This year, four candidates, competing for two Township Committee seats, have been invited to participate. The

candidates are: Democrats: David Barnett and Richard Huber and Republicans: Marc A. Krauss and Jerry Fernandez.

Non partisan moderators will chair both meetings. Vocal questions will not be permitted. Pens and paper will be available for written questions, which must pertain to local (Springfield) matters and addressed to specific candidates. Questions will be collected by volunteers from both organizations.

Questions of a personal nature will not be permitted. At the beginning of the program, each candidate will have an opportunity to introduce himself and share limited biographic information that could impact upon his performance as a member of the Springfield Township Committee.

Candidates will also have an opportunity to present closing statements. All dialogue will be strictly timed. Representatives from both sponsoring organizations declared that these meetings are not debates, since the candidates will not directly respond to each other's statements and rebuttals.

PUBLIC HEARING OF THE 2009 MUNICIPAL POOL REFERENDUM QUESTION PLANNED

Please join the Springfield Township Committee on Tuesday, October 20th at 7:00 p.m. in the Jonathan Dayton High School Auditorium for a public hearing of the 2009 Municipal Pool Referendum Question.

At the August 11th Township Committee meeting, the governing body voted to place a referendum question on the November 3rd General Election ballot. The question is non-binding and is intended to poll the residents. We want to know if you think we should renovate and upgrade the municipal pool complex. Before we spend more money to develop plans and commit more than \$4

million, give us your opinion.

Several things need to be understood about a possible pool renovation and upgrade. First, the pool is a utility and so it is supposed to be self-sustaining. What the pool costs to operate should be paid for by pool revenue. Because the pool is so old, we have spent hundreds of thousands of dollars recently to fix it.

There aren't any specific plans in place that the voters will be agreeing or disagreeing with. Your vote will tell us whether we should move forward with more analysis, planning, and public meetings. Below is a concept sample. There are several other variations and possibilities to explore if the referendum questions passes, however the sample provides a general idea regarding the extent of the renovations for approximately \$4.5 million. Our existing pool complex is located in an area with restrictive environmental issues that make any "extreme" renovation and construction difficult. Additionally, there are financial constraints that we have to consider and the project is being scaled down to mainly include pool structure upgrades. The primary purpose and most attractive feature is the aquatic element.

Please vote on November 3rd and tell your friends, family, and neighbors. Springfield needs to be a place we call home and can be proud to live in. Unfortunately, many people are ashamed of the pool and some even register in neighboring communities. We need to offer the same amenities as our neighbors and move forward with positive changes. An improved pool facility will have a positive effect on property values and can provide you and your family with a safe, affordable, and exciting summer. Be sure to look for the following question and interpretive statement on the ballot...

Should the Township of Springfield renovate and upgrade the municipal pool complex expending not more than \$4.5 million in so doing?

The Springfield municipal pool is a utility charged with being self-sustaining. The costs associated with operating the pool utility are paid for by membership fees and other pool program fees. The Township Committee will conduct further analysis and planning with the input of the general public through future scheduled meetings if this referendum question passes.

The result of this vote is non-binding and is intended to provide the public an opportunity to express their opinion.

Message from the Mayor



Since this edition of The Patriot will be the last chance for me to mention anything about the November elections, I want to take this opportunity to make some comments. In the upcoming election four people are vying for two seats on the Township Committee; two Democrats and two Republicans. Many people think they are required to vote for the candidates as a team, while in fact you can vote for any candidate independently or for the team. Why not attend one of the events that are offered in order to meet the

candidates? You will be able to submit questions about the issues that are important to you and learn which candidates share your views. Personally, I believe that politics should not play a role in who you vote for; just vote for the two people who you feel are best for our town.

Another issue for consideration during the November election is the proposed pool renovation project. It will be listed on the ballot as a non-binding referendum question. This enables our residents to express their opinion as to whether or not they feel the governing body should pursue the project. I feel the renovation of our municipal pool is long overdue. Our municipal pool was built in 1963 and has not had any major changes since that time. A modern facility with all the amenities found at other municipal pools will have a positive impact on our community and our property value. While we have seen a decline in membership over the years, other municipalities have seen increases after upgrades were made to their facilities.

Our recreation director Michael Tennaro and I visited Westfield's pool to get input from their recreation director, since they have one of the most successful operations in the county. Westfield sells out their seasonal memberships in less then one day and has a long waiting list for openings. If our referendum is approved and we proceed with our project, Westfield will be generous enough to list our facility as an alternative for those people who were not able purchase a seasonal membership. This should help us increase our membership while still offering our residents priority in becoming members.

We will also be discussing admission changes that are similar to those of other municipalities. Residents would be able to purchase daily badges even if they are not seasonal members. Non-resident guests will also be allowed to use our facility but at a higher rate then that for residents. These are a few of the changes that have benefited other towns and hopefully will benefit Springfield. It is our intention to maintain the resident cost but increase the cost for non-residents.

I urge everyone to vote in the November election for the candidate of their choice and also for the pool project by way of the referendum question.





2009 LEAF COLLECTION IS RAPIDLY APPROACHING


The onset of autumn is here and the leaves will soon be falling once again. We at the Public Works Department would like to advise all homeowners that the leaf collection process for 2009 will be the same process that has been employed since 2005 when the institution of new stormwater regulations necessitated minor changes in the collection process. The basic tenets of the 2009 collection program are listed below.

- Residents and landscapers may begin placing leaves in the curb area, either loose or in paper recyclable bags on October 26.
- After the first curbside collection no loose leaves can be placed into the curbline for a period of five days. After five days have elapsed, leaves can once again be placed in the curb area for another collection.
- Leaves cannot be placed within ten feet in any direction of a curbside storm drain (catch basin).
- Do not place any debris, (rocks, branches, sticks, etc.) in the leaf piles. If debris is found to be in a pile, that pile will be passed by and not collected until such debris is removed by the homeowner or landscaper.
- The Department will not collect any leaves that are placed in any type of plastic bag.

Following these simple rules will ensure that the upcoming collection process will be as problem free as possible for everyone. Please convey to your landscaper that these rules will be enforced and should follow your instructions and comply with the simple rules stated above.

The Department will canvass the Township by sections. For an estimate of when leaves will be collected in a particular section please call the DPW at 973-912-8483.

Residents who are late in putting leaves out for collection and miss a pick up, be advised that we will be back. In the event of an early snowfall, we will extend the program accordingly.



GREENING SPRINGFIELD EFFORT KICKS OFF!

On September 23rd, the first public meeting of Greening Springfield took place. There was a great turnout, despite the fact that JDHS held their Back to School night on the same night. Twenty four people were in attendance representing a cross-section of the community: the Township Committee, the Environmental Commission, the Board of Education, the Springfield Garden Club, the Springfield Historical Society, business owners, and concerned citizens. The purpose of the meeting was to introduce the community to the Sustainable Jersey program which Greening Springfield volunteers will implement.

The meeting was led by Lori Sandler, chairperson of Greening Springfield, who began the evening with a talk on what "sustainability" means. She made the point that for a community to be sustainable, it must not only survive, but thrive. This can be achieved through various actions which aim to preserve our environment, promote our local business, and enhance our quality of life.

Mayor Bart Fraenkel spoke about the importance of education in shifting mindsets in our community. In particular he mentioned recycling, admitting that he is the "Recycling Czar" in his own home. He stressed the need to go into the schools and teach the kids about recycling and stressed the importance of the Town putting more recycling bins in our fields.

The guest speaker of the evening was Mary Reilly, Green Team Leader of Cranford. Mary spoke to us about the formation of Sustainable Jersey, what other towns are doing and her experience in Cranford. Two hundred and three municipalities have now registered with the program. Those registered are eligible for grants and other funding to implement some of the measures outlined. Cherry Hill has been very pro-active in sustainable actions in the town and has received 1 million dollars in grants!

Sam Mardini, Springfield Assistant Township Engineer spoke of the actions that have already been done in our town for which we can receive

Sustainable Jersey "points". They are: the Cut It and Leave It grass program, the installation of a Rain Garden in front of the Annex Building, and recycling in our Municipal Building. He also discussed two actions he is currently working on getting grants to fund: an energy audit of all municipal facilities and assessing a "carbon footprint" of all municipal facilities and operations.

The last part of the meeting was devoted to generating ideas from the attendees as to areas they felt were most important to begin implementing. The room was brimming with conversation and many ideas were presented. Four committees were established: Recycling, Education, Energy Audits and Green Business Recognition.

STAY FIRE SMART, DON'T GET BURNED!

Staying fire smart plays a big role at home, work and school. Everyone should be sure to keep up on identifying hazards that can cause fires. Everything from carelessness with open flames to failure to maintain fire alarm systems can be the source of a fire emergency. There are a wide variety of situations that have potential for disaster if you are uneducated about them. That is why this year's topic for Fire Prevention and Education is Stay Fire Smart, Don't Get Burned!

From October 5th through 23rd, the Springfield Fire Department will be visiting all our public and private schools to help the community be more "fire smart." The main purpose is to make people realize what they can do to prevent fires and what to do in the event of an emergency.

Here are some tips to get you started:

- Never leave food unattended on the stove or in the oven. This is the number one cause of house fires!
- Have your chimney and heating systems inspected annually.
- Make sure to clean your dryer vent and do many of the township residents at this event.

- Keep lighters and/or matches out of the reach of children.
- Open flames such as candles or fireplace fires should never be left unattended and should put out before you leave the room.
- Space heaters should be kept 3 feet from anything that can burn.
- Turn off all space heaters when leaving
- Have an exit plan and stay familiar with exits when in any building.
- Have smoke alarms in proper working order and make sure batteries are changed twice annually.
- Practice family fire drills and have a designated meeting spot.

FOUR CENTURIES IN SPRINGFIELD

There will be a very special opportunity for history buffs this year when once again Springfield's celebration of Four Centuries in Union County will be held at the First Presbyterian Church at 210 Morris Avenue. Mark you r calendar for the weekend of October 17th and 18th.

Due to the unfortunate and prolonged closing of the Historic Cannon Ball House, while we raise funds for necessary structural repairs, we invite the public to visit the Church from which Rev. James Caldwell distributed the Isaac Watts hymnals to the American troops ("Give 'em Watts, boys!") during the Battle of Springfield on June 23, 1780. An actual hymnal is on display in the Church, which was burned during the British retreat, rebuilt on the original foundation and rededicated in 1791.

Also on display will be many artifacts from the Historic Cannon Ball House and costumed docents will provide the historical background of the Church, the House, and the Battle. Guarding the Church since 1905, is a statue of a colonial soldier which stands on the smallest state park in New Jersey. Across Church Mall is an early burial ground to explore; one of several nearby with beautifully carved stones by local masters of the art, each with a story to tell about those who rest beneath them.
