## FIRE AT BALTUSROL GOLF CLUB

There was a fire on the roof of the clubhouse on July 16th which was deemed accidental in nature. The initial call went out at 11:16 am, Springfield Fire was on scene at 11:20 am. This was a 3 alarm fire. According to Springfield Fire Captain Mike Mastroeni, "It was stubborn fire located in the attic--we had to open several areas of the roof. The fire appeared to be contained to the area of origin and there was a heavy smoke condition." According to Scott Seidel, Coordinator for Springfield Emergency Management, "There were 45 firefighters on scene, 6 engines and 2 ladder companies. Fire Departments from towns including Springfield that responded were Union, Cranford, Hillside, Millburn, Summit, Roselle and Elizabeth. Springfield Police, Springfield First Aid Squad, Springfield Emergency Management and Springfield Auxiliary Police were on scene as well as Union County EMS. The road in front of the golf course was closed temporarily and traffic diverted. There were no civilian injures. One firefighter was treated for injuries.





#### HAM RADIO SPECIAL EVENT STATION

Amateur "HAM" Radio Field Day is an annual amateur radio event sponsored the Amateur Radio Real League (ARRL). The event encourages emergency communications and preparedness among amateur radio operators. In the United States, it is typically the largest single emergency preparedness exercise in the country, with over 30,000 operators participating each year. Field Day is always the fourth full weekend of June, beginning at 1800 UTC Saturday and running through 2059 UTC Sunday.

On Saturday, June 22, 2019, Springfield Emergency Management set up a Field Day special event radio station in conjunction with their 225th Anniversary Celebration for the founding of the Township of Springfield. Using Springfield Emergency Management's Club callsign, W2OEM, Ham Radio Operators Marc Lepore, N2FCC and Eric Deutchman, WB2LMW, set up a temporary radio station with generator power and worked a number of other

ham radio operators. Operators contacted were in Georgia, Michigan, South Carolina and Florida. Lepore commented to the Patriot Times, "I've been a ham radio operator for almost 35 years and enjoy the hobby, it's fun to set up a temporary station like this and be able to speak directly with someone in another apart of the country or the world, no calling plan needed! I also enjoy setting up emergency communications systems and have done so many times over the years with the Township during emergencies." Deutchman echoed Lepore's sentiments and noted he earned his Novice or beginners Ham License in the early 1960's and has been an active ham radio operator ever since, participating in numerous amateur radio events year round, including the "Jamboree on the Air", an annual Scouting radio event in the fall. Revolutionary War reenactor Chris Diaman of the 3rd New Jersey regiment observed 21st century communications in person and put the call out that "The British are coming"! Anyone wishing to learn more about Ham Radio is encouraged to contact the Springfield Office of Emergency Management at 973-467-3388 or email, oemcooridnator@springfield-nj.us.

Since the first ARRL Field Day in 1933, radio amateurs throughout North America have practiced the rapid deployment of radio communications equipment in environments ranging from operations under tents in remote areas to operations inside Emergency Operations Centers (EOCs). Operations using emergency and alternative power sources are highly encouraged, since electricity and other public infrastructures are often among the first to fail during a natural disaster or severe weather.


To determine the effectiveness of the exercise and of each participant's operations, there is an integrated contesting component, and many clubs also engage in concurrent leisure activities (camping out, cookouts, etc.). Operations typically last a continuous twenty-four hours, requiring scheduled relief operators to keep stations on the air. Additional contest points are awarded for experimenting with unusual modes, making contacts via satellite, and involving youth in the activity.







## DEMOLITION COMMENCES ON THE "LYONS" BUILDING

In an exclusive interview with the Patriot Times, Scalera noted "The Township has waited a long time for this to finally start to happen--other projects are underway as well and we look forward to the new look of downtown Springfield."

When driving, you should never smell smoke and/or the acrid smell of burning wires. Smoke does not necessarily mean that the car is on fire, but it should always be treated seriously. Drive directly to the shoulder of the road and turn off the ignition.

According to the American Automobile Association and the National Fire Protection Association, there are nearly 300,000 car fires annually in the United States, resulting in more than 500 deaths. The leading cause of these fires was poor vehicle maintenance.

Here is some advice to prevent a fire and avoid problems with your car. Include a check of the fuel system during your regular maintenance. Electrical and fuel system problems are the primary causes of car fires. An early indication of a problem is an electrical fuse that blows more than once. The source of the tripped fuse could be either a faulty component or a wiring problem. Next, check for oil leaks and always use a funnel when adding oil. Oil spilled on a hot exhaust manifold can cause a fire.

Another source of fires is the catalytic converter. This is the cylindrical unit located in the exhaust system found before the muffler. Catalytic converters can become so hot they can ignite dried grass or leaves directly under the parked vehicle. Never park on dried grass or leaves.

Your first action, if you a suspected that your car is on fire, should be to pull over immediately and turn off the engine. As you drive, the forward motion of the vehicle will force air into the engine compartment which feeds oxygen to the fire. It is best to stop in an area away from buildings and people, if you have that option. Burning plastics and other materials can produce toxic gases; therefore it is best not to expose yourself or bystanders.

Modern cars usually have an electric fuel pump; and by turning off the ignition, you will have stopped the flow of fuel to the fire. Next, get yourself and passengers out of the car and close the doors behind you. Closed doors and windows may limit the spread of fire by reducing the amount of oxygen available.

While explosions from car fires are rare (the most common is the bursting of a burning tire), you should stand clear of the area – especially avoiding the front and rear of the vehicle. Vehicles with slow impact bumpers are equipped with gas shock absorbers that, under intense heat, can explode and turn into lethal projectiles.

That's a lot to remember, so in summary, if smoke is billowing out of your car, pull over, turn off the ignition, get everyone out of the vehicle and call for help.

June 22nd & 23rd saw the celebration of the Township's 225th Anniversary in style! On Saturday a Festival was held on Mountain Ave. with model race cars, sand art, local businesses, food trucks and more. While this was going on, the Brigade of the American Revolution Revolutionary War re-enactors, opened their camp located in the back of the high school to the public. People could walk into their camp, where the re-enactors had spent the night in 18th Century tents. They could watch them prepare breakfast on campfires as well as do tasks which would have been done in the late 18th Century, cleaning weapons, preparing food, mending clothes, playing music on period instruments, etc.

Then the soldiers and their camp followers formed up and marched down Mountain Avenue through the festival to the DAR cemetery on Mountain Avenue and conducted a service and placed a wreath commemorating those who perished defending the Township and the Country in the Revolutionary War. They then did the same at the Presbyterian cemetery on Church Mall and at the monument at the Presbyterian Church, the site where Reverend Caldwell spoke those famous words "Give 'Em Watts Boys". After marching back to their camp they prepared for battle. A little before 2 pm, they marched across a very soggy field and over the footbridge to Meisel Avenue Park. For an hour the two sides, American and British, reenacted a battle, using muskets, bayonets and even a canon. After marching back to their camp, they remained open to the public until 430 pm. This was about the time the Township's annual fireworks celebration, held on the 22nd of June to commemorate the anniversary, was getting underway. Rides for Children, merchandise for sale, food, and music by the 1910 Fruitgum Company occupied a record crowd until 920 pm when the fireworks celebration commenced. Garden State Fireworks of Millington, NJ did the show. They are a world renowned fireworks company, even doing the show at the White House on July4th this year!

Then on Sunday morning, the camp again opened at 10 AM and a period church service was held in the camp. At 1 PM it was back to Meisel Avenue Park to defeat the British and send them back to New York! The Camp closed at 330 PM and everyone returned to the 21st century. While the Township's actual 225th anniversary was April 14, 2019, the Anniversary Committee made the decision to hold the event in June in hopes of better weather—Good call!

After raising money in the 2016-2017 school year to "Fill an Ark," Saint James the Apostle School decided its next major mission would be focused on clean water.

The school's Technology instructor, Mary-Alice Zavocki, became aware of charity: water after learning about its founder, Scott Harrison, and how like the prodigal son, he decided to turn his life around and do something good. His story was shared via video with students in the appropriate grades and retold to our younger students. All students were interested to learn that there are people in this world who do not have access to clean, drinkable water and wanted to do what they could to help.

This was when the "Every Drop Counts" mission was born.

The students set a goal of raising \$5,000. After numerous bake sales involving all grades as bakers and sellers, a t-shirt design contest and sale, a silent art auction, dress down days, loose change collections every Wednesday for "Water Wednesdays," recess games organized by 8th graders and the generosity of students, families, faculty, staff and parishioners, we did it! Third grader, Emily Lagemann, even donated her birthday gifts totaling \$300 to the cause. On the last day of school, Saint James the Apostle School principal, Mrs. Caroline Ponterio, announced the school had raised \$5,577 and counting.

The money will be donated to the charity: water. Private donors cover charity: water's operating costs, so 100% of the funds Saint James raised will bring clean water to those in need. It takes just \$30 to provide someone with clean drinking water for one year. At the moment, the school's efforts will support clean water for over 185 individuals for a year.

Saint James the Apostle School students have raised over \$16,500 over the last four years for the following organizations: Leukemia & Lymphoma Society (Pennies for Patients), Heifer International, Juvenile Diabetes Research Foundation and charity: water.

#### **BBQ** and Grilling Safety Awareness

#### **Gas Grill Do's And Don'ts**

- Always follow all of the grill manufacturer's instructions and keep written materials and manuals in a safe, accessible place.
- When not in use, make sure all grill burner controls are turned off and that the valve cylinder is closed.
- Do not smoke while handling the propane cylinder.
- . Do not allow children to tamper or play with the cylinder or grill.
- Make sure the gas grill is shut off and cooled before covering your grill after use.
- Always use or store cylinders outdoors with the relief valve in direct contact with the vapor space, usually in an upright (vertical) position.
- After filling or exchanging, take your cylinder home immediately.
   Keep your vehicle ventilated and keep the cylinder valve closed and plugged or capped in accordance with the manufacturer's instructions.
- When your grill is not in use, cover disconnected hose-end fittings and birder air intakes with small plastic bags, or obtain protective fitting caps from your propane supplier to keep out dirt, insects, and moisture.
- Do not use, store, or transport your cylinder where it would be exposed to high temperatures. (This includes storing spare cylinders under or near the grill.)

#### Get ready to grill safely!

July is peak month for grill fires with an average of 19,000 people hospitalized because of injuries involving grills. Before using your grill its a good idea to inspect and test your grill while also insuring its placed in a safe location. Some leading causes of grilling accidents and injuries include not cleaning your grill, unattended cooking, children touching/playing around hot grill, and leaks or breaks. You should always grill with safety in mind to insure a successful BBQ season.

## Police Chief's Column Chief John P. Cook

The Summer and early Fall are times that Springfield Township sees a lot of people traveling throughout town on their bicycles. Bike riding is a fun and healthy form of exercise and transportation. But riders and drivers together need to understand that bicycles are not toys, they're vehicles.

Before riding, it is important that you inspect your bike to ensure it is ready for the trip with all parts working properly. Following the inspection, it is extremely important to wear a properly fitted bike helmet. The helmet is used to protect your brain and could save your life. Next you should adjust the bicycle to fit your height. While straddling the bike youshould give 1 to 2 inches from you to the top bar if its a road bike or 3 to 4 inches if it's a mountain bike. The seat height should allow a slight bend in your knees and the handlebar should be at the height of your seat. Lastly, ensure your tires are properly inflated and check the brakes.

When riding, chose your outfits wisely. Picking neon, fluorescent, or bright colors will help you stand out greater than when wearing dark colors. Wear a reflector belt, vest, jacket, or hat. Remember, even when you see a driver, it doesn't mean they see you. It is important to ride during daylight hours over hours of darkness. If you have to ride at night, equip your bike with a front head light and a blinking rear light to let the bike stand out to the passing motorists.

These simple tips will help you become a smarter and safer rider. They are also great tips to teach your children or reinforce in your teenagers. Drivers, don't forget to share the roadway. Everyone wants to get to their destination safely.
