2024 National PTSD Awareness Day is June 27th. Posttraumatic stress disorder (PTSD) is a mental health problem. Anyone can develop PTSD at any age. Some factors, (many of which are not under a person's control), can increase the chance that someone will have PTSD. For example, having a very intense or long-lasting traumatic event or being injured during the event can make it more likely that a person will develop PTSD. It is also more common after certain types of trauma, like combat and sexual assault. What happens after the traumatic event is also important. Stress will increase the odds of developing PTSD, while social support can make it less likely.

PTSD symptoms usually start soon after the traumatic event, but they may not appear until months or even years later. In addition, they may also come and go over many years. If these symptoms last longer than four weeks, cause you great distress, or interfere with your work and/or home life, you might have PTSD. The major types of symptoms include 1) reliving the event (memories can come back at any time) which can feel very real and scary, 2) avoiding things that remind you of the event (this includes people and situations, or even talking or thinking about the event), 3) having more negative thoughts and feelings than before the event (the way you think about yourself and others - you may feel numb, that no one can be trusted or you may feel guilt or shame that you couldn't prevent the event), 4) feeling on edge or keyed up (hyperarousal) which makes sleeping and concentrating difficult or you're easily startled by sudden loud noises/surprises. You may find yourself acting in unhealthy ways like self-medicating with drugs or alcohol or driving aggressively.

PTSD can occur at any age. Children may have symptoms like those above or display others. Children younger than 6 may get upset if their parents are not close by, have trouble sleeping, or act out the trauma in their play. Children ages 7 to 11 may also act out trauma through play, stories or drawings. Some may have nightmares or become more aggressive or irritable. Children ages 12 to 18 may have symptoms more like adults: anxiety, withdrawal, depression or reckless behavior like substance abuse or running away.


After a traumatic event, it's normal to think, act and feel differently than usual. If you don't start to feel better after a few weeks, talk to your doctor or mental health care provider. Disruption of your daily life with upsetting thoughts and feelings doesn't have to be handled alone.

In the next issue of The Patriot Times we will review tips for veterans coping with large-scale traumatic events. If you or a loved one is in crisis call 911 if you need immediate police, fire or emergency medical assistance. Call 988 to speak to a trained crisis counselor who can help with mental health related distress.

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

With summer almost upon us, I expect many readers of the Springfield Patriot Times have plans to travel or take a vacation during the next couple of months. While this may be a time to kick back, relax, and forget about the everyday bustle, it's still important to take steps to protect your homes, your valuables, and yourselves while you're away. Thieves never take a vacation from picking out their next target.

Your home:

- Close and lock all doors and windows when you leave, and activate your alarm system if you have one.
- Consider mounting motion activated lights or security cameras on the exterior of your home. Door bells with built-in cameras are easy to install and will show you anyone who comes to your door while you're away through your smart-phone.
- Keep blinds and shades in their normal positions.
- Grass should be cut and bushes trimmed to avoid the appearance that no one has been home for a while (or make arrangements for this to be done while you are away).
- Contact the post office and put a hold on your mail, and stop newspaper deliveries.
- Use light timers, and consider having a radio on a timer as well.
- Ask a trusted neighbor to park a car in your driveway and keep an eye on your house.
- Call the police department and have your house added to the vacation list.

Your valuables:

- Pack light and only take the essentials. Large, heavy bags will slow you down and make you a target for theft.
- Only take what is necessary in your wallet/purse; clean out extra credit cards or personal items while you travel.
- Plan on using credit cards or traveler's checks for most of your purchases, and only carry a minimal amount of cash.
- Don't travel with a lot of expensive jewelry, only take the pieces you are regularly accustomed to wearing.
- When driving, always remember to lock your car and keep your valuables out of sight (keep valuables with you if possible). Place maps, brochures, and other travel documents in the glove compartment to avoid advertising you are a tourist.
- Don't leave cash, checks, credit cards or car keys in your hotel room. Take them with you or secure them in your room safe, if available.

Yourselves:

- Plan your travels carefully and double check maps and GPS to avoid getting lost in unfamiliar areas.
- Keep your medicines with you; do not pack them in your luggage.
- If traveling to a foreign country, familiarize yourself with emergency numbers and know how to contact local authorities. Be sure to contact your cellular phone provider to set up the proper service if you plan take your phone with you. Purchasing a pre-paid cellular phone at your destination can also be an option.
- Walk in well-lit, active areas, and avoid taking shortcuts.
- Stick together with your family members, and look out for one-another. Agree on a meeting place if you decide to split up. Make sure everyone has the address of your accommodations should you unexpectedly get separated from one another.
- Always be cognizant that tourists are prime targets for petty thieves. Be aware of your surroundings at all times and stay attentive in public places. Avoid consuming excessive amounts of alcohol as your ability to remain alert can be impaired.

I hope this information will help everyone stay a little safer and better enjoy whatever plans they have for this summer. Being properly prepared will reduce the chance of having your vacation ruined by falling victim to criminal activity.

FIREWORK SAFETY

Fireworks are often used to mark special events and holidays. The only safe way to view fireworks is to attend a professional show. With many professional firework shows being canceled this year; it is important to know that fireworks are not safe in the hands of consumers. Fireworks cause thousands of injuries each year.

A few ideas to get into the patriotic spirit, without fireworks:

- 1. Use glow sticks, they glow in the dark and are a safe alternative to a sparkler. Fun for all ages.
- Loud and proud. Noise makers are sure to make a statement. They can be found at local party supply stores or make your own.
- Outdoor movie night. Set up a screen and projector. Don't forget the bug spray!
- Red, white and blue silly string...fun for all ages.
- Make a patriotic craft with the family.
- Throw a birthday party for the USA, and don't forget the cake

FACTS

- More than 19,500 reported fires are started by fireworks annually.
- Burns account for 44% of the 9,100 injuries treated in emergency rooms seen in the month around July 4.
- Half of the fireworks injuries seen at emergency rooms were
- Extremities: hand, finger, or leg.one-third were to the eye or other parts of the head.
- Children ages 10-14 had the highest rate of fireworks injury, with more than one-third (36%) of the victims of fireworks injuries under age 15.
- Sparklers account for roughly one-quarter of emergency room fireworks injuries.

SAINT JAMES THE APOSTLE CHURCH MARKS **SOLEMNITY WITH PROCESSION IN SPRINGFIELD** STREETS AND CULTURAL CELEBRATION



Sunday, June 2, 2024, Saint James the Apostle Church celebrated the Solemnity of the Most Precious Body and Blood of Christ, with an outdoor Eucharistic immediately procession after the Noon Mass through the streets of Springfield near the Church. Also known as Corpus Christi, this solemnity celebrates the Catholic teaching that Jesus is truly present in the Eucharist.

For the solemn procession, the Eucharist is placed in a special container known as a Monstrance and is carried by the priest while walking under a ceremonial canopy. The congregation walks behind offering prayers and songs of praise.

Along the way, the procession paused at shrines set up by parishioners to honor the Blessed Mother and Saints as portrayed in Italian, Polish, Filipino, Spanish, and Portuguese traditions. Prayers at these stations were led by families of the parish. Before carrying the Monstrance in the Eucharistic procession, Fr. David Santos, Pastor, remarked that this was "a splendid opportunity to celebrate our Faith and rediscover the truth of the Eucharist. He invited the members of the parish to "come worship the Lord and give witness to Jesus' marvelous presence in the Eucharist.'

Immediately following the procession, parishioners enjoyed an al fresco reception featuring an array of savory and sweet foods from the different cultures highlighted at the stations along the route. Enjoyed by all, it was a celebration of faith, fellowship, and pride in being a part of the fabric of Springfield. 

to pay to bring awareness to the cause. I also had the honor of escorting and speaking personally with surviving family members to the candlelight vigil. As they arrived by bus, they were overrun with so much emotion & sadness. Each family member I escorted, I first asked their names, where they were from, and what agency their loved one worked for. I then asked each of them to tell me a funny story and their favorite about their family member, which instantly made them open up and smile. Seeing them smile & laugh through their pain while remembering their family member, even just a little bit during that walk, made it all worth it."





Aleksandr Smirnov's appointment as the academy's Class President marks three years in a row that a Springfield Officer has earned the title. He is preceded as Class President by Alexa Montagna (2023) and Omar Shanawani (2022). Officers Alexa Montagna and Omar Shanawani were given Instructor Plaques of Recognition for their hard work and dedication to the Union County Auxiliary Police Academy as they acted as Instructors as well.

The training program curriculum meets the NJ State's requirements and includes the following partial list of subjects: 9-1-1 Dispatch, Alcoholism, Arrest, Search and Seizure, Controlling Crowds and Assemblages, Handling Disorderly Persons, Criminal Law, Defensive Tactics, Expandable Baton, Directing Traffic, Communication Using Flashlights, Whistle and Hand Signals, Ethics in Policing, Handcuffing, Motor Vehicle Traffic Stops, Patrol, Auxiliary Police Powers, Unarmed Defensive Tactics and Weapon Familiarization plus many more subjects.

In or around 1941 under the Civil Defense Act, volunteers fell under the control of the Civil Defense (CD)/Disaster Control Department. The purpose of this was to coordinate the efforts of its members in a common front to protect the lives and property of all persons within its territorial limits against enemy action or natural disaster, and to preserve our national security. At the time this was deemed necessary because of the constant threat of nuclear war with the USSR. The reason for the Civil Defense was that whole areas and population groups would become isolated from the rest of the country in a post attack period. These volunteers were then called "CD" or "civil defense".

In or around 1952 the wording "CD" or "civil defense" was then changed to "Police Reserve" or "Reserve", and this was used to describe the group of volunteers. Their role was to aid the police department in daily activities. In or around the early 1980s the designation of "Police Reserve" was then changed to "Auxiliary Police" in accordance with the Office of Emergency Management.

Auxiliary Police Officers are part of the local Office of Emergency Management; however, they are assigned to the local police agency that they are part of. They assist the police agency with uniformed patrols, provide traffic control, crowd control, and assist at major events.

Some will say an Auxiliary Police Officer is an extra set of eyes and ears for law enforcement. Being an auxiliary police officer is strictly voluntarily. Auxiliary Police do not receive any payment for the duties that they perform. Some responsibilities will vary depending on where that auxiliary officer lives.
