In an exclusive interview with the Patriot Times, according to Committee Co-Chairmen Scott Seidel and John Cottage, the forecast was a little unsettled earlier in the week but by the 4th it looked good. Low humidity and temperatures in the mid 70's provided a spectacular evening for the event. Seidel commented "In addition to our trackless train, moonwalk, bounce house, petting zoo and pony rides, we added a stilt walker and roving magician to entertain the crowd." Co-Chairman John Cottage commented "The crowd arrived early and just kept coming—I have never seen the field so packed in the 40 plus years we have been doing this event. There must have been more than 4000 people there!"

Springfield OEM Deputy Coordinator and Springfield EMS Chief Apu Mullick commented to us: "Despite the large crowd no injuries were reported and the biggest issue was a few lost cellphones which were reunited with their owners. Volunteers from the Springfield First Aid Squad were at the field throughout the event to render aid if needed." Springfield Police Sergeant, and OEM Deputy Coordinator Ryan Westover told the Patriot Times: "The Office of Emergency Management, Department of Public Works, Fire Department and Police Department all worked together days in advance of the event to provide a safe and great experience for everyone. Members of the Springfield Office of Emergency Management, Auxiliary Police and CERT Team provided the logistical support to make this event happen."

Children were able to ride the trackless train, see the animals at the petting zoo, ride the ponies and enjoy a giant slide and moon bounce. The 1910 Fruitgum Company started their concert at 8 pm and played until 9:15 when the fireworks show started. Frank Applegate, Deputy OEM Coordinator and the person in charge of logistics, told the Patriot, "I am extremely pleased with how the event turned out. It was a safely organized planned event, which is our primary objective. My thanks to each and every volunteer, all the members of our Auxiliary Police, CERT Team members, and the Springfield First Aid Squad who gave up their holiday to make this a great event for the Township." Seidel thanked the businesses that sponsored the show, our Platinum Sponsor Autoland and the County of Union and the Union County Board of Commissioners who supported the event this year by donating the use of the County Bandwagon (stage) and making a cash donation as well to the Township of Springfield which help to fund the event. At the conclusion of the 1910 Fruitgum's performance, 4th of July Committee Co-chairs Scott Seidel and John Cottage introduced Mayor Chris Weber, Deputy Mayor Alex Keiser and Township Committee members Chris Capodice and Erica Dubois. Just before the fireworks started, Mayor Chris Weber welcomed the crowd and thanked all the sponsors and started the display by giving the signal for the Fireworks Flag to be lit up to the sounds of the Star Spangled Banner. What a spectacular 2021 4th of July Celebration enjoyed by All!

The inaugural event included a live performance by the Essex & Union County Marching Band led by Darryl Taylor; informational tables by Springfield Unity Project and Elvira Chaush of New York Life Insurance; introductions by Anderson Blair; invocation by Rev. Milton Hobbs of Antioch Baptist Church; greetings and proclamation by Mayor Chris Weber; remarks by Andrea Holley-Blair, co-vice president of Springfield Unity Project; and a poem by Morghan Blair. At the conclusion of the program, a flag commemorating Juneteenth was raised by Mayor Chris Weber, Deputy Mayor Alex Kesier, and Township Committeewoman Erica DuBois. Juneteenth -- which became a new federal holiday last week -- recognizes the emancipation of African American slaves, as well as the two year delay between the Emancipation Proclamation in 1863 and the freeing of slaves in Texas in 1865. Township officials in attendance included Municipal Clerk Linda Donnelly, Police Chief John Cook, Fire Administrative Captain Michael Mastroeni, Fire Captain Marc Corea, Fire Captain Victor Kostin, Emergency Management Coordinator Scott Seidel, and Director of Recreation Adam Lieb.

The monument, erected in 1896 by the Sons of the American Revolution, along with the burial ground of some of Springfield's founding families and patriots, has been maintained by the Church and Cannon Chapter of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution since 1952. Each year on this date, the DAR commemorates the "Forgotten Victory", and all the Revolutionary War patriots that sacrificed their lives and fortunes to protect our freedom from tyranny.

On the 241st anniversary of the Battle of Springfield, members from DAR, SAR, Boy Scout Troop 73, local historical societies and visitors from as far as Florida, gathered to remember what true patriotism is.

Linda Jurczak, a Springfield resident and DAR State Officer, led the ceremony which included an NJSSAR Honor Guard. Police Chief John Cook and scouts raised the new American flag; a wreath was laid at the monument by Chapter Regent Nancy Donhauser and NJSSAR State President Charles Morgan; and the Roll Call of known Revolutionary War soldiers who are buried in Springfield was read by John Kieser, of The Forgotten Victory Trail Committee, LLC and Mrs. Jurczak.

An information board inside the cemetery provides visitors with historic facts about the battle, the burials and the patriotic work of the DAR and SAR organizations. All respectful visitors are welcome.

On Tuesday, July 6th, on an extremely hot sunny day with temperatures in the 90's, and heat indexes in the 100's, a group of dedicated golfers participated in the 62nd annual Springfield Mayor's Day golf outing at Baltusrol Golf Club in Springfield. The tournament, started in 1960, raises scholarship money exclusively for Jonathan Dayton High School Seniors. Scott Seidel, Tournament Chairman, commented, "With a summer date and people heading away on long awaited vacations we were not at full capacity but we fielded more golfers than we did in 2020 during COVID.

However we were very fortunate and pleased to have been one of the first tournaments to play on the newly renovated and famous "Lower Course". We had a total of 138 golfers between the lower and upper courses. While a very hot day, thunderstorms and lightning held off until play was completed."

Jennifer Sherman greeted all the players as they arrived and checked them. Gennifer Abraham and Amy Roselle, office managers for Seidel and Hecht respectively, provided logistical support in keeping track of all the golfers and their Registrations. A cocktail hour was held from 515 pm to 615 pm and then dinner and awards followed at 615 pm.

Seidel further commented to the Patriot Times, "Without the generous support of Baltusrol, its Board of Directors, General Manager Kevin Vitale, Head Pro Ryan Fountaine, and all their staff, this event would simply not be possible. 



## Fire Chief's Column Chief Carlo Palumbo

#### **THUNDERSTORMS**

Approximately 10% of thunderstorms are considered severe, which means they produce hail at least three quarters of an inch in diameter, have winds of at least 58 miles per hour, or produce a tornado. Lightning often strikes outside of heavy rain and may occur as far as 10 miles from any rainfall. Most lightning deaths and injuries occur when people are caught outdoors in the summer months during the evening or afternoon. The chances of being struck by lightning are about 1 in 600,000.

Before

- Stay informed—listen to a NOAA weather radio to check local forecasts and news reports regularly. Keep a battery-powered or hand-cranked radio along with extra batteries.
- Buy ground fault protectors for key electrical equipment.
- Remove dead or rotting trees and branches that could fall.
- If a thunderstorm is likely in your area, postpone outdoor activities.
- Shutter windows and secure outside doors and objects. Secure outdoor objects that could blow away.
- Unplug appliances and other electrical items, such as computers, and turn off air conditioners. If you are unable to unplug them, turn them off.

During

- Follow the 30-30 rule: When you see lightning, count the seconds until you hear thunder. If that time is 30 seconds or less, the thunderstorm is within 6 miles and is dangerous. Seek shelter immediately. The threat of lightning continues longer than most people think. Wait at least 30 minutes after the last thunder before leaving your shelter.
- If you can hear thunder, you are within striking distance for lightning. Seek safe shelter immediately.
- Stop outdoor activities at the first clap of thunder and get inside a large building or an enclosed vehicle. Wait 30 minutes after the thunder to go back outside.
- When inside, stay off corded phones, computers, and other electronic equipment that put you in direct contact with electricity or plumbing. Cordless phones and cell phones are safe to use. Avoid showering or bathing.
  - If you are in open water, go to land and seek shelter immediately.
- If you feel your hair stand on end, indicating that lightning is about to strike, squat low to the ground on the balls of your feet. Place your hands over your ears and your head between your knees. Make yourself the smallest target possible and minimize your contact with the ground. Do not lie flat on the ground.

After

- If a person is struck by lightning, call 9-1-1 and get medical care immediately.
- Lightning strike victims carry no electrical charge; attend to them immediately. Check their breathing, heartbeat, and pulse.





The Township of Springfield in conjunction with the Springfield Senior Citizens Club is honoring one of its longtime resident, Bill Levidow, on the occasion of his 100th birthday.

Born on July 10, 1921 on Long Island to a photographer and a music teacher, Bill's family moved to Brooklyn in 1937. During WWII, Bill served in the US Navy's Construction Battalion (Seabees) where he contracted malaria on Guadalcanal and spent the rest of the war on New Caledonia in the South Pacific. In 1943, on a three day leave, he married Beatrice Ezrol of Brooklyn.

Bill earned his BS in Electrical Engineering at CCNY and his MS at Newark College of Engineering. Along the way he was elected to Eta Kappa Nu, the EE honor society.

After working several years for Federal Electric Products designing circuit breakers and motor control equipment he joined the faculty of Newark College of Engineering (now NJIT).

Bill joined Bell Labs in the early 1960's, and became part of a select group of engineers who were seconded to Washington, D.C. to provide technical support to NASA and the Office of Manned Space Flight. Among the projects on which he worked were Skylab (providing alignment with the sun to utilize solar power) and the Apollo mission (on attitude control systems for the lunar lander).

For close to four decades, Bill and Bea taught international folk dancing at several local groups, retiring only recently.

Bill served for several years on the Springfield Environmental Commission including as chair. Among other projects which continue through today, Bill worked to implement water quality testing for local rivers and streams, provided recycling containers for public use, and the annual County-wide Bio Blitz.

Bill also enjoys participating in the Summit Old Guard, taking classes for seniors, and watching the colorful birds which come to the home-made feeder in his yard. Bill and Bea have three children: Les (in London), Roger (Union, NJ) and Nancy (San Francisco).

We are proud and happy to recognize and thank Bill Levidow on his service and his significant contributions to his country and his community on the occasion of his 100th birthday.

"You have enriched my life by your faith, your dedication to the parish and the sharing of your families with me," Fr. Joe told those attending the mass in the packed church.





## Police Chief's Column Chief John P. Cook

With the summer months here, school sessions done, vacations taking place, etc., readers of the Patriot Times are reminded that more and more of us, especially our children, are out and about on bicycles.

I encourage parents to spend a few minutes with their children to explain and emphasize the importance of safe bicycle riding, before letting them pedal away with their friends.

In New Jersey, bicycles are considered vehicles and must follow the same laws as motorists. Bicyclists must ride on the right side of the road with the flow of traffic and obey all traffic signals. Bicyclists should never attempt stunts or tricks, ride with more people on the bike than for what it was designed, "hitch" rides by holding onto moving vehicles, weave in and out of traffic or between cars, ride against the flow of traffic, or ride at night without proper lights and/or reflectors.

NJ law mandates that all cyclists under the age of 17 years (including children strapped in attached child-seats) must wear an approved, properly fitting helmet, but it is recommended for all cyclists to use one to protect themselves. This also applies to persons skating, skateboarding, roller blading, etc.

Wearing a helmet is the single most important safety measure to follow when bicycling, skateboarding, or roller blading, especially for children and young adults. Each year, many cyclists and skaters are injured or killed in crashes – many of which do not even involve other vehicles. Head injuries are the most common reported injury, and are the most

common cause of death resulting from these accidents. They are also the most preventable, since the use of a proper-fitting helmet offers excellent protection against head injuries.

Bicycles should be routinely inspected and maintained to ensure that they are in good working order and should be sized properly for the rider. The tires/wheels, brakes, chain, reflectors, lights, and seat height should be checked before every use to help prevent malfunction. Cyclists should also be alert and wear bright reflective clothing (especially if cycling at night or early morning).

In an effort to keep our children safe, Springfield police officers will be more aggressively enforcing the NJ helmet laws, and will be monitoring bicycle riding activity for other unsafe behavior. Violations can result in the child being warned of the offense, and the parent or guardian of the child being issued a citation.

Preventable injuries, or worse, have been a growing concern in most communities so please speak to your children not only about the importance of wearing a helmet for safety reasons, but the laws requiring them to wear a helmet and operate their bicycles properly.

On another note, parents are also reminded that their children should not be permitted to play on public roads, even on quiet cul-de-sacs or side streets. Public roads are intended for vehicular, bicycle, and pedestrian traffic only, and should never be utilized for children's games or other activities.
