FOURTH OF JULY FIREWORKS WERE A SUCCESS ON THE FIFTH!

Springfield's 4th of July Fireworks Display once again squeaked by before the rain started. Well, not really, so much for writing this on July 2nd! The 4th of July Committee, consisting of Scott Seidel, John Cottage and Wally Schultz, had to decide at 10 am, whether or not it will rain at 9 pm. Since the National Weather Service, with all their equipment really can't do that, we do our best! For almost 40 years we have managed to get the show in on the 4th, the only exceptions being one year, when we postponed a day as it was raining all day and then in 2005 when we held the fireworks on the weekend of June 25th to coincide with the 225th Battle of Springfield Celebration.



At 10 am the committee met and reviewed the weather maps and future cast. All reporting stations said heavy rain after midnight and a possible pop up shower in the evening. Given that forecast, we advised all our vendors, petting zoo, sound engineers, band members and volunteers that we were a go. Once we start setting up, we are committed to putting on the show. We felt if need be, we could shoot the show at 9 pm if we had to. The 4th was a nice day until around 7 pm when the skies darkened and the winds picked up. Still, all weather radars showed we were good until 10 pm. Then at 8 pm it started to drizzle, with the radar still showing heavy rain at 9:45 pm. Then, it started to pour, people left the field, and our stage and sound system flooded out and we were done for the night. Even though by 9 pm it had stopped raining, there was little point in setting off the fireworks with 30 people to watch. Our second act, Ron Dante, who flew in from California, was only able to sing one song.

Our Fireworks contract provides for rain and they have to come back on the next clear night. Unfortunately, the rides, petting zoo and musicians all had to be paid for the day and we simply cannot afford to pay twice to bring them back for a second day. Add to that that our gate collections were less than half of normal, it was a disaster all around. A few people were disappointed that they could not get a refund as they left on Monday. We hope that most people understand that they were making a donation to our town and that we, unfortunately, cannot control the weather. Postponing or can-

celling is always our last choice. It actually costs us more when we have to do it the next day. All our volunteers, who donate their time, have to give up an extra day to make this happen. We couldn't do this without our gate collectors, Auxiliary Police, CERT and Emergency Management volunteers, Chamber of Commerce members and residents who come out to help.

Tuesday the 5th was a beautiful day. We had our food vendor return with a limited menu and our novelty vendor as well. Wally Schultz was our musical director, and using the OEM sound system, provided some nice 80's and 90's music for the crowd. By 9 pm, Meisel Field was almost filled to capacity. We passed a bucket for donations and we wish to thank everyone who helped out as we collected a little over \$500 to help defray our costs. The show went off at 9:20 pm and ran until almost 10 pm. Everyone seemed to enjoy it and we received many compliments for the display. For those that don't know, the event costs over \$25,000 to put on, and that's without all the volunteer assistance. Not a bad deal for a \$5 donation!

"THE GREAT CRAYON CLEANOUT" A COLORFUL SUCCESS AT SAINT JAMES THE APOSTLE SCHOOL

Saint James the Apostle school students from grades PreK-3 through Grade 8 participated in the "The Great Crayon Cleanout" sponsored by the Bedtime Math Foundation in partnership with The Crayon Initiative. For over a month, students scoured their classrooms and homes for unused and/or broken crayons. The PreK students had fun sorting all of the crayons by color. Lower elementary grade students weighed the crayons by color and determined orange was the most collected color at 17 pounds followed by pink/red at 16 pounds.



Saint James collected over 100 pounds of used crayons! Every pound of used crayons can make five new 8-packs of crayons. That's over 4,000 new crayons (500 8-packs) they collected. The Crayon Initiative will melt down the discarded crayons to manufacture new packs which will be donated to eleven New Jersey children's hospitals. Students helped reduce clutter in their homes, kept discarded crayons out of landfills and helped make some children's day a little brighter by giving them some tools to unlock their artistic potential.



THE MADISON HEALTH DEPARTMENT URGES RESIDENTS TO REDUCE AREAS ON THEIR PROPERTY THAT COULD ATTRACT RODENTS AND MOSQUITOES

The Madison Health Department has received numerous complaints about rat sightings and properties that are potential breeding grounds for mosquitoes. The Health Department is encouraging Madison residents to be aware of steps they can take to ensure the health and safety of themselves and their neighbors by keeping their properties well maintained.

To prevent mosquitoes from breeding and becoming a nuisance, follow these steps to reduce standing water in your yard:

- Unclog rain gutters
- Cover trash cans
- Clean out bird baths and stagnant fountains
- Repair leaky hoses
- Maintain small ponds

Steps to prevent rodents in your yard:

- Deny food source (use hard sided trash containers, plastic or metal to prevent garbage leakage)
- Make sure garbage containers have tightly fitting lids
- Remove any ripe fruits or vegetables from home garden
- Eliminate water sources (see above)
- Trapping
- Remove any accumulated garbage or debris
- Elevate any stacked wood
- Professional exterminator service



After the war, because of her language skills, she aided the American Joint Distribution Committee helping to resettle many displaced persons. Later she came to America, settled in Springfield along with her late husband Naum, also a Holocaust survivor, and their son Sam. She was one of the founding members of Temple Beth Ahm Yisrael of Springfield and a tireless worker for the synagogue's sisterhood and Hadassah.

Joe Tenenbaum, was honored with the Lifetime Service Award and also received a 50 year member pin for his dedicated service to B'nai B'rith. Joe has been the longtime President of the Union County Lodge, serves as a V.P. on the B'nai B'rith Tri-State Regional Board, the Board of the Elin-Unger Post 273 of the Jewish War Veterans, is a life member of Hadassah, a member of Temple Beth Ahm Yisrael of Springfield and a member of the Senior Set of Congregation Israel of Springfield. Joe was honored for his over 50 years of service to the community and to B'nai B'rith.

Davida Berkowitz, the 2016 Eshet Chayil Award recipient is the Executive Director of Congregation Beth Israel of Scotch Plains. Davida is a graduate of the Solomon Schechter Day School and has worked as a Jewish professional for over 19 years. Davida was recognized for her ongoing committment to the Jewish community in her work as a synagogue professional.

Kenneth Lavroff, the recipient of this year's Keter Shem Tov Leadership Award is the owner/manager of Deli King in Clark, N.J.. Ken was honored for his continuous efforts in serving our community for the past 32 years, including feeding our volunteers on Super Sunday, supplying holiday dinners to families in need after 9/11 and in supporting B'nai B'rith and other community service organizations.



MAYORS COUNCIL RAHWAY RIVER WATERSHED ENDORSES FEDERAL STRATEGY FOR INITIAL RAHWAY RIVER FLOOD MITIGATION PLAN

The Mayors Council Rahway River Watershed Flood Control voted at its recent meeting to endorse the US Army Corps of Engineers strategy for initial flood mitigation in the upper Rahway River Basin. Known as Alternative 4a, the plan is a revision of one of the 10 alternatives that the US Army Corps and the NJ Department of Environmental Protection have been evaluating since the major damages from Irene in 2011 caused over \$100 million of property damages.

Alternative 4a includes modification to the Orange Reservoir and downstream channel improvements through Cranford and lift or acquisition of numerous properties in the City of Rahway. The plan had the strongest benefit cost ratio required to be attained as part of the federal process meaning the project benefits (less flood damages) exceed project costs. The next steps include the July 14 presentation of the plan to the US Army Corps of Engineers Headquarters in Washington DC and then USACES finalization of environmental review and a final report by the Chief of Engineers.

Missing from Alternative 4a were improvements to Lenape Park given the cost and environmental mitigation required. Lenape Park was constructed as a flood retention basin in the 1970s and it has lost some of its value due to factors such as upstream over development. While improvements will not be included as part of the federal Alternative 4a, Cranford and Union County will continue to consider ways to incorporate improvements into a local plan.

The Mayors also heard great news that the needed funding to finalize the study has been secured and included in the Senate and House appropriation billsamounting to \$379,000 which is matched by the state of New Jersey. Also important, the Mayors were informed by Winning Strategies, a federal lobby firm working with the Mayors Council, that Congressman Leonard Lance, working with his colleagues was able to get the upper Rahway River project inserted in legislation Water Resources Development Act of 2016, which would authorize engineering and pre-construction funding for the project.

At the Mayor's meeting Zach Mccue, spoke positively on behalf of Senator Cory Booker and Ryan Farrell, an assistant for Congressman Lance offered encouraging words about the project and that this is a priority for the Congressman.

Union County Freeholder Chairman Bruce Bergen, who has continued to be a strong supporter of flood control plan, spoke at meeting about the formation of a commission to administer the USACE flood mitigation plan.

The Mayors Council Rahway River Watershed Flood Control includes: Union Mayor Manual Figueiredo; Former Millburn Mayor Robert Tillotson; Cranford Mayor Andis Kalnins; Millburn Mayor Ted Bourke; Rahway Mayor Sam Steinman; Springfield Mayor Jerry Fernandez; Maplewood Mayor Victor Deluca; and Kenilworth Mayor Anthony DeLuca.

Over \$100 million of damages was faced by residents along the Rahway River during Irene and no improvement in the situation has yet been done. The Federal and State Rahway River Flood Mitigation Plan has significant flood mitigation benefits including material water elevation reductions from Millburn to Rahway.

I ask that all recipients of the Springfield Patriot Times take just a few moments to read over these suggested tips on how to prevent your becoming a victim of a crime. While there is no fool proof way to guarantee that a crime is not committed against you, these tips may help protect you, your family, and your property and your personal identity information.

- Whether you leave your home for a day or only an hour, remember to make sure to lock all doors and windows. Most house burglaries are commonly referred to as "break-ins" but burglars routinely walk around your home trying all doors and windows to see if one was inadvertently left unlocked so they do not have to break into your home. Remember that a closed window is not a locked window.
- Remember to always lock your vehicle, especially in your driveway overnight. Make sure the car windows are closed. Vehicles in driveways become frequent targets of thieves who merely walk about residential areas late at night where they simply try door handles to find unlocked vehicles that they then rummage through.
- Never leave valuables inside of your vehicle overnight in your driveway. Every year residents who have had their vehicles burglarized, either by havng left it unlocked or by a thief, who will force entry into it, will report the theft of phones, wallets, handbags, laptop computers or tablets, cameras, GPS units and other valuables
 - Consider installing motion sensor lights around your home as an added deterrent.
- Be wary of persons at your door soliciting various types of home repair work. Some may do a good job but many are just looking to con you out of your money. Some door-to-door thieves may try to con you into paying for home repairs that will wind up costing you more money to undo what they supposedly repaired. Others may try to lure you into your backyard under the guise of doing work on a neighbor's tree or requiring help retrieving a lost pet but these pretenses are done to afford additional suspects to enter your unlocked front door to commit thefts.
- You should not walk along the street or through parking lots, to or from your car, while using a smart phone as your attention is on the phone and not on the thief who will run up to snatch your phone, sometimes by physically assaulting you.
- Remember that whenever you receive a telephone call, an e-mail or a letter that indicates you have won some type of monetary prize, lottery or sweepstake and you are required to pay some type of fee to collect your prize winnings...this is a scam to con you out of money. Legitimate prizes require no payment of any
- Be wary of e-mails you may receive from a bank you have a debit or credit card account with or a store where you may have used the card where the e-mail is to alert you to possible fraud on your debit or credit card account. Instead of blindly contacting the number listed on the e-mail or clicking on the supplied link you should contact your bank or the store via the numbers on your debit or credit card. Fraudsters will create very realistic looking e-mails to con you into calling them under the guise of being your bank or a store in order to extract your full account number and or personal identity information.
- If you receive a telephone call from the IRS saying you need to pay some type of back tax immediately to avoid arrest...this is a scam. If the telephone caller says he or she is a law enforcement officer and you must immediately pay bail for a criminal charge signed against you or you will be arrested...this is a scam. If you receive a call indicating you failed to appear for jury duty and you need to pay a fine immediately or risk being arrested...this is a scam. No law enforcement or governmental agency will call threatening an arrest unless you make some type of payment where the requested payment demanded is to be made by either your debit or credit card account number or by your going to a store to purchase a pre paid MoneyPak card or to send your payment via a Money Gram or Western Union wire transfer. If you receive any of these types of calls you should look up the telephone number for the supposed agency and contact the IRS or the police agency to verify if the call you received was legitimate. Remember that when an actual reason exists where a warrant will be issued for your arrest the only time you will be afforded an opportunity to pay your bail will be after you're arrested.
- If you receive a call from someone purporting to represent the electric company or the gas company where you are instructed to make a payment for an overdue bill or your service will be immediately shut off you should get the information the caller gives you and look up the phone number yourself for the named utility company and contact them to verify if the call you received was legitimate.
- If you sell anything on line or if you advertise any type of service or business on line and you receive a check from a purported buyer or customer where the check is made out for more than the agreed upon price...AND...you are requested to wire the overpayment back to the remitter...this is most likely a scam where the check you initially received is counterfeit. Ask your bank to examine the check.
- Be wary of telephone calls where you are told a relative, usually reported to be out of state or in a foreign country, or on vacation and has been involved in a motor vehicle accident or has been arrested and you are asked to wire money for bail or for hospital bills or to pay damages. Nowadays thieves will obtain names and other information for your relatives off of social media sites such as FaceBook to use when calling you. If you receive such a call, merely get all of the contact information from the caller and hang up. Immediately call your relative who is supposedly on vacation in order to verify that the call you received is a scam.

These are but just a few tips on how to prevent some of the more prevalent crimes and scams that some township residents unfortunately fall victim to every year. If you are in doubt of a suspicious call, email or person, please contact the police department so that an officer can meet with you to offer our assistance.





WHEN TO CALL 911

In an emergency, call 911 or your local emergency number immediately from any wired or wireless phone.

An emergency is any situation that requires immediate assistance from the police, fire department or ambulance. Examples include:

- A fire
- A crime, especially if in progress
- A car crash, especially if someone is injured
- A medical emergency, such as someone who is unconscious, gasping for air or not breathing, experiencing an allergic reaction, having chest pain, having uncontrollable bleeding, or any other symptoms that require immediate medical attention

Important: If you're not sure whether the situation is a true emergency, officials recommend calling 911 and letting the call-taker determine whether you need emergency help.

When you call 911, be prepared to answer the call-taker's questions, which may include:

- The location of the emergency, including the street address
- The phone number you are calling from
- The nature of the emergency
- Details about the emergency, such as a physical description of a person who may have committed a crime, a description of any fire that may be burning, or a description of injuries or symptoms being experienced by a person having a medical emergency

Remember, the call-taker's questions are important to get the right kind of help to you quickly.

Be prepared to follow any instructions the call-taker gives you. Many 911 centers can tell you exactly what to do to help in an emergency until help arrives, such as providing step-by-step instructions to aid someone who is choking or needs first aid or CPR.

Finally, do not hang up until the call-taker instructs you to.

If you dial 911 by mistake, or if a child in your home dials 911 when no emergency exists, do not hang up—that could make 911 officials think that an emergency exists, and possibly send responders to your location. Instead, simply explain to the call-taker what happened.


