

LURING SUSPECT ARRESTED

On Tuesday, October 1 at approximately 3:30 pm, Springfield Police received a report that a possible luring incident had taken place in the area of Baltusrol Way. Officers immediately responded to the scene to attempt to locate the suspect and to ensure the victim's safety.

Sergeant Ryan Westover spotted a vehicle traveling on Morris Turnpike that matched the description given by the victim, and initiated a motor-vehicle stop. The driver was positively identified as the subject involved in the incident, and was placed under arrest. James Simmons, 28, of Newark, NJ was charged with harassment and multiple motor vehicle violations, along with having an active warrant from Irvington, NJ.

Detective Sgt. James Mirabile, Detectives Anthony Voorhees and Foster Ziegler, Corporal Marc McBratney, and Officer Gregory Weinstock all assisted in the investigation.

Chief John Cook commended all officers that were involved in the case, stating: "The officers' immediate response to this incident, along with excellent investigative work and dedication to the safety of the public, led to another successful apprehension by our police department."



No appointments are necessary. The immunizations are free to all, but seniors with a Medicare Part B card are requested to bring it with them. All are reminded to wear short sleeves if possible when they come for their flu shot. Seasonal flu vaccine is recommended by Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) for everyone over the age of 6 months. According to the CDC, vaccination is especially important for people at higher risk of severe influenza and their close contacts, including healthcare personnel and close contacts of children younger than 6 months. Everyone is encouraged to receive the 2019-2020 flu vaccine. Most people are ill with flu for only a few days, but some get much sicker and may need to be hospitalized.





Cooking fires are the number one cause of home fires and home injuries. The leading cause of fires in the kitchen is unattended cooking. It's important to be alert to prevent cooking fires.

WHAT YOU SHOULD KNOW

- Be on alert! If you are sleepy or have consumed alcohol don't use the stove or stovetop.
- Stay in the kitchen while you are frying, grilling, boiling or broiling food.
- If you are simmering, baking or roasting food, check it regularly, remain in the kitchen while food is cooking, and use a timer to remind you that you are cooking.
- Keep anything that can catch fire oven mitts, wooden utensils, food packaging, towels or curtains away from your stovetop.

IF YOU HAVE A COOKING FIRE

- Just get out! When you leave, close the door behind you to help contain the fire.
- Call 9-1-1 or the local emergency number after you leave.
- If you try to fight the fire, be sure others are getting out and you have a clear way out.
- Keep a lid nearby when you're cooking to smother small grease fires. Smother the fire by sliding the lid over the pan and turn off the stovetop. Leave the pan covered until it is completely cooled.
- For an oven fire turn off the heat and keep the door closed.

SAFETY CONSIDERATIONS FOR COOKING WITH OIL

Oil is a key ingredient found in the majority of today's kitchens. Whether a recipe calls for frying or sautéing, we include oil in almost all of our daily cooking. When using any of the many oils to prepare your meals like olive, canola, corn or soybean, consider the following safety tips when cooking:

- Always stay in the kitchen when frying on the stovetop.
- Keep an eye on what you fry. If you see wisps of smoke or the oil smells, immediately turn off the burner and/or carefully remove the pan from the burner. Smoke is a danger sign that the oil is too hot.
- Heat the oil slowly to the temperature you need for frying or sautéing.
- Add food gently to the pot or pan so the oil does not splatter.
- Always cook with a lid beside your pan. If you have a fire, slide the lid over the pan and turn off the burner. Do not remove the cover because the fire could start again. Let the pan cool for a long time. Never throw water or use a fire extinguisher on the fire.
- If the fire does not go out or you don't feel comfortable sliding a lid over the pan, get everyone out of your home. Call the fire department from outside.

FACTS AND FIGURES

- A study published by the U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission found that 75% of range or stove fires started with food ignitions. Forty-three percent began with cooking oil; 33% started with fish or meat. Sixty-three percent of the range or stove fires beginning with food occurred when someone was frying.
- Fifty-five percent of the people who were injured in non-fatal reported home cooking fires during 2005-2009 were injured when they tried to fight the fire themselves.
- One of every four home fires reported in 2007-2011 started with fat or grease. One of every three reported fire injuries resulted from these fires.

TIME TO CLEAN THE PARKS VOLUNTEERS NEEDED

The Springfield Department of Public Works (DPW) and the Springfield Environmental Commission have joined forces to clean up township parks on Sunday, November 3. But, they need your help and have put out a call for volunteers. This new, fall version of Clean Communities day, aims to rid the parks of debris including plastic bottles, food containers and refuse that piles up after the spring, summer and fall sports and recreational seasons. Alyson Weber Miller, chair of the Environmental Commission, praised the efforts of the DPW, "We know the DPW does an extraordinary job of cleaning and maintaining our sports fields and playgrounds, but garbage does collect in the bushes and fringes of most of our parks. We'd like to clear this garbage out before winter." The parks to be cleaned are Washington, Irwin, Laurel, the Community Gardens/Patriot Park and the area between the Walton and Sandmeier Schools. The Environmental Commission will sign volunteer hours forms for middle and high school students.

Police Chief's Column - Chief John P. Cook HALLOWEEN SAFETY

Since Halloween is right around the corner, I thought it would be best to utilize this month's column to remind readers of the Springfield Patriot Times about the importance of staying safe while enjoying Halloween festivities. I encourage all community members to follow the safety tips below to help make sure everyone has a safe and pleasant time on Halloween

Parents should always accompany young children while they are trick-or-treating. Older children may be able to go by themselves, but they should always stay in a group with friends, use a pre-planned route, and have an agreed time to 'check in' with their family. Also, having a flashlight, glow stick, cell phone, and possibly even a first aid kit is a good idea while trick-or-treating. Costumes should be bright and contain reflective strips, and should be made of flame-retardant material. Long trailing fabric could pose a tripping hazard or even a fire hazard, as some people use candles in jack-o-lanterns. Make sure that any costumes with masks do not limit a child's ability to see ahead of them and all around them. Also, toy guns may look real in the dark, so costumes should not contain toy weapons of any kind.

While trick-or-treating, children should never be allowed to enter a person's home, unless it is a very close friend or relative. Parents should inspect all candy their children receive, and discard any unwrapped items or treats that look questionable. Children should not be allowed to eat any treat that hasn't been checked first. Any candy that appears to have been tampered with should be reported to the police department immediately.

Trick-or-treaters should respect their neighborhoods. Although it may seem like fun, 'mischief' such as smashing pumpkins, 'egging', and spray painting are all illegal activities that damage a person's property and could subject you to summonses, fines, and other serious penalties. Parents should remind their children to be thoughtful of others when taking candy left at a front door and to not deliberately damage or take any items such as decorations from homes along their trick or treating route.

Drivers should be extra careful and cautious when heading out on Halloween, and expect to contend with large groups of children racing from house to house for treats. Drivers must remember that children will be excited and may be less cautious while walking. They should anticipate children crossing the streets randomly, and possibly darting out from between parked vehicles. Before dusk and all evening, drivers should proceed slowly and with lights on in order to see children in costumes. Drivers should not use their cellular phones, unless equipped with a hands-free connection.

For those of you who won't be venturing out for trick-or-treating, and if you anticipate children coming to your home, please do not use external decorations that are illuminated with candles, especially at your front door or along paths on which children would walk. Glow sticks or battery operated candles are much safer alternatives. Also, keep in mind that household pets may become irritated from the added excitement of children coming and going, so care should be taken to keep pets in a safe and secure area while you answer the door. (Also remember to secure the candy treats in your home so your pets cannot get at them as many types of Halloween treats can be poisonous if eaten by cats and dogs).

For added safety, there will be an increased police presence throughout the town, especially in residential areas. Police officers will be patrolling in both marked and unmarked police vehicles, but all officers will wear full police uniforms for safety reasons. If you see anything suspicious or out of the ordinary, don't hesitate to call the police department or flag down a passing police officer to report it.

By simply understanding and following these suggested safety tips you can help in making Halloween both a fun and safe experience for our children
