The new website, which retains the address of www.springfield-nj.us, was designed with some goals in mind including a clean and simple appearance, ease of navigation and content and functionality that was driven by the many suggestions received from Township Committee members, Township employees and Township residents.

### Town Adopts Tax Exemption For Redevelopment Project

Matt Jessup, redevelopment attorney addressed the committee and explained the tax exemption that is being granted under Ordinance 2018-19. Jessup explained that this is for the 24 unit residential and retail project to be built at Morris Ave and Church Mall. Without the tax exemption the project would be financially unacceptable and would not be built. The exemption program, known as a "Pilot" Program allows for a minimum tax of 10% of annual gross revenue to be paid in lieu of a conventional real estate tax assessment. The calculation came out to 9.57%, which was lower than the State mandated minimum so the developer agrees to pay the 10% minimum. Right now the property pays about \$3700 per year in taxes to the town. Under the exemption program, the projected tax on only the improvements is estimated to be \$49,059 per year. The land is still taxed in the conventional manner.

Despite the misty rain, Springfield's annual Public Chanukah Menorah Lighting Ceremony was well-attended by several hundred members of the community.

Held at Veterans Memorial Park on the corner of Mountain Avenue and Shunpike Road, the Chanukah festivities on the evening of Sunday, December 2 were organized by the Chabad Jewish Learning Center (JLC). Rabbi Mendy Blesofsky of the JLC opened the sixth annual event by welcoming families, friends, sponsors, and local officials from the Township Committee, Police and Fire Departments, and First Aid Squad. After speaking to the crowd about the story of Chanukah and the customs of the holiday, Rabbi Blesofsky introduced Mayor Richard Huber, who extended his holiday wishes to the guests.

The highlight of the evening was the lighting, which featured traditional Chanukah songs recited by students of the JLC in addition to children from the audience. \*\*\* Prior to completing an Application for A Certification of Compliance (Selling Your Home) you must complete a "Permit Closure Verification" \*\*

### PERMIT CLOSURE VERIFICATION INSTRUCTIONS

Go to the Township website www.springfield-nj.us

Click on "Departments" to open drop down menu, select "Building".

At the bottom of the Building page is a tab "Permit Closure Verification Form" click on the tab to open.

Complete required information, certify and submit.

The Permit Closure Verification request will be sent automatically to the Building Department staff, they will research the property and send you via email, the permit status of the property; a copy will be sent to the Fire Department and the Smoke Certification Scheduling Clerk.

Should you need specific information regarding outstanding permits or inspections, please submit an OPRA (Open Public Record Act) request to the Township Clerk.

Call (973) 912-2220 or email building@springfield-nj.us should you have any questions. After confirmation that all permits on the property have been closed out, please complete "Application for Certification of Smoke Detector, Carbon Monoxide Alarm & Portable Fire Extinguisher Form" which is attached below. If you cannot access the form, you may pick one up at the Fire House. Please either mail or drop off the completed Application together with a check or money order payable to "Township of Springfield" in the locked mailbox at:

#### \*\*PLEASE NOTE EFFECTIVE JANUARY 1, 2019:\*\*

#### Pursuant to N.J.A.C. 5:70-4.19:

Ten-year sealed battery-powered single station smoke alarms shall be installed and shall be listed in accordance with ANSI/UL 217, incorporated herein by reference. However, A/C-powered single or multiple-station smoke alarms installed as part of the original construction or rehabilitation project shall not be replaced with battery-powered smoke alarms. The effective date of this subsection shall be January 1, 2019. THEREFORE ALL NON-SEALED BATTERY OPERATED SMOKE DETECTORS MUST BE REPLACED

### COMEDY ICON GILBERT GOTTFRIED RETURNS TO SCOTTY'S COMEDY COVE

For almost four decades, Gilbert Gottfried has entertained audiences with his iconic voice and crude humor. On Saturday November 10, he brought his act to Scotty's Pub and Comedy Club.

Speaking with Gottfried via telephone, we discussed his return to Scotty's, his current projects, and his unparalleled brand. Today, aside from his podcast, which we'll talk about shortly, Gottfried travels extensively from city-to-city to perform his standup act. "There are entire states that I swear I've never been to," he said; however, he appreciated the return visit to Scotty's because "they must have thought I did a good job." The 63-year-old comedian still has a lust for the stage and a desire for an approving audience.

Aside from his standup act, Gottfried has a deep appreciation for the history of television and film. That enthusiasm has translated to Gilbert Gottfried's Amazing Colossal Podcast, which features show business legends and icons. As a teenager, Gottfried loved watching TV and movies and adored the Marx Brothers, The Three Stooges, and Laurel and Hardy. When asked whether there was an actor or comedian that influenced him, he hesitated and said that "some lines come to me and then I'll recall that an actor or comedian said something similar." Ultimately, he has been thrilled to interview the likes of Dick Van Dyke, Norman Lear, and Peter Fonda while reminiscing about the entertainment of his youth with co-host, Frank Santopadre, a comedy writer who currently works on ABC's The View.

When asked about how he developed that shrill, unmistakable voice, Gottfried replied, "It [the voice] developed over time; it was not conscious. Do you know why you walk a certain way?" I also asked about his life growing up in Brooklyn, NY and the reason why many great actors and comedians seem to have roots in the New York City borough. He didn't have an answer, but we both agreed that it must be something in the water.

Gottfried also appreciates the many fans of all ages who convey their love for specific projects, whether it be his brief stint on Saturday Night Live, his memorable roles in Beverly Hills Cop 2 or Problem Child, or his voiceover work as Iago in Aladdin. Asked whether there were any current comedians he admired, he thoughtfully replied, "Watching a comedian is like going to work on your day off."





# Police Chief's Column Chief John P. Cook

Since winter is almost upon us, I thought this would be a good opportunity to remind residents and business owners of some of the township ordinances and state laws our police officers enforce relating to winter weather.

- Parking on the street and in municipal lots is prohibited when the roadways and lots are snow-covered. Parked vehicles make it difficult for our plow crews to clear snow from the roads. If snow is forecast, please make arrangements to park your vehicles elsewhere.
- Snow must be cleared from fire lanes within 12 hours of daylight after the snow has fallen. Every second counts when we respond to emergency calls, and if the passage of emergency vehicles is obstructed by snow, someone's life could potentially be put at risk. Fire hydrants must also be kept clear from piled snow.
- Snow and ice must be cleared from sidewalks within 24 hours after the snow has fallen. Shoveled paths must be at least 24 inches wide, and icy sidewalks must be treated with sand or salt. Traveling in winter weather is more dangerous for everyone, particularly pedestrians. If sidewalks are impassable, pedestrians often resort to walking on plowed roads which puts them at risk for vehicles sliding into them. Please make sure your sidewalks are cleared properly.

- Once plowing of our roads has begun, it is prohibited for anyone to shovel, blow, or plow snow back onto a public street from private property. It is also prohibited for private plows to plow snow from a driveway across the width of the street to be piled along the opposite curb. Snow that remains as a result of this often turns into hazardous solid ice and is more difficult to be treated.
- All snow and ice must be removed from your vehicle before driving. This applies to ALL vehicles, no matter how small or large. Clearing a small portion of your windshield is not sufficient to safely operate a vehicle. The penalties are even steeper if snow or ice flies off of your vehicle and causes damage to other vehicles, or even worse, if someone is injured.
- "Warming up" and idling your vehicle for more than 3 minutes is against state law in NJ. While there are some exceptions, this applies to most passenger vehicles. In addition, township ordinance prohibits vehicles from idling more than 2 minutes on all municipal and school properties. Keep in mind that unattended running vehicles are easy targets for thieves, and it only takes seconds for someone to drive away with your car.

Also, please remember that driving in winter weather requires more concentration, and less speed. Motorists should travel much slower and be much more cautious than during normal driving conditions. Following distances should be increased, and distractions should be avoided.

On behalf of the entire Springfield Police Department, I wish everyone in our community a safe, happy, and healthy holiday season, and a Happy New Year.

The Donald B. Palmer Museum of the Springfield Free Public Library will present the exhibit, "Over There and Over Here: Springfield, New Jersey and the World during the Great War," now through the end of April, 2019. Items on display include many belonging to longtime Springfield resident Donald B. Palmer, the benefactor of the museum and himself a mechanic and member of Company C of the 311th infantry during the Great War. In addition to photographs of platoons 1, 2 & 3 of the 311th infantry, visitors to the exhibit can see the Battle of Verdun Award that was issued to Donald Palmer after the war by the City of Verdun. Also on display is Mr. Palmer's NJ Victory Medal. Additional items in the exhibit include military accessories such as the American Doughboy helmet and the instantly recognizable German Pickelhaube helmet with its distinctive spike. A sampling of guns and bayonets of the type that would have been used during the war are also on display as are various implements vital to the war effort that were used on the home front. This exhibit was curated by museum professionals Jesse Gordon and Alexsandra Simakowicz Gizzi.

# SPRINGFIELD TOWNSHIP COMMITTEE MEETING HIGHLIGHTED BY SWEARING IN OF NEW PROBATIONARY FIREFIGHTER, MICHAEL MONTERO

In the first reguar Township Committee Meeting following Election Day, Mayor Richard Huber kicked off the gathering with the swearing in of Springfield's newest firefighter, Michael Montero. Montero is a graduate of Summit High School and has been active with the Summit Fire Department and EMS. A large crowd of 40+ people attended to support Montero, who is taking on his new role due to a recent retirement in the department.

Prior to the ceremony, Mayor Huber announced three community events, which all residents should consider attending:

Community Public Menorah Lighting – At 5:00 pm on December 2, 2018, the community is invited to watch the lighting of an 18-foot menorah at Veterans Memorial Park (on the corner of Shunpike Road and Mountain Avenue. Hosted by the Chabad Jewish Center of Springfield NJ, the event includes free latkes and donuts.

Holiday Celebration and Tree Lighting – The Springfield Recreation Department will be hosting its annual holiday celebration on Wednesday, December 5, from 5:00 pm – 8:00 pm. In addition to the tree lighting, there will be activities such as a petting zoo, carriage rides, and bounce house. And, there may even be a visit from Santa Claus!

"Rise Against Hunger" Meal Packaging Event – Spearheaded by the Rotary Club of Springfield, members of the community are asked to volunteer in order to help package meals for "Rise Against Hunger." The event will take place on Thursday, December 13 from 6:00 pm – 9:00 pm at the Chisholm Community Center. Last year, volunteers packed 30,000 meals and this year's goal is to reach 50,000.

In other news, the public listened to a presentation by Sam Mardini and Michael Butrico, who introduced the finalization of a Community Development Block Grant that the Springfield community will receive in support of its seniors. The funds will be allocated for two part-time bus drivers, who work weekdays between the hours of 9:00 am and 4:00 pm to transport seniors to local stores as well as planned excursions.

On the agenda for new business, the Committee heard the Second Reading of Ordinance 2018-19, approving an application for a long-term tax exemption for a 24-unit mixed use development to be built at Morris Avenue and Church Mall. The program, known as a "Pilot Program," allows for a minimum 10% tax on annual gross revenue to be paid in lieu of a conventional real estate tax assessment. Matt Jessup, the attorney representing SPDSAIL Urban Renewal LLC, explained that the current tax revenue generated from the property is \$3,700; however, the improvements would help generate a new annual tax revenue of \$49,000.

The next Springfield Township Workshop Meeting will be on Monday, December 17 with the Township Committee Meeting on Tuesday, December 18. Both meetings are scheduled for 7:00 pm.

### HOLY CROSS LUTHERAN CHURCH PARTICIPATES IN HOMELESS SABBATH WEEKEND

### **PATRIOT PROFILES**

Organizations and People that make a Difference in Springfield

### THE CANNON BALL HOUSE - A SPRINGFIELD TREASURE -

If you have never been to the Cannon Ball House, located at 126 Morris Ave, you are missing a real Springfield treasure. Built around 1760, it is one of only four structures in the township that survived the British burning of the township during the Revolutionary War. Struck by a cannon ball during the war, it is aptly named.

The British soldiers were trying to reach Morristown. The Battle of Springfield, fought on June 23, 1780, which has been chronicled in Thomas Fleming's book "The Forgotten Victory" is considered, by many, the turning point of the Revolutionary War. During the battle, 6000 British troops tried to advance west on what is now Morris Ave. The British pushed slowly to what today is Van Winkle's creek just west of the present day Mountain Ave. As the battle ensued, the Reverend James Caldwell passed out Watts Hymnals from the Presbyterian Church to Colonel Elias Dayton's Regiment of 1500 for use as wadding in their rifles. Reverend Caldwell's cry "Give Them Watts, Boys" has lived on to become the motto of the conflict. Since the British were thwarted, they resorted to burning and looting the township.

The Cannon Ball House passed from owner to owner over the years until 1955 when it became the property of the Springfield Historical Society. It is listed on both the State and National Register of Historical Places. Designated a Four Centuries site, it is open for tours several times each year. Those dates usually include the Sunday of President's Day weekend, the Sunday closest to the anniversary of the battle (June 23rd), Four Centuries weekend in October and the first Sunday in December.

Among the items put on display when the Cannon Ball House is open for tours is a letter signed by George Washington whose headquarters was in Springfield from June 7 to June 22, 1780. Also artifacts relating to daily life from the 18th to 20th centuries, a room devoted to Springfield's military history including artifacts from the Revolutionary War (the cannon ball which was lodged in the wall of the house is there) and more.

In an exclusive interview with the Patriot Times, Margaret Bandrowski, President of the Springfield Historical Society said "The Springfield Historical Society is proud of the history of Springfield and its important role as the site of a turning point in the Revolutionary War. The Cannon Ball House played a crucial role in that battle and it is our honor to continue to maintain the house and to share the history with the public".
