

#### TUESDAY, SEPTEMBER 26 IS NATIONAL VOTER REGISTRATION DAY 2017

On September 26, 2017, Americans will celebrate National Voter Registration Day with a massive 50-state effort to register voters before Election Day this November. The League of Women Voters of the Union Area plans to register voters at the Springfield Free Public Library, 66 Mountain Avenue, in Springfield, from 10 am to 5 pm.

With important local and state elections this fall and primaries for next year's state and national elections months away, every eligible American voter should exercise his or her right to be heard at the ballot box. National Voter Registration Day is the right place to start by getting registered.

The League of Women Voters, a nonpartisan political organization, is dedicated to ensuring that all eligible voters – including first-time voters, non-college youth, new citizens, minorities, the elderly and low-income Americans – have the opportunity and the information to exercise their right to vote.

Thousands of national, state, and local organizations and volunteers will be the driving force behind National Voter Registration Day 2017. 

#### **SCHOOLS ARE OPEN** PLEASE DRIVE CAREFULLY

Summer vacations have ended and the school year has begun. I would like the readers of my column in the Springfield Patriot Times to remember to drive with extra caution when approaching and entering a school zone, when entering onto school property or when approaching a school bus actively involved in either receiving or discharging children. In order to ensure the safety of the township's school children, the police department personnel will be placing an added emphasis on monitoring the operation of motor vehicles on the roadways where local schools are located in order to enforce those parts of the NJ motor vehicle code that pertain to school zones and school busses.

All motorists must bring their vehicle to a complete stop when approaching a school bus which is either receiving or discharging children. The bus will display the noticeable red flashing lights that are illuminated to warn motorists to stop their vehicles and to not pass the stopped school bus. This regulation applies to vehicles on either side of a roadway without a center divider where a bus is stopped, whether it be an overtaking vehicle (one that is on the same side of the road as the stopped bus) or for an approaching vehicle (one that is traveling on the opposite side of the street but approaching the bus). It is paramount that all traffic on both sides of a roadway comes to a complete stop as many of the children, especially when being discharged, will require to cross the roadway.

Pursuant to the NJ motor vehicle code, the speed limit in any school zone is twenty-five (25) miles per hour during the times of the day when schools are opening and closing, specifically when children are either going to or leaving school. In addition, the school zone speed limit restriction is in effect during any recess period when the presence of children is clearly visible from the roadway. This speed restriction is of vital importance as the schools within the township are located on heavily trafficked main thoroughfares.

All operators of motor vehicles should pay attention to the flashing school zone speed limit signs. These signs are used as an added warning to motorists approaching school zones at the start and end of each school day. In addition to police officers, crossing guards may be seen handling various traffic related duties at schools as a complement of civilian school crossing guards work at specific heavy traffic intersections that are near the schools to assist children in walking safely to and from school each day.

Anyone driving onto school property during the times when children are being dropped off or picked up should drive slowly with extreme caution as driveways and the parking lots will frequently have children running to or from vehicles or riding their bicycles.

In keeping with the safety of children, motorists are further reminded to use caution in the area of schools even after the school day due to children often leaving later due to extracurricular activities or school sporting events. This is of extreme importance once the time changes and it becomes darker much earlier.

Also please keep in mind that vehicles are not to be idling while on school property when waiting to pick up children. Police officers will randomly be checking and enforcing this township ordinance.

Lastly, please remember that the operators of vehicles which sit in line along Mountain Avenue waiting to pull into the Walton School lot are to remain inside their vehicles at all times, and the vehicles are to remain running and in drive with the proper turn signal on as this is a traffic route.



#### SEVERE WEATHER BLACKOUTS

Severe weather and storms can cause power outages and restoring power can take time. In some instances, such as during extended periods of hot weather, power companies may schedule periods of power outages to help conserve power across the board.

#### **Before**

- Conserve energy to help reduce the threat of a power outage.
- Have flashlights, a battery-powered or hand-cranked radio, and extra batteries on hand.
- Set aside extra water and buy or make extra ice.
- If you have space in your refrigerator or freezer, keep plastic containers filled with water, leaving about an inch of space in each one. The chilled or frozen water will help keep food cool during power outages.
- Be prepared to cook outside.
- If you take any medications that must be refrigerated, check with your doctor or pharmacist to determine how long medications can last.
- Back up computer files regularly.
- Have some form of phone that does not require electricity, either a standard telephone or a cellular phone, rather than a cordless telephone.
- Keep your vehicle's gas tank at least half full.
- If you have any specific needs or disabilities that require electrical equipment, make plans for dealing with a power outage.

#### **During**

- Never use candles for emergency lighting, use flashlights.
- Turn off any electrical equipment you were using when the power went out. Leave one light on so you know when the power returns.
- Avoid opening the refrigerator and freezer.
- Use generators safely. Don't run a generator inside a home or garage. Connect the equipment you want to run directly to the generator. Do not connect a generator to a home's electrical system. Keep instructions with the generator and be familiar with its use.
- Use the telephone only for emergencies.
- Listen to the radio for updates.
- Eliminate unnecessary travel.
- If it is hot outside, take steps to remain cool. If it is cold, take steps to remain warm.
- If you are in your car when a power line falls on it, stay in the vehicle and do not touch anything on the outside of the vehicle. Use your horn or cell phone to signal for help.
- Short-term power outages usually occur during peak energy usage times, usually between 4:00 p.m. and 7:00 p.m. on weekdays, and typically last one hour.

#### <u>After</u>

- Stay away from downed power lines.
- Do not refreeze any dairy products, seafood, or food that has thawed completely and been above 40° for more than two hours, or anything with a questionable texture or smell. If in doubt, throw it out.

The SAT diagnostic test will be held at the library from 10:30 AM to 2:30 PM on Saturday, September 30. The ACT diagnostic test will be held at the library from 10:30 AM to 2:30 PM on Saturday, October 7. The diagnostic tests are the same as those that are made available on the Educational Testing Service website, but these sessions will give participants the experience of taking the test in a structured setting with other students.

Students wishing to improve their test taking abilities may sign up for free tutoring sessions that will be held either on a one-to-one basis or in groups

of no more than three students to one tutor. Students will have the opportunity to specify which subject areas they would like to concentrate on. The tutoring sessions will be held from 10:00 AM to 2:00 PM on October 21 and 28; November 4, 18 and 25: and December 2 and 9.

These free testing and tutoring opportunities are open to all residents of Springfield who are enrolled in grades nine through twelve as of this fall. 

#### LIFELONG SPRINGFIELD RESIDENT MARK HURWITZ HAS AN INTERESTING HOBBY



Lifelong Springfield resident Mark Hurwitz has an interesting hobby. He re-enacts battles of the American Revolution and has been doing so for over 40 years! Mark joined the 3rd NJ Regiment, "Jersey Blues" (www.jerseyblues.org) in 1974. Over the years, he had held many leadership positions with the group including Commander and National Commander of the Brigade of the American Revolution (www.brigade.org). He also worked as a consultant to PBS in their 1997 documentary —"Liberty-The American Revolution".

His true passion is doing the actual battle re-enactments and he does them all over the country with the BAR. Not only does he dress in an authentic reproduction of the uniform and carry a musket, but as BAR Commander, reproduced the uniform of Col. Elias Dayton, one of the heroes of the Springfield campaign. Along with his wife, Pat, acting as a 'Woman of the Army', Mark sets up 18th Century encampments as part of each re-enactment. His extensive knowledge on all

aspects of the battles that took place during the revolution come into play during each event weekend.

Back in 2005, Mark was a key player as the Event Coordinator of the re-enactment which was held in Springfield, as part of the celebration of the 225th anniversary of the Battle of Springfield. On June 24th of this year, Mark was part of the 240th anniversary re-enactment of the Battle of Short Hills, held in Clark, NJ. Then, on August 12, Mark and Pat traveled to Bennington, Vermont to re-enact the 240th Battle of Bennington. This reporter had the pleasure of attending that event, which saw Mark as the Narrator of the Battle, dressed as a Militia Officer. After the Battle re-enactment was over, an attendee who was visiting the area from Dublin, Ireland, came up to Mark and commented that without his extensive revolutionary knowledge and narration/commentary of the Battle, the event would not have been nearly as meaningful. Mark and the 3rd NJ Regiment will be appearing at a number events, locally in NJ this Fall. Check the schedule on their web site

In an exclusive interview with the Patriot Times, Mark commented, "Growing up in Springfield, I was inculcated with the Revolutionary War in my hometown. My friends all had plastic WWII toy soldiers, I had a 'Johnny Tremain' set of Revolutionary War soldiers. When the Bicentennial came along, I had graduated college and saw the 3rd NJ Regiment at a BAR Encampment at Kean University. They were my 'Hometown Heroes', my high school was named after Capt Jonathan Dayton. Doing 'Living History' as a hobby allowed me to put all the reading and the childhood history tourism to practical use. It is great to step back in time for a weekend!"And, as they say, "the rest is history"...
