Communities such as Springfield that receive Tree City USA status not only have taken the time to meet the above stated standards, they also recognize that trees promote healthier communities in the following ways;'

Their leaves filter the air we breathe by removing dust and other particles from the air. Trees moderate climate, conserve water and provide habitat for wildlife. Trees planted in urban areas reduce the heat island effect caused by pavement and buildings. Properly placed trees can increase property values.

Trees are a vital component of the infrastructure in our cities and towns and they also provide environmental and economical benefits. Cities that are recognized with a Tree City USA designation go to great lengths to plant and care for the community forest.

TEAMWORK IS HEART OF COUNTY VETERANS BUSINESS ASSOCIATION

for former Marine Corps Major Richard Vaill, and now he is bringing that mindset to New Jersey where he hosted the inaugural meeting of the Veteran's Business Association (VBA) in conjunction with the Gateway Regional Chamber of Commerce.

"I wanted to help build a support system for veterans," said Vaill, business development officer at The Provident Bank. "This association allows veterans the opportunity to get together and help each other out."

The VBA was created by Vaill to help make all veterans working throughout New Jersey feel comfortable and connected.

Vaill graduated from the U.S. Naval Academy, Annapolis, MD in 1988 a 2nd Lieutenant in the Marine Corps. He served on active duty from 1988-1993 and was a Logistics Officer with the 2nd Marine Division in Desert Storm.

Following his service, he spent more than 10 years working in the financial industry while remaining a reservist. He then returned to active duty in 2003-2004 as a "hometown link" for the Marine for Life program. His duty was to help recently discharged Marines get settled into civilian life.

"These young Marines have a lot of skill, but they would need assistance with their transition once they left the service," said Vaill. "I would use my resources to get them going."

Vaill would reach out to businesses, arrange introductions and continually network. He found that the law enforcement community was extremely receptive to the placement program, and would hire many of the Marines he

> "The mission is twofold, to help veterans network and grow their business, and also help veterans transition out of the armed forces," said Vaill, who had about 40 people turn out for the VBA's inaugural event.


FROM THE CHAMBER CHAIRS

GET TO KNOW THE SPRINGFIELD FIRST AID SQUAD

With the National Emergency Medical Services Week coming up May 17th through May 23rd perhaps we as town residents should take a look at the Springfield First Aid Squad.

The Springfield First Aid Squad is provided by an independent group of volunteers. They are not part of the town's Police force or Fire department. These volunteers spend countless hours each week manning the first aid squad building and responding to all emergencies. The services are provided to our town 24 hours a day, 7 days a week, 365 days a year. Through out its 60 years of volunteer service to our town, there has never been a single bill generated for any services.

In 2008 there were a total of 1,642 emergency calls and responses. That is around thirty-two emergency calls to 911 a week. This included calls made by our town residents, 915 home calls, 333 business and doctor's offices, 232 auto accidents, and the balance to schools, sporting events, and fires. Some of the more rewarding calls that the squad responded to this year included 14 calls for C.P.R.; 10 of which were lives saved, and another exciting call was a birth that occurred in the ambulance in route to the hospital.

There are over fifty volunteers that give of themselves riding the ambulance on a regular basis. These volunteers have put countless hours into providing our town with free emergency response to your calls. They all spend many hours each year taking continuing education in first aid and other varied medical courses. Many of them have completed and passed the New Jersey State E.M.T.-B course. During this National EMS week and especially during the rest of the weeks of the year, please keep these volunteers in your thoughts and prayers. Thank You to all of our volunteers on The Springfield First Aid Squad.

NOTE OUR CHANGES DURING CONSTRUCTION

Due to on-going construction in the police

department located in the municipal building, it is necessary to relocate portions of the police operations. The renovation of the police dispatch area is scheduled to begin, so the police dispatch area is temporarily being moved to the fire house located at 200 Mountain Ave.

This movement has reduced our ability to handle walk in complaints to police headquarters. In order for us to deal with walk in complaints, citizens will have to contact the dispatch area for officer assistance by calling the main police headquarters phone number which remains as 973-376-0400. An officer will be dispatched to handle the complaint. Citizens, who come to the municipal building between the hours of 8:00 a.m. and 4:00 p.m. Monday through Friday, may contact the police by going to the township clerk's office and asking for assistance or by utilizing the white colored phone attached to the wall outside of police headquarters.

Between the hours of 4:00 p.m. and 8:00 a.m. and all day Saturday and Sunday and

legal holidays, the municipal building is closed, so citizens who wish to contact the police will be required to call the main police department number noted above. If you are at the entrance to police headquarters please use the white colored phone attached to the wall outside of the door. All phone lines to the police department will remain the same and as always, emergencies will be dealt with by calling 911.

Police records and administration will remain the municipal building during the construction and may be accessed during regular business hours (8:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. M-F). The investigative division is currently remaining in their offices and may be reached by calling the main phone number 973-376-0400.

This inconvenience will not disrupt our normal response to citizen's complaints and calls, since the majority of our responses are originated through calls that our made to the police dispatch.

This construction will provide the police department with a more up-to-date dispatch area to facilitate our work.

WHAT TO DO IF YOUR CAR CATCHES FIRE

When driving, you should never smell smoke and/or the acrid smell of burning wires. Smoke does not necessarily mean that the car is on fire, but it should always be treated seriously. Drive directly to the shoulder of the road and turn off the ignition.

According to the American Automobile Association and the National Fire Protection Association, there are nearly 300,000 car fires annually in the United States, resulting in more than 500 deaths. The leading cause of these fires was poor vehicle maintenance.

Here is some advice to prevent a fire and avoid problems with your car. Include a check of the fuel system during your regular maintenance. Electrical and fuel system problems are the primary causes of car fires. An early indication of a problem is an electrical fuse that blows more than once. The source of the tripped fuse could be either a faulty component or a wiring problem. Next, check for oil leaks and always use a funnel when adding oil. Oil spilled on a hot exhaust manifold can cause a fire.

Another source of fires is the catalytic converter. This is the cylindrical unit located in the exhaust system found before the muffler. Catalytic converters can become so hot they can ignite dried grass or leaves directly under the parked vehicle. Never park on dried grass or leaves.

Your first action, if you a suspected that your car is on fire, should be to pull over immediately and turn off the engine. As you drive, the forward motion of the vehicle will force air into the engine compartment which feeds oxygen to the fire. It is best to stop in an area away from buildings and people, if you have that option. Burning plastics and other materials can produce toxic gases; therefore it is best not to expose yourself or bystanders.

Modern cars usually have an electric fuel pump; and by turning off the ignition, you will have stopped the flow of fuel to the fire. Next, get yourself and passengers out of the car and close the doors behind you. Closed doors and windows may limit the spread of fire by reducing the amount of oxygen available.

While explosions from car fires are rare (the most common is the bursting of a burning tire), you should stand clear of the area – especially avoiding the front and rear of the vehicle. Vehicles with slow impact bumpers are equipped with gas shock absorbers that, under intense heat, can explode and turn into lethal projectiles.

That's a lot to remember, so in summary, if smoke is billowing out of your car, pull over, turn off the ignition, get everyone out of the vehicle and call for help.




