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Message from the Mayor



It is with a mixture of pleasure and sadness that I write to you in my final message as Mayor. As you may know, Springfield voters go to the polls every year to elect members to the Township Committee. The Township Committee selects a Mayor for a one year term. Every year, the governing body "re-organizes" and a new Township Committee begins. My three-year term on the Township Committee, which concludes at the end of this month, has been a wonderful experience and I am honored to have had an opportunity to serve the community. It was

an honor and a privilege to work for Springfield, watch it grow and progress and to meet so many wonderful residents. Thank you!

Despite the approaching end of the 2010 Township Committee session, there is still work that needs to be done and the governing body and I have an obligation to continue working with the same level of commitment and determination for you without sinking into a lameduck status.

At our most recent Township Committee meetings, several important matters were addressed. Next year, the Township Committee selects professionals for various vital positions. In an effort to combat our opinion that the position of Township Attorney is a clear conflict of interest for local residents with special interests and prevent a return to the old ways that held Springfield back, measures were implemented to prohibit local residents with special interests from applying for the job.

Due to nearly a dozen retirements in the Police Division this year, the Public Safety Director and Police Officer-in-Charge recommended hiring police officers to fill vacancies. The retirements account for a nearly \$800,000 savings in salaries. However, the vacancies jeopardize safety, create a backlog of work and result in an increase in overtime to nearly \$150,000. The Township Committee recently hired a total of 8 police officers with an estimated cost of almost \$500,000. In a fiscally sound move, the hires were also staggered between this year and next year to avoid a sudden burden with future promotions. These hires will also contribute to efforts to reduce overtime. We expect a savings of over \$300,000 with this staffing.

Most importantly, residents should note that they will not receive a sewer bill next year. The decision to separate the sewer utility from property taxes this year, while done in the best interest of residents, was met with widespread frustration, confusion and opposition. As a result, Committeeman Jerry Fernandez, Committeeman Marc Krauss and I have responded as concerned representatives and agreed to repeal the sewer utility as the community wants. This will return the sewer assessment back into the municipal budget as part of one unified property tax bill where it had been.

The upcoming winter season also marks the second annual Springfield Luminary fundraiser. This initiative is an excellent tradition that we can take pride in and it can serve as beneficial source for assistance to various community causes. The recipients this year are the Springfield First Aid Squad, the Springfield Y.M.C.A. Before & After Child Care Program and the Jonathan Dayton Baseball & Softball Programs. Together, let's light up Springfield this New Year's Eve.

I want to thank everyone who has served as a volunteer on the numerous Township Committees and in an appointed capacity. I greatly appreciate the cooperation you have given to ensure the success of Springfield in 2010. I also want to thank the professionals whose employment with the Township will be reconsidered by the incoming governing body and commend them for their unwavering commitment to Springfield - our Township Administrator Anthony Cancro, our Township Attorney Jeffrey Lehrer and our Public Safety Director Richard Rosell – Springfield was lucky to have such outstanding professionals. Finally, I want to thank all the Department heads and employees for their positive attitude, hard work and devotion to the team spirit.

I wish everyone a happy and healthy holiday season and New Year!






Twenty-four hours a day, seven days a week, the Springfield First Aid Squad provides emergency medical services (EMS) to the residents of Springfield, those who work and play in our town and those who are "just passing through." Composed of volunteers of all ages and from all walks of life, the First Aid Squad provides aid to those in need at no cost; the Squad relies on donations to cover operational expenses.

The Springfield First Aid Squad is a nonprofit, tax-exempt organization separate from the Township of Springfield. Unlike other emergency services in town, we do not rely on tax dollars for our daily operating expenses, and none of our members are paid for their work. Our expenses involve vehicle and equipment purchases and maintenance, training, supplies and the like.

HAVE A SAFE HOLIDAY SEASON

With the holidays nearing many residents stores should be placed in the trunk or in the and business owners alike are preparing for the holidays and tending to their holiday shopping. Unfortunately thieves are also busily shopping during the month of December and looking to see what they can steal from you.

As many persons will favor paying for Christmas or Hanukah gifts by using cash instead of credit or debit cards, shoppers should be careful when receiving money from banks or via accessing an ATM machine. Money received should be immediately put out of sight before exiting the bank branch or ATM machine location.

Woman should hold onto a pocketbook when in stores, such as supermarkets, and not leave the handbag unattended in a cart while walking up and down an aisle. If at all possible store coupons should be kept in a separate billfold type wallet and this can be left open in the upper part of a cart while a wallet containing currency, credit cards or checks can be safely kept on your person and not in the cart. Thieves will look for an unattended cart with handbag or wallet in same and will watch the intended victim and snatch the wallet when the person is busy looking at or removing items from a shelf.

Handbags should NEVER be worn with the strap across the chest as some thieves will drive up to a victim walking in a parking lot where driver will feign asking for directions and this is done to draw the victim closer so the thief can grab onto the handbag strap and rapidly speed away. If this is done while holding onto a handbag, the bag is gone but if the bag is worn with the strap across your chest, the victim will most likely be dragged by the speeding car before the handbag strap eventually gives way and breaks.

As handbag thefts or purse snatches increase during the holiday shopping time, your bag should not contain anything that cannot be replaced. Identification and other documents can be replaced such as checks or credit cards but forms of identification such as your Social Security card should be left at home since thieves who obtain this can easily use your identity information to commit various types of Identity Theft related frauds.

Shoppers should park their cars in the main well lit sections of a parking lot and should make sure to close all windows and lock all car doors. Any shopping bags from other

rear of an SUV or van where it is not readily visible to thieves who will walk amongst cars in the lot looking for packages in order to break into the vehicle to steal the visible packages. Do not leave packages inside of your car overnight in your driveway and instead bring them into your home to store.

Remember to always retrieve your credit or debit card from the cashier after making any purchase as during the rush of holiday shopping it may be inadvertently left behind at the register or deliberately retained by a dishonest employee, especially when businesses hire many temporary holiday employees. If you later discover that your credit or debit card was not returned, do not waste time attempting to contact the store to see if your card was located or can be tracked down and instead immediately contact the issuing bank for your credit or debit card to report it as lost so any unauthorized use can be quickly prevented.

Businesses should increase the amount of times that monies are removed from a cash register drawer and make additional bank drops if necessary so no large amounts of money are left in the business overnight or in the cash register drawers. The bank drop should be done by multiple employees together and the times should be staggered on a daily basis so as to prevent thieves from watching a business to set up a theft.

Residents who go away for the holidays should remember to cancel their mail delivery and any newspaper delivery and should do everything possible to make their house look as if it is occupied. Interior lights on timers and external lights that are motion activated can greatly reduce the appearance that no one is home. In addition, a neighbor or family member can be asked to park a car in your driveway if your driveway is empty.

During the holiday season the Springfield Police will have officers in both marked and unmarked vehicles patrolling residential areas and the shopping areas in town in order to make the holidays safe for residents, merchants and shoppers while also deterring thieves and their holiday shopping schemes. TIPS FOR A FIRE SAFE HOLIDAY

The holidays are a time to enjoy family and cut tree in the house. A tree can become friends and reflect on those things that are the most important to each of us. As Fire Chief. my primary goal is the safety of the Township's firefighters and residents. By following these commonsense, but often overlooked, safety tips you will be able to enjoy a happy and safe holiday season.

CHANUKAH

- 1. Keep the menorah, oil, candles, matches and lighters out of the reach of small children and pets and at least 4 feet away from curtains and other flammable objects.
- 2. When lighting and blessing candles, make sure not to accidentally set your sleeves on fire when you put your hands over the flames. Never leave burning candles unattended.
- 3. Create a safe place in the house in which multiple candles can be lit and be aware of the large amount of heat the candles generate. Do not place candles under kitchen cabinets or on top of tablecloths and make sure all candles are in a sturdy base that will not tip over.
- 4. When frying latkes, keep all children away from the hot oil. Make sure all pan handles are turned inward on the stove so they can't accidentally be bumped and spill hot oil. A frying screen can help prevent grease splatters. In case of a grease fire, always have baking soda and a tight-fitting lid to your pan nearby. Never put water on a grease fire!
- 5. If using decorative, electric menorahs, use only UL approved appliances and cords. Inspect all cords for frayed wires or broken sockets. Turn off the menorah when you go to bed or leave the house.

CHRISTMAS

- 1. Artificial Trees Trees should be labeled "Fire Resistant." Although this label does not mean the tree won't catch fire, it does indicate the tree will resist burning and any flames should extinguish quickly.
- 2. Live Trees Special fire safety precautions need to be taken when keeping a

engulfed in flames in less than 5 seconds, and the entire room can be engulfed in well under a minute. A burning tree will rapidly fill a room with both fire and deadly gases.

When choosing a tree, the needles should be green and hard to pull from the branches and the trunk should be sticky. Two weeks is about the most time a cut tree should spend in the house. Keep the tree stand filled with water at all times. Do not place the tree near a heat source. The heat will dry out the tree, causing it to be more easily ignited. When disposing the tree, never put tree branches or needles in a fireplace or wood burning stove.

- 3. Decorations All holiday decorations should be non-flammable or flame-retardant and placed away from heating vents. Never use lit candles to decorate a tree. If you use candles to decorate a room, make sure they are in stable holders and placed them where they cannot be easily knocked over. Never leave a burning candle unattended and always extinguish it before going to sleep.
- 4. Electricity Inspect holiday lights each year for frayed wires, bare spots, gaps in the insulation, broken or cracked sockets, loose bulb connections and excessive kinking or wear before putting them up. Limit the use of extension cords and avoid using multiadaptors. Follow the manufacturer's instruction on how to use all lights. Generally, do not link more than three light strands. Make sure to periodically check all wires - they should not be warm to the touch. Unplug the Christmas tree lights when you go to sleep or leave the house. Don't run a cord under a rug or carpet and be careful when placing cords behind furniture--if pinched, cords can be damaged. Do not use indoor extension cords outside -- use only those that are made specifically for outdoor use. Keep outdoor extension cords above ground and out of puddles and snow.

RECYCLING PROGRAM HAS A SUCCESSFUL DEBUT



The new electronic recycling program initiated by the Public Works Department was kicked off on November 6, 2010. This program is in response to a new law which comes into effect January 1, 2011. The law states that disposal of any electronics into our trash stream is prohibited, all electronic items such as computers, televisions, printers, etc. must be recycled. Since our curbside recycling vendor is not contracted to collect such items an alternative was sought that would allow residents to dispose of these items without carting them to an out of town vendor. In order to further enhance the program it was also decided to allow for the recycling of appliances and brush, grass and leaves on the specified first Saturdays of each month. All costs for this program are derived from State and County grants.

The three major benefits of this program are;

- 1. Residents are provided with an easier way of recycling electronic items
- 2. Additional revenue will be added to Township coffers through increased grant awards
- 3. Trash disposal costs will be reduced by reducing the amount of trash dumped and the resulting tipping (dumping) fees paid by the **Township**

Considering the fact that November 6 was the first day of the program, the number of residents participating was quite high. Over 75 pieces of electronic equipment such as personal computers, printers, cameras, televisions, etc. were deposited. The material will be collected at the DPW garage by a recycling vendor at no cost to the Township. Upon collection, the material is recorded and weighed. The tonnage collected will be reported to the State D.E.P. as part of our annual tonnage recycling report and the dollar amount of our tonnage grant is directly contingent upon the amount of tonnage reported for the year. Therefore the more we recycle, the more money we receive through our recycling grants and the less trash we will have to pay to dispose of.

We therefore encourage all residents to take participate in this program which will cut costs and increase revenues.




SPRINGFIELD BEAUTIFICATION COMMITTEE HONORED




