Message from the Mayor

On behalf of the Township Committee, I would like to wish everyone a very happy summer! Congratulations to all recent elementary school, middle school, high school and college graduates. Springfield is very proud of your accomplishments and the success of our community depends on hardworking and dedicated individuals like you.

I also want to extend my appreciation to everyone who made the annual 4th of July Celebration a success, especially the Chamber of Commerce who makes the event possible and the paid and volunteer members of our public safety

units. Everyone who attended enjoyed a spectacular fireworks show, outstanding musical entertainment, and delicious food.

There have been various wild animal sightings in Springfield for several years that were brought to the attention of the Springfield Board of Health but they did not publicize them. With the summer here and more people spending time outdoors, I want to take this opportunity to reassure the public and provide some information. Coyotes are actually more common than many people think – across the state. Attacks are rare. If provoked or given access to food, their behavior will change. According to the State, "In suburban and urban areas, coyotes have occasionally attacked small pets. Although attacks on humans are extremely rare in eastern states, as with any predatory animal they can occur." More information is available from the New Jersey Division of Fish & Wildlife at their website. The message is generally the same for black bear sightings. Police are aware and they are on the lookout as part of their patrols and our animal control plan, however, "management" of the animal population is under the State Division of Fish and Wildlife. Short of widespread "extermination" which isn't even an option, there is very little that a municipality or local animal control can do besides respond. The State says, "Sightings alone should not cause alarm but are a signal to take the preventive measures described here. Significant damage and nuisance coyote problems should be reported to the Wildlife Services Section at (908) 735-8793." If there is an emergency, dial 9-1-1. Typically, police are called in response to wild animals and animal control is called if they are found to be acting in an aggressive/violent manner or have attacked.

The Board of Education and Township Committee will be holding a special, joint meeting this year on Monday, July 16 at Jonathan Dayton High School to workshop and discuss issues of mutual concern. Despite the fact that we are separate, independent governing bodies, it is important that we maintain open lines of communication and find ways to work together effectively and efficiently to benefit taxpayers. We have rescheduled our July Township Committee meetings and will meet after the Joint meeting in Town Hall for our own Township Committee meeting. These meetings are both public and open to all.

I am happy to announce that this month we will "cut the ribbon" at the new First Aid Squad & Municipal Library parking lot. Residents will find that this will ease the congestion around Town Hall, the First Aid Squad and the Municipal Library as well as offer more parking spaces for visitors.

This summer, stop by the improved and expanded Springfield Farmers Market to sample some of the great, new products! "Jersey Fresh" fruits & vegetables, fresh flowers, cheeses, pickles, jams & jellies, fresh pasta, dried fruits & nuts, baked goods and fresh sauces are available every Monday 12 p.m. to 6 p.m.

Police Chief's Column Chief John P. Cook

In the past persons who were the victims of bunco scams or confidence schemes were looked upon as being complicit in the fraud acts committed against them under the old adage of "you can't cheat an honest man". Today that saying is no longer true as fraud scams are now designed to target unsuspecting persons through sophisticated cons with the use of modern technology. Fraudsters nowadays know that it is very possible, and at times extremely easy, to "cheat an honest man" so in order to enable town residents to recognize a fraud scam attempt the police division offers the following preventative tips.

Most fraud scams that specifically target residents are done via the internet or via the telephone are designed to obtain either money from or the personal identity information of the intended victim. This will be an attempt to have monies wired to the fraudsters or obtain credit account numbers or identity information such as a Social Security number.

Any mail received or an internet e-mail or even a telephone call that indicates a resident is a winner of any type of sweepstakes or foreign lottery where some type of monetary fee is required to be paid this is an outright scam. If you did not enter any sweepstakes or participated in any foreign lottery, there is no way you can be a winner. Whenever fees are required to be paid in advance in order to collect the supposed prize, this is a scam to con you out of your money.

If you are selling an item over the internet or you advertise some type of service that you perform, be wary of persons who contact you wanting to purchase items you've listed for sale or wanting to pay you for the services you offer where the subject pays by check which is payable to more monies than were agreed to. This scam specifically wants the intended victim to believe that the check was made out in the inflated amount by accident and will attempt to have the victim wire any monetary difference before the actual check is discovered to be counterfeit. The suspects will always be out of state or in a foreign country but will claim to be in the process of moving into Springfield. The scam targets persons selling any item from a car to a couch or offering services from babysitting to piano lessons.

Do not give out personal information to callers who claim to be representatives of your bank or any business you may have a credit account with. The fraudster may also pose as a law enforcement official with the call pretending to be some type of investigation into fraud on your account. This is done to con you into giving out a Social Security number or other personal information when the caller asks you to prove your identity. Remember that anyone who calls you should already know who you are and you do not have to give out confidential information in order to prove your identity. This same scam, known as "phishing" can also involve bogus e-mails purporting to be from a financial institution or governmental agency and is intended to con you into divulging your identity information.

In short, to prevent falling for the myriad of fraud schemes one old adage is as true today as it was years ago, and that is..."if something seems too good to be true, it probably is".



PHILLIPS 5K TRAIL RUN/WALK RAISES MORE THAN \$2,000

232ND ANNIVERSARY OF THE BATTLE OF SPRINGFIELD

The Church and Cannon Chapter, Daughters of the American Revolution held their annual commemoration ceremony on June 23rd in the historic DAR cemetery it owns on Mountain Avenue, Springfield. Members of Boy Scout Troop 73, Springfield Historical Society, C.A.R. and public, joined the DAR in marking the 232nd anniversary of the Battle of Springfield.

The DAR honors all who are buried, especially the Stites family, who were the original owners in 1711 and all who died during the battle on June 23, 1780. A wreath made by members of the Children of the American Revolution was placed at the monument which was erected in 1896 by the SAR. Two Springfield residents were presented with DAR Awards of Appreciation for their interest and support of the preservation of the historic cemetery. Linda Jurczak, Chapter Regent, thanked Margaret Bandrowski, Springfield Historical Society President, for always including the DAR cemetery in her historic tours and encouraging the town to know its rich history; and to Marc Krauss, Township Committeeman, who, upon learning of the importance of the cemetery to the history of the Township of Springfield, worked with Township Administrator, Anthony Cancro, to include a new entrance way in a county grant application in 2011. The 50 year old, crumbling steps were replaced with a blue stone and brick staircase, to provide safe access for the community. The project was completed in the fall and was re-dedicated during the ceremony.




FREE SENIOR PARKING PASS

Safety Tips for Residential Pools

With the summer fully under way and families enjoying time together in their swimming pools, it's time for a reminder of safe pool practices in order to avoid tragedies. According to federal statistics, more than 60 percent of all pool-related deaths and injuries occur in pools owned by the victim's family or friends.

Each year, nearly 400 children drown in pools and spas, and more than 5,000 others are treated for pool-related injuries, according to the Consumer Product Safety Commission. People who own pools need to be especially cautious because more than 70 percent of all pool injuries occur in backyard pools, including in-ground, above-ground and portable pools. Since the beginning of June, in New Jersey, there have been four accidental drownings involving children under the age of 7.


The American Red Cross, CPSC and Springfield Fire Department recommend pool owners:


- Don't let anyone swim unsupervised and have a pool alarm installed to warn you that someone may be in the pool without your knowledge.
- Fence pools with a four-foot or taller fence with self-closing, self-latching, alarmed gates. Make sure pool gates are closed and locked, especially when not in use.
- Place tables and chairs well away from the pool fence to prevent children from climbing into the pool area.
- Have a telephone at poolside to avoid having to leave children unattended in or near the pool to answer a telephone elsewhere.
- When the pool is not in use, remove all pool toys because they can attract young children who may accidentally fall in the water.
 Keep all doors and windows leading to the pool area secure to prevent small children from getting to
- the pool.Instruct baby-sitters about potential hazards to young children in and around swimming pools and the need for constant supervision.
- Do not consider young children "drown proof" because they have had swimming lessons; young children should always be watched carefully while swimming.
- Keep emergency equipment, such as life preservers, rescue devices and a first aid kit by the pool.
- Do not use flotation devices as a substitute for supervision.
 Never use a pool with its pool cover partially in place, since children may become entrapped under
- Never use a pool with its pool cover partially in place, since children may become entrapped under it. Remove the cover completely.
- Remove steps to above ground pools when not in use.
- Learn CPR (cardiopulmonary resuscitation).




