

SPRINGFIELD POLICE OFFICERS APPREHEND **BURGLARY SUSPECTS**

On Thursday, March 7, 2019 at approximately 4:00 pm, the Springfield Police Department responded to a report of a possible burglary in progress. A resident contacted the police after being alerted by his housekeeper that a group of unknown males had walked through his yard toward a neighboring property, which was vacant. The resident observed the group exiting the neighboring home and fleeing the area in a vehicle, which he described to the police.

Officer Michael Wlazlo immediately responded to the scene, and through his preliminary investigation determined that a forced entry had been made to the vacant home. While enroute to assist, Officer Matthew Schmidt spotted the suspects' vehicle traveling on Mountain Âve. and initiated a motor vehicle stop. The four subjects in the vehicle were positively identified as the burglary suspects, and were placed under arrest by Officer Schmidt and Officer Anthony Kassis with the assistance of Mountainside PD. They are now facing charges of burglary, criminal mischief, and drug possession.

Chief John Cook credits the vigilance of the resident and the quick actions of the officers for this successful apprehension. Chief Cook commented to the Patriot Times: "Our community relies on a close working relationship between the police and the public. This is another instance where an observant homeowner and excellent police work by our officers keeps criminals off the streets.'



SPRINGFIELD CELEBRATES **BLACK HISTORY MONTH AT** CHISHOLM COMMUNITY CENTER

Residents of Springfield and neighboring communities joined together at Chisholm Community Center on the evening of Wednesday, February 6 to recognize Black History Month and the impact of notable African-American people and places on Union County.

This year's event, entitled "Celebrating Union County's Black History," built on the success of the 2018 affair, which focused on Springfield's rich African-American heritage. The 2019 celebration opened with a song, "Lift Every Voice and Sing," which Mayor Erica DuBois mentioned has become the "Black national anthem." Following the singing, John Prescott, History Programs Coordinator for the County of Union's Office and Cultural and Heritage Affairs, led the audience through a brief timeline of significant African-American contributions to Union County. His presentation included inventors, writers, educators, activists, and athletes, who called various communities within Union County home.

Union County was also home to Shady Rest Golf and Country Club, the oldest African-American golf clubhouse in the US. Known today as the Scotch Hills Golf Club, the main part of the old Shady Rest Clubhouse remains. Famous visitors such as Duke Ellington, Cab Calloway, and Count Basie graced the course at different points of the early 20th century.

The second portion of the event tackled the everchanging complexion of race relations in our society, an open forum for audience members to lend their perspectives to the current state of race in the US. Topics such as the role of media and social media on race took center stage.

Moderated by Mayor Erica DuBois, the event was also attended by Union County Freeholder Kimberly Palmieri-Mouded, Former Freeholder Bruce Bergen, Springfield Township Deputy Mayor Chris Capodice, and Springfield Township Committee Member Alex Keiser.

SPRINGFIELD IS ONE OF EIGHT TOWNS TO RECEIVE GRANT

Eight Towns Get Grants to Provide Boost for NJ Floodplain Reforestation Projects

Sustainable Jersey, The Nature Conservancy and The Watershed Institute partner to give grants and technical

Sustainable Jersey announced today that over \$38,000 was awarded to eight New Jersey municipalities for floodplain reforestation projects. The Roots for Rivers Reforestation Grant and Technical Assistance Program is a partnership between The Nature Conservancy, The Watershed Institute and Sustainable Jersey. Sam Mardini, Springfield's Director of Engineering applied for this Grant.

The grant recipients are Oakland Borough (Bergen), Mount Holly Township (Burlington), Vineland City (Cumberland), South Orange Village (Essex), High Bridge Borough (Hunterdon), Asbury Park City (Monmouth), Bernardsville Borough (Somerset) and Springfield Township (Union). These communities will receive funding to cover the costs of tree saplings and protection. The trees will be planted by local volunteers

Michelle DiBlasio, the Watershed Restoration Coordinator for the New Jersey Chapter of The Nature Conservancy, said, "Throughout much of the state, our floodplains have been deforested and left without trees to help filter water, absorb flooding, or cool the river for fish. One important way to help ensure we can continue to rely upon our precious natural water resources is to restore New Jersey's floodplains—the critical land near our rivers' banks. For the past five years, The Nature Conservancy has worked with local, state and federal partners in northwestern New Jersey to reforest the floodplains of a key tributary to the Delaware River, the Paulins Kill.

Planting trees in places where the floodplains have been degraded will protect the lands and waters on which the people of New Jersey depend. "Sustainable Jersey values our partnership with The Nature Conservancy. These grants will help catalyze floodplain restoration efforts across the state," explained Randall Solomon, executive director of Sustainable Jersey.

PHONY IRS SCAMS CONTINUE TO TARGET RESIDENTS

Despite the many warnings law enforcement agencies, news outlets, and other consumer groups issue, IRS scams continue to occur, and people continue to be victimized by the criminals who orchestrate these crimes. I hope the following information will help all readers of the Springfield Patriot Times identify these schemes, and I ask that you share this information with friends and family members to help prevent them from being victimized as well.

IRS Telephone Scam

Fraudsters, claiming to be agents with the Internal Revenue Service (IRS) or U.S. Treasury Department, will make random phone calls to people and "inform" them that they owe taxes or some other type of fine. Victims will be threatened with arrest, deportation, or other legal actions unless they immediately pay a specified amount of money. On some occasions, the caller may even say that officers from the Springfield Police Department are on the way to arrest the victim.

If a victim agrees to make the immediate payment for the back taxes and/or fines, the caller will require the payment to be made with pre-paid type of debit card (such as Green Dot Visa, I-Tunes Card, etc.) or by wiring the money directly (Western Union, Money Gram, etc.) With the pre-paid cards, fraudsters can retrieve the funds by merely having the victim read off certain numbers from the rear of the card. Sometimes, fraudsters will even direct victims to the nearest business where the cards or moneywire facilities are available.

Fraudsters are beginning to use computerized robo-calls to increase the amount of people targeted. Automated phone recordings purporting to be messages from the IRS, indicating there are problems with your taxes or recently filed tax returns, are becoming more common. The messages contain call-back numbers which will then directly connect the victim with the actual fraudsters. If you listen closely to these calls, you may notice the person speaking has a foreign accent, uses incorrect words or phrases, or has incorrect sentence structure, as many of these scammers operate from overseas.

IRS Email Scam

Fraudsters will send very authentic looking e-mails, purporting to be from the IRS, "notifying" you of a problem with your taxes. These emails may even contain the actual logos for the U.S. Treasury Department or IRS within the e-mail. Victims will be prompted to click on a link to get the "full information" about the problem.

These bogus links will take the victim to websites which contain fraudulent payment prompts and blank fields to input credit card, bank, and other protected personal information. Fraudsters will use these fake websites to steal your identity information, and possibly infect your computer with viruses or other types of ransom-ware programs.

IRS False Tax Return Scam

Another scam that occurs this time of year involves fraudsters utilizing your identity information to file fraudulent tax returns. The fraudulent returns will contain your true personal information, but will utilize a different address for the refund payment.

Once the IRS processes multiple return documents with the same Social Security Number used, they will contact you via US Mail, or sometimes by phone.

However, real agents from the IRS will understand if you question the legitimacy of the call, and will instead direct you to initiate contact yourself by visiting their real website at www.IRS.gov. They will not ask for any personal information or account numbers over the phone.

IMPORTANT TIPS TO REMEMBER.....

- The IRS will not contact you by telephone to request an immediate payment for back taxes, unfiled returns, or any other penalties. The IRS uses the US Mail as the primary method of contact.
- Do not click on links in e-mails purporting to be from the IRS in which you are asked to make some type of immediate payment. Write down the information from the e-mail and initiate contact with the IRS yourself by visiting www.IRS.gov, or by finding the telephone number for your nearest IRS field office.
- The IRS, like any other agency that has the power to seek the issuance of a warrant for your arrest, will never call you in advance to inform you of a warrant AND agree to dismiss a warrant in lieu of some type of monetary payment. If an actual warrant is issued for your arrest, you may be able to post bail, but you will first be arrested. Any telephone caller who suggests you can make a payment as a way to avoid being arrested is a fraud.

If you receive one of these communications and are unsure if it is legitimate, please call the Springfield Police Department before you give out any personal information, agree to transfer money, or make any payment. We can help you determine if the correspondence is real or a fraud, and prevent you from becoming another victim.

Library Director Dale Spindel (above on left) opened the event with brief remarks, inviting attendees to refreshments that included candies that were popular 50 years ago that are still in production today and requesting support for the Library's programs (\$25 is Fab, \$50 is Groovy and \$100 is Far Out). She then introduced the Odessa Klezmer Band to the packed room.

In addition to bandleader Ed Goldberg who is also is the group's accordionist and vocalist, other members of the ensemble include Stan Kaplan on saxophone, clarinet and flute, Bob "Mose" Marsley on percussion and Ellen Hodges on tambourine. Klezmer is the name given to celebratory music of the Jews of Eastern Europe although it also reflects the influence of musical styles from Turkey, Romania, Bulgaria and Germany. As Klezmer musicians migrated to America between 1880 and 1924, the sounds of American jazz also became an important influence on the Klezmer tradition.

The Library's year-long celebration will also feature discussions of books from 50 years ago, music & movies from 1969, as well as the current events of the time, including the moon landing.



In an emergency, call 911 or your local emergency number immediately from any wired or wireless phone.

An emergency is any situation that requires immediate assistance from the police, fire department or ambulance. Examples include:

- A fire
- A crime, especially if in progress
- A car crash, especially if someone is injured
- A medical emergency, such as someone who is unconscious, gasping for air or not breathing, experiencing an allergic reaction, having chest pain, having uncontrollable bleeding, or any other symptoms that require immediate medical attention

Important: If you're not sure whether the situation is a true emergency, officials recommend calling 911 and letting the call-taker determine whether you need emergency help. When you call 911, be prepared to answer the call-taker's questions, which may include:

- The location of the emergency, including the street address
- The phone number you are calling from
- The nature of the emergency
- Details about the emergency, such as a physical description of a person who may have committed a crime, a description of any fire that may be burning, or a description of injuries or symptoms being experienced by a person having a medical emergency

Remember, the call-taker's questions are important to get the right kind of help to you quickly.

Be prepared to follow any instructions the call-taker gives you. Many 911 centers can tell you exactly what to do to help in an emergency until help arrives, such as providing step-by-step instructions to aid someone who is choking or needs first aid or CPR.

Finally, do not hang up until the call-taker instructs you to.

If you dial 911 by mistake, or if a child in your home dials 911 when no emergency exists, do not hang up—that could make 911 officials think that an emergency exists, and possibly send responders to your location. Instead, simply explain to the call-taker what happened.

If you do not have an emergency, but require Police assistance, please call 973-376-0400. It is answered 24 hours a day, seven days a week by a Springfield Police Officer.

MOUNTAIN AVENUE STREETSCAPE – PHASE II

SPRINGFIELD TOWNSHIP, UNION COUNTY



In April 2019, the Business Improvement District in coordination with Springfield Township will begin construction of Phase II of the Mountain Avenue Streetscape Improvement Project. The project will continue the streetscape construction in the area already completed in Phase I. This section of Phase II will include an area approximately 250' west of the intersection of Mountain Avenue and Springfield Avenue and continue until opposite the Post Office Building.

The second section of Phase II will be constructed further west on Mountain Avenue primarily between ConnectOne Bank and Kipling Avenue. The construction in this section will be mainly on the south side of Mountain Avenue.

The Streetscape improvements include new paver sidewalks, decorative lighting, benches, trash and recycling containers that will enhance the aesthetic of the local business community.

Originally a colony settled by the Dutch and Swedes, New Jersey was seized by England in the mid-17th century. It also played a pivotal role in the Industrial Revolution, which completely transformed the United States.

Key wealth generators include financial services, telecommunications, chemicals and agriculture.

Compared to national averages, property crime levels are also very low at a ratio of 0.34 based upon 13.79 crimes per 1,000 which compares to the national average of 40.43.







MICHAEL BUTRICO MOVES ON



Thursday, February 28 signaled the global recognition for rare diseases, but for the Weissberg family, the day is about their son Holden and his unique genetic condition. Holden Weissberg has dup15q syndrome, which his mother, Lauren, explained afflicts "only 1,300 people worldwide."

For readers unaware of dup15q syndrome, understanding the disease can be quite complicated. According to the Dup15q Alliance website, "most people have 2 copies of chromosome 15...," one from their mother and one from their father. "Sometimes, extra copies... connect and form their own, extra chromosome." The symptoms can range from developmental delay to autism in addition to poor muscle tone, motor and language impairment, and even seizures.

One of the toughest realizations of the dup15q syndrome came from Marc, Holden's father, said, "I'm never going to be able to talk to my son." Fortunately, with a combination of special needs education, Applied Behavior Analysis (ABA), and therapy, Holden is making strides in his communication skills. Lauren explained that Holden "is more aware of the adults in his life and showing more awareness of the people in his life." And, that's important now that Holden has a new baby brother, Jonas.

Lauren continued, "In the two months that the baby came, he is more curious, more alert." Lauren and Marc have been strong advocates for dup15q syndrome, joining the Dup15q Alliance and rallying the community to learn more about the genetic disorder and other rare diseases. And, their efforts have paid off. Springfield residents that know the Weissberg family (and many who don't have any affiliation) wore blue on February 28 to raise awareness for dup15q on Rare Disease Day.

Lauren and Marc know that the funds they are raising may not cure Holden, but organizations like Dup15q Alliance offer clinics, treatments, and annual family conferences to learn from the experts. And, they are fortunate that their family, friends, school district, and community continue to support them.
