Dear Residents,

This past winter I shared with you the ongoing challenges of the rising costs in our municipality, state, and country over which we have no control.

The Township has been hard at work attempting to maximize our cost-saving efforts, including reviewing existing and potential new shared services agreements with other public entities, shifting service entities to control cost.

In the upcoming months we will be moving our emergency dispatch services from Mountain Valley to Union County Dispatch services saving over \$350,000. We also plan to enter a shared service agreement with the County for our Health services, saving an additional \$250,000. Cutting back Bulk Pickup from four times a year to twice a year saved us \$50,000.

During the off season, the pool parking lot is used to station School Buses increasing revenue approximately \$150,000. Lastly, we have been awarded various first responder grants in the amount of \$125,000.

Although we have made some significant headway, we still are faced with a significant hurdle to keep taxes in check while providing the same level and quality of services and programs to our residents, businesses, and visitors. I encourage all of you to attend our public budget presentations later this month to ask questions and find out more.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

From all of us in Springfield Public School, we hope you and your family have enjoyed the changing weather and holiday celebrations over the past weeks. I'm excited to share a few updates about our work in our schools!

The Referendum Vote held on March 14, 2023, represented a significant step forward for our community. Voters approved the two questions on the ballot. The official count totaled 1,425 votes in favor and 390 opposed for Question 1 and 1,309 votes in favor and 499 opposed for Question 2.

We deeply appreciate the time our community devoted to learning about the proposal and sharing information with neighbors over these last few months. It was wonderful for me, personally, to meet so many members of our community and hear the variety of perspectives and experiences that will continue to impact our work moving forward.

We are now looking at the next steps for planning critical repairs for our district's infrastructure including safety and security upgrades at all five schools, bathroom renovations to improve plumbing and sewer systems, heating/ventilation/air conditioning systems updates, as well as refreshed spaces, which include the high school and middle school gyms and rooms used for art and music education at both the high school and middle school.

Throughout March, our students were also accomplishing great things! At Jonathan Dayton High School, our talented students showcased their skills at the Spring musical Heathers the Musical: High School Edition. Our Spring athletics teams began preparing for the season, and early indications promise some great games! Our athletic schedule is available on our website, and we invite our community to join us with Bulldog spirit! Students are celebrating college acceptances, and we are proud to see them planning for their next steps.

In the month ahead, we are continuing work on the Florence M. Gaudineer Middle School Media Center and Learning Lab spaces, and as the project progresses, we are looking forward to welcoming students next Fall.

At James Caldwell School, we are eagerly anticipating the delivery and installation of the new playground equipment, and remain grateful to the Township and the Planning Committee members for advocating for schools while evaluating planning opportunities. We hope to announce a ribbon cutting soon!

As a reminder, at our Board Meeting on March 27, 2023, our calendar was updated. The schools will be closed on May 26th and 29th for Memorial Day, June 6th for Election Day, June 19th for Juneteenth, and our last day of school will be June 22nd. Jonathan Dayton High School Graduation will be held on Wednesday, June 21st on our home field. We look forward to continuing to keep you updated about the wonderful things happening in Springfield.

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

On Saturday, April 8, 2023, hundreds of community members of all ages joined together at Chisholm Park for the Township of Springfield's annual Egg Hunt & Kite Fest, which was postponed from the previous week due to rain and wind. The event was sponsored by the Springfield Recreation Department, along with Mike Scalera State Farm Agency and Cardinal Land Properties. On a partly cloudy day in the low-50s, the popular spring event featured kite flying and separate egg hunts for toddlers through teenagers. Prizes -- awarded to children for finding the winning ticket eggs, bringing the most creative kites, and flying the highest kites -- were presented by Mayor Christopher Capodice; Springfield Patriot Chamber of Commerce Co-Chairman Mike Scalera, who served as master of ceremonies; Springfield Patriot Chamber of Commerce Co-Chairman Scott Seidel; Director of Recreation Adam Lieb; Assistant Director of Recreation Brendan O'Reilly; and Chief of Police John Cook. The gift card prizes were donated by event supporter TD Pizza. Township Committeeman Richard Huber and Congressman Tom Kean, Jr., visited with event participants prior to the egg hunts. Following the two egg hunts, the Easter Bunny made an appearance and posed for pictures with families throughout the afternoon. 

LITHIUM-ION BATTERY SAFETY

Lithium-ion batteries supply power to many kinds of devices including smart phones, laptops, e-scooters and e-bikes, e-cigarettes, smoke alarms, toys, and even cars. If not used correctly, or if damaged, these batteries can catch on fire or explode.

THE PROBLEM

- •These batteries store a large amount of energy in a small amount of space.
- •Sometimes batteries are not used the right way; batteries not designed for a specific use can be dangerous.
- •Like any product, a small number of these batteries are defective. They can overheat, catch fire, or explode.

SAFETY TIPS

- •Purchase and use devices that are listed by a qualified testing laboratory.
- •Always follow the manufacturer's instructions.
- •Only use the battery that is designed for the device.
- •Put batteries in the device the right way.
- •Only use the charging cord that came with the device.
- •Do not charge a device under your pillow, on your bed, or on a couch.
- •Do not keep charging the device or device battery after it is fully charged.
- •Keep batteries at room temperature when possible. Do not charge them at temperatures below 32°F (0°C) or above 105°F (40°C).
- •Store batteries away from anything that can catch

SIGNS OF PROBLEMS

Stop using the battery if you notice these problems: odor, change in color, too much heat, change in shape, leaking, or odd noises. If it is safe to do so, move the device away from anything that can catch fire. Call 9-1-1.

BATTERY DISPOSAL

Do not put lithium-ion batteries in the trash. — Recycling is always the best option. — Take them to a battery recycling location or contact your community for disposal instructions. — Do not put discarded batteries

CHARGING AN E-BIKE

Charge your battery in a flat, dry area away from children, direct sunlight, liquids, tripping hazards, and in a location where the e-bike is not at risk of falling (continued from front page)

What is the PACT Act? The PACT Act is probably the biggest health care and benefit expansion in the history of the VA. The law's full name is: The Sergeant First Class Heath Robinson Honoring Our Promise to Address Comprehensive Toxics (PACT) Act. The Act is important because it expands and extends eligibility for VA healthcare for Veterans with toxic exposures and Veterans of the Vietnam, Gulf War and post-9/11 eras. More than 20 presumptive conditions for Agent Orange, burn pits and other toxic exposures have been added in addition to more presumptive-exposure locations for radiation and Agent Orange.

If a Veteran previously filed a claim and it was denied PLEASE reapply. Also if you are a survivor of a Veteran (this includes surviving spouses, children and parents) you may be eligible for benefits. You do not need an attorney to file. Go to the website www.VA.gov Use VA Form 21P-534EZ if you are a surviving spouse or child, or VA Form 21P-535 if you are a surviving parent.

••SPRINGFIELD UPDATE ••

Municipal Court proceedings continue regarding violations of the Municipal Ordinances concerning the condition of the property. The trial is scheduled to continue before Municipal Court Judge Rosenbluth on April 10, 2023.

Meanwhile, last week two reports were provided concerning the steel beams, strength of concrete, and replacement of curved pipe. On Friday, March 24, 2023 the Township's Redevelopment Counsel requested further verification including the necessary sealed plans.

In addition, the Property Maintenance Inspector has issued a notice that the fencing must be removed and replaced from the Springfield rights-of-way because of safety issues. The Notice requires compliance no later than the close of business on April 3rd in accordance with the Springfield Ordinances.. If this is not accomplished, Springfield intends to obtain a quote and undertake the necessary work. If Springfield does the work (which is required to be done by the property owner), a resolution will be presented to the governing body to impose a lien for all expenses incurred against the property.

We continue to evaluate whether the property owner can complete the project.. The Township is actively evaluating its remedies if the project continues to be stalled

Finally, certain matters are pending before the Union County Construction Board of Appeals which involve substantial penalties against the property owner. We are hopeful that these matters will be scheduled for a determination in the immediate future.

THE MORRIS AVENUE BRIDGE

The Morris Avenue bridge replacement project is in it's final design stage. The New Jersey Department of Transportation is coordinating with the New Jersey Department of Environmental Protection for proposed Green Acres impacts of widening the bridge.

Start of construction is anticipated in late Summer 2024. The construction duration for the overall project is approximately 1½ years. There are timing restrictions that affect when the contractor can work in the river to prepare for the bridge replacement which will start after schools begin the summer break. Rt 82 will be closed over one summer to replace the bridge.

VARIOUS SAFETY ISSUES

Our Springfield Zoning Official issued a notice to Springfield Center Urban Renewal ("Gomes Property") requiring it to address various safety issues including the fencing and rights of way. Instead of immediately complying, Springfield Center filed a complaint in the Superior Court of New Jersey in Elizabeth on March 30th. Our Redevelopment counsel filed substantial opposition on Sunday, April 2nd.

The Court held an emergent telephonic hearing on April 3rd. At the conclusion of the hearing, the Court stated, among other things, "the time for talking is over. . ." The Court directed Springfield Center to provide 24/7 security for the site until complete fencing was erected and directed that a meeting occurs on the site within 24 hours.

On April 4th the Township Officials, including the Mayor, met with Springfield Center and their counsel. The entire perimeter of the exterior of the site and the interior of the site were examined. The Township made it clear that the rights of way must be returned to the

Township as soon as possible. This will require certain backfilling to ensure the safety of the sidewalks. This will also require that the PVC pipe which crosses the sidewalk at the corners of Caldwell and Morris Avenue and Center and Morris Avenue must be removed on a daily basis or placed below the sidewalk.

All of these conditions continue to be of the utmost importance to the Township. Springfield Center indicated that they are going to begin work immediately. The Township also identified various construction and other debris which need to be removed from the site.

As a result of certifications from outside engineers concerning the integrity of the steel and concrete, the previous Stop Work Order has been rescinded but all work must commence in a safe manner.

We will continue to keep you updated concerning this site and the Township's efforts to mandate compliance with all safety and other ordinances, codes, and laws.

WATER AND SEWER BILL ASSISTANCE AVAILABLE

New Jerseyans having trouble paying their water or sewer bills are encouraged to apply for the Low Income Household Water Assistance Program (LIHWAP). Households must have total gross monthly incomes at or below 60% of the State median monthly income of \$6,662 (based on a family of four) to qualify for assistance. Applicants' names must match the names on their water or sewer bills.

A NEW RESOURCE FOR TRANSGENDER AND NON-BINARY NEW JERSEYANS

A new, one-stop hub can help members of New Jersey's transgender and non-binary community find information about essential programs and services.

The Transgender Information Hub at Transgender. NJ.gov contains information such as how to change a name, acquire legal assistance, obtain mental health and medical support, learn about rights and legal protections, and more. As New Jerseyans and community stakeholders provide feedback, the site will be updated and further enhanced.

RESOURCES FOR FORMER DECAMP BUS COMMUTERS

Most commuters impacted by the discontinuation of daily DeCamp Bus routes into Manhattan can begin taking NJ TRANSIT buses from their former DeCamp stops beginning Monday, April 10th. Four existing NJ TRANSIT bus routes will be modified to accommodate approximately 85% of current weekday DeCamp customers.

TROUT SEASON NOW OPEN

Anglers of all ages can head to their favorite fishing spots as of Saturday, April 8th. The Pequest Trout Hatchery has stocked New Jersey waterways with more than 180,000 rainbow trout. Anyone aged 16 or older must obtain a New Jersey fishing license and trout stamp to fish for trout.

STAY HEALTHY THIS SPRING

New Jerseyans are encouraged to continue taking necessary precautions to keep themselves and their loved ones healthy. Respiratory viruses, including COVID-19 are still among us.

Residents are particularly encouraged to stay upto-date on COVID-19 and flu vaccinations, including receiving the updated bivalent COVID-19 booster when eligible.

Everyone six months of age and older is now eligible for the bivalent COVID-19 vaccinations that target recently circulating Omicron subvariants. COVID-19 vaccines are free to everyone. Find locations offering COVID-19 vaccines and boosters on the COVID-19 Vaccine Finder and Community Calendar.

Flu vaccines, which are often covered by insurers at little to no cost to individuals, can be found at pharmacies, health care provider offices, Federally Qualified Health Centers (FQHCs), and local health departments. FQHCs and health departments may



also offer the flu vaccine at little to no cost for eligible uninsured or underinsured individuals.

Everyone is encouraged to take common sense measures to protect themselves and the people around them. This includes coughing or sneezing into your sleeve, washing your hands, staying home when you're sick, and wearing a mask if you or someone you're spending time with is at high risk of severe illness.

If symptoms appear, get tested for COVID-19. Free at-home test kits are available from the federal government and testing is offered for free at certain sites around New Jersey. Keep children home from school and child care centers if they are feeling unwell.

GOMES UPDATE APRIL 2023

On April 10th Municipal Court Judge Rosenbluth finalized the testimony and evidence in the trial concerning the December 2021 Summonses against Springfield Center Urban Renewal. A decision should be forthcoming in the near future.

Also on April 10th, our Township Construction Official issued a Notice of Unsafe Structure concerning the hairstylist building which is part of the development site. This Notice requires the property owner to remove the structure or attempt to make it safe.

Last week, our Township Zoning Official issued a notice to remove various debris from the site. If the debris is not immediately removed, a new summons may be issued against the property owner.

The Township has determined to retain a construction expert, Bill Costello of Epic Management. Mr. Costello toured the site on April 10th along with other Township officials.

On April 10th, OSHA (Occupational Safety and Health Administration) was at the site to inspect worker safety protocols and open areas.

The Township has contacted JCP&L to check the safety of a utility pole which is on Morris Avenue immediately adjacent to the site. We are hopeful that they will be on scene within the next few days.

The State has apparently issued a notice concerning asbestos abatement from the structure remaining on the site.

The Township intends to continue, to do weekly and daily inspections. demanded a construction phasing plan.

We will continue to keep you advised as to all issues.







On April 22, 2023 members of Springfield, Summit and Millburn Fire Departments were recognized at the New Jersey FMBA Valor Awards Banquet.

On the afternoon of May 19, 2022, Springfield, Summit and Millburn Fire Departments were dispatched to Route 24 East in Summit for the reported multivehicle crash with injuries. Arriving units on scene were confronted with a mass casualty incident with a total of seven vehicles involved including sedans, SUVs, pickup trucks, a tri-axle dump truck and tractor trailer. The incident was spread down the eastbound lanes spanning approximately one-quarter mile, with vehicles in every lane including the median and shoulders on both sides of the highway. Two separate areas of the crash were significant. Both areas required extensive extrications, one with two passenger vehicles, one on top of the other and approximately 300 yards away, was a tractor trailer with a sedan underneath it, with the driver heavily entrapped who was unconscious, with severe head trauma and multiple injuries.

New Jersey State Police Medi-Vac was requested to the scene, and a landing zone was set up on the highway. One patient was flown to University Hospital in Newark in critical condition, others were transported via ground ambulance to Morristown and Overlook Hospital in serious condition. Sadly, one victim did succumb to injuries and was pronounced at the scene. The crews remained on scene working with the Union County Medical Examiner to extricate/recover the victim.

In total, three victims were trapped in their vehicles and needed to be extricated at the scene. If not for the efforts of the crews on scene to be able to adapt and quickly work together, this incident likely could have had a different outcome with the potential of more lives lost.

Chief Palumbo "The members of all three departments were able to communicate and execute a plan of action. Every member on scene displayed the true meaning of professionalism by staying focused on the tasks at hand. Their actions prove in the utmost manner the level of pride and dedication these departments work to achieve in order to provide the best possible services."



Police Chief's Column for readers of the Patriot Times

Now that spring is here and warmer days are just around the corner, people will be heading back outdoors to enjoy the season. Readers of the Springfield Patriot Times may notice an increase in vehicle and pedestrian traffic, as well as increased enforcement of motor vehicle violations by Springfield police officers. Officers will we be conducting a variety of enforcement activities, including "cops in crosswalks" pedestrian enforcement, distracted driving and hands-free cellular device enforcement, and speeding enforcement. Traffic safety is a shared responsibility, and our goal is to educate drivers, pedestrians, and cyclists in the proper use of the roadways, and reduce the number of traffic-related incidents that occur in Springfield.

Motorists must come to a complete stop and remain stopped when a pedestrian is crossing in a marked crosswalk. This includes motorists who are making turns while pedestrians are crossing. Marked crosswalks are designated with painted lines and/or stripes, and have yellow warning signs posted as motorists approach. Marked crosswalks can be within intersections controlled with traffic signals, uncontrolled intersections, or mid-block. Crosswalks can also be unmarked, which include all intersections of streets normally considered to represent crosswalks but are not physically painted or striped. At these intersections with unmarked crosswalks, motorists must yield to the right-of-way of pedestrians and allow them to cross, but pedestrians must first wait for an adequate break in traffic that will allow them to cross safely before leaving the curb.

Pedestrians are reminded to cross only where legally permitted. At intersections with traffic signals, pedestrians must follow the signal, and cross only when the "WALK" symbol is displayed. If an intersection is not equipped with pedestrian signals, pedestrians should cross with the green light. At uncontrolled intersections or at mid-block crosswalks, pedestrians must remember to cross only when there is an appropriate gap in traffic. Pedestrians should never suddenly leave the curb and begin crossing into the path of a vehicle that is so close it would be impossible for the driver to stop or yield. Pedestrians should always be alert and wear bright reflective clothing (especially if walking at night or early morning).

Cyclists must remember that they have the same rights and responsibilities as motor vehicle drivers. Cyclists should always ride on the right side of the road, obey all signs and traffic signals, and ride with the flow of traffic. Cyclists should always be alert, wear bright reflective clothing (especially if cycling at night or early morning), and properly maintain their bicycles in good working order – including reflectors and lights. NJ law mandates that all riders 17 years and younger (including children strapped in attached child-seats) must wear an approved, properly fitting helmet, but it is recommended for all cyclists to use one to protect themselves.

Parents are reminded that their children should not be permitted to play on public roads, even on quiet cul-de-sacs or side streets. Public roads are intended for vehicular, bicycle, and pedestrian traffic only, and should never be utilized for children's games or other activities.

As our police officers will begin additional enforcement details, I remind motorists of NJ's "Move Over Law", which requires drivers to change lanes for stopped emergency vehicles...not only for police, but for fire department, first aid squad, and tow trucks/driver assistance vehicles as well. If changing lanes is impossible, or if the roadway is only one lane, drivers must slow down to below the posted speed limit, and prepare to stop as they approach the emergency vehicle.

Together, we can make Springfield's roads safer for everyone.
