## Message from the Mayor



On behalf of the Township Committee, happy new year! Thank you to all who attended the annual Township re-organization meeting on January 3. I want to thank my family and friends for their continued love and support.

Congratulations to Richard Huber and Erica Dubois on their election to the Township Committee. I'm honored to have been selected as the Chair by my colleagues. I'm looking forward to serving the Township of Springfield as its new mayor. We are all eager to work hard on behalf of all residents and businesses in town to make our community a better place in which to live and work.

To serve as your Mayor is a great privilege, and one that I do not take lightly. Having served on the Revenue & Finance sub-committee last year, I am well-versed in the details of the budget and I understand the implications of the budget on property taxes. This year, I will be working with the new chair of the

sub-committee, Committeewomen Geri Bujnowski, to develop a fiscally responsible budget and one that is forward-looking with a debt reduction plan so that we can ensure the future of Springfield is sound. There are a number of ways in which we have seen revenue decrease (through numerous tax appeals) and expenses increase (health benefits, utilities, pension payments, etc.). This year, we are beginning the process earlier. We are aiming to have the budget introduced in March and adopted in April. The public is invited to participate in the process and hear from each department head directly about their budget requests. There will be a daytime session at 2 pm on Tuesday, March 14 and an evening session at 6 pm on Tuesday, March 14.

This year, we are making a push to improve the use of technology in government to enhance services offered and make interaction with Town Hall more convenient over the internet. Our municipal website is also undergoing a renovation – it will still be functional during the change. Visit the website www.springfield-nj.us and navigate to the Department of Public Works page to download your copy of the new bulletin which provides key dates and information about spring cleaning, vegetative waste disposal, leaf collection, curbside collection for trash, recycling, and bulk waste, disposal information for special items like Christmas trees, hazardous waste, electronics, and more. Finally, be on the lookout for more information about the question on the 2017 election ballot asking residents if they would like to establish a Charter Study Commission to examine our form of government.

# CANNON BALL HOUSE DEBUT OF RESTORED GEORGE WASHINGTON LETTER

Springfield's Historic Cannon Ball House, located at 126 Morris Ave., will be open on Sunday, February 19 from two to four. In honor of it being Presidents' Day weekend, two samples of presidential penmanship will be displayed. One is a piece of correspondence from Herbert Hoover, while the other is a letter signed by George Washington. This letter was composed when Washington was encamped in Springfield during the Revolutionary War. Courtesy of some generous benefactors, the Washington Letter has recently undergone conservation and reframing. This open house will be the first time since its restoration that this document will be on display to the public. Also on view this weekend will be a new exhibit relating to World War I. This year marks the centennial anniversary of America's entry into this global conflict. On display will be different artifacts relating to WWI and their connections to Springfield. So join us one day shy of President's Day for a notable chapter in the history of the Cannon Ball House. Hours: Sunday, February 19 from 2 to 4. Admission: \$2 for adults, free for children 12 and under. Note: We will not be open Presidents' Day itself. For more information call (973) 376 4784.

# SPRINGFIELD COMMUNITY CHILDREN'S CHORUS PERFORMS AT THANKSGIVING SERVICE

When driving, you should never smell smoke and/or the acrid smell of burning wires. Smoke does not necessarily mean that the car is on fire, but it should always be treated seriously. Drive directly to the shoulder of the road and turn off the ignition.

According to the American Automobile Association and the National Fire Protection Association, there are nearly 300,000 car fires annually in the United States, resulting in more than 500 deaths. The leading cause of these fires was poor vehicle maintenance.

Here is some advice to prevent a fire and avoid problems with your car. Include a check of the fuel system during your regular maintenance. Electrical and fuel system problems are the primary causes of car fires. An early indication of a problem is an electrical fuse that blows more than once. The source of the tripped fuse could be either a faulty component or a wiring problem. Next, check for oil leaks and always use a funnel when adding oil. Oil spilled on a hot exhaust ma ifold can cause a fire.

Another source of fires is the catalytic converter. This is the cylindrical unit located in the exhaust system found before the muffler. Catalytic converters can become so hot they can ignite dried grass or leaves directly under the parked vehicle. Never park on dried grass or leaves.

Your first action, if you suspect that your car is on fire, should be to pull over immediately and turn off the engine. As you drive, the forward motion of the vehicle will force air into the engine compartment which feeds oxygen to the fire. It is best to stop in an area away from buildings and people, if you have that option. Burning plastics and other materials can produce toxic gases; therefore it is best not to expose yourself or bystanders.

Modern cars usually have an electric fuel pump; and by turning off the ignition, you will have stopped the flow of fuel to the fire. Next, get yourself and passengers out of the car and close the doors behind you. Closed doors and windows may limit the spread of fire by reducing the amount of oxygen available.

While explosions from car fires are rare (the most common is the bursting of a burning tire), you should stand clear of the area – especially avoiding the front and rear of the vehicle. Vehicles with slow impact bumpers are equipped with gas shock absorbers that, under intense heat, can explode and turn into lethal projectiles.

That's a lot to remember, so in summary, if smoke is billowing out of your car, pull over, turn off the ignition, get everyone out of the vehicle and call for help.

# Police Chief's Column Chief John P. Cook

I ask that all recipients of the Springfield Patriot Times, both township residents and business owners alike, take a few moments to read over these suggested tips on how to prevent your becoming a victim of a crime in this New Year. Although there is no fool proof way to guarantee that a crime is not committed against you, these are a few simple tips to help protect you, your family, your property and personal identity information.

- Whether you leave your home for a day or only an hour remember to make sure to lock all doors and windows. Most house burglaries are commonly referred to as "break-ins", but burglars routinely walk around your home trying all doors and windows to see if one was inadvertently left unlocked so they do not have to break into your home. Remember that a closed window is not a locked window.
- Remember to always lock your car when parked in your driveway overnight and make sure the windows are closed. Cars in driveways become a frequent target of thieves who merely walk about residential areas late at night where they simply try door handles to find unlocked cars that they then rummage through.
- Never leave valuables inside of your car overnight in your driveway. Every year residents have their cars burglarized, either by leaving it unlocked or by forced entry into it. Residents report the theft of cellular phones, wallets, handbags, laptop computers or tablets, digital cameras and other valuables.
- Consider installing motion sensor lights around your home as an added deterrent.
- Be wary of persons at your door soliciting various types of home repair work. Some may do a good job, but many are just looking to con you out of your money.
- You should not walk along the street or through parking lots, to or from your car, while using a smart phone. Your attention is on the phone and not on the thief who will run up to snatch your phone, sometimes by physically assaulting you.
- Remember that whenever you receive a telephone call, an e-mail or a letter that indicates you have won some type of monetary prize, lottery or sweepstake and you are required to pay some type of fee to collect your prize winnings...this is a scam to con you out of money. Legitimate prizes require no payment of any fees.
- Be wary of e-mails you may receive from a bank you have a debit or credit card account with, or a store where you may have used the card where the e-mail is to alert you to possible fraud on your debit or credit card account. Instead of blindly contacting the number listed on the e-mail, contact your bank or the store via the numbers on your debit or credit card. Fraudsters will create very realistic looking e-mails to con you into calling them under the guise of

being your bank or a store in order to extract your full account number and or personal identity information.

- If you receive a telephone call from the IRS saying you need to pay some type of back tax immediately to avoid arrest...this is a scam. If the telephone caller says he or she is a law enforcement officer and you must immediately pay bail for a criminal charge signed against you or you will be arrested...this is a scam. If you receive a call indicating you failed to appear for jury duty and you need to pay a fine immediately or risk being arrested...this is a scam. No law enforcement or governmental agency will call threatening an arrest unless you make some type of payment where the requested payment demanded is to be made by either your debit or credit card account number, your going to a store to purchase a pre paid MoneyPak card, or by sending your payment via a Money Gram or Western Union wire transfer. If you receive any of these types of calls you should look up the telephone number for the supposed agency and contact the IRS or the police agency to verify if the call you received was legitimate. Remember that when an actual reason exists where a warrant will be issued for your arrest the only time you will be afforded an opportunity to pay your bail will be after you're arrested.
- If you receive a call from someone purporting to represent the electric or gas company and you are instructed to make a payment for an overdue bill or your service will be immediately shut off, you should get the information the caller gives you. Then, look up the phone number yourself for the named utility company and contact them to verify if the call you received was legitimate.
- Regularly check your bank and credit card statements and immediately contact your financial institution when you discover any unauthorized charges.
- If you sell anything on line or advertise any type of service or business on line and you receive a check from a purported buyer or customer where the check is made out for more than the agreed upon price...AND...you are requested to wire the overpayment back to the remitter...this is most likely a scam where the check you initially received is counterfeit. Ask your bank to examine the check and if you deposit it, do not send off the supposed overpayment to the remitter until the deposited check has cleared.
- Be wary of telephone calls where you are told a relative, usually reported to be out of state, in a foreign country, or on vacation has been involved in a motor vehicle accident or has been arrested and you are asked to wire money bail, hospital bills, or to pay damages. Nowadays thieves will obtain names and other information for your relatives off of social media sites such as FaceBook to use when calling you. If you receive such a call, merely get all of the contact information from the caller and hang up. Immediately call your relative who is supposedly on vacation in order to verify that the call you received is a scam.

These are just a few simple tips on how to prevent some of the more prevalent crimes and scams that some township residents unfortunately fall victim to every year. If you are in doubt of a suspicious call or person contact the police department so we may assist you.

# MAYORS COUNCIL RAHWAY RIVER WATERSHED FLOOD CONTROL HEADS TO TRENTON TO URGE STATE TO MAKE FLOOD MITIGATION PLAN PRIORITY

The Mayors Council Rahway River Watershed Flood Control will be heading to Trenton to meet with DEP Commissioner Robert Martin on December 9 to urge the state to move ahead on the state funding of the Rahway River Flood Mitigation plan including getting to construction in 2017. In a meeting organized by Senator Tom Kean and expected to be attended by Assemblywoman Munoz and Assemblyman Bramnick, the Mayors call for state action is the main topic.

Union Township Mayor Manuel Figueiredo said, "We have been representing our communities to urge the State of New Jersey to begin construction of the Rahway River flood mitigation plan in 2017. As Mayor I have led Union's effort to better protect our residents, and our visit to Trenton to meet with the state DEP Commissioner Robert Martin is to remind him of the state's pledge to follow through on this important effort."

Bolstered by the federal US Army Corps of Engineers draft environmental impact statement that said there are no impacts that can't be mitigated with reasonable actions, the Mayors will be asking that the state fund in first quarter 2017 the Orange Reservoir Dam integrity study to ensure the dam is safe and meets federal standards.

Union County Freeholder Chairman Bruce Bergen said, "Over \$100 million of damages were faced by residents along the Rahway River during Irene. The Federal and State Rahway River Flood Mitigation Plan has significant flood mitigation benefits, including material water elevation reductions from Millburn to Rahway. Known as Alternative 4a, the plan is a revision of one of the 10 alternatives that the US Army Corps and the NJ Department of Environmental Protection evaluated."

Alternative 4a includes modification to the Orange Reservoir, adding two 36-inch outfall pipes permitting the reservoir to be drained two days before a major storm to reduce significantly the water elevation downstream during the major storm event. There will be downstream channel improvements through Cranford with one and one-half mile of channel deepening. Also, there is expected to be lifting or acquisition of numerous properties in the City of Rahway. The plan had the strongest benefit cost ratio as part of the federal process, meaning the project benefits (less flood damages) exceed project costs.

Also expected in the next week is the US Congress is expected to pass and send to the President the Federal Water Resources Act, which authorizes the US Army Corps as a federal priority the acceleration of the Rahway River Watershed Flood Mitigation Plan. US Senate Cory Booker, Senator Robert Menendez, and Congressman Leonard Lance and Congress Donald Payne were instrumental in this legislative action representing in a great way Union and Essex County communities.

The Mayors Council Rahway River Watershed Flood Control has expressed appreciation for making the plan a priority. Mayor Kalnins said, "We appreciate the efforts of our federal legislators working on our behalf. Now we need the state to take this major step forward and expedite the plan. "The Mayors Council includes: Maplewood Mayor Victor Deluca; Mayor Manual Figueiredo; Orange Mayor Dwayne Warren; Former Millburn Mayor Robert Tillotson; Cranford Mayor Andis Kalnins; Millburn Mayor Ted Bourke; Rahway Mayor Sam Steinman; Springfield Mayor Jerry Fernandez; and Kenilworth Mayor Anthony DeLuca.

Winter Safety for Senior Citizens

Did you ever hear a parent tell a child to put on a coat before they catch a cold? That's because just being really cold can make you very sick, and it's not limited to kids. The National Institute on Aging (NIA) says older adults can lose body heat fast—faster than when they were young. A big chill can turn into a dangerous problem before an older person even knows what's happening. NIA has a brochure, Stay Safe in Cold Weather! with tips on how to stay warm when it's cold.

Here are a few of the tips they recommend:

- Set your heat at 68 degrees or higher.
- Dress warmly on cold days even if you are staying in the house.
- Wear loose layers when you go outside on chilly days. Wear a hat, scarf, and gloves.
- Don't stay out in the cold and wind for a long time.
- Talk to your doctor about health problems that may make it harder for you to keep warm.
- Find safe ways to stay active even when it's cold outside.
- Ask a neighbor or friend to check on you if you live alone. If you think someone has hypothermia, call 911 right away. Cover him or her with a blanket. Don't rub his or her legs or arms.
