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DATES ANNOUNCED FOR 2018 JUNIOR POLICE ACADEMY

Springfield Police Department Chief of Police John P. Cook has announced the dates for the 2018 session of its Junior Police Academy. The academy will be running one, one-week session from July 16th thru July 20th, 2018, which will be held at the Springfield Police Department. Classes will run from 8:00 am to 2:00 pm daily.

This program is designed to provide area youth with the opportunity to gain an understanding of the role of the Police Officer. While other youth academy programs provide a day camp setting, the Springfield Police Junior Academy has been modeled after today's police academy. Those accepted to the program will undergo physical training and daily training in Drill and Ceremony,

will be instructed in criminal investigation techniques, evidence recovery, patrol practices and effects of alcohol and drugs. In addition, the cadets will participate in field trips to the Union County Police Academy and attend demonstrations from various specialized units that are available to law enforcement, such as the police canine unit, SWAT team, and the bomb squad.

ANNUAL BATTLE OF SPRINGFIELD COMMEMORATION PLANNED FOR FLAG DAY

The Church and Cannon Chapter, Daughters of the American Revolution will host the annual commemoration of the Battle of Springfield on Thursday, June 14 at the DAR Cemetery (39 Mountain Ave.) followed by a program at the Springfield Library about the battles of Connecticut Farms, Springfield and Elizabethtown by members of the Sons of the American Revolution.

The ceremony will begin promptly at 7 pm with a wreath laying at the SAR monument which is dedicated to all who fought in the Battle of Springfield on June 23, 1780. Immediately following the brief ceremony, the group will cross the street to the library for the program.

In the event of rain, the ceremony and program will be held in the Palmer Museum of the Library. Park in the municipal lot or on Mountain Avenue.

This year marks the 238th anniversary of the victorious battle in which 1500 Continental soldiers and local militia held off 5,000 British and Hessian soldiers in their attempt to reach Washington's camp in Morristown. The enemy, unprepared for such opposition, burned all but four buildings while retreating to Staten Island, and never returned to New Jersey again.

WREATH LAYING CEREMONY AT HISTORIC CANNON BALL HOUSE

Cannon Ball House will be holding an open house on June 24 to commemorate the 238th anniversary of the Battle of Springfield. Proceedings will begin with Robert Meyer, State President of the New Jersey Sons of the American Revolution, laying a wreath at the CBH to honor those who fought and died in this conflict. The Battle of Springfield was the final major battle of the Revolutionary War to be fought in the northern colonies. The wreath laying will take place at 1pm and the house itself will open an hour later at 2 pm. Many artifacts from this battle are on display inside the house, including the missile that gave the structure its name.

In addition, a variety of exhibits on the second floor continue to mark the centennial of America's entry into World War One. These include a display of political cartoons by the artist Louis Raemaekers as well as artifacts from WWI that have ties to Springfield. So join us at the Historic Cannon Ball House to discover and reflect upon Springfield's military past.

Sunday, June 24 Wreath Laying Ceremony Starts at 1pm on the grounds of the Cannon Ball House.

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

JONATHAN DAYTON HIGH STUDENT MARISSA STEINER WRAPS UP FINAL YEAR AS CHARITY WALK COORDINATOR

It's not every high school senior who can list six years of running a charity walk on their college application, but Marissa Steiner, an eighteen-year-old senior at Jonathan Dayton High School in Springfield, can do just that. Ms. Steiner is the co-chair of the Central/ Northern New Jersey Promise Walk for Preeclampsia to benefit the mission of the nationalPreeclampsia Foundation.

'Marissa and I are both survivors of a potentially deadly complication of pregnancy known as preclampsia," explained Marissa's mother Stephanie. "We count ourselves very fortunate to be here to coordinate this annual community event to help other families like ours."Preeclampsia is characterized by high blood pressure during pregnancy and is a leading cause of premature birth. In Marissa's case, she was delivered six weeks early when mom Stephanie experienced sudden, life-threatening high blood pressure. Marissa weighed only 3 pounds at birth and spent many weeks in the neonatal intensive care unit fighting for her life.

The national crisis with maternal mortality has recently received extensive national attention, thanks in no small part to the Steiners' efforts in New Jersey. The 2018 Central/Northern New Jersey Promise Walk will have Dr. Larry Bloomstein as their special mission speaker this year. Bloomstein tragically lost his wife Lauren just hours after the birth of his first daughter, Hailey. The Bloomsteins' story was recently featured in a national piece by NPR and ProPublica to help raise awareness of the national maternal health crisis. Bloomstein has been a proud supporter of the work of the Preeclamspia Foundation "I started co-chairing our local Promise Walk for Preeclampsia to help fund research so that no one else has to go through what people like the Bloomsteins or my Mom and I experienced," said Marissa. "It's my hope that future generations will havemore options than premature delivery or facing the loss of a young mother.'

Marissa's efforts have not gone unnoticed:in 2016, Marissa and Stephanie were named the "Walk Coordinators of the Year" by the Preeclampsia Foundation and presented with an award. The 2018 event is well on its way to reaching its goals thanks to Marissa's continual efforts, but the Preeclampsia Foundation is not the only charity that the teenager has benefitted. Marissa has volunteered with the Children's Specialized Hospital for the past 4 years. She was recently awarded the 2018 Union County Unity Award for Achievement by a Student and the 2018 Barbara Albanese Memorial Award by the



If you have driven on Mountain Ave lately, you may have noticed new banners on telephone poles from the Firehouse to Supreme Bagel. Depicted on those banners are pictures of Springfield Veterans – our Hometown Heroes. A new program established to recognize and honor those who have served and those who are currently serving is responsible for those banners. To date, 20 such banners have been created.

Township Committee member Maria Vassallo had envisioned the banner program for a number of years. 

Police Chief's Column Chief John P. Cook

Readers of the Springfield Patriot Times may have been noticing an increase in motor vehicle violation enforcement by the Springfield Police Department. This not only coincides with the rise in vehicular and pedestrian traffic the summer season brings, but also the police department's involvement in local and nationwide enforcement campaigns such as "Click it or Ticket", "Cops in Crosswalks," and "U Text, U Drive, U Pay." Some of these "crackdowns" offer state and federal grant assistance which supplements the cost for extra officers to participate in these efforts, so we can maintain a full force of regular on-duty officers at all times.

Since the law changed in 2010, motorists must come to a complete stop for pedestrians in any crosswalk. Everyone is reminded that there are many intersections on heavily trafficked roadways that are not controlled by traffic signals, so it is vital that motorists be aware of pedestrians and come to a complete stop when approaching an intersection with crossing pedestrians. As part of the "Cops in Crosswalks" enforcement program, plainclothes officers pose as pedestrians while crossing at various intersections throughout the township, and motorists who fail to stop for the "crossing pedestrians" will be stopped by uniformed officers and issued a summons for this violation. Police officers will specifically target the busiest intersections throughout the township where there have been past incidents of either pedestrians or bicyclists having been struck by automobiles, which also include intersections where pedestrians have been seriously injured or killed

For many years now, NJ law has mandated all occupants of a motor vehicle must wear seat belts. The law also mandates proper restraint systems must be used for children and infants while riding in a vehicle. As part of the "Click it or Ticket" program, plainclothes officers act as "lookouts" at intersections and other busy areas throughout the township and report seat belt violations to uniformed officers who are waiting down the road to stop these motorists and issue summonses.

As part of the "U Text, U Drive, U Pay" enforcement, officers will monitor traffic specifically looking for motorists who operate their vehicle while using a cellular telephone that is not set up for hands free operation, or who are observed to be text messaging while driving. For several years in a row, distracted driving continues to be the leading cause of fatal crashes in NJ, with cellphone use/texting being a top distraction.

In addition to these campaigns, our officers continue to aggressively enforce motor vehicle violations which contribute to a high number of traffic incidents. These include speeding, improper use of marked turning lanes at intersections, careless or aggressive driving, and failure to stop/yield violations. Some of this enforcement targets specific areas of Springfield where traffic issues have been identified. Whenever the police department receives complaints about traffic concerns, traffic studies are conducted first to determine the extent of the prob-lem. The information gathered in these studies helps us to develop enforcement strategies and determine if other forms of traffic remediation are necessary.

Police officers know better than most about the tragic consequences resulting from accidents caused by inattentive or careless drivers. Through increased and visible traffic enforcement, accidents resulting in injuries or deaths can be prevented. With the rise in traffic congestion during summer months, and with more children being out and about, it is vital that motorists use common sense and caution while driving. I wish all readers of my Springfield Patriot Times column a very safe and happy summer.

GRILLING FIRE SAFETY TIPS

Some of us will be starting up their barbeque grill for the season. Here are some tips to keep your barbeque fun and safe.

Each year, fire departments nationally respond to nearly 8,000 grill fires. Nearly 3,000 of those fires spread to a nearby structure – usually the house. Grill fires cause an annual average of 10 deaths, 120 reported injuries, and \$80 million in direct property damage. In half of the grill-related home fires, 86% of the time the fire started when either

the flammable or combustible gas or liquid propane caught fire.

One-third of the structure fires involving grills started on an exterior balcony or unenclosed porch, which is why for people living in multiple residential properties (multi-family homes, apartments and condominiums), open flame cooking devices are prohibited for use on balconies. Portable LP-gas grills are not to be stored indoors or within 5 feet of combustible portions of the building.

- Propane and charcoal BBQ grills must only be used outdoors. If used indoors, or in any enclosed spaces such as tents, they pose a fire hazard and a risk of exposing occupants to deadly carbon monoxide poisoning.
- Place the grill a safe distance from lawn games, play areas, and foot traffic. Grills should be positioned at least 5 feet away from siding, deck railing, and out from under eaves and overhanging

branches.

- Keep, matches, lighters, and starter fluid out of the reach of children in a locked drawer or cabinet.
- Keep children and pets away from the grill area: declare a three-foot "kid-free zone" around the grill.
- Use long barbeque mitts and long-handled grilling tools to protect the chef from heat and flames when cooking.
- Periodically remove grease or fat buildup in trays below the grill so it cannot be ignited by a hot grill.

If your grill does catch fire, turn off the gas, do not pour water (or any other liquid!) on a grease fire, keep the lid closed to deprive the fire of oxygen, and call the fire department. We'll do our best to save your barbeque.

HADASSAH HOLOCAUST LECTURE HELD AT THE SPRINGFIELD PUBLIC LIBRARY ON APRIL 12, 2018

During the late 1930's and early 1940's, Samuel Maltz lived in Sokal, Poland. He witnessed many atrocities that we often hear about during the Holocaust. The Germans entered the town of Sokal in 1941. They then proceeded to open Ghettos where all the Jews were herded in behind barbed wire. Samuel Maltz worked in the Ghetto in Sokal at the Railroad that transported Jews to the death camp of Belzec where 850,000 Jews were gassed. During this time he would slip out of the Ghetto at night and look for someone to hide his family. He found Franciszka Halamajowa who agreed to hide his family. In the back of her house was a barn, a pigsty, with a hayloft ---There she sheltered 15 Jews for 20 months. Before the War, 6000 Jews lived in Sokal, After the War, 30 survived and she saved 15 Jews. One of them was his niece, Fran Letzter Malkin (born in 1938) who was today's speaker. Also speaking was his daughter, Miriam Maltz Schiffman, his daughter who was born in Newark Beth Israel Hospital ---a Second Generation survivor. During Fran's lecture to the audience, she described many of the events that took place around her area in Poland and her experience in staying in a hidden area until they were liberated by Soviet troops in July 1944. Fran's memory is still crystal clear today and she was very articulate during the lecture n describing her many Holocaust experiences In 2007, Fran and her cousins returned to Sokal (now Ukraine) and made a film "No. 4 Street of our Lady" www.streetofourlady.org

Thanks to Fran and other Holocaust survivors who continue to speak out today, we can continue to remind the world that this atrocity occurred and we must continue to speak out to insure that its memory is never erased. During the recent past, the former President of Iran, Mahmoud Ahmadinejad, spoke frequently at the United Nations indicating that the Holocaust never occurred. Additionally, some schools in France decided to remove any publications in their schools that mentioned the Holocaust since it offended some of their Muslim citizens. We must continue to hold events, such as this one at the Library, to insure that future deniers cannot continue their lies.

Friday, May 25, 2018 marked the highly-anticipated opening of the Springfield Community Pool bathhouse building. As temperatures reached the high 80s, Springfield residents and pool patrons flocked to the pool for a quick swim in freshly painted pools, a free preview of the new pool building, and a ribbon-cutting ceremony.

The ceremony kicked off with Adam Lieb, Director of the Springfield Recreation Department, who spoke about the replacement of the 55-year-old Springfield Community Pool bathhouse building. He also reminisced about his own experiences at the Springfield Pool, talking of his parents bringing him as a one-year-old in 1979. He also jokingly mentioned how he, "broke [his] very first bone here." Lieb also recognized Cornerstone Architectural Group and M. Disko Associates for their incredible architectural and engineering design of a renovated pool building and then handed the microphone over to Sam Mardini, Director of Engineering.

Mardini applauded the speed of construction, which was performed in less than 8 months, from Labor Day 2017 to today "without any service interruptions to our members." He thanked the Springfield Township for their funding and support for the project as well as Robert Barranger and Donna Miller from Cornerstone Architectural Group. He also recognized the Project Engineer and longtime Springfield resident, Mike Disko, "who led us from the beginning to the end with his expertise, commitment, and hard work." Mardini noted others who worked tirelessly on the project, who made it possible to open the building on time.

The ceremony ended with a few words from Mayor Richard Huber, who "personally thanked all past and present members of the Township Committee who put this together." He also congratulated former Business Administrator, Ziad Shehady for his time and commitment on the project.

Following the ribbon-cutting ceremony, the public enjoyed hot dogs and water supplied by the new concession operator, Dellano's, as well as music from DJ Techno Wolf. The 8,900-square foot building features modern locker rooms, bathrooms, and changing areas; fitness center with state-of-the-art equipment; dividable multi-purpose room for camps, parties, classes, meetings, and events; new kitchen and concession stand with shaded picnic pavilion; covered entry portico for drop-off and pick-up; central breezeway with natural light; new offices for front gate, managers, first aid, lifeguards, and camp; covered gathering space with built-in seating; and expanded storage areas.
