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Message from the Mayor

As I write this column, our local election has not yet taken place (silly season is almost over, yay!). If I am lucky enough to serve a second three-year term, thanks to all the residents who showed their support at the polls. If I am not so lucky this time around, thanks to all the residents who showed their support at the polls. Either way, I am proud of all the hard work done this year by our outstanding township employees, working together with the department heads and the township committee. I hope to see this type of camaraderie continue for years to come.

I would like to recognize the Business Improvement District this month, and all the groundwork undertaken this year. Politicians are always promising good things to come. This time, it's not just an empty promise. The BID hired an outstanding development team this year and has made significant inroads in the first steps towards the transformation of our downtown (a significant complaint since I first moved here seventeen years ago). Specifically, a major property owner who previously was not interested in updating his property is now sitting at the table with the development team. The development team is preparing several renderings, which will be presented to the township committee in November. One of the first steps necessary is a traffic study to determine public transportation alternatives. This has started thanks to a \$90,000 grant from Union County.

I would also like to recognize the progress Springfield is making regarding flood mitigation and water control. There has been ongoing progress throughout this year in de-silting streams. This is necessary to allow the water to flow smoothly from higher elevations without excessive ponding (or flooding). I wish this was all that was needed to avert catastrophic flooding (Hurricanes Floyd and Irene as examples) but every bit helps. The governor's office was very helpful in expediting this process with the state Department of Environmental Protection, and for that we all owe thanks. Last month I opened my column with the words "Spirit and Unity". I believe the previous two paragraphs embody these words and I hope to see this continue for many years. OCTOBER 2013 TOWNSHIP COMMITTEE RECAP

The workshop meeting was held at the firehouse on Monday, October 7th (starting at 7:30PM, its usual time). We reviewed our annual best practices worksheet. This comprises a list of the governor's recommended best practices for municipalities and includes shared services between other towns, towns and boards of education, and towns and counties. It is important to score at least ninety percent in order to maintain the same level of state aid used to offset municipal property taxes. Springfield actually scored ninety-six percent! We discussed moving our next workshop meeting date, as it falls on Veterans Day, November 11th. We also discussed the monthly reports from our administrator, police and fire chiefs, emergency management, public works, recreation, and engineering.

The first legislative meeting of October was held on Tuesday, the 8th. We approved moving the November 11th workshop meeting to November 12th starting at 6:30PM in town hall (it will be followed immediately by our regular legislative meeting at 7:30PM). We appointed a qualified purchasing agent which allows the threshold for non-bid work to increase to \$36,000.00. This agent is a shared service with Maplewood. We also approved the contract to purchase and install above ground fuel tanks which are needed in the event of catastrophic events such as last year's Superstorm Sandy. Moving forward, we will not have to rely on the county's fuel reserves as we did last year. Additionally, we approved payroll and vendor bills for the previous two week period, approved tax appeal refunds and overpayments and other day to day necessities in order to allow the township employees to keep the township of Springfield running smoothly.

The second legislative meeting of September was held on Tuesday, September 22th. We announced a proclamation for Pancreatic Cancer Awareness Month (November 2013). We accepted grants from Union County for the Kids Recreation Trust Fund in the amount of \$66,000.00, and Greening Union County in the amount of \$2,000.00. We also announced the opening of a new basketball court in Washington Avenue Park and a soon to be opened basketball court at Meisel Field. We awarded a contract for the replacement of the municipal pool filtration system. This work will be completed long before next summer's pool season. We also approved payroll and vendor bills for the previous two week period, approved minutes of previous meetings during the summer, approved tax appeal refunds and overpayments and other day to day necessities in order to allow the township employees to keep the township of Springfield running smoothly as always.

BURGLARY

Regardless of the economic conditions that exist in our society there will always be those individuals who will commit various types of crimes of opportunity such as theft, break-ins to motor vehicles and burglaries to homes, especially when the time change has it becoming darker much earlier. Readers of the Springfield Patriot Times should be aware of a few simple techniques that may prevent their homes from being targeted by thieves.

I would like all readers of my column in the Springfield Patriot Times to know that the easiest way for a burglar to enter your home is when you fail to recognize that a closed window is not a locked window and a closed door is not a locked door. Burglars will initially walk around a house to see if a door has been inadvertently left unlocked or if a window was closed but not locked by the homeowner. Whether you leave your house for the entire day or just an hour...always lock all doors and windows. Homeowners will not usually lock second story windows believing they are not accessible to a thief but in some cases the burglar may use lawn furniture, storage bins or other items in the rear yard to reach a higher window or a lower roof in order to open an unlocked upper floor window. Many residents who have long extension ladders will leave them in the rear yard propped up against the house or garage and this is an invitation for a thief to use the ladder to enter your home by accessing and opening an unlocked second floor window.

While the best deterrent to residential burglaries is an alarm system there are other things that can be done to prevent a burglary. Homes with dogs as pets are least favored by most thieves who do not want to encounter a potentially unfriendly dog within the house and to this point, homeowners with or without a dog will buy and post a "beware of dog" sign on their property as an added deterrent.

At night, lighting is another deterrent to crime. Exterior sensor lights and interior lights on a timer will make it appear as if your home is occupied at night when you are away. Many burglars will first ring the doorbell of a house they believe is unoccupied to see if anyone is at home because burglars too know all about lights on timers. To easily thwart this you should always leave the light on in a bathroom on a second floor of your house. Bathroom windows are easy to distinguish from other larger second floor windows and a burglar not seeing anyone answer the door after the bell was rung may lead the burglar to believe the resident is in the bathroom and could not hear the bell. Most burglars do not want to confront residents and this uncertainty will usually result in their passing up on breaking into your home. External lighting always limits the ability for burglars to covertly be able to work on trying to pry open a window or a door.

Homeowners on vacation should make sure to stop mail or newspaper deliveries and not have any empty garbage or recycling cans left out in front of house as these are signs the residents are away. Again, motion sensor and timer lights will give the appearance that you are home each night. If your home will

not have any cars left in the driveway see if a neighbor, a relative or friend can park a car in your driveway so the home looks occupied. As the price of gold and silver have never been so high this has resulted in house burglars going directly to master bedrooms to seek out and steal gold and silver jewelry and this is usually found both in jewelry boxes atop the dressers or stored inside of dresser drawers. Jewelry, especially items not worn on a regular basis, should be kept in a secure location that is not located within the master bedroom as burglars only spend a matter of minutes inside of a house and usually only search the bedrooms looking for cash and jewelry. A common technique is to quickly pull out and dump the contents of dresser drawers to look for and retrieve any jewelry or cash and to look under the bed and in the closets of a master bedroom for any small metal security type lock box. These boxes, of which many are fireproof, are commonly used by residents to store money, jewelry, small handguns and many types of important documents ranging from passports to deeds. You must not leave this box anywhere in the master bedroom where it can be easily found as a burglar will always believe that this locked box will have something of value in it and as the box is portable the burglar will merely carry it off and break into it later on. The best locations to store these boxes containing your important papers is either atop a high shelf in your basement or in your attic as burglars never have the time or desire to search these areas.

Motor vehicles when parked, even in your driveway overnight, should have all of the doors locked and the windows fully closed. Eliminate visible enticements to thieves such as GPS units on dash board or a pocketbook, a computer case or a cellular phone on the seat as car burglars will usually look into a car and see an item they want and will then break in. The overwhelming majority of thefts from cars parked overnight in residential driveways in Springfield had the thief merely going from driveway to driveway checking to see if the doors on a parked car were left unlocked.

Readers of the Springfield Patriot Times should be aware that they may already have a security alarm system for their house when they are home. If you have a car that has a remote control that you carry on your key chain then you have the ability to push a panic button on the alarm controller to activate the alarm on your car. If during the night you hear the sound of what may be someone trying to break into your home you should activate the car alarm as this will most likely cause the thief to flee. The non stopping alarm will rouse neighbors to look out their windows and contact the police if for no other reason than to complain about the annoying alarm. Simply leave your car keys on your bed table at night.

The best deterrent to these types of property crimes is for residents who see anything or anyone they deem to be suspicious to immediately contact the police department and to relay the activity they observed so police officers can investigate the situation. Each year your police department is able to apprehend persons engaged in burglaries and thefts due to the alert observations of residents who see something suspicious and called the police. I know that readers of my column in the Springfield Patriot Times may say that they "do not want to bother" the police by reporting something that may turn out to be nothing but this is definitely not a bother to my officers as your police department relies on this type of cooperation from the public to help us stop these crimes before they can occur.

SPRINGFIELD AUXILIARY POLICE HAVE TWO NEW OFFICERS

On Tuesday, October 29, 2013, Todd Abrams and Vitali Kutsyy graduated Basic Auxiliary Police Class #147 at the Essex County Police Academy. They were schooled in traffic & crowd control, search & seizure, hazmat and many other law enforcement topics over the past two months. They join approximately 20 other Auxiliary Officers who are volunteering their time to help the Town. Wally Schultz, OEM Deputy Coordinator and a Captain with the Auxiliary Police said "Our Officers assist and augment the regular Police Department, they patrol the town and are a deterrent to crime. Even just driving our marked Patrol vehicle through a residential neighborhood or shopping center may cause a criminal to decide to move on to another area and not commit a crime here". Scott Seidel, OEM Coordinator, noted our Officers come from all walks of life and just want to give back to their Community, we have a great group of men and women who really care and it shows. They are very professional while working as Auxiliary Officers and take their "volunteer" jobs very seriously. We are always looking for a few good members to help out." Police Chief John Cook commented

"Our Auxiliary Officers are a tremendous asset to our Township. Though they are volunteers, they are held to a high standard of professionalism and take great pride in what they do. A new Basic Auxiliary Police Class is

scheduled to start in February of 2014 and any qualified individual interested in applying can fill out the form which is on the Township's website under Emergency Management and send it to OEM. NEW FLOOD INSURANCE DEADLINE WILL HELP SANDY SURVIVORS

LINCROFT, N.J. - Superstorm Sandy survivors will have more time to file critical paperwork for their flood insurance settlements.

The Federal Emergency Management Agency announced on Oct. 1 that it has extended the deadline for filing proof-of-loss claims for a second time. The new deadline is April 28, 2014.

TOWNSHIP AWARDED GRANT TO ENCOURAGE ENERGY RESILIENCE

The Township of Springfield was awarded a \$177,600 competitive grant from the State Hazardous Mitigation Office, a Division of the State Police. The grant was awarded under the State's Hazard Mitigation Grant Program - Energy Initiative to encourage energy resilience for critical facilities.

The grant will be used to purchase three natural gas standby emergency generators for the Chisholm Community Recreation and Senior Building at 100 South Springfield Ave, the Springfield Library at 66 Mountain Ave and Municipal Town Hall at 100 Mountain Ave. The Chisholm Building has been designated as an emergency shelter for Springfield residents when there is an electric power failure for an extended period of time. According to Scott Seidel, Coordinator of the Springfield Department of Emergency Management, "these three generators were identified in the Township's Post-hurricane Sandy after-action report as actions, along with others, that would make municipal operations more secure and sustainable."

The Township is working on other actions such as portable generators for traffic signals, above ground gasoline and diesel storage tanks to allow police, fire and municipal vehicles a stable source of fuel. In addition, barricades, cones and barrels in a trailer for the Police and training Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) members is now available.

B'NAI B'RITH TO RECEIVE COMMENDATIONS AND PROCLAMATIONS ON ITS 170TH BIRTHDAY

On Tuesday, October 9, 2013, the Springfield township committee recognized the newest volunteer Emergency Medical Technicians of the First Aid Squad.

As the primary emergency medical services agency for the town, the Squad depends on volunteers and donations to fulfill its role. "While no experience is needed to join, since we team up new members with experienced EMTs, it's great to have so many new EMTs ready to go out and help our community as well as mentor future volunteers," said Squad's Captain Apu.

So far in 2013, the Squad has had eleven of its volunteers complete the 200+ hours of classroom instruction, hospital internships and online training. "The

EMT course was expanded a few years ago and we were worried that it would make it more difficult for our volunteers to find the time to complete all of its requirements," said Squad President Elizabeth J. Fritzen. "Our members all have full schedules outside of the Squad. They are students, work full-time or even two jobs, and have family obligations too."

Two days later, on October 10, the Squad had two EMTs recognized along with members of the Overlook Medical Center Emergency Department, for their care of a stroke patient.

"Two million brain cells die every minute during stroke," said Joy Eboras, RN, the hospital's Stroke Coordinator. "Caring for a stroke requires team work, from friends and family recognizing the initial symptoms through to care for the patient after discharge."

In this case, the patient was attending a funeral when she began experiencing weakness on one side of her body and slurred speech. The Springfield First Aid Squad, along with the police & fire department and paramedics from Overlook, responded to treat the patient on scene and during the transport to the hospital. Care was transferred to the hospital staff and the patient received a clot-busting medication sixteen minutes after arriving at the hospital, a new record at Overlook. The national standard is to have the drug delivered within 60 minutes of the patient arriving at the hospital.

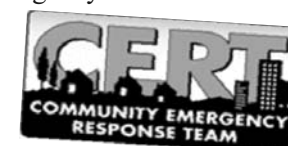

WINTER BULK GARBAGE PICKUP IS HERE - DECEMBER 11-12

It's that time of year again...so start getting your old things you no longer want ready for bulk garbage pickup on Wednesday, December 11 and Thursday, December 12.

If your garbage is picked up on Thursday, your bulk pickup will be December 11, Wednesday. If your garbage pickup is Friday, your bulk pickup will be December 12, Thursday.

All material should be out at curb side the evening before pickup.

Bulk waste is comprised of a collection of large and/or non-routine waste items collected on a quarterly basis. Bulk waste constitutes larger household waste including household furniture, appliances, light brush not to exceed six feet in length, bundled and tied and not to exceed 60 pounds, broken crockery, carpeting, not to exceed six feet in length, rolled and tied, not to exceed 60 pounds, hot water heaters, and barbecue grills.

Specifically excluded are construction material and debris such as sheet rock, lumber, pipe and panelling, concrete and large rocks, stones or logs greater than six inches in diameter, stumps and tree roots, recyclables, electronic items* (computers, televisions, etc.), video games, propane tanks and all other hazardous waste. Refrigerators and freezers must have the doors removed. Freon no longer has to be removed by the homeowner from air conditioners, freezers, and all other cooling devices.

Plan now for December 11 and 12. *Please note: All electronic items such as computers, printers, televisions, etc. are to be recycled on the first Saturday of every month at the Springfield Pool between the hours of 7:00 am – 11:00 am. 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ADULT HEALTH SCREENING

Men and women are encouraged to check their heart health at the Adult Health Screening on Wednesday, December 4, 2013 starting at 8 a.m. The screening includes the CMP (comprehensive metabolic profile blood analysis), blood pressure checks, information on cholesterol and diet, fitness and preventing osteoporosis. The CMP analysis includes total cholesterol, HDL and LDL cholesterol, CBC and other blood components.

Residents of Madison and Springfield may participate in the screening at the Madison Health Department. Registration is required for the program and appointments may be made by calling 973-593-3079 ext. 1 on weekdays starting November 7. Residents are charged a non-refundable fee of \$25.00 for the CMP blood test payable within the registration period. Participants should have their physician's name, address and telephone no. ready when they call.

All adults are advised to know their cholesterol numbers. As obesity and overweight have increased to an estimated 60% of the population in the U.S., cholesterol has also risen to dangerous levels. A cholesterol reading of under 200mg/dl is recommended, but the levels of HDL and LDL, components of cholesterol, are also of major importance for good heart health. Dietary fats, fiber, and exercise can all affect cholesterol levels. Information on lowering cholesterol levels will be available at the screening.

The screening is offered by the Madison Health Department in their offices at the Madison Civic Center, 28 Walnut Street, Madison with parking behind the building. Entrance is through the glass doors on the side of the building and down the stairs to the offices on the right.

All residents of Madison and Springfield may participate annually in the screening.

If your child needs volunteer hours, the Springfield Recreation Dept. has many opportunities for the youth in Springfield to achieve these hours.

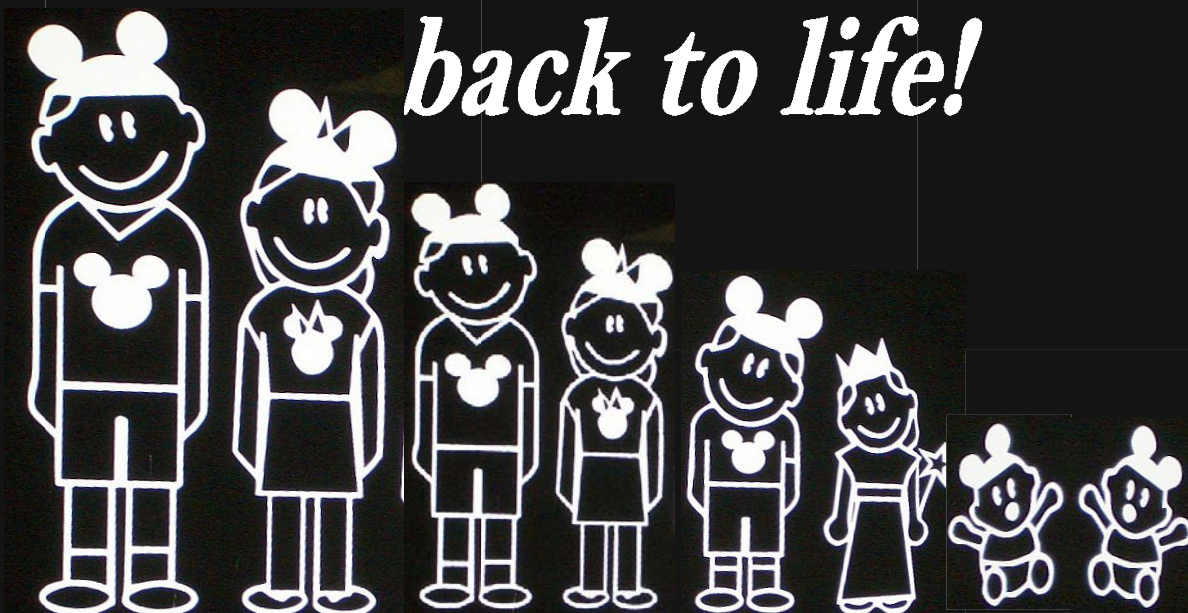
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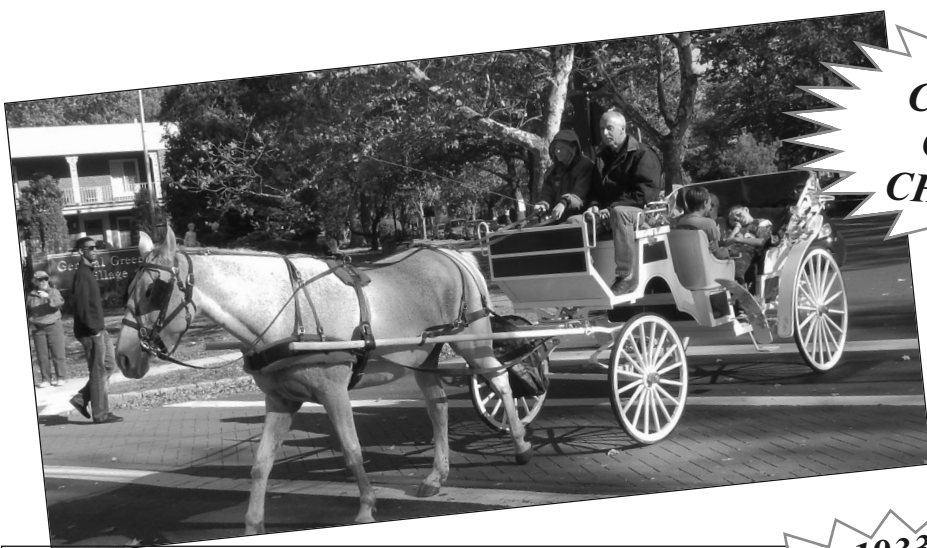
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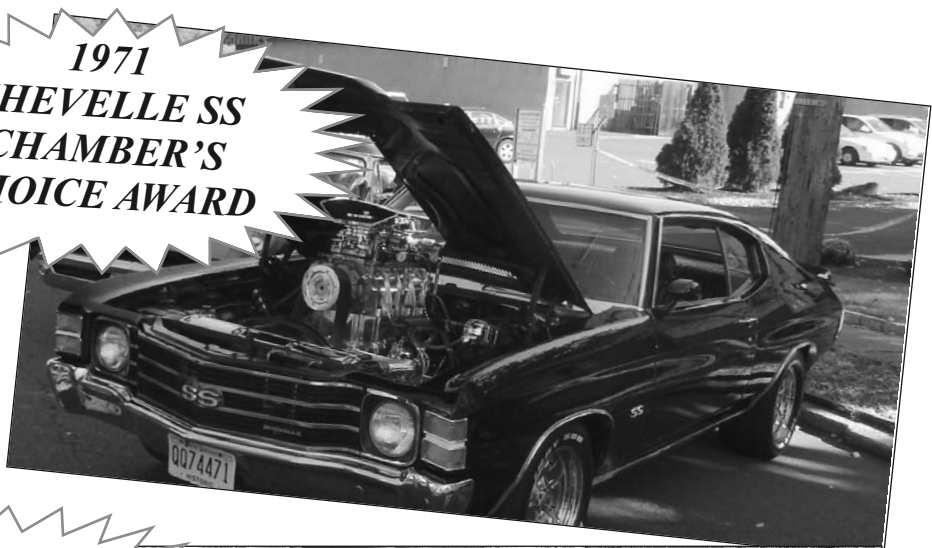
