

Message from the Mayor

Hello Springfield Friends and Neighbors,



ahead, as are plans to improve the sidewalks along Mountain Avenue.

But these are not the only things happening in Springfield. Now that we are well into Spring, our Recreation Department and Department of Public Works have been hard at work getting our fields and parks ready for resident use. Over the last two summers, we've been able to implement significant improvements at the Community Pool, and this year we are continuing to make that facility better and better. Free Wi-Fi will now be available, one handball court has been demolished making way for more lawn area and two additional shade structures are being installed. Additionally, we've purchased 35 new lounge chairs, concession and baby pool umbrellas, locker room benches, picnic tables and more. All these improvements have been paid for by revenue from the pool, not taxpayer money. The pool officially opens on Memorial Day weekend.

Continuing to look forward, the budget subcommittee is hard at work finalizing this year's municipal budget. Several important dates are coming up when residents can learn about this important topic. The sub-committee with be holding two Town Hall meetings to present the budget, the first on May 19 at 11:00 am and then another on May 26 at 6:00 pm. Residents are encouraged to attend. Additionally, there will be a final hearing and adoption of the Capital Improvement Budget on May 12th during the regular 7:30 Township Committee meeting.

A few other items to note are that the Springfield Annual Community Town-wide Garage Sale is being held on June 20 & 21. Fees for this event are waived and registration can be done by emailing communitygaragesale@Springfield-nj.us. Finally, I'm happy to announce that we have a new Senior Citizen Bus on order. This was made possible in part by a very generous grant from Investors Bank. My sincere thanks goes out to the bank and the Investors Foundation for their generosity and continued support of our community.

On behalf of the Springfield Township Committee, I urge you to attend town hall meetings and bring your input to help us make the best decisions for our community. The Township Committee meets in regular session at 7:30 pm on the second and fourth Tuesdays of every month in the Municipal Building. The Committee's regular Tuesday meetings are televised (you can find the link at the municipal website http://springfield-nj.us/).

BEAR SAFETY TIPS

TIPS ON REDUCING CONFLICTS AND ENCOUNTERS WITH BLACK BEARS

Black bears by nature tend to be wary of people. However, if you encounter a black bear in your neighborhood or outdoors while hiking or camping, follow these common-sense safety tips:

- Never feed or approach a bear!
- Remain calm if you encounter a bear. Do not run from it.
- Make the bear aware of your presence by speaking in an assertive voice, singing, clapping your hands, or making other noises.
 - Make sure the bear has an escape route.
- If a bear enters your home, provide it with an escape route by propping all doors open.
- Avoid direct eye contact, which may be perceived by a bear as a challenge. Never run from a bear. Instead, slowly back away.
- To scare the bear away, make loud noises by yelling, banging pots and pans or using an air horn. Make yourself look as big as possible by waving your arms. If you are with someone else, stand close

together with your arms raised above your head.

- The bear may utter a series of huffs, make popping jaw sounds by snapping its jaws and swat the ground. These are warning signs that you are too close. Slowly back away, avoid direct eye contact and do not run.
- If a bear stands on its hind legs or moves closer, it may be trying to get a better view or detect scents in the air. It is usually not a threatening behavior.
- Black bears will sometimes "bluff charge" when cornered, threatened or attempting to steal food. Stand your ground, avoid direct eye contact, then slowly back away and do not run.
- If the bear does not leave, move to a secure area.
- Report black bear damage or nuisance behavior to the DEP's 24-hour, toll-free hotline at 1-877-WARN DEP (1-877-927-6337).
- Families who live in areas frequented by black bears should have a "Bear Plan" in place for children, with an escape route and planned use of whistles and air horns.
- Black bear attacks are extremely rare. If a black bear does attack, fight back!

WHAT IS "CUT IT & LEAVE IT" GRASS RECYCLING PROGRAM?

Grass clippings are a major part of the Township of Springfield municipal solid waste stream. Nearly a third of all summer waste generated by homeowners consists of grass clippings. As a Springfield resident, you probably already recycle paper, corrugated cardboard, glass, aluminum cans, and more. However, many people may not realize that another material that is easily recyclable is right under their feet: grass. The NJ Department of Environmental Protection estimates that as much as a ton of clippings is generated for every acre of turf grass each year. A lawn that is 5,000 square feet generates 75 pounds of grass clippings per mowing. By just cutting it and leaving it, think of the amount of waste that will be diverted from the solid waste stream.

Grass clippings can be added to the list of common home wastes that can be recycled. Simply leave your clippings on the lawn when you mow, and let nature do the recycling for you. Grass clippings will provide a natural fertilizer for a growing lawn which also helps retain moisture for your lawn, while reducing weed growth and soil erosion.

When "Cut it & Leave it" is properly done, clippings settle quickly between the growing blades of grass where they shelter the roots from the sun, and conserve moisture. As they break down, they release more moisture as well as nutrients into the soil. This means that grass needs to be watered less frequently. Clippings left on the lawn supply one-third or more of the nitrogen needed to keep your grass green and healthy.

How to Cut and Leave it....

Why spend time and energy buying bags and throwing the grass clippings into them and then bringing them to the DPW garage? There is a better way

Here is how - cut grass when dry and keep mower blades sharp. Follow the "1/3 Rule": mow your lawn

often enough so that no more than 1/3 of the length of the grass blade is cut in any one mowing. Frequent mowing will produce short clippings that will not cover up the grass surface. You may have to cut the lawn every 7 days when the lawn is growing fast but only every 7 to 14 days when the lawn is growing slowly.

The mower collection bag should be removed to allow clippings to drop on the lawn. However, if your mower does not have a safety flap covering the opening where the bag fits into the chute, it is important that you purchase a retrofit kit from your local retailer

Most lawnmower manufacturers have developed "mulching" mowers which cut grass blades into small pieces and force them into the soil. These types of mowers are effective in grass recycling and have become very popular. Make your next mower a mulching one.

Cut it and leave it is the natural way you can have a green, healthy lawn while spending less time and money and think of the amount of waste that will be diverted from the solid waste stream!

FAQ on Grass Recycling - Do grass clippings cause thatch and lawn disease?

No. Research has shown that grass roots are the primary cause of thatch, not grass clippings. Thatch is composed primarily of roots, stems, rhizomes, and other plant materials. These plant materials contain large amounts of lignin (fibrous material) and decompose slowly. Grass clippings are approximately 80-85 percent water with only small amounts of lignin, and decompose rapidly.

Will grass clippings make your lawn look bad?

If a lawn is properly mowed, watered, and fertilized, grass clippings can actually produce a healthier looking lawn. It is important to cut the lawn frequently to produce small clippings that will decompose quickly. If a lawn is not cut frequently and clippings are left on the lawn, it will produce a "hay-like" look which can be unsightly.



TOWNSHIP COMMITTEE RECAP

The April 28 Township Committee meeting included several causes for celebration. Award certificates were presented to the winners of the contest held in the schools for posters for Clean Communities Day. The announcements were made by Denise DeVone, Environmental Commission Co-chair and the presentations were made by Mayor David Barnett. Smiles and much applause all the way around. The mayor proclaimed May 3-9 Municipal Clerks Week which gave us all a chance to honor our Township Clerk Linda Donnelly for the mountain of work she does efficiently and cheerfully for all of us in Springfield, and also to acknowledge our Deputy Clerk, Maryellen Brennan. Our world would not turn without them. Police Officer Keith Christopher was sworn in as Sergeant. The seasonal staff for the pool and the summer camps was approved, so spring is truly here and summer is rapidly approaching. The final reason for special celebration is the approval of funding which includes the purchase of a sorely need new fire engine and also a much needed new bus for the Seniors (funded in part by a generous grant from Investors Savings). Funding for the annual Fireworks display was passed as was one for the Farmers' market. Summer is truly on its way. The annual Budget was introduced and will be presented to the public at two meetings to be held in May.

Topics to be discussed at the May Workshop meeting on Monday, May 11 will include a proposed resolution in support of the State's tightening up of the regulations concerning parents' ability to opt out of the vaccination requirements for religious reasons and also the possibility of televising Planning and Zoning Board and Worksop meetings. Please plan to join the discussion at the Firehouse at 6:30

on Monday, May 11.

Both the Workshop meeting of April 13 and the Regular meeting of April 14 included extensive discussion of the proposed final reading of the Ordinance which would give final approval to the Township's plan for the redevelopment of the property on Morris Avenue between Caldwell Place and Center Street and to the proposed plan for the property on Church Mall which was to be referred to the Planning Board for comment. At the Workshop meeting there were two issues discussed which were not part of the Regular meeting: the performance of Giordano Companies recycling and an update on the Rahway Valley Sewage Authority.

Tiffany Nisio of Giordano acknowledged the issues of missed pick-ups in Springfield, citing the competing demands on the company for certain dates, offering to change the pick up date to allow the company more flexibility but also citing Giordano's pledge to do whatever would be necessary to service Springfield. The decision was made to keep the recycling dates as they currently are

(separate from garbage pick ups) to which Ms. Nision agreed.

Michael Furci, the Township's representative on the RVSA, reported on several matters and a discussion followed which included information that our allowed flow rates are sufficient for both current usage and future growth, and the indications so far from our ongoing assessments of excessive flow rates over the past year coincide with rain events and may be due to the need for repairs to the system. The investigation should be concluded shortly and decisions will be made about what actions may be required. The TC went into closed session to discuss the pending appointment of the Pool manager for the current year.

The Regular session of April 14 was preceded by a public presentation of the two plans for downtown Redevelopment and a plan for new Streetscaping for the two commercial areas along Mountain Ave. sponsored by the Business Improvement District. Mayor Barnett was joined in these by Michael Scalera and Beth Lippman of the BID as well as Matt Jessup, our Redevelopment attorney. The two Redevelopment plans were also discussed as part of the Regular meeting prior to the voting. The two major concerns expressed were parking and the possibility of overloading the schools unless rentals were to be controlled. The ordinance confirming the adoption of the TC plan for the property on Morris Avenue between Caldwell and Center was adopted by a 3 to 2 vote (abstentions); this allows negotiations to legally begin with the developer including discussion of the issues publicly expressed. The resolution sending the Church Mall proposal to the Planning Board for discussion also passed with 3 votes in favor, one No and one abstention. There was also public discussion prior to the appointment of the Pool manager for the coming season. Both Chief John Cook and Captain Pat McLaughlin were given well-deserved raises.

What To Do If Your Car Catches Fire.

When driving, you should never smell smoke and/or the acrid smell of burning wires. Smoke does not necessarily mean that the car is on fire, but it should always be treated seriously. Drive directly to the shoulder of the road and turn off the ignition.

According to the American Automobile Association and the National Fire Protection Association, there are nearly 300,000 car fires annually in the United States, resulting in more than 500 deaths. The leading cause of these fires was poor vehicle maintenance.

Here is some advice to prevent a fire and avoid problems with your car. Include a check of the fuel system during your regular maintenance. Electrical and fuel system problems are the primary causes of car fires. An early indication of a problem is an electrical fuse that blows more than once. The source of the tripped fuse could be either a faulty component or a wiring problem. Next, check for oil leaks and always use a funnel when adding oil. Oil spilled on a hot exhaust manifold can cause a fire.

Another source of fires is the catalytic converter. This is the cylindrical unit located in the exhaust system found before the muffler. Catalytic converters can become so hot they can ignite dried grass or leaves directly under the parked vehicle. Never park on dried grass or leaves

Your first action, if you suspect that your car is on fire, should be to pull over immediately and turn off the engine. As you drive, the forward motion of the vehicle will force air into the engine compartment which feeds oxygen to the fire. It is best to stop in an area away from buildings and people, if you have that option. Burning plastics and other materials can produce toxic gases; therefore it is best not to expose yourself or bystanders.

Modern cars usually have an electric fuel pump; and by turning off the ignition, you will have stopped the flow of fuel to the fire. Next, get yourself and passengers out of the car and close the doors behind you. Closed doors and windows may limit the spread of fire by reducing the amount of oxygen available.

While explosions from car fires are rare (the most common is the bursting of a burning tire), you should stand clear of the area – especially avoiding the front and rear of the vehicle. Vehicles with slow impact bumpers are equipped with gas shock absorbers that, under intense heat, can explode and turn into lethal projectiles.

That's a lot to remember, so in summary, if smoke is billowing out of your car, pull over, turn off the ignition, get everyone out of the vehicle, and call for help.

SPRING IS FINALLY HERE SO REMEMBER TO USE THE ROADWAYS SAFELY TO PREVENT ACCIDENTS

Now that the spring weather has returned everyone is returning to the outdoors for both recreational purposes or to start those spring cleaning projects about your home. With this nicer weather now upon us, township residents may begin noticing an increase in the visible enforcement of motor vehicle violations by Springfield police officers with this being done to coincide with the nicer weather. This enforcement is not merely to cite motorists for violations but to hopefully educate both drivers and pedestrians alike in the safe and proper use of township roadways in an effort to reduce vehicle accidents. It is imperative that motorists operate their vehicles with extra caution during the warmer months as there are many more people outdoors, especially children playing in residential areas or walking or riding bicycles along township streets.

Residents are reminded that a motorist must come to a complete stop for a pedestrian in any crosswalk. Many of the intersections that are not controlled by a traffic signal and that are located on more heavily trafficked roadways have the noticeable yellow warning sign in the middle of the crosswalk to remind motorists to stop for crossing pedestrians.

Beginning in the month of May plainclothes police officers may pose as pedestrians who will be crossing at various intersections throughout the township and motorists who fail to stop for the "crossing pedestrian" will be stopped by uniformed officers and issued a ticket. Police officers will be operating at various intersections throughout the township, especially those where there have been incidents of either pedestrians or bicyclists having been struck by autos and been seriously injured or killed in the past. As you may not know whether a person legally using a crosswalk is an officer or not just remember to always stop for a crossing pedestrian in a crosswalk.

This stop for pedestrians in a crosswalk law not only stipulates a motorists is expected to stop for a pedestrian using a crosswalk but the pedestrian is expected to only legally cross a roadway at an intersection with a traffic signal, a crosswalk, or at street corners where a crosswalk would be located. Aside from intersections the other two other areas where a pedestrian runs a greater risk of being struck by a car are when crossing in the middle of a block or trying to cross a divided

Now that the spring weather has returned everyone is turning to the outdoors for both recreational purposes to start those spring cleaning projects about your highway. Any pedestrians crossing a roadway illegally can also be subject to being stopped and ticketed by police officers as well.

Other police operations for driver safety that will be conducted will target some of the major causes of motor vehicle accidents that occur within the township. Officers will be stopping motorists who operate a motor vehicle while using a cellular telephone that is not set up for hands free operation or are observed to be text messaging while driving. The other violations that frequently contribute to a higher number of accidents that are to be addressed are speeding, the improper use of specific turning lanes at intersections, driver inattention and aggressive driving.

The daily rush hour traffic congestion combined with more and more motorists seeming to be rushing to get to their destinations and the warmer weather leading to more children being out and about makes it vital that motorists use common sense and caution when driving. In residential areas drivers need to be mindful of persons walking dogs, jogging or out for an early evening stroll as well as children running about their neighborhood or riding their bicycles. Likewise, children should be instructed to not play or run blindly out into the street and dog walkers must have their pets securely held by a leash.

Remember that ALL persons under the age of seventeen (17) who either operate or ride upon a bicycle as a passenger MUST wear a properly fitted and fastened bicycle helmet and this applies especially to toddlers carried in a restraining seat attached to a parents' bicycle or in a trailer towed by the bicycle. Although optional for adults, a bicycle helmet should be worn by everyone when riding a bicycle, especially on public roadways where encounters with motor vehicles are an ever present hazard.

My officers and I know better than most people about the tragic consequences that can result from usually preventable accidents that are frequently caused by inattentive or careless drivers. Hopefully by heeding these warnings along with the increased and visible traffic enforcement by officers, motor vehicle accidents resulting in injuries or deaths can be prevented. So get out and enjoy the nice weather but please remember to use the roadways safely.

TD BANK ROBBERY IN SPRINGFIELD

On April 21, 2015 at approximately 4:36 pm, an individual committed a robbery at the TD Bank at 166 Morris Avenue. The male suspect handed a note to the teller that demanded money and contained threats to harm the teller if the money was not handed over and this was done while the suspect kept his right hand in his pants pocket as if he was holding onto a weapon. The suspect fled the bank running along Springfield Avenue before crossing the street to the parking lot of 150 Morris Ave.

According to Chief John Cook, an investigation by Detective Lieutenant Judd Levenson found that the same suspect had robbed a bank in South Plainfield hours earlier and had subsequently fled from police on foot into Plainfield. While police were searching for this suspect he broke into a home in Plainfield where he held the residents hostage until he took clothing to change into before driving off in the car belonging to the victims in Plainfield. The suspect apparently drove from Plainfield to Springfield robbing his second bank in the same day.

Springfield PD detectives working with detectives from both the South Plainfield and the Plainfield police departments were able to identify the suspect as Marlon Peek, age 39 of Plainfield. Peek was identified in committing 2 bank robberies in South Plainfield as well as the home invasion in Plainfield and the bank robbery in Springfield and is suspected of having committed additional bank robberies in Middlesex County since March of 2015.

On April 24, 2015 an arrest warrant was issued by the Springfield Police Department charging Peek with 1st degree robbery and he is also wanted by other police departments for robbery as well.

Marlon Peek was apprehended by police on Wednesday 05/06/2015 after attempting to commit a bank robbery in Linden NJ. He also attempted to commit a carjacking to flee from the police but was taken into custody. He was formally arrested and charged by Springfield PD detectives on 05/07/2015 on one count of robbery in the 1st degree and his bail from \$200,000.00 with an initial court appearance in the Union County Superior Court set for 05/15/2015.

POLES AND POSTERS DON'T MIX

During an emergency, we may have to have utility workers quickly access utility poles. Putting signs on them with the associated nails, ty raps, staples etc. can hinder and even injure a worker.

If you are planning to use a sign to publicize any activity, please post it on a stake, not on a utility pole. Nails, staples or other fasteners used to attach signs to poles can be hazardous to our workers who must climb these poles to repair or maintain our equipment. In addition, state law prohibits the posting of signs or outdoor advertising on any utility poles. If you want to advertise your event, get permission from property owners to post your signs on stakes, and check with the Town Hall, 973-912-2200, on any regulations regarding posting signs.
