



Police Chief's Column Chief John P. Cook

Residents may notice an increase in the visible enforcement of motor vehicle violations by Springfield police officers, this being done to coincide with the school closings for summer recess. This enforcement is not done merely to cite motorists for violations but to hopefully educate both drivers and pedestrians alike in the safe and proper use of township roadways in an effort to reduce vehicle accidents. It is imperative that motorists operate their vehicles with extra caution during the summer months when more people are outdoors, especially children playing in residential areas and local parks or walking or riding bicycles along township streets.

A law change went into effect in 2010 that has now changed the statute that originally only required motorists to yield to pedestrians who were legally crossing in a crosswalk to now require the motorist to come to a complete stop for a pedestrian in any crosswalk.

Both resident and business recipients of the Springfield Patriot Times are reminded that there are many intersections that are not controlled by a traffic signal and that are located on more heavily trafficked roadways. It is vital that motorists now come to a complete stop when approaching an intersection with crossing pedestrians.

Plainclothes police officers may be posing as pedestrians while crossing at various intersections throughout the township. Motorists who fail to stop for the "crossing pedestrian" will be stopped by uniformed officers and issued a summons for failing to stop for pedestrians. Police officers will specifically target intersections throughout the township where there have been past incidents of either pedestrians or bicyclists having been struck by automobiles. These also include those intersections where pedestrians have been seriously injured or killed.

This enforcement action will continue during the summer months in order to ensure the maximum safety of children and adults walking about the streets in the township. Not only are motorists expected to stop for a pedestrian using a crosswalk, but the pedestrian is expected to legally cross a roadway at an intersection with a traffic signal, a crosswalk, or where a crosswalk would be located at the intersection of two streets. Any pedestrian crossing a roadway illegally can be stopped and ticketed by police officers as well.


Other police operations being conducted will target some of the major causes of motor vehicle accidents that occur within the township. Officers will be stopping motorists who operate a motor vehicle while using a cellular telephone that is not set up for hands free operation or are observed to be text messaging while driving. The other violations that contribute to a high number of accidents that are also being addressed are speeding, the improper use of specific turning lanes at intersections, failure to wear seat belts and the varied reckless, careless or aggressive types of driving that plague our roadways daily.

Recipients of the Springfield Patriot Times are urged to make sure that any child under the age of 17 only rides a bicycle while wearing an approved, properly fitted and fastened bicycle helmet. This law also applies to any child who rides upon a bicycle while in a restraining seat that is attached to the bicycle or in a trailer that is hooked up to and is towed by the bicycle. Despite the mandatory age requirement for the wearing of bicycle helmets, this is something that all bicyclists should do in order to prevent head injuries.

The daily rush hour traffic congestion combined with more and more motorists seeming to be rushing to get to their destinations and the summer months having more children being out and about makes it vital that motorists use common sense and caution when driving. Police officers know better than most about the tragic consequences that result from accidents caused by inattentive or careless drivers. Hopefully by increased and visible traffic enforcement, accidents resulting in injuries or deaths can be prevented. Applications will be accepted beginning May 15, 2017, and the deadline for applications will be June 30, 2017.

Springfield Police Department Chief of Police John P. Cook has announced the dates for the 2017 session of its Junior Police Academy. The academy will be running one, one-week session from July 31st thru August 4th, 2017, which will be held at the Springfield Police Department. Classes will run from 8:00 am to 2:00 pm daily.

This will be the inaugural session of this program, designed to provide area youth with the opportunity to gain an understanding of the role of the Police Officer. While other youth academy programs provide a day camp setting, the Springfield Police Junior Academy has been modeled after today's police academy. Those accepted to the program will undergo physical training and daily training in Drill and Ceremony, will be instructed in criminal investigation techniques, evidence recovery, patrol practices and effects of alcohol and drugs. In addition, the cadets will participate in field trips to the Union County Police Academy and attend demonstrations from various specialized units that are available to law enforcement, such as the police canine unit, SWAT team, and the bomb squad.

Each cadet will receive official Springfield Police Junior Academy uniforms to wear throughout the course. Upon successful completion of the course, the cadets will participate in a graduation in which they will be presented with a certificate of completion.

Acceptance into this program requires that the applicant be between the ages of 11-14. Those that qualify will be selected based upon the return date of their application and tuition payment of \$100.00. These applications are to be dropped off to the desk Officer at the Police Department. Please note, however, that preference will be given to Springfield residents. A sport which had always given the image of a privileged or an elitist game (as nearly all the teams came from private or prep schools), lacrosse had about 100 high school teams in the 1990's grow to 184 in 2003, and then to over 330 teams in 2017. That is tremendous growth and that growth has FINALLY hit the town of Springfield and Jonathan Dayton High School!.....Jeff Kaesshaefer and his coaches, Robert Spinner, Chris Stebbings, Chad Rubin, Phil Turnbull, Brady Hendrickson, and Dermot McLeer all helped achieved that. One other achievement – was the addition of Coach Lynn Stebbings (Former College player) who helped not only with our 2nd and 3rd Boys – but more importantly the growth of the Springfield Girls Lacrosse teams!! From 10 girls two years ago to two teams with over 30 girls participating!!!

Although the numbers and experience aren't quite there yet for our first high school season – the promising Youth teams coming to Dayton over the next few seasons hope to change that quickly. The Springfield Boys 8th grade team, the programs first group that started in 4th grade, currently has the most experience and the most Summer Club players. With a stingy Defense lead by goalie Nick Stampolous (Force Summer Club), Cole Kebea (Force Summer Club), Anthony Apicella (Force Summer Club), Anthony Corigliano (Emeralds Summer Club), Sam Roth (Force Summer Club), Daniel Munoz, and second year player David Greenman - and a more patient offense lead by Gavin Dzikowski (14 goals, 3 Assists) (2Knights Summer Club), Mike Kanarek (5 Goals, 2 Assists) (Emeralds Summer Club), Elijah White (5 Goals)(Emeralds Summer Club), Ethan Coelho (4 Goals, 1 Assist)(Force Summer Club) and David Ares (4 Assists)(Force Summer Club). Experienced returning players, Alex Gary (2 Goals, 1 Assist) Jordan Berkowitz (1 Goal, 2 Assists) Gary Mignon (3 Goals, 1 Assist), Ryan Sickinger (2 Goals), Jordi Frei (1 Assist) Brandon Doren (1 Goal, 1 Assist) Matt Gomes (1 Goal), Evan Kaye (1 Goal) and two promising first year players, Zach Abramovitz (1 Goal) and Joe Grzybowski (1 Goal). 


Organizations and People that make a Difference in Springfield

SPRINGFIELD AMERICAN LEGION POST 228

The American Legion is the nation's largest organization of veterans and their families. Today it counts more than 2 million members who support their community with more than 13,000 posts across the United States. Since its inception by Congress in 1919, the Legion works every day on behalf of US Service men and women.

The American Legion Post of Springfield is correctly identified as Continental Post 228 of the American Legion of New Jersey. It has been in existence for over 70 years. One member, Ray Schramm received his 70-year membership award two years ago. Don Schwerdt just received his 60-year award. The Post was formed as a fraternal organization where veterans could get together and share their experiences. The veterans served their country in wartime and continued to serve their community in peacetime. Many veterans served Springfield by becoming police officers, business leaders, members of the First Aid Squad and serving in town government.



Some well known names in the community and past members of Post 228 include former Post Commanders Bill and Ethel Smith. Herb Quinton, Herb Simpson, and Bill Weber. Current active members include Don Auer, Sanford Drucks, Joe Policastro, Pete Mongiello, Rich Novak and Don Rathjans.

You may have seen veterans distribute Poppies in the days leading up to Memorial Day or at Veterans Park at the corner of Shunpike Road and Mountain Ave. The donations received are used to help veterans. The Springfield Post goes to the East Orange Veterans Hospital numerous times in the year to provide entertainment to the patients there. They join other Posts from Union County to provide help to homeless veterans and sponsor job fairs for veterans. The Post is very grateful to those who take a poppy and donate to help veterans. The biggest need of the Springfield American Legion Post, as well as the county organization and the national organization is new members. The veterans from World War II, Korea and Viet Nam are aging rapidly.

HELP PRESERVE SPRINGFIELD'S HISTORY

The Cannon Ball House, home of the Springfield Historical Society (SHS), is one of four village homes that survived the American Revolution and the only one that provides tours to the public. The first documented owner is Dr. Jonathan Dayton, uncle to the signer of the US Constitution for which our high school is named, and half-brother to General Elias Dayton of Revolutionary War fame. Dr. Dayton died in 1778, leaving his wife and children to run the household. It is believed that Keturah Dayton, his widow, established a tavern in the home to support the family after his death. During the Battle of Springfield (June 23, 1780), her home was used as a field hospital, thereby saving it from being burned to the ground during the British retreat.

The Cannon Ball House is listed on the State and National Registers of Historic Places. In an effort to be pro-active, the SHS hired an historical architectural firm to prepare a Conditions Assessment. The assessment includes a list of repair and maintenance projects that are recommended to ensure the continued stability and use of the now 270+ year old building. The Springfield Historical Society works on preserving Springfield's rich history and sharing it with local schools and the community. There are open house events held throughout the year for the public as well as historical tours given to our elementary school students over a period of several weeks during each school year.

At this time, the SHS is asking for the support of the community. Businesses and residents are encouraged to make tax deductible donations to the Springfield Historical Society's fundraising campaign to ensure the proper maintenance of this significant relic of Springfield's Revolutionary history. Take pride in Springfield by supporting the icon that represents the victory of the Battle of Springfield and is the only repository of local artifacts from three centuries to educate the public. Approximately 10% of thunderstorms are considered severe, which means they produce hail at least three quarters of an inch in diameter, have winds of at least 58 miles per hour, or produce a tornado. Lightning often strikes outside of heavy rain and may occur as far as 10 miles from any rainfall. Most lightning deaths and injuries occur when people are caught outdoors in the summer months during the evening or afternoon. The chances of being struck by lightning are about 1 in 600,000.

BEFORE

- Stay informed—listen to a NOAA weather radio to check local forecasts and news reports regularly. Keep a battery-powered or hand-cranked radio along with extra batteries.
- Buy ground fault protectors for key electrical equipment.
- Remove dead or rotting trees and branches that could fall.
- If a thunderstorm is likely in your area, postpone outdoor activities.
- Shutter windows and secure outside doors and objects. Secure outdoor objects that could blow away.
- Unplug appliances and other electrical items, such as computers, and turn off air conditioners. If you are unable to unplug them, turn them off.

DURING

- Follow the 30-30 rule: When you see lightning, count the seconds until you hear thunder. If that time is 30 seconds or less, the thunderstorm is within 6 miles and is dangerous. Seek shelter immediately. The threat of lightning continues longer than most people think. Wait at least 30 minutes after the last thunder before leaving your shelter.
- If you can hear thunder, you are within striking distance for lightning. Seek safe shelter immediately.
- Stop outdoor activities at the first clap of thunder and get inside a large building or an enclosed vehicle. Wait 30 minutes after the thunder to go back outside.
- When inside, stay off corded phones, computers, and other electronic equipment that put you in direct contact with electricity or plumbing. Cordless phones and cell phones are safe to use. Avoid showering or bathing.
- If you are in open water, go to land and seek shelter immediately.
- If you feel your hair stand on end, indicating that lightning is about to strike, squat low to the ground on the balls of your feet. Place your hands over your ears and your head between your knees. Make yourself the smallest target possible and minimize your contact with the ground. Do not lie flat on the ground.

AFTER

- If a person is struck by lightning, call 9-1-1 and get medical care immediately.
- Lightning strike victims carry no electrical charge; attend to them immediately. Check their breathing, heartbeat, and pulse.

The Springfield Auxiliary Police swore in two new members on May 9th. Officers Marcelo Montanga and Steven Friedman graduated from the John H. Stamler Police Academy. The Officers, all volunteers, completed a comprehensive training class at the the John H. Stamler Police Academy which runs the class in cooperation with the Union County Office of Emergency Management. They train civilian volunteers to serve as Auxiliary Officers, who, under the New Jersey Civil Defense and Disaster Control Plan, can be appointed to augment the forces of the regular police departments in the event of emergencies. An Auxiliary Police Officer is a civic-minded resident who volunteers his or her time to the local Police Department. These officers serve as the "eyes and ears" of the police department. In addition, an Auxiliary Police Officer provides police presence in the community. In uniform, the Auxiliary Officer can conduct both foot and vehicle patrols, as well as assist with special events, such as festivals, parades and holiday activities. The Auxiliary Officer also serves the extremely important role of support during a state of emergency or other time of crisis.

Although the Auxiliary Police Officer volunteers his or her personal time, the officer upholds the same personal and professional standards as any law enforcement officer. Upon graduating from the Auxiliary Academy, the Auxiliary Police Officer is administered the Oath of Honor that is taken by all law enforcement officers.

237TH ANNIVERSARY OF THE BATTLE OF SPRINGFIELD

June 23rd will mark the 237th Anniversary of the Battle of Springfield, referred to as "The Forgotten Victory" in a 1973 book of the same name by Thomas Fleming.

On June 23, 1780, a force of roughly 5,000 British and Hessian soldiers attempted to capture General George Washington who was encamped in Morristown. Springfield was considered an easy path with no expectation of conflict. Much to their surprise, 1,500 Continental soldiers and Minutemen (residents who would take up arms at a moment's notice to help fight an enemy invasion) confronted the British forces with enough resistance that the British retreated, burning most buildings in the process. This was the last major Revolutionary War battle to occur in a Northern state.

We should be proud of our founding residents and of our rich history. Should the British have defeated the outnumbered American forces in Springfield, they would have had an excellent opportunity to capture General Washington, and the Revolutionary War could have had quite a different ending and our way of life would not be what it is today.
