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
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# Message from the Mayor

Dear Neighbors,



At the beginning of every year, the Finance Sub-Committee works with the Township Administrator, the Chief Financial Officer and the department heads to set the Township's priorities. They map out a vision for the upcoming year and begin work on determining a budget for the Township's 17,000 plus residents.

This year's Sub-Committee was, once again, comprised of myself and Deputy Mayor Chris Weber. We established our objective to form a fiscally responsible and fair budget. We sought to limit tax increases for township residents, reduce the township's long-term debt, while continuing to maintain the township's high-quality services

It is important to remember, your tax bill reflects the collection of taxes for multiple entities. The township remits payment to Union County and Springfield Public Schools. The Township Committee has no say over the budget processes for those entities. The County portion accounts for nearly 18 percent of your tax bill and the Public Schools accounts for a little over 50 percent.

The Township Committee has control only over the municipal portion of your tax bill, which accounts for a little over 30 percent. That means approximately 30 cents of every dollar paid goes toward providing the township's services.

For the 2022 Fiscal Year, the municipal portion of your tax bill will reflect an increase of \$35 for an average household. This modest tax increase is a result of the township's revenues returning to near pre-pandemic levels, a decrease in delinquent taxes and prudent financial decisions that resulted in a healthy surplus.

I believe our budget maintains our township's quality services, invests in our future and is fiscally respon-





The Police Unity Tour was founded in 1997 by Officer Patrick Montuore of the Florham Park, NJ Police Department. The idea was simple, Pat wanted to help raise money for the National Law Enforcement Officers Memorial by gathering together several law enforcement officers and riding their police mountain bikes from New Jersey to the site of the Memorial in Washington, DC. Since then it has grown into an annual event that has delivered over five million dollars to the Memorial Fund, making it the largest private and/or corporate sponsor of the Memorial! The Police Unity Tour is proud to be one of the largest sponsors for the National Law Enforcement Officers Memorial Fund (NLEOMF). The Memorial was founded in 1983 by members of the United States Congress who wanted to recognize the services and sacrifices of all law enforcement officers who have ever died in the line of duty. The Memorial is located at Judiciary Square in Washington DC and covers three acres of land. It was dedicated in 1991 and honors all of America's federal, state and local law enforcers. To date, there are more than 16,500 names of officers inscribed randomly on the Memorial.

The Police Unity Tour is a non-profit organization that has grown from one chapter with a few members to eight chapters with over 750 members.

Our motto, "We Ride for Those Who Died", has special meaning to our riders and support team staff. We hold in our hearts the memory of every Law Enforcement Officer who has given their all and paid with the ultimate sacrifice to their community and our nation.

On Friday, May 13th, Springfield Police Lieutenant Ryan Westover, along with nineteen other Police and Firefighters from Union County, received the Two Hundred Club of Union County's Medal of Valor Award. Formed in 1968, The Two Hundred Club of Union County has recognized the achievements of uniformed Police Officers, Firefighters and State Troopers. The Club is comprised of residents and business people in Union County and throughout New Jersey who care about the welfare of the men and women who put their lives on the line very day for our protection. In addition to awarding Twenty Medal of Valor Awards each year, the Club provides financial assistance to families of uniformed protectors throughout the County who have given their lives in the line of duty. The Club also administers a scholarship program as well, this year giving out four \$5,000 scholarships.

Police Chief John Cook introduced Lieutenant Westover and provided this brief account of his actions resulting in the presentation of this award.

On March 11, 2021 at approximately 7:00 am, Lieutenant Westover was traveling north on the Garden State Parkway. As he was approaching the area of Old Bridge, he observed that traffic was slowing and quickly noticed dark smoke rising ahead. As he approached the scene, he could see that a minivan had gone off of the roadway, onto the center median, and had struck a tree head-on causing the vehicle to catch fire.

Lieutenant Westover immediately pulled over and ran to the scene at which two New Jersey State Troopers had also arrived. One Trooper was attempting to put out the fire while the second was attempting to pry open the driver's door. Upon gaining entry through another door, Lieutenant Westover joined the second Trooper inside the vehicle. They attempted to remove the driver, who had been pinned in the driver's seat, and was seriously injured.

The flames in the engine compartment were visible and they were starting to approach the main passenger compartment. The Trooper and Lieutenant Westover were finally able to extract the driver from the vehicle and get her to a safe and secure location.

Lieutenant Westover received the Two Hundred Club Medal of Valor for going above and beyond the call of duty and risk his safety to help save this woman's life.

One of the barrels will be installed in the Springfield Community Garden to replace an older damaged barrel. The remainder went home with workshop participants to install in their yards for a total cost of about \$6.00 per barrel. Alyson Weber Miller, chair of the Springfield EC, explained that rain barrels, "are wonderful for communities that flood because they help capture runoff water from house roofs. Then, the water can be saved and used for gardening, lawns and filling bird baths.'

This performance is free and open to all members of the general public. Those planning to attend should bring their own lawn chairs or blankets as no other seating will be provided.



**GRILLING FIRE SAFETY TIPS** 

Some of us will be starting up their barbeque grill for the season. Here are some tips to keep your barbeque fun and safe.

Each year, fire departments nationally respond to nearly 8,000 grill fires. Nearly 3,000 of those fires spread to a nearby structure – usually the house. Grill fires cause an annual average of 10 deaths, 120 reported injuries, and \$80 million in direct property damage. In half of the grill-related home fires, 86% of the time the fire started when either the flammable or combustible gas or liquid propane caught fire.

One-third of the structure fires involving grills started on an exterior balcony or unenclosed porch, which is why for people living in multiple residential properties (multi-family homes, apartments and condominiums), open flame cooking devices are prohibited for use on balconies. Portable LP-gas grills are not to be stored indoors or within 5 feet of combustible portions of the building.

- Propane and charcoal BBQ grills must only be used outdoors. If used indoors, or in any enclosed spaces such as tents, they pose a fire hazard and a risk of exposing occupants to deadly carbon monoxide poisoning.
- Place the grill a safe distance from lawn games, play areas, and foot traffic. Grills should be positioned at least 5 feet away from siding, deck railing, and out from under eaves and overhanging branches.
- Keep, matches, lighters, and starter fluid out of the reach of children in a locked drawer or cabinet.
- Keep children and pets away from the grill area: declare a three-foot "kid-free zone" around the grill.
- Use long barbeque mitts and long-handled grilling tools to protect the chef from heat and flames when cooking.
- Periodically remove grease or fat buildup in trays below the grill so it cannot be ignited by a hot grill.

If your grill does catch fire, turn off the gas, do not pour water (or any other liquid!) on a grease fire, keep the lid closed to deprive the fire of oxygen, and call the fire department. We'll do our best to save your barbeque.

Summer is here, often bringing excessive heat and thunderstorms that can produce dangerous lightning, damaging winds and flooding. Severe storms can increase the risk for power outages.

Being prepared can help minimize any potential challenges that occur should a storm impact electric service. JCP&L recommends these tips to be prepared for anything Mother Nature might have in store this season:

#### PREPARE FOR OUTAGES BEFORE THEY HAPPEN

- · Keep a flashlight, portable radio and fresh batteries in a familiar location.
- Stock a supply of bottled water and foods that do not require cooking. Don't forget
- Prepare a first-aid kit and gather prescription medications and other personal health items
- Make sure cell phones and tablets are fully charged. Keep a car charger or battery-
- charging pack handy so you can easily charge devices during an outage.

  Have a hard-wired telephone available to report an emergency. A plain, hard-wired phone can operate on power delivered through the phone line. Do NOT talk on a hard-wired telephone during a storm – telephone lines can conduct electricity, too.

In the event of prolonged storm-related outages (24 hours or greater), JCP&L coordinates with local grocery stores to have free ice and water available for customers impacted by disruptions to their electric service. A list of participating stores is available on the JCP&L website and social media platforms when this program is open

#### SIGN UP FOR UNION COUNTY EMERGENCY ALERTS!

Use https://ucnj.org/alerts/ and pick Citizen System > Register Union County

Emergency Alert System can be used to notify the public with important information during an emergency. Emergencies happen with little or no notice at any time of the day or night. This service will allow us to relay critical information to you about natural disasters or other emergencies that require your immediate attention.

In the event of an emergency, Union County Emergency Services can identify the affected area and send a message that describes the situation and may recommend the protective actions residents should take. The Emergency Alert system will automatically call out to all land-line and opt-in telephone numbers within the affected geographic area and deliver the recorded message once a voice is heard. If your phone line is busy, the system will attempt to redial the number three times to make contact. If an answering machine picks up the call, the emergency message will be left on the machine.

Some of the many uses of the system include:

· Emergency Evacuations · Wildfire · Flood · Natural Disaster Alerts · Missing Child Alerts · Hazardous Material Leaks · Neighborhood Emergency Incidents

This notification service provides a system to share emergency information with our citizens, but registration will not guarantee notification of any specific event. You are still encouraged to visit our website and to stay tuned to local news channels and radio stations during a community crisis.

#### SPRINGFIELD REPRODUCTIVE JUSTICE RALLY - MAY 14







A Reproductive Justice Rally was held in the Township of Springfield on Saturday, May 14 in front of the Municipal Building. Over 30 people

Sponsored by the Springfield Unity Project (SUP) and CACP (Citizens Against Corporate Personhood), the rally was organized by Wendy Jones to

speak out for reproductive justice in response to Supreme Court Justice Alito's leaked draft overturning Roe v. Wade, the 1973 law that made abortion legal nationwide

According to Jones, the court expects to release the final version at the end of June or the beginning of July, nearly half the states have already passed laws limiting or outlawing abortion in anticipation of the change.

The rally began with women's stories about both legal and illegal abortions. Krystal Sital, writer, activist, and SUP member, spoke about her 2016 abortion to end a Cesarean scar ectopic pregnancy, which threatened her life.

Ann Gilson and Wendy Jones, members of CACP (Citizens Against Corporate Personhood), read excerpts from the autobiography "Billie Jean King," and "Alice Walker: a life" by Evelyn C. White describing the abortions of the tennis champion and activist Billie Jean King and the writer and activist Alice Walker, respectively.

After a parody sung to the tune of the Supremes' "Stop in the Name of Love": 'We're not going back in time/ our bodies belong to us," Jones and Gilson read statistics from the Guttmacher Institute. The research revealed that pregnant people of color, poor women, and rural women would be most harmed by the overturning of Roe v. Wade.

Mayor Keiser emphasized the importance of voting.

Jones urged rally participants to remember that although "the struggle continues, we will prevail."

#### BONNIE LAFAZAN LIBRARY'S NEW ASSISTANT DIRECTOR



On May 9th, Bonnie Lafazan became the Springfield Public Library's new Assistant Director. Bonnie is a lifelong learner and educator, library advocate for patrons and fellow librarians, and library manager, bringing over two decades of experience as a lawyer, adjunct professor, and librarian. For the past 13 years, Bonnie has served as Berkeley College's Woodbridge Campus Library Director and most recently served as Berkeley College's Interim Library Director, where she was responsible for overseeing in-person and online library services, collection and resources, information literacy instruction, and library programming.

With a J.D. from the New England School of Law, Bonnie began her career as a contracts and licensing attorney at several entertainment companies in New York City. During this time, she was also a curriculum developer and an Online Adjunct Professor of Communications Law and Internet Law, where she taught and developed online courses at New York University and the University of Maryland.

In an exclusive interview with the Patriot Times, Denyce noted she has been active in the Union County Chapter of the New Jersey Technical Assistants for the past 12 years and have been the Treasurer and Vice President for the past seven years.

She noted: "At our meetings we usually choose a newer topic in our field. The board members take turns on doing the research and present it to our fellow members to keep our Association current and uniform in the execution of permitting and inspection.

One of the contributions that I am most proud of is the instituting of a system that will allow us to have all our records scanned in an approved manner by the state to our server so we can eliminate a software middleman. Scanning directly to the server also allows departments such as engineering and zoning that often have a need for our records to readily access them from their desktop.

I have achieved this by first creating a folder for every property by listing them by lot and block. Our copier has OCR capability so we can scan each permit into the folder using the permit number. The OCR feature allows different search methods so whatever we needed could be found. This was a slow process.

We found a company that can scan huge amounts of data in half the time and use our system of lots and blocks. They scan and deliver the data to us on a hard drive which we load onto the server, keep as a backup and the company also keeps a backup. We are able to fund this endeavor through a trust account set we set up several years ago for penalties collected.

This firm also destroys the records in accordance with the state mandates. We are well on our way to clearing out over 40 years worth of paper permits at no cost to the taxpayer. "Denyce Yannazzone has been named as the 2022 Technical Assistant of the Year by the State of New Jersey, Department of Community Affairs. She was chosen for her outstanding contributions and support in the areas of code enforcement. She was honored by her association and by the Department of Community Affairs at an awards luncheon held during the Building Safety Conference of New Jersey on May 4th, 2022, at Hard Rock in Atlantic City.



### **Police Chief's Column**

With the summer months here, school sessions done, vacations taking place, etc., readers of the Patriot Times are reminded that more and more of us, especially our children, are out and about on bicycles.

I encourage parents to spend a few minutes with their children to explain and emphasize the importance of safe bicycle riding, before letting them pedal away with their friends.

In New Jersey, bicycles are considered vehicles and must follow the same laws as motorists. Bicyclists must ride on the right side of the road with the flow of traffic and obey all traffic signals. Bicyclists should never attempt stunts or tricks, ride with more people on the bike than for what it was designed, "hitch" rides by holding onto moving vehicles, weave in and out of traffic or between cars, ride against the flow of traffic, or ride at night without proper lights and/or reflectors.

NJ law mandates that all cyclists under the age of 17 years (including children strapped in attached child-seats) must wear an approved, properly fitting helmet, but it is recommended for all cyclists to use one to protect themselves. This also applies to persons skating, skateboarding, roller blading, etc.

Wearing a helmet is the single most important safety measure to follow when bicycling, skateboarding, or roller blading, especially for children and young adults. Each year, many cyclists and skaters are injured or killed in crashes – many of which do not even involve other vehicles. Head injuries are the most common

reported injury, and are the most common cause of death resulting from these accidents. They are also the most preventable, since the use of a proper-fitting helmet offers excellent protection against head injuries.

Bicycles should be routinely inspected and maintained to ensure that they are in good working order and should be sized properly for the rider. The tires/wheels, brakes, chain, reflectors, lights, and seat height should be checked before every use to help prevent malfunction. Cyclists should also be alert and wear bright reflective clothing (especially if cycling at night or early morning).

In an effort to keep our children safe, Springfield police officers will be more aggressively enforcing the NJ helmet laws, and will be monitoring bicycle riding activity for other unsafe behavior. Violations can result in the child being warned of the offense, and the parent or guardian of the child being issued a citation.

Preventable injuries, or worse, have been a growing concern in most communities so please speak to your children not only about the importance of wearing a helmet for safety reasons, but the laws requiring them to wear a helmet and operate their bicycles properly.

A final note, as stated last month, parents are also reminded that their children should not be permitted to play on public roads, even on quiet culde-sacs or side streets. Public roads are intended for vehicular, bicycle, and pedestrian traffic only, and should never be utilized for children's games or other activities.




