Police Chief's Column Chief John P. Cook

Since May is Motorcycle Safety Awareness Month, I would like to take this opportunity to share some motorcycle traffic safety tips with Springfield's Patriot Times readers. Motorcyclists are much more likely to be injured or killed than other motorists, and are more susceptible to being involved in crashes in general. According to the National Highway Traffic Safety Association, there were over 8.6 million motorcycles on the road in 2016, and in that same year, over 500,000 new motorcycles were sold. Motorcycle crash fatalities continue to increase every year, with over 5,000 deaths reported nationwide according to the latest statistics. 69 of those occurred in NJ. In addition, over 2,000 motorcyclists are injured on NJ roads each year.

Approximately half of the reported motorcycle crashes involve at least one other vehicle. Many crashes involving motorcycles occur when the other vehicle's driver does not see the motorcycle. Considering this, drivers are urged to operate their vehicles with extra care during the summer months, and I offer the following information to motorists to help prevent motorcycle crashes:

- 1. Be extra observant for motorcycles on the road. Motorcycles are not as visible as cars or trucks, and can sometimes be hidden by traffic. Check your mirrors carefully before turning, changing lanes, and merging. Do not use hand-held electronic devices while driving!
- 2. Watch out when making left turns. Many crashes between cars and Motorcycles occur when a vehicle is turning left at an intersection. If you are preparing to cross traffic or turn left, take a second look for motorcycles
- 3. Do not tailgate motorcycles. Leave plenty of space if you are following a motorcycle. Motorcycles require less stopping distance and are more maneuverable than cars.
- 4. Watch out for road hazards. While potholes, debris, or other road defects may not have any effect on your car, motorcycles must avoid these.
- 5. "Share the Road." Treat motorcyclists with the same respect and courtesy you afford to other motorists.

Motorcyclists must also do their part to stay safe on the roads. Fatality rates involving speeding and alcohol use are much higher for motorcyclists than for all other types of motor vehicle operators. We urge all motorcyclists to wear proper DOT-compliant helmets, operate their motorcycles safely and legally, and be extra observant in busy areas.

Over the past several years, three-wheeled vehicles have become much more popular and we regularly see them being driven in our area. These vehicles have enclosed or partially enclosed side-by-side seats with seatbelts, a steering wheel, and foot pedal controls. These vehicle are classified as "autocycles" by the NJ MVC, and have their own set of legal requirements. (Traditional three-wheeled motorcycles (trikes) have handlebars and motorcycle-style seating, and remain classified as motorcycles.) As of 2017, autocycles have their own type of license plate designation, and a motorcycle license endorsement is not required to operate one – just a valid basic driver license. All autocycle operators and passengers must wear seatbelts and helmets, and if the vehicle does not have a windscreen, goggles and a face shield must we worn as well. Most importantly, children who require child restraint systems are not permitted as autocycle passengers at any time.

As a reminder, always obey posted speed limits, lane markings, and all other traffic control devices. If you have to make a call while driving, always use a hands-free device, and never text while driving. If you plan on drinking, always use a designated driver, ride share service, or car service – never get behind the wheel or handlebars if you've consumed alcohol. Help keep the roadways safe for everyone this summer.

Some of us will be starting up their barbeque grill for the season. Here are some tips to keep your barbeque fun and safe.

Each year, fire departments nationally respond to nearly 8,000 grill fires. Nearly 3,000 of those fires spread to a nearby structure – usually the house. Grill fires cause an annual average of 10 deaths, 120 reported injuries, and \$80 million in direct property damage. In half of the grill-related home fires, 86% of the time the fire started when either the flammable or combustible gas or liquid propane caught fire. One-third of the structure fires involving grills started on an exterior balcony

started when either the flammable or combustible gas or liquid propane caught fire. One-third of the structure fires involving grills started on an exterior balcony or unenclosed porch, which is why for people living in multiple residential properties (multi-family homes, apartments and condominiums), open flame cooking devices are prohibited for use on balconies. Portable LP-gas grills are not to be stored indoors or within 5 feet of combustible portions of the building.

• Propage and chargoal BBO grills must only be used outdoors. If used

• Propane and charcoal BBQ grills must only be used outdoors. If used indoors, or in any enclosed spaces such as tents, they pose a fire hazard and a risk of exposing occupants to deadly carbon monoxide poisoning.

• Place the grill a safe distance from lawn games, play areas, and foot traffic. Grills should be positioned at least 5 feet away from siding, deck railing, and out from under eaves and overhanging branches.

• Keep, matches, lighters, and starter fluid out of the reach of children in a locked drawer or cabinet.

• Keep children and pets away from the grill area: declare a three-foot "kid-free zone" around the grill.

• Use long barbeque mitts and long-handled grilling tools to protect the chef from heat and flames when cooking.

• Periodically remove grease or fat buildup in trays below the grill so it cannot be ignited by a hot grill.

If your grill does catch fire, turn off the gas, do not pour water (or any other liquid!) on a grease fire, keep the lid closed to deprive the fire of oxygen, and call the fire department. We'll do our best to save your barbeque.

On April 10, 2018, William Cieri was sworn in as Captain with the Springfield Police Department, after the Township Committee unanimously voted to promote him from Lieutenant. Mayor Richard Huber administered the oath of office to Captain Cieri who was surrounded by his wife, son and daughter, while Captain Cieri's friends and family as well as past and present Springfield police officers filled the gallery. Afterwards, Chief John Cook gave the audience a brief summary of Captain Cieri's career. Cieri joined the Springfield Police Department in 1993, having previously worked for the Orange Police Department. Since coming to Springfield, Cieri has been a patrol officer, has been assigned to the Union County Auto Theft Task Force as well as the Springfield Police Department's Detective Bureau, including time as the department's Juvenile, Evidence & ID Officer. After his promotion to Sergeant in 2011, Cieri was one of the department's patrol supervisors. In February 2015, Cieri was promoted to Lieutenant becoming a platoon commander, as well as the department's liason to the Union County Terrorism Task Force & Union County Domestic Violence Task Force.

SEAT BELT ENFORCEMENT AND EDUCATION CAMPAIGN TO BE CONDUCTED LOCALLY AS PART OF NATIONWIDE CLICK IT OR TICKET MOBILIZATION MAY 21 – JUNE 3, 2018

Law enforcement officers from the Springfield Police Department will join with police from around the country in cracking down on unbuckled motorists and passengers as part of the national "Click it or Ticket" campaign.

Beginning May 21 and running through June 3, the annual "Click It or Ticket" national mobilization utilizes high visibility seat belt checkpoints and saturation patrols, in combination with local and national publicity efforts, to reiterate the lifesaving value of seat belts. "Using a seat belt is the simplest way for a driver and his or her passengers to protect themselves when traveling," said Gary Poedubicky, Acting Director of the New Jersey Division of Highway Traffic Safety. "In 2016, it is estimated that more than 14,500 lives were saved nationally by the proper use of seat belts."

Poedubicky added that a key focus of this year's campaign is to promote seat belt usage by adults in all seating positions in the vehicle, both front AND rear seats. The front seat belt usage rate in New Jersey currently stands at 94.07%. However, adults riding in rear seats are buckling up at a significantly lower rate, only 48% in the most recent survey. "For whatever reason there seems to be a disconnect with people feeling they don't need to buckle up when riding as a passenger in rear seats, and this is a concern," he said. During the 2017 "Click it or Ticket" campaign, 350 New Jersey police agencies participated in the two-week initiative. As a result of the effort, law enforcement officers issued 17,792 seat belt citations, 6,363 speeding summonses and made 976 impaired driving arrests.





The Springfield Swim Team is open to girls and boys from 5-17 years old. The Swim Team will be divided into two groups: The Developmental Team will be made up of children 8 years old and younger who need more instruction and guidance. Developmental Team participants initially must be able to demonstrate the ability to submerge themselves underwater, swim freestyle for at least 15 yards, be able to swim on their back, and be willing and able to swim in the 5 foot and 12 foot sections of the main pool. Close to 600 people attended the annual banquet. It is with great pride, as Chief of the Department, to be able to announce that the Department's hard work, dedication and service to the community was recognized as they received top honors in several categories that evening.

LOCAL OF THE YEAR

President, Altay Vigilante, Vice President Kevin Ruck, Delegate Daniel Royland, together with members of Springfield FMBA Local #57 have been continuously dedicated to giving back to the town. For the past several years, members have been making donations to cancer organizations, autism support groups and veteran groups through the sale of t-shirts. Local 57 continues to sponsor several local sports teams and school events, provide service and refreshments at multiple town functions such as the street fair and annual holiday tree lighting. Members donate their time to cook at several school picnics throughout the year. Springfield FMBA also purchased and donated 3 AEDs to Springfield Little League. Members also coordinate many fire prevention seminars for

GROUP EFFORT NON-FIRE

The car was wrapped in live power lines, which were still energized with high voltage electricity. There were also multiple spot fires around and under the vehicle. At this point, members were sacrificing their own safety to maintain all focus on the driver. whose condition was worsening. When the vehicle appeared to no longer be energized, Captain Heinrich made the decision to extricate the victim while nearby wires continued to arc and start fires. The victim was transported to the hospital in serious condition and has since made a full recovery. The members of the Department displayed their high level of courage and discipline to initiate the positive outcome for the trapped driver.

The victim was removed from the second floor and down the interior ladder with the assistance of Westfield firefighters. Unfortunately, the victim did not survive the rescue attempt. Recognition here is for members coming together to overcome and adapt in the middle of a very high stress situation. What makes this situation unique is these members do not regularly operate together, in some cases these members may have never even met, yet they demonstrated the ability to work together in this unfortunate circumstance.

Lt. Raguse joined the Springfield Police Dept. in December 2005. In 2010, an opportunity became available for a Springfield police officer to be assigned to a Homeland Security task force. With her prior experience as a National Bank Examiner for the U.S. Department of Treasury, then-Officer Raguse was a "perfect fit for the position," said Chief John Cook. Raguse was promoted to Investigator in 2012 and Sergeant in February 2015. Raguse, who had been serving in the Department's Special Services Unit until this promotion, will be a Patrol Platoon Commander in her new role.

In an interview after the promotions tonight, Chief John Cook remarked that "police work, in all reality, has been a male dominant career in our country for quite a long time. I am especially proud of our female officers as I realize the extra efforts that are perceived to be necessary for them to feel on par at times with not only their male counterparts, but also with the public in general. I do not tolerate, for one iota, any sense of there being any inequality in how my officers treat each other and more so how my officers are treated by the public.

Lieutenant Raguse has been through some of the negativity of which I referred, prior to my taking command of the department, and has not only maintained her professionalism in her career but has excelled and had become Springfield's first female Sergeant and now Lieutenant, of which I am very proud of and for her."

Sgt. Knudsen joined the Springfield Police Department in July 2004, having graduated from the Monmouth County Police Academy a month earlier. Over the years, Knudsen has been one of the Department's Terminal Agency Coordinators ("TAC" officers), serving as a liaison between the Department and the State's computer databases, has been one of the Department's two on-call fatal crash investigators, has been a Firearms Instructor since 2013, a Rifle Instructor since 2017 and was named co-head Firearms Instructor in October 2017. Knudsen has also served for nine years on the executive board of the Springfield PBA, having held office as the union's secretary, vice president and president at various times. Promoted to Corporal in 2014, and Investigator earlier this year, Knudsen had been serving in the Department's Investigations Bureau prior to this promotion which makes him a Patrol Shift Supervisor.

The audience gathered also heard a proclamation presented to Stephanie and Marissa Steiner, recognizing May as Preeclampsia Awareness Month. Marissa explained that the duo are the co-chairs of the Promise Walk which raises awareness of Preeclampsia, a disease that almost killed both mother and daughter during Marissa's birth 18 years ago. This year's walk will be on May 20th at Oak Ridge Park in Clark, NJ.

The final presentations of the evening were to those Springfield school children that participated in the Clean Communities art contest. Presented by Aly Miller and Denise DeVone, the winners were presented with certificates while friends and familiy cheered.
