a roadway shall ride as near as possible to the right side of the roadway as practicable, exercising due care when passing a standing vehicle or one proceeding in the same direction.

Bicycles may move to the left when making a left turn from a left turn lane or pocket; to avoid debris, drains or other hazardous conditions that make it impracticable to ride at the right side of the roadway; to pass a slower moving vehicle; to occupy any available lane when traveling at the same speed as other traffic; to travel no more than two abreast when traffic is not impeded, but otherwise shall ride in single file (N.J.39:4-11; 39:4-10; 39:4-14 et.seq.).

During the year the police department offers inspections for children's bicycles and safety tips for the children. Interested individuals should contact Corporal John Rowley or Officer Jonathan Rachel at 973-921-1775.




