This year, two candidates are competing for the one Township Committee seat. The candidates are: Democrat: Mayor Hugh Keffer and Republican: Ziad Shehady.

A non partisan moderator will chair the meeting. Vocal questions will not be permitted. Pens and paper will be available for written questions, which must pertain to local (Springfield) matters and addressed to a specific candidate. Questions will be collected by volunteers from the Hadassah American Affairs Committee. Questions of a personal nature will not be permitted. At the beginning of the program, each candidate will have an opportunity to introduce himself and share limited biographic information that could impact upon his performance as a member of the Springfield Township Committee. In addition, candidates will also have an opportunity to present closing statements. Dialogue will be strictly timed. The meeting is not a debate but rather a forum. The candidates will not directly respond to each other's statements and rebuttals.

The Township Committee received a compliment in the September 29, 2011 issue of The Local Source Newspaper. (The following has been reprinted with permission from the September 29, 2011 issue of Union County Local Source.) "The Springfield Township Committee gets an "A" for conducting business in a quiet, dignified manner since January. What a change over last year. Just a year ago, this community saw its police department assumed by the prosecutor's office because its foundation had eroded to the point where there was no chain of

command. Clearheaded, mature thinking and decision making have built a solid foundation in the police and fire departments.

I applaud that effort and hope this strong, forward direction continues, because the community can only benefit when their leaders have its best interests at heart. That takes a mature, sensible governing body that works together without drama to make these kind of strides and I urge residents to remember this when they head to the polls this fall"

In the past nine months, the Township Committee has worked closely with the Springfield Board of Education to develop better playing fields for the children of Springfield. 

SPRINGFIELD HOPE HELPS THOSE IN NEED

Springfield HOPE has received over can". We plan on making sure every \$1200 in donations from township residents and businesses to help those who suffered losses during Tropical Storm Irene. Using that money, plus other donations already on hand, HOPE has purchased \$6500 in gift cards from Kohls and Village Supermarkets (Shop Rite) to help those severely impacted by the storm, stated HOPE Trustee, Scott Seidel. Shop Rite's parent company, Village Supermarkets, was especially helpful in making the bulk purchase a simple matter, commented HOPE Trustee John Cottage. Residents impacted by Irene are urged to email or call Springfield HOPE to obtain these gift cards. All requests and calls are kept confidential. Dr. Gary Hecht, whose office is "HOPE" Headquarters, explained while \$6500 sounds like a lot of money, when divided between all the families impacted by the storm, it translates only to a small gift per family. Gary said "We really wish we could fix everyone's problems, but are happy to be able to do what we

FOUR CENTURIES AT THE HISTORIC CANNONBALL HOUSE

Springfield's Historic Cannonball House, (CBH) located at 126 Morris Ave., will again be part of Union County's Four Centuries in a Weekend on October 15th and 16th.

Springfield's Fall Festival will also be held on Sunday, October 16th. Visitors will be able to combine a trip to the festival with a stroll by the town's Revolutionary era cemeteries, the 1765 First Presbyterian Church, and end with a visit to the House itself. The Festival may have horse-drawn carriage rides along Morris Ave for visitors to enjoy.

The Springfield Historical Society will feature an exhibit highlighting the 250th Anniversary of the Civil War. Captain Edward Wade, who died of wounds received at Antietam in September 1862, was a resident of Millburn, then a part of Springfield. A number of items belonging to him are on view at the Cannonball House. In addition, some of the many letters exchanged by Wellington Briant and his family, following his enlistment in October 1861, will also be on display. These letters contain fascinating details of military and civilian daily life.

Celebrating the Revolutionary War history of the township, members of the Brigade of the American Revolution will be present on Saturday, October 15th only. They will demonstrate 18th century weapons, military drills, and interact with visitors. Visit us and hear the story of the Battle of Springfield (June 23, 1780) and its significance in the nation's history – as well as how the Cannonball House got it's name!

SPRINGFIELD VOLUNTEER FIRST AID SQUAD SEMI-ANNUAL FUND DRIVE

The Springfield Volunteer First Aid Squad has kicked off its semi-annual fund drive with a letter to all residents of the town. Twice a year, members of the squad reach out to the community seeking donations, which are used to directly fund the all-volunteer emergency services and rescue organization.

At this time, all residents should have received an envelope containing a donation card. Please consider making a donation if you have not done so already.

"We understand that now more than ever we are reaching out and asking for money during difficult times for many," said Fred Ostry a member of the squad. "We depend on the generosity of our friends and neighbors to purchase supplies, maintain our ambulances, and to continue providing professional EMS services free of charge to the community."

The organization provides EMS and rescue services to the community on a 24-hour basis. Dedicated members volunteer their time for training and for responding to calls, which range from minor cuts to serious injuries. They do so, day or night, and often at the expense of time with their families.

Members responded to approximately 1,800 calls in 2010 and devoted more than 30,000 hours volunteering to answer calls and train to assure residents get the best possible care.





DON'T BE A VICTIM OF A BURGLARY OR THEFT



In good economic times or bad economic times, there will always be various types of thefts of opportunity that are committed such as shop-lifting, break-ins to motor vehicles and burglaries to

houses or businesses. The following information is for residents and businesses alike on some ways to prevent being the victim of a burglary or theft.

Home owners must remember that a closed window is not a locked window as burglars will initially walk around a house to see if a door has been inadvertently left unlocked or if window as closed but not locked by the homeowner. Whether you leave your house for the entire day or just an hour ... always lock all doors and windows. Homeowners do not usually lock second story windows believing they are not accessible to a thief but in some cases a burglar will use lawn furniture or storage bins in the rear yard to be able to reach a higher window or a lower roof in order to open an unlocked upper floor window.

While the best deterrent to either commercial or

residential burglaries is an alarm system there are other things that can be done to prevent a burglary. Houses with dogs as pets are least favored by most thieves who do not want to encounter a potentially unfriendly dog within the house and to this point, homeowners with or without a dog will buy and post a "beware of dog" sign on their property as added deterrent. At night, lighting is another deterrent to crime as lights at houses gives an appearance that the house is occupied and lighting at businesses limits the availability for burglars to work on prying a window or door.

Homeowners on vacation should make sure to stop mail or newspaper deliveries and not have empty garbage or recycling cans left out in front of the house as these are signs the residents are away. Motion sensor lights or lights on timers will give the appearance that you and are family are home at night. If possible, see if a neighbor or relative or friend can park one of their vehicles in your driveway so your house looks occupied.

Businesses with cash registerss should have the register drawer left in the open position when the business is closed s the main focus of any retail burglary is to take the money in the register draw.

As the price of gold and silver have been so high this has resulted in house burglars going directly to master bedrooms to seek out and steal gold and silver jewelry and this is usually found both in jewelry boxes atop the dressers or stored inside of dresser drawers. Jewelry, especially items not worn on a regular basis, should be kept in a secure location that is not located within the master bedroom as burglars are prone to only spend minutes inside of a house and usually only search the bedrooms looking for cash and jewelry.

Motor vehicles when parked should have the doors locked and windows fully closed and no visible enticements to thieves such as GPS units on dash board or pocketbook or computer case on the seat as car burglars will usually look into a car and see an item they want and will then break in or they will merely go car to car seeing if doors are unlocked.
