CHOOSE YOUR RIDE



Perhaps you drove by the Springfield Fire Department recently and had taken a second look at what you thought was a parked taxi, but then saw what looked like a patrol vehicle.

What you saw was the Springfield Police Department's latest means of bringing awareness to the public of some of the consequences of operating a vehicle while under the influence of alcohol and/or drugs.

A few months ago Captain McLaughlin had approached Chief Cook to talk about a vehicle he had seen being used by another department to promote the fight against driving under the influence.

Knowing how I feel about this topic, the Captain felt that this could be something that we could look into doing as well," said Chief John Cook of the Springfield Police Department.

"Once we had one of our older vehicles ready to come out of service, I decided to utilize this vehicle to promote the consequences of driving while under the influence. Normally, vehicles that are no longer used for patrol service are sold for a minimal amount of money, mostly to companies that turn them into cabs. I felt that the benefit of using this vehicle to promote not driving while under the influence would far outweigh the money that we would have made

Chief Cook stated that he had brought this idea up at a Township Committee meeting some time ago and that it was received very well by all. **CONTINUED ON PAGE 7**



Message from the Mayor

Hello Springfield Friends and Neighbors,



Many people have asked me what I liked most about being Mayor and serving on the Township Committee. I consistently answer that while I am extremely proud of having been able to represent the Township at meetings

and events from the federal to local levels, I am most proud of the work I've done here in Springfield. At the top of this list is the enormous progress made on downtown redevelopment. I'm happy to announce that as of this week we have a DEFINITIVE PLAN TO REDEVELOP THE 85,000 SQUARE FOOT PROPERTY ON MORRIS AVE AND CALDWELL. The Township has agreed to a detailed plan (available at town hall) and the project is moving ahead rapidly. Several other property owners have taken notice and additional discussions are in the works.

I would also like to mention that having overseen the budget for the last three years, I feel that we have delivered three fiscally conservative budgets that minimized municipal taxes, while investing in must-have items like a new ladder truck for our fire department and critical emergency equipment in case of another natural disaster. We have fully renovated and re-opened the Chisholm Community Center as a place for all Springfield residents, from children to seniors, to meet and play. We have negotiated fair contracts with our Police and Fire unions that will attract and keep talented employees and ensure Springfield's safety. We have maintained and improved our infrastructure, including roads and parks and have been able to invest \$750,000 in the community pool, without impacting taxes. As Mayor, I created the Springfield Flood Mitigation Committee and have made significant progress on flood mitigation and prevention efforts. We have made enormous progress improving our environment, even gaining prestigious certifications for our efforts, all of which I am extremely proud.

Many residents tell me what a wonderful place Springfield is to live, and I agree with them. My hopes for the future are that we continue to keep it that way. I would very much like to see the continuation of controlled spending to minimize the tax burden on residents. Future Township Committees need to look to revenue generating sources to offset New Jersey's high property taxes. I would also like to see the Sarah Bailey building developed into an Arts and Cultural center; this would draw the public to the center and spur business activity. Last but not least, I would like to see expanded recreation activities, such as utilizing the pool property during the winter as a skating rink.

Once again, It was an honor serving you and I encourage every resident to get involved in our local government. It is easily the best way to achieve the change and progress that we all want for our community. I wish everyone a safe and health holiday season and a very happy new year!

Children entering Kindergarten must reach their fifth birthday on or before December 1, 2016. Parents/guardians need to bring the following materials to registration:

- \bullet Child's Orginal Birth Certificate \bullet Current Immunization Records
- \bullet 4 Proofs of Residency \bullet Tax Bill or Lease Utility bill, bank statement, etc.

SBA REOPENS DISASTER LOAN FILING PERIOD FOR SUPERSTORM SANDY SURVIVORS

WASHINGTON – The U.S. Small Business Administration (SBA) announced it has reopened the filing period for survivors in all states affected by Superstorm Sandy on December 2, 2015 to apply for low-interest disaster loans. The new filing deadline for physical damage and economic injury losses is December 1, 2016. Survivors may apply online using the Electronic Loan Application (ELA) via SBA's secure website at https://disasterloan.sba.gov/ela.

Additional details on the locations of recovery centers and the loan application process can be obtained by calling the SBA Customer Service Center at 800-659-2955 (800-877-8339 for the deaf and hard-of-hearing) or by sending an email to disastercustomerservice@sba.gov.

The filing deadline to return applications for physical property damage and to return economic injury applications is December 1, 2016.

SPRINGFIELD FLOOD MITIGATION COMMITTEE SEEKING MEMBERS FOR 2016

In August, 2011, following Hurricane Irene, residents affected by the hurricane began to meet and attend Township Committee meetings to voice their concerns about flooding.

In January, 2013 the Mayor of Springfield formally established the Springfield Flood Mitigation Committee, (SFMC). Members are residents of Springfield who take an oath of service and are appointed to the SFMC on an annual basis.

The members along with a designated liaison from the Township Committee meet monthly to identify areas where flooding is a problem and actions to be taken to mitigate the situation. The committee and Township Committee liaison report back to the full Township Committee. Some of the issues identified and actions taken include:

- Identified portions of the Rahway River that runs through Springfield which needs to be cleaned and maintained for adequate water flow. Succeeded in getting a portion of the stream/river cleaned at Alvin Park.
- Work on projects with the Township Environmental Commission and Sustainable New Jersey. Through SFMC efforts Springfield received a grant used to construct rain gardens.
- Successfully lobbied to prevent further housing development in the Tree Top section of Springfield.
- Several SFMC members are CERT certified. They serve the community during emergencies and special events. During Hurricane Sandy they worked in the township temporary shelter.

SFMC is looking for members. You don't need an engineering degree, or be a scientist. The committee is looking for interested residents, particularly those in flood areas, willing to work and make a difference.

"Deputy Mayor Bandrowski would often keep up with the status of this program by asking me how it was progressing. We were all anxious to get this vehicle completed", said Cook.

The Chief met with Mark Montenero, the President of Autoland whom he has known for quite some time. "Mark has always been interested in making a difference in our community for as long as I have known him. We occasionally would get together, when our schedules allowed, to discuss ideas we each had to better serve Springfield, sometimes working together on events to benefit Springfield or some charitable cause," according to the Chief. "From the moment I told him about our program and what we were doing with the decommissioned vehicle, he immediately insisted on being involved. Having been a volunteer firefighter himself, Mark has always been a supporter of first responders and in making as much of a positive difference in our community as possible," stated Cook.

Once the vehicle was totally decommissioned, having all emergency equipment removed, it was brought to Autoland where Montenero donated the services of the company he utilizes for wrapping vehicles. This process involves a vinyl laminate, designed to fit a vehicle's particular dimensions, which is printed with whatever design or wording as requested, and then adhered, or wrapped, onto the vehicle. This is a more efficient way to detail a vehicle as opposed to painting it. Once the wrapping of the vehicle was completed, an older, no longer used light bar was added and the vehicle was returned to the Springfield Police.

The vehicle is currently parked on Mountain Avenue near the front of the Fire Department. The hope is that as more people are made aware of the consequences of driving while under the influence, the greater the possibility that someone will heed the advice of calling for a ride, as opposed to driving themselves.

As readers can see by the photos, the front half of the vehicle is a Springfield Police black and white cruiser while the back half is designed as a yellow cab. The wording, "Choose Your Ride", is the idea that the Springfield Police wants to get out to the public.


"If someone chooses to drink and/or use drugs, they also have the choice of calling for a ride, which is far less expensive than driving and getting arrested for DUI. More importantly, a ride can save innocent victims from death or serious injury by keeping drivers under the influence off of our roads," emphasized Chief Cook.

The vehicle will be used as a mobile billboard to promote the Department's fight against driving while under the influence.

It will be present at functions such as the Springfield Street Fair, July 4th celebration, Memorial Day Parade, National Night Out, etc.

Police Chief's Column Chief John P. Cook

Now that the winter season is upon us, I ask that all recipients of the Springfield Patriot Times take just a few minutes to read over these suggestions for winter driving safety.

WINTER DRIVING TIPS:

- Avoid driving while you're fatigued. Getting the proper amount of rest before taking on winter weather tasks reduces driving risks.
- Never warm up a vehicle in an enclosed area, such as a garage.
- Do not park atop dry leaf piles as the heat of your engine can start a fire and also remember that wet leaves on the roadway can be as slippery as driving on ice.
- Make certain your tires are properly inflated.
- Never leave your vehicle running unattended as thieves can easily drive off with it. Do not leave your vehicle running when you stop to pick up coffee or a newspaper during your commute. It only takes seconds to drive off with your car.
- Keep your gas tank at least half full to avoid any freeze-up to the gas line.
- If possible, avoid using your parking brake in cold, rainy and snowy weather.
- Do not use cruise control when driving on any slippery surface (wet, ice, sand).
- Always look and steer where you want to go.
- Use your seat belt every time you get into your vehicle.
- Do not use a hand held cell phone to talk or text while driving. During times of bad weather limit external distractions so you can concentrate on road conditions.
- Use caution on roadways that have expansive overpasses. Treated road surfaces may be dry from the salting and the sun but some surfaces under an overpass may not receive sunlight and a driver can encounter icy road conditions on what may otherwise be a dry roadway.
- Tips for long-distance winter trips:

 Watch weather reports prior to a long-distance drive or before driving in isolated areas. Delay trips when especially bad weather is expected. If you must leave, let others know your route, destination and estimated time of arrival.
- Always make sure your vehicle is in peak operating condition by having it inspected by a reputable repair facility.
- Pack a cellular telephone with your local emergency telephone numbers, plus blankets, gloves, hats, food, water and any needed medication in your vehicle.
- If you become snow-bound, stay with your vehicle. It provides temporary shelter and makes it easier for rescuers to locate you. Don't try to walk in a severe storm. It's easy to lose sight of your vehicle in blowing snow and become lost.
- Don't over exert yourself if you try to push or dig your vehicle out of the snow.
- Tie a brightly colored cloth to the antenna or place a cloth at the top of a rolled up window to signal distress. At night, keep the dome light on if possible. It only uses a small amount of electricity and will make it easier for rescuers to find you.
- Make sure the exhaust pipe isn't clogged with snow, ice or mud. A blocked exhaust could cause deadly carbon monoxide gas to leak into the passenger compartment with the engine running.
 Use whatever is available to insulate your body from the cold. This could include floor mats,
- Use whatever is available to insulate your body from the cold. This could include floor mats newspapers or paper maps.
- If possible run the engine and heater just long enough to remove the chill and to conserve gasoline.

TIPS FOR DRIVING IN THE SNOW:

- Accelerate and decelerate slowly. Applying the gas slowly to accelerate is the best method for regaining traction and avoiding skids. Don't try to get moving in a hurry. And take time to slow down for a stoplight. Remember: It takes longer to slow down on icy roads.
- Drive slowly. Everything takes longer on snow-covered roads. Accelerating, stopping, turning nothing happens as quickly as on dry pavement. Give yourself time to maneuver by driving slowly.
- The normal dry pavement following distance of three to four seconds should be increased to eight to ten seconds. This increased margin of safety will provide the longer distance needed if you have to stop.
- Know your brakes. Whether you have antilock brakes or not, the best way to stop is threshold breaking. Keep the heel of your foot on the floor and use the ball of your foot to apply firm, steady pressure on the brake pedal.
- Don't stop if you can avoid it. There's a big difference in the amount of inertia it takes to start moving from a full stop versus how much it takes to get moving while still rolling. If you can slow down enough to keep rolling until a traffic light changes, do it.
- Don't power up hills. Applying extra gas on snow-covered roads just starts your wheels spinning. Try to get a little inertia going before you reach the hill and let that inertia carry you to the top. As you reach the crest of the hill, reduce your speed and proceed down hill as slowly as possible.
- Don't stop going up a hill. There's nothing worse than trying to get moving up a hill on an icy road. Get some inertia going on a flat roadway before you take on the hill.
- Stay home. If you really don't have to go out, don't. Even if you can drive well in the snow, not everyone else can. Don't tempt fate: If you don't have somewhere you have to be, watch the snow from indoors.

This is an important update from your electric company, Jersey Central Power & Light (JCP&L)

JCP&L has received increased reports of scammers targeting utility customers. In the latest scam, a telephone caller poses as an electric utility company employee and threatens to shut off the customer's power unless an immediate payment is made. In many cases, the customer is told to pay using a pre-paid debit card, such as a Green Dot/MoneyPak card, a money transfer service like Money Gram or Western Union, or in person at a physical location.

Be aware that scammers often use Caller ID spoofing software to lead you to believe you are receiving a call from JCP&L, and/or provide you with a fake "verification" phone number. These call-back numbers may even include exact replicas of greetings and hold messages you would hear when calling JCP&L's Contact Center.

Facts to remember:

- If your account is past-due, you will receive a written notice of your account status, with instructions on how to avoid disconnection of service.
- While JCP&L representatives may call a customer whose bill is in arrears in order to remind them that a payment is due, the representative would explain how a payment can be made using JCP&L's established payment options.
- They will not demand a payment over the phone or at a particular physical location.
- JCP&L does not accept prepaid debit cards or wire transfers as payment, and our representatives will not demand your bank information or credit card number over the phone.

What you should do:

- If you receive a suspicious call, hang up immediately.
- If you believe you have been a victim of this scam, please contact your local police department or the state attorney general's office.
- If you have purchased a Green Dot card to pay your electric bill and would like to request a refund from Green Dot/MoneyPak, visit www.moneypak.com/refundrequest.aspx.*

MAYORS COUNCIL RAHWAY RIVER WATERSHED FLOOD CONTROL BEGINS 2016 CONSTRUCTION FUNDING CAMPAIGN

The Mayors Council Rahway River Watershed Flood Control is making a direct appeal to citizens to write letters to state and federal legislators to finalize the Rahway River Flood Mitigation Study in early 2016 so construction funding for the entire project can get into position and get US Congress support.

The Mayors Council met recently in Rahway City Hall and discussed also making the Orange Reservoir and Clark Reservoir modification projects as the priority projects to be funded in 2016. Both of these projects would modify the outlets to the reservoirs to permit more storage capacity prior to a major storm. In each case the benefits are clear providing lower water elevations downstream while not impacting up stream bank protection.

Also announced at the meeting was that the seven communities' governing boards (Millburn; Maplewood; Union; Springfield; Union; Cranford; Kenilworth; and Rahway) have again agreed again to enter an inter local agreement to work towards flood control objective in 2016. The City of Orange has also indicated its support.

The Mayors discussing the construction funding campaign for funding the four phase Rahway River flood mitigation plan. Earlier in 2015, the Mayors were successful with US Congress representatives support to get the funding needed to complete the feasibility study of the flood mitigation plan including \$2.0 million of state and federal funding to complete the study. The current plan includes modification of the Orange Reservoir to store more storm water during major storm by draining the reservoir a day or

so before; increased storage at the Lenape Basin including new dikes; channelization work in Cranford to add river capacity; and modification at the Clark reservoir and channelization work in Rahway's part of the Robinson's Branch of river.

The US Army Corps of Engineers and NJ Department of Environmental Protection has been working at evaluating the hydrology; environmental impacts and optimal benefits of the federal project which would fund 90% of cost between federal and state

A major milestone in the project is what is referred to as the TSP milestone which is the major decision point on recommendation of the project to the US Congress and is scheduled for March 2016. The work thus far has indicated the projects would meet federal standards and be eligible to be funded.

The Mayors Council has been urging acceleration of the process to start construction funding and implementation since much is already known about the project's feasibility and benefits.

The Mayors Council action plan in 2016 includes:

*January visit with Senator Corey Booker; Senator Robert Menendez; Congressman Payne and Congressman Leonard Lance urging timely funding

*Resolutions by each of the affected communities be sent to the US Congress and New Jersey State Legislature to expedite both the TSP and Chief's Report

*Consideration of an MOU or P3 or P4 financing for the Orange Reservoir modification since that is first project that has to be done.


