At the Township Committee meeting on March 22, 2022, Chief Cook read the following correspondence from Mr. Harry J. Delgado who is the Accreditation Program Director for the New Jersey State Association of Chiefs of Police.

Having achieved their second re-accreditation, the Springfield Police Department for nearly a decade, has made a commitment to adhering to best practices at the state and national level in a highly regarded voluntary statewide law enforcement accreditation program. This long-term commitment to state accreditation places the Springfield Police Department in an exclusive group of law enforcement agencies of less than 8% in New Jersey. This program, administered through the New Jersey State Association of Chiefs of Police and the New Jersey Law Enforcement Accreditation Commission has helped to transparently demonstrate the professionalism and preparedness of the State's law enforcement agencies. The New Jersey State Association of Chiefs of Police Law Enforcement Accreditation Program is purposefully designed to enhance the professionalism and transparency in the State's public safety system.

During these uniquely challenging times, and the threat to our health and safety, encouraging law enforcement agencies to follow standardized practices and policies is a potentially lifesaving, and cost-effective investment of time and resources.

Accreditation gives an agency a preparedness plan and verification of excellence.

Accreditation status represents a significant professional achievement.

The Springfield Police Department's goal is to work in partnership with the community and the other entities within the Township. They have successfully established a Junior Police Academy to help teach the youth of the town about law enforcement and promote teamwork.

More recently, they have partnered with the Springfield Unity Project to help build a stronger bond between the Department and the community by co-hosting a meet and greet event.

With the onset of the Covid-19 pandemic, the Police Department has worked diligently with the Office of Emergency Management, First Aid Squad, Fire Department, and Public Works to establish healthy and safe guidelines while responding to calls of service.

They ensured all Officers were outfitted with proper PPE while at work and designed a new schedule to limit possible exposure to the virus.

Under its administration, the high level of competence, leadership and professionalism is evident within the agency. Officers are forward thinking and engaged in self-improvement.

It is the opinion of the assessment team that the Springfield Police Department is a highly professional and committed agency which exemplifies all the tenets of Law Enforcement Accreditation at the state and national levels.

On Wednesday evening March 23rd, Springfield Police Chief John Cook hosted an in person seminar for the clergy in Town. Police Chief's Column for readers of the Patriot Times Chief John P. Cook

The police department often receives questions about what should be done with unwanted firearms/ammunition. Whether inherited from a deceased family member or friend, discovered in a newly purchased property, or just no longer wanted, unwanted firearms and ammunition can't simply be thrown away like other household items. The only safe and legal way to dispose of them is through a complete documented destruction of the weapons. This is not something the general public is able to do on their own.

If you discover a firearm while moving into a new property, it is best to contact the police department right away if you are unfamiliar with handling firearms. You should not attempt to check if the weapon is loaded, or try to unload it. Definitely DO NOT attempt to pull the trigger to check if the firearm is loaded. Also DO NOT bring the firearm to the police department if you are unsure if it is loaded – only unloaded weapons can be legally transported in NJ. After calling the police department, a police officer will respond to your home and will assist you with making sure the weapon is put into a safe state. If the firearm is legal and compliant for the state of NJ, you may opt to sell it or keep it by first turning it over to a NJ licensed firearms dealer. If you choose to keep it, you must then obtain the proper permits. Otherwise, you can turn it into the police department for voluntary destruction.

If a firearm is inherited, NJ law allows the heir to legally keep the firearm without having a firearm purchaser identification card and/or a handgun purchase permit. However, the firearm must be legal to possess in NJ and the person receiving the firearm must qualify to acquire and possess the firearm. If they are not qualified, the weapon must be turned into the police department within 180 days.

All unwanted firearms and ammunition must be disposed of properly. The easiest way to safely and legally dispose of them is by turning them over to the police department. The police department will properly document the relinquishment of the weapons and will submit them for destruction. Many communities host gun turn-in events to ensure unwanted firearms and ammunition don't end up in the wrong hands. On Saturday, April 23rd, Springfield Police Department is partnering with Union County in hosting a local firearm turn-in event. All Union County residents are invited to turn in unwanted firearms and ammunition between the hours of 8 AM and 4 PM at the Calvary Assembly Church, 242 Shunpike Rd., in Springfield.

In addition, unwanted prescription drugs are also being collected at this event. Secure disposal of prescription medicines is very important to ensure that controlled substances are destroyed properly. While the police department is a participant of Project Medicine Drop and has a secure prescription drop box available 24/7 for the community, this upcoming event will make it even easier for our community members to dispose of their unused and unwanted prescriptions.

SPRINGFIELD QUARRY WALK SET TO RETURN SUNDAY, APRIL 24

The Springfield Environmental Commission has announced that after a two and a half year hiatus (because of COVID), the much-loved and popular Houdaille Quarry Walk will return on Sunday, April 24. Alyson Weber Miller, chair of the SEC, noted that "There is no public access to the Quarry, with the exception of this event. Participants will get to visit a completely natural, unspoiled area that is home to turkeys, raccoons, deer, foxes, coyotes and birds. At the bottom on the Quarry there is a pond and a tunnel under Route 78."

The Houdaille Quarry was originally a vast lava flow from an ancient volcano. In more recent times, it was a site used for mining gravel and rocks used for road building. The Union County leaf composting facility is now located on part of the site and it is also the home of the Union County Model Airplane Club which builds and flies model airplanes.

The annual Quarry Walk is a guided 90-minute tour of the area. Appropriate clothing, including long sleeves, long pants and sturdy walking shoes, is necessary. This is a vigorous walk that is not for young children or anyone who is physically challenged. No strollers or dogs are permitted. The walk leaves promptly at Noon (late comers will not be accommodated) so plan to arrive at the Quarry early - it is located on Mountview Road off Shunpike in Springfield. Gates will open at 11:45 AM for onsite parking and registration. In case of inclement weather, the rain date will be May 1.

APRIL SHOWERS BRING MAY FLOWERS AND FLOODING!

Spring is here and so is the potential for flood season! Floods are probably one of the most common natural disasters we may face here in Springfield. Floods can occur when water overflows onto land due to large amounts of rain in a very short period of time or snow, coastal storms, or water system failures. Overflowing water can cause outages, disrupt transportation, damage buildings, and create landslides with little to no warning. Because of this, it is essential to be aware of how to remain safe during flood season.

FEMA has many ways people can start preparing themselves and their homes for when spring arrives. First, know your risks. FEMA's Flood Map Service Center is a continually updated public source for flood hazard information produced in support of the National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP) (https://www.fema.gov/flood-insurance) that can provide you with a better understanding of your flood risk. The Emergency Alert System (EAS) (https://www.fema.gov/emergency-managers/practitioners/integrated-public-alert-warning-system/public/emergency-alert-system) and National Oceanic Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) Weather Radio (https://vlab.noaa.gov/web/dis/noaa-weather-radio) also provides flood alerts. And don't forget to sign up for Union County First Alert (https://member. everbridge.net/index/892807736726316#/signup).

Create a flood evacuation plan for your household, taking into consideration the specific needs of your loved ones, such as medical needs, dietary needs, and languages spoken. The following are some questions to discuss with your family to start your emergency plan:

- 1. How will I receive emergency alerts and warnings?
- 2. What is my shelter plan?
- 3. What is my evacuation route?
- 4. What is my family/household communication plan?
- 5. Do I need to update my emergency preparedness kit?
- 6. Check with the Center for Disease Control (CDC) and update your emergency plans due to Coronavirus.
- 7. Get masks (for everyone over 2 years old), disinfectants, and check my sheltering plan.

In case of an emergency, keep important documents in a waterproof container and create password-protected digital copies. Move valuables to higher levels. Clean drains and gutters, install check valves, and consider a sump pump with a battery to mitigate your risks.

If you do find yourself in an area that is flooding, **do not walk, swim, or drive through flood waters**. Instead, try to avoid the waters by turning around. Avoid bridges over fast-moving water, stay in your car if it is trapped in rapidly moving water, and if you are trapped in a building, try to get to the highest level and signal for help.

After a flood, pay attention to authorities for information and instructions, returning home only when they say it is safe to do so. Wear protective clothes and appropriate face coverings if cleaning mold and other debris, and be aware of animals or risks of electrocution that may be present in your home. Use generator or other gasoline-powered machinery outdoors and away from windows.

RABBI ADRIENNE RUBIN APPOINTED AS NEW RABBI

Temple Beth Ahm Yisrael, a Conservative Egalitarian synagogue in Springfield, NJ, is pleased to announce the appointment of Rabbi Adrienne Rubin as its new Rabbi. Rabbi Rubin has served as the Temple's Interim Rabbi since July 2020. She succeeds Rabbi Mark Mallach, who retired in June 2020 after serving as TBAY's Rabbi for 21 years, and who is now the Temple's Rabbi Emeritus. TBAY is planning an Installation and Celebration Weekend for May 13-15, 2022.

Rabbi Rubin was hired after meeting with the Rabbinical Search Committee headed by David Brooks. In preparation for this search, TBAY conducted extensive congregational surveys and focus groups to determine what qualities their next Rabbi would need. After their first meeting, it was clear Rabbi Rubin would be a good fit for the congregation and, as time went on, their initial instincts proved accurate. TBAY President Brian Margulies says, "It is easy to see why Rabbi Rubin is such a great fit to serve as our 'mara d'atra' or spiritual leader of Temple Beth Ahm Yisrael. Her love of Talmud and Torah, her ability to reach out to all members of our sacred Jewish community, and her ability to connect with the greater Springfield community have allowed her to feel at home in a short period of time."

Rabbi Rubin first met the TBAY community on Purim in March 2020, the very week that the pandemic lockdowns began. "Starting in the middle of a pandemic has been both a challenge and an opportunity," she said. "I have not had the luxury of large and frequent in-person opportunities to connect personally with the members of the congregation. We have had to be creative together right from the start—in finding ways to get to know each other, in transforming High Holy Days, B'nei Mitzvah, Shabbat and daily minyan services, and in engaging the community in events and activities. And even if they look different from what we are used to, each interaction we have is an opportunity to deepen our connections: to each other, to being Jewish, and to our shared values as a community."

TBAY has already benefitted from Rabbi Rubin's innovation in services, community outreach and religious education. "Over the past two years, Rabbi Rubin has been a breath of fresh air while serving in her role as our Interim Rabbi. Her energy, enthusiasm, intelligence, and warm and welcoming personality have been a great asset to our community. Her leadership during these difficult COVID times has allowed us to not only survive but thrive by engaging our growing membership in dynamic in-person and on-line programming," noted Margulies.

Rabbi Rubin is passionate about the congregation she serves, saying "I feel so blessed to have found Temple Beth Ahm Yisrael. TBAY is so much more than just a synagogue. It is a place of joy, of learning, of connection. I am truly honored for the opportunity to serve this warm, welcoming and diverse community of people who care about one another and know what is going on in each other's lives. People step forward to help, even if they find out via an 8:00 a.m. text that someone needs a 10th person to form a minyan. When I walked in the door here, I felt like I had come home."

Rabbi Rubin's path to TBAY and the rabbinate is an unusual one, although she

has been serving the Jewish community for over 30 years. Raised in Lexington, MA, she attended Princeton University, graduating in 1988 with a degree in Music Theory and Composition. After college, she worked as an actuary in Boston while studying voice and training to become an opera singer. Her plans shifted as she became increasingly drawn to cantorial work. A member of Temple Emunah in Lexington, she sang at multiple synagogues in the Boston area and then as the High Holy Days Cantor at the University of Rhode Island. Shortly after she moved to Princeton in 1994 to take a job in the University's Alumni Council, she began as the Cantorial Soloist at Temple Micah, an unaffiliated, egalitarian synagogue in Lawrenceville, NJ.

In the years that followed, while raising her family, Rabbi Rubin worked at several nonprofit and community organizations. However, her synagogue work became increasingly important to her and she expanded her role beyond leading services. She prepared students for B'nei Mitzvah, taught children in the religious school, led adult and teen Torah and text study, and tended to the pastoral care and life cycle needs of the congregation and the greater unaffiliated Jewish community. After several periods of serving as Temple Micah's sole clergy, with the encouragement of her congregants, she realized that the rabbinate was where she belonged. She began private studies toward ordination and received S'micha in 2019 from the pluralistic Rabbinical Seminary International, founded in 1955 by the Hungarian Chasidic Rabbi and Kabbalist Dr. Joseph H. Gelberman.

Rabbi Rubin currently serves as the Rabbi to the Board of Trustees of the Northern NJ Chapter of the Federation of Jewish Men's Clubs and is a member of the Steering Committee of the Greater MetroWest Rabbis' Roundtable, organized through the Jewish Federation of Greater MetroWest NJ. She is also active with the Union County Va'ad haRabbanim.

Rabbi Rubin has been selected for cohorts for the Center for Rabbinic Innovation and the Keshet Leadership Project. She is a member of the International Federation of Rabbis, Rabbinical Fellowship of America, the Women Cantors' Network, 18Doors (formerly Interfaith Family Network), Equally Wed and the Rainbow Wedding Network. Her writing has been published in Who by Plague: High Holy Days Sermons from COVID19 Times, edited by Rabbi Oren Steinitz, and both volumes of When We Turned Within: Reflections on COVID-19, edited by Rabbi Menachem Creditor and Sarah Tuttle-Singer. Rabbi Rubin maintains a blog on the TBAY website, www.tbaynj.org, and on her Facebook page.

Rabbi Rubin lives in Princeton, NJ, with her husband Doug. They have one son, Elian, who is a Classical Civilizations Major (and Quidditch player) at Oberlin College of Arts and Sciences. Rabbi Rubin cares deeply about the greater community and has volunteered and/or worked with numerous nonprofit organizations, including the Central NJ Nonprofit Council, the Princeton-Mercer Regional Chamber Nonprofit Business Partnership, Send Hunger Packing Princeton, SAVE, A Friend to Homeless Animals, the Princeton Public Schools, the Princeton Education Foundation, VolunteerConnect, Women in Development, Princeton University, and her local Pack, Troop and Council of the Boy Scouts of



GET TO KNOW LOCAL SERVICE ORGANIZATIONS

There is nothing more rewarding than getting involved with a service organization and Springfield has several outstanding ones. Here are a few.

THE ROTARY CLUB

Rotary International, founded in 1905 by Paul Harris, is a global network of 1.4 million neighbors. It is a humanitarian service organization which brings together business and professional leaders in order to provide community service, promote integrity, and advance goodwill, peace, and understanding in the world. It is a nonpolitical and non-religious organization. For many years, their mission has been to eradicate Polio worldwide.

The Springfield Rotary Club was founded by a group of local businessmen in 1947 and has been active ever since.
