



PATRIOT PROFILES

Organizations and People that make a Difference in Springfield

During the last week of August, did anyone notice Justin Bieber or Taylor Swift wandering the streets of Springfield? No, well that's ok, because they weren't here, but a singer/comedian who topped the billboard charts above them was! Daniel Avidan, Jonathan Dayton High School Class of 1997 graduate, recently had his music rank higher than Bieber, Swift and even Loretta Lynn! Never heard of him? Well read on, but bear in mind his brand of musical comedy may be rated "PG-13" or "R"!

Late in August, in an exclusive interview with the Patriot Times at

the Union Plaza Diner, I sat down for dinner with Danny and his longtime friend, fan and supporter, Adam Seidel (yes, my son). While attending a class at Bennington College, Dan produced his first independent comedy video, titled "Dick Danger, Private Eye" and immediately knew he wanted a career in the arts. Graduating college in 2001, Dan had dreams of being a musician, so he moved to Philadelphia and performed in various bands for 8 years but could not find any success. The music business, according to Dan, was in "smoking ruins."

So he turned to comedy, moved to Brooklyn and took classes at the UCB (Upright Citizen Brigade) Theatre. There he met another comedy musician, Brian Wecht--and in 2009 they formed a comedy band called "Ninja Sex Party." You may ask what's a comedy musician--well a good example would be "Weird Al" Yankovic. Dan and Brian self-produced YouTube videos and began to form a tremendous following online. Once their YouTube videos reached a few million hits, they realized they had something and moved to Los Angeles to pursue their comedy/music profession full time.

While in LA they met another internet performer, Arin Hanson, who invited Dan to join his daily online video game show called "Game Grumps." On that show, the two of them play video games while recording jokes and running commentary. It was an instant worldwide hit, and the show now averages 3 million views per day.

As of this writing, Dan has over four million "Game Grumps" Youtube subscribers and over an additional million for "Ninja Sex Party". All in all, his YouTube videos have been viewed over 3.4 BILLION times!

His music is available on iTunes, Spotify (for streaming) and Amazon. Ninja Sex Party's last three albums have topped the charts as the #1 comedy albums in America, and their most recent album reached #9 on the Billboard Top 200, ahead of such stars as Justin Bieber, Taylor Swift and Loretta Lynn.

His latest project is called "Good Game," a scripted comedy show that was

His latest project is called "Good Game," a scripted comedy show that was produced by Dan Harmon, creator of the popular network TV Shows "Community" and "Rick and Morty."

Dan is now taking his live show all over the world, with performances across the USA, Canada and Europe. He also has plans for a tour of Australia next year. Although he resides in Los Angeles, he loves Springfield and says it will always be his home.

Just before our interview he performed on Broadway in NYC to a sold-out audience of over 3000 fans at the Playstation Theatre. Later in the week he performed another sold-out show at the world famous Electric Factory in Philadelphia.

It was wonderful to sit down with Dan and hear his stories about his career. Several of the Ninja Sex Party videos were filmed here in Springfield and at our house in Vermont (Watch the credits!), and they are all available to be viewed for free on YouTube. 



The display was packed with spectators all day long. On the library lawn we had the NASCAR Rock N' Rolls Racing that kept the kids and big kids alike amused all day! There were pony rides and a horse and buggy that gave people a ride around the area, and if you didn't want a horse ride, you could take the train!" Gennifer added, "We had an "Etsy" craft area with 20 vendors, a local resident and book illustrator doing caricatures of people, commercial vendors, political parties, dance studio and martial arts demonstrations (separately!) and Joel Daniel The Marine Sandpiper from 29 Palms, California who was flown out for the event. Joel Daniel, a veteran himself, was pleased to be the feature musician especially with the addition of our 5K run that benefited veterans this year. Food trucks lined Mountain Ave, an old time Good Humor truck served ice cream and Pizza was cooked on site." Bobby then chimed in, "Let's not forgot our Car Show, sponsored by Autoland and run by G-Wiz productions which drew in nearly 100 classic cars. Awards were given out for Chambers Choice, Mayor's Choice and many more categories.

Police Chief's Column Chief John P. Cook HALLOWEEN SAFETY

As this month includes Halloween, motorists on this day should be wary of children in residential areas trick or treating as those not escorted by a parent may sometimes run back and forth across streets while going house to house. Children have the potential of crossing streets in mid-block and in doing so may dart out from between parked cars. It is imperative that adults accompanying children have them adhere to the safe and proper way to cross streets. Motorists in the residential areas should drive at an extremely slow and cautious manner in order to look out for unescorted children who may opt to run into and carelessly cross a roadway.

Street safety is of utmost importance, not only during Halloween trick or treating, but all year long. Parents should remember, and they should make their children fully aware that the roadways are for use by vehicles and not areas to play upon. In many residential areas parents allow portable basketball hoops to be placed in the street in front of their homes. This requires children to be in the street to use them. In other residential areas parents believe that by sitting in lawn chairs in the street or by the placement of signs or pylon cones in the street by their homes that this will somehow make it safe for children to be playing in the street. These measures do not ensure the safety of children while appearing to condone this dangerous activity. The roadways are for vehicles and are not play areas for children. Sometimes these supposed safety obstructions may actually confuse a driver or divert a driver's attention while driving through a residential area. Just as drivers must be cautious in residential areas, children must learn and practice street safety on Halloween and all year long.

Parents should make sure that Halloween costumes, especially ones with any type of mask or facial covering, do not limit a child's ability to be able to walk properly or have a total unobstructed ability for a child to see ahead and around them. The costumes should either contain a reflective type of material or should have some type of reflective clothing attachment. Children should carry a flashlight and or a glow-stick after dusk for added illumination.

Some Halloween costumes may contain materials that can easily catch on fire or, if

exposed to heat or an open flame, can actually melt. Residents who expect children coming to their door should refrain from having any type of external decorations that are illuminated by the use of a lit candle, especially any decorations at your front door or along the path to your front door that children walk on. Glow sticks should replace lit candles in a carved pumpkin as this is much safer and still lights up the pumpkin.

Household pets may become unnerved by the added tumult caused by children coming to your door and door bells ringing. Care should be used by homeowners to make sure that animals are kept in a secure area so they cannot bolt out the front door when it is opened. Also remember to secure the candy treats in your home so your pets cannot get them as many types of Halloween treats can be poisonous if eaten by cats and dogs.

Many residents opt to leave bowls of assorted candies by their front door instead of answering the doorbell for every trick or treater. They rely on the honesty of all children to just take one or two items. Some juveniles, usually unaccompanied by a parent or other adult, will take all the candy and may even take or damage the bowl the candy was in. This obviously deters the resident from wanting to take part in giving out candy the following year. Accordingly, parents are asked to remind their children to be thoughtful of others when taking candy left at a front door, and to not deliberately damage or take any items such as decorations from homes along their trick or treating route. Young children should be accompanied by responsible adults when going door to door. Older children who go out with no adults should only go out in groups and never go alone. Under no circumstances should any child ever enter into the house of a stranger.

Please instruct your children to eat nothing that they receive during their door to door trick or treating until it has been brought home and you have thoroughly inspected all treats. Any suspected signs of possible tampering should be reported to the police department immediately. On any treats where the packaging is ripped, punctured or in an unsealed condition you should use the old adage of.....when in doubt, throw it out.

For added safety, there will be increased police patrols in the residential areas on both the night of Halloween and the night before with the latter intended to deter those persons who go out to create mischief or commit acts of vandalism. Police officers will be out in both marked police vehicles as well as unmarked cars. For safety reasons all of the officers in the unmarked police vehicles will also be in police uniform.

By simply knowing and following these suggested safety tips you can help in Halloween being both a fun and safe holiday experience for our children.



That's why this year's Fire Prevention Week theme: "Every Second Counts: Plan 2 Ways Out!" is so important. It reinforces why everyone needs to have an escape plan.


Here's this year's key campaign message

- Create a home escape plan with all members of your household today!
- Would you and your family members know what to do in a real fire situation? Develop a home escape plan together and practice it.
- A home escape plan includes two exits from each room in your home (typically a door and a window). Make sure your exits are clear of clutter and that windows can open easily.
- It's 2:00 o'clock in the morning. You and your family are fast asleep when you awaken to the smoke alarm sounding and the smell of smoke. If you're not sure what you'd do next, it's time to learn!
- In a fire, working smoke alarms alert you in time to escape safely. Make sure you know how to use those minutes wisely. Develop a home fire escape plan and practice it twice a year with all members of your
- Use this home escape planning grid to map out a floor plan of your home. Make sure it includes the location of all smoke alarms in your home; two exits from every room; a path from each exit to the outside; and an outdoor meeting place where everyone will meet upon exiting.
- A home escape plan includes an outside meeting place where everyone will meet upon exiting the home. Pick a stationary location in front of your home, like a tree, mailbox, or light post.
- In a fire situation, once you get outside, stay outside! Call 911 or the local emergency number immediately from your cell phone or a neighbor's phone.
- Firefighters are equipped to go inside a burning building you're not. Never go back inside a burning building!
- Create different fire scenarios for practicing your home fire escape plan like blocking some exits and conducting a fire drill in the dark. Develop a plan for each situation.
- If there are members of your household who need assistance escaping a fire situation, make sure your home escape plans account for their needs.

INFLUENZA IMMUNIZATIONS FOR SPRINGFIELD RESIDENTS

Seasonal influenza immunizations will be available to Springfield residents in the coming weeks. On Tuesday, October 24, 2017 from 12:30 to 2:00 pm and on Wednesday, November 1, 2017 6:00 to 7:30 pm. Vaccine will be administered at the Chisholm Community Center located at 100 South Springfield Avenue. Adults and children over the age of three years are invited to receive their annual flu vaccine at this public health event. No appointments are necessary. Seniors with a Medicare Part B card are asked to bring it to the clinic. There will be a \$10.00 fee for residents without Medicare. All are reminded to wear short sleeves if possible when they come for their flu shot. Please note: the vaccine to be distributed is the regular dose covering four influenza types. It is not high dose.

Seasonal flu vaccine is recommended by Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) for everyone over the age of 6 months. The CDC states: Vaccination is especially important for people at higher risk of severe influenza and their close contacts, including healthcare personnel and close contacts of children younger than 6 months." Everyone should get the annual, seasonal influenza vaccine. Additionally, all pregnant women, women who are planning to become pregnant, women postpartum and women who are breast-feeding during the influenza season should be vaccinated.

Most people are ill with flu for only a few days, but some get much sicker and may need to be hospitalized especially the very young, the elderly and those with coexisting conditions that may result in complications if influenza illness develops.

The 2017-2018 flu vaccine offers protection against four virus strains most likely to cause illness this coming season: A/California (H1N1), A/Hong Kong, B/Phuket and B/Brisbane. It takes up to two weeks after vaccination for antibodies to develop and protection may last for up to one year.

While flu spreads every year, the timing, severity, and length of the season varies from one year to another. Seasonal flu activity may begin as early as October and continue to occur as late as May. Getting vaccine during the fall months should Oprovide protection for the whole season, although vaccinations may be given any time during the flu season.
