I would like to provide you the very latest updates on projects we've been working on. Evergreen Avenue Paving

The County of Union provided a 2019 Infrastructure Grant for Paving Improvements to Evergreen Avenue. Project work was completed by December 2019. Reimbursement of the project grant of \$57,500 has been requested. **Country Club Lane and Nelson Place**

The Township of Springfield was notified of a grant opportunity for Union County Community Development Block Grant funding. An application was submitted for paving improvements on Country Club lane and Nelson Place. A grant of \$150,000 was requested for the project. Program awards are announced around June 2020.

Main Street Bridge over Route 78

The New Jersey Department of Transportation is planning on replacing the concrete bridge deck and deficient superstructure on the Main Street Bridge over Route 78. Sign panels will also be replaced. The project is funded with Federal dollars. Construction is expected to commence in Spring 2020 with a Fall 2022 completion. Vehicular and pedestrian traffic will be maintained during construction.

Morris Avenue Bridge over Rahway River

The New Jersey Department of Transportation is planning on replacing the Route 82 Bridge, which is in poor condition, over the Rahway River. During times of flooding, the existing arch openings of the bridge restrict the river's flow, causing flooding to adjacent upstream properties. Construction is anticipated to commence in Winter 2022 with completion in Fall 2023. The roadway will be closed to all traffic for approximately eight (8) weeks during the bridge replacement. Traffic detours will be established. NJDOT met with municipal staff in October and held a public information meeting on January 14, 2020.

Tesla Charging Stations @ Wawa

The Planning Board met on January 2, 2020 and approved installation of eight Tesla electric vehicle charging stations at the Wawa site located at the corner of Morris Turnpike, Cleveland Place and Morris Avenue.





Police Chief's Column - Chief John P. Cook

The Police Department continues to receive reports of scams and other crimes involving fraudulent activity on an almost daily basis. While these schemes may unfold in different ways, the end result is always the same – the perpetrators defraud the victims of their money. Many of the suspects involved in these scams operate from foreign countries, and prosecution is all but impossible. Luckily, many financial institutions will rectify fraudulent transactions, but full resolution of these situations can turn in to major hassles for victims. Thieves may attempt to use their victim's breached personal information to open unauthorized accounts or make fraudulent purchases for a long time after the initial fraud is detected. So, the best way to deal with these types of frauds is to be able to recognize and identify the scam before you become a victim. Here are some warning flags to look out for:

• If you receive an email or phone call indicating you won a prize, but must pay some type of "fee" before you can collect a prize, it is a scam. If you did not personally enter a sweepstakes or lottery, hang up the phone immediately or delete the email. Do not reply, and do not provide any personal information. Any legitimate prize will not require a pre-payment of any sort.

• If you are selling an item or offering a service online, and someone wants to give you a check made out for more than you are asking, it is a scam. These perpetrators will ask you to wire or transfer the difference from your bank account before the check is discovered to be counterfeit.

• If you receive an email from a bank or credit card company requesting you to click on an included link to access your account, it is probably a scam. If the link directs you to enter personal information in addition to your account information, it is definitely a scam. Some of these emails look very convincing, and can fool almost anyone. If you are not sure, but want to check your account anyway, don't click the included link, but rather manually type the bank's web address or call the phone number listed on your card or statement.

• If you receive a call from someone who claims to be a representative of your bank or credit card company, and they ask for your personal information to "verify" your identity, it is a scam. These perpetrators will try to get you to divulge your confidential information, such as your social security number, to commit frauds against you. Any legitimate caller will already know who you are and will not ask you to provide confidential information to prove your identity.

• If you receive a call or email from someone claiming to be a foreign law enforcement official, who asks you to pay bail for one of your relatives who was jailed abroad, it is a scam. Fraudsters will browse Facebook accounts looking for people who are posting photos while on vacation in foreign countries, and track down their relatives who they will try to scam.

• If you receive a call from someone who claims to be a police officer or federal agent and tells you there is a warrant for your arrest that you can pay over the phone, it is a scam. If there really is a warrant issued for your arrest, police will come to your home or business to arrest you, but will never call ahead and agree to accept bail payment over the phone in lieu of arrest.

• If you receive a call from someone who claims to be a representative of a utility company, and threatens to disconnect a utility unless you make a payment over the phone, it is a scam. Sometimes these callers will request payment to be made with a pre-paid debit card or bank transfer. If in doubt, always contact your utility directly to verify your account status.

• If you receive a call from someone claiming your social security number has been compromised, suspended because of suspicious activity, or it's been used in a crime, and you must make some kind of a large payment to rectify the problem, it is a scam. The social security agency will never call and threaten your benefits or tell you to wire money, send cash, or put money on gift cards. Never give any part of your Social Security number to anyone who contacts you. If in doubt, hang up and contact the SSA directly at 1-800-772-1213.

• Phony IRS scams also increase during this time of year. You may receive phone calls or emails that appear to be authentic indicating you owe taxes or have other problems with the IRS. Do not click on any links in these emails, and do not provide the callers with any information. Remember, the IRS will not contact you by telephone or email to request personal or financial information, or threaten arrest if immediate payment is not made. Any official correspondence will be made via the US Postal Service.

Very few instances exist in which you may have to provide confidential personal information over the phone, text message, or email. You should take every precaution to safeguard your social security number, bank account numbers, credit/debit card numbers, and other personal identifying information. If you feel you may have fallen victim to one of these scams, contact the Police Department for assistance and for


Springfield Honors Martin Luther King, Jr. Day With Insightful Conversation And Unity

Springfield Police Officer John Laurencelle was in Afghanistan for 10 months with C co 1-171 AVN BN of the New Jersey Army National Guard. He was with a MEDEVAC unit based out of Lakehurst, NJ. They flew UH-60 Blackhawk helicopters and are tasked with the immediate evacuation of American and coalition forces from the battlefield to higher levels of medical care. John is a Flight Paramedic. So when American forces are engaged with the enemy and sustain casualties; it is their responsibility to launch, land in the combat zone, extract and treat the wounded, and get them to a surgeon within an hour of the request for medical evacuation. Additionally, they transport those same casualties after their surgery at a forward hospital to the larger hospital located in Kandahar. John spent most of his time in Kandahar province and the surrounding provinces in western Afghanistan.

He was awarded an Air Medal with the "C" device for combat, and the Combat Medical Badge.



AUXILIARY POLICE HOLD AWARDS DINNER

On January 30, the Springfield Auxiliary Police held their annual awards dinner at Baltusrol Golf Club. Emergency Management Coordinator Scott Seidel welcomed the members of the Auxiliary Police and the CERT Team, their guests and township officials who were in attendance. Mayor Christopher Capodice addressed the gathering and thanked the volunteers for their efforts. Springfield Police Chief John Cook commented on the unit's work and thanked the members for their dedication. After dinner, Seidel started the awards program by commenting that in 2019, the Auxiliary Police performed 2,281 hours of service, which probably represents over \$100,000 in volunteer service to the township. The Auxiliary Police duty hours consist of routine training patrols, court duty, special events, emergencies and of course the two "flagship" events, the Fourth of July celebration and the Chamber of Commerce Festival and Car Show.

A substantial amount of hours was performed on the Fourth of July. On the Fourth, everyone would like to be with their families, but for the Auxiliary Police as well as the many other Emergency Management and CERT Volunteers, it means spending time away from their families to make sure the Township runs a safe and secure event. In 2019 the Unit worked 1165 hours at special events and special details, 140 hours at emergencies and 506 hours of patrol. The annual requirement is 96 hours per year and most members surpassed that bench mark in 2019, according to OEM Coordinator Scott Seidel. Scott Seidel then presented The Chief Harold Liebeskind Auxiliary Officer of the Year award to Officer Antonio Nacci. Deputy Coordinator Apu Mullick commented to the Patriot Times "This award is presented to an officer who stands out among his peers in his performance and is not necessarily given for the officer with the most amount of hours worked. This year's recipient for 2019 is Officer Antonio Nacci. He performed 135 hours of duty hours in 2019." Upon receiving the award, Nacci commented. "I truly enjoy being a part of this organization and being able to serve my community".

Space heaters are a great way to warm up a cold room or provide supplemental heat to your home. But while convenient, they are also a leading cause of home fires during the winter months. If you're going to use a space heater, here are a few tips to make sure you stay extra warm – and safe.

- Use only equipment that is made for home heating. Use all types of heaters carefully and follow all directions for safe use.
- Use a space heater that has been tested to the latest safety standards and has been certified by a nationally recognized laboratory. These heaters have the most up-to-date safety features. Older space heaters may not meet newer safety standards.
- Place the heater on a level, hard, nonflammable surface, such as a ceramic tile floor.
- Make sure space heaters are at least three feet away from bedding, drapes, furniture and other flammable materials.
- Place smoke alarms on every level of your home, outside of sleeping areas and inside each bedroom.
- Utilize a carbon monoxide detector.

Don'ts

- Never leave a space heater on when you go to sleep.
- Don't place a space heater close to any sleeping person, bedding, furniture, drapes or other flammable materials.
- Never use gasoline in a kerosene space heater, as even small amounts of gasoline mixed with kerosene can increase the risk of fire.
- Never use your oven, grill or clothes dryer to heat your home. This could cause a fire or dangerous carbon monoxide gas, which produces deadly, odorless, colorless fumes.
