"I want to thank the Honorable Mayor and members of the Springfield Township Committee for this annual swearing in of the Squad's new Officers each year and for recognizing our organization. We are humbled by your thoughts of us and your support.

The Springfield First Aid Squad has served the community with emergency medical services for over 70 years. This past year of course was a challenge for all of us.

First, let me speak about our members. When Springfield needed us, we were there.

Our members put themselves on the front line of the COVID 19 pandemic for the residents of Springfield and all of Springfield.

During the Spring of 2020, the world changed. The Springfield First Aid Squad responded to over 140 COVID 19 related calls alone. We added additional crews to

be available for all of the COVID related emergencies as well as our routine calls; traffic accidents and medical, heart attacks and strokes. Our members never shirked their duties or responsibility even when they were at high risk with a pandemic raging.

In those months we almost doubled our one- year supply costs. We hunted like the rest of the world for PPE supplies andbargains were few! We added additional in house crews to be available for our uptick of call volume.

To continue to keep our residents and EMS providers safe, we have to aggressively maintain and exceed supply levels and staffing. The future of this virus is just unknown.

But do know that your First Aid Squad is prepared to be there for you!

Our members continue to amaze with their dedication!!

Thank you all once again for this great honor!"

"A TALE OF TWO CHIEFS"

In Springfield, when you say Chief Palumbo you have to be more specific. Do you mean Fire Chief Carlo Palumbo or Auxiliary Police Chief Angelo Palumbo? Springfield is very lucky to have the Palumbo brothers in key leadership positions in Public Safety.

Fire Chief Carlo Palumbo has been part of the Springfield Fire Department since 1995 when he became a member of the volunteer group. After three years in that role, he became a member of the career department in 1998. In 2006 he was promoted to Fire Captain and served as a tour commander.

In 2012 he was promoted to the rank of Deputy Fire Chief where he managed the day-to-day operations. In 2014 Palumbo was promoted to his current position as Chief, where he has 25 Career Firefighters under his command as the Chief of Department. He holds an Associate's Degree in Fire Technology and a Bachelor Degree in Fire Safety Administration.

Palumbo has had a distinguished career as a firefighter in Springfield. He was one of the initial waves of first responders to respond to New York on 9/11. Over his career, Palumbo has received several awards and citations including EMS Medal of Distinction from New Jersey State F.M.B.A. for his part in an emergency childbirth.

Carlo is very active in the community and in various fire-related organizations. He is a Trustee of Springfield HOPE and is on Union County College Advisory Committee for the Fire Science program.

In an exclusive interview with the Patriot Times, Carlo said "I believe strongly in being active as well as involved in community service. I feel it is imperative to continuously educate and work closely together with other agencies to ensure public safety".

Angelo Palumbo has been a member of the Springfield Volunteer Auxiliary Police since 1991 and his celebrating his 30th year of service. After attending the Union County Auxiliary Police Academy, he was a patrolman working regular patrol shifts each month. Angelo was promoted to Sergeant in 2000, Lieutenant in 2002, Captain in 2008 and finally he became the fifth Chief in the history of the Auxiliary Police in 2012. In that capacity, he leads a group of around 20 volunteers who respond to Township emergencies 24/7.

During his years in the unit, he participated in major events such as hurricanes Floyd, Irene and Sandy, major blizzards, fires and major traffic incidents. He has logged over 4000 hours of volunteer service to the Township. On two occasions, in 1992 and 2014, he received the coveted Auxiliary Police Officer of the Year award for his outstanding service.

In an exclusive interview with the Patriot Times, Angelo said "I've totally enjoyed being a member of the Auxiliary Police helping the Township and giving back to the town I grew up in".



FIRÉ DEPARTMENT: IN RESPONSE **TO THE COVID-19 OUTBREAK 2021**

In response to the COVID-19 outbreak and subsequent social distancing policies, the Springfield Fire Department would like to communicate to the public the adjustments in which we will be operating.

Emergency response will not change. Our station is fully staffed and able to respond to any emergencies that the community might face. Our first responders will be instituting enhanced personal protective equipment and procedures such as:

- Maintaining six feet of distance for initial assessment, when possible.
- Donning enhanced PPE on calls of suspected respiratory infection or flu- like symptoms.
- Placing mask on patient, when possible.
- An Isolation and Quarantine Contingency Plan has been established for the safety of Fire Department personnel.

Fire Inspections and Certificate of Smoke Detector Compliance for Home Sales protocols were modified

Altered protocols:

- Home Sale Smoke Detector Compliance via signed notarized affidavit
- All Fire Protection reports will be reviewed remotely

Springfield Fire Headquarters is closed to the public

- Notices are posted on the front door of Headquarters, directing visitors to call the station to conduct business.
- All personnel, in the Headquarters and office positions, are practicing social distancing.
- Employees are encouraged to maintain the recommended 6-foot distance from one another.
- Conference calls or Zoom sessions are being used in place of in-person meetings.

SPRINGFIELD EMERGENCY **MANAGEMENT RECEIVES \$10,000 GRANT** FROM 2019 AND APPLIES FOR 2021

The Township recently received a \$10,000 New Jersey Emergency Management Agency Assistance grant previously awarded by the State of New Jersey Division of Law and Public Safety. The grant involved the submission of a detailed plan enhancing the Township's preparedness for responding to acts of terrorism, natural disasters and other catastrophic events. Very detailed documentation and reporting is required to qualify for these grants and Jennifer Sherman, the Office of Emergency Management's Administrative Assistant prepared the necessary documentation for review by the Office of Emergency Management Staff, Deputy Coordinators Apu Mullick, Frank Applegate, Sergeant Ryan Westover and Office of Emergency Management Coordinator Scott Seidel. According to Seidel. "These submissions are very detailed and need to be submitted in a very specific manner or they get rejected. Jennifer has worked on these before and is very familiar with the requirements." The Township has already submitted its annual request for 2021's Grant.

Springfield Office of Emergency Management has also submitted their "HAZARD MITIGATION PLAN 2020 FOR SPRINGFIELD TO UNION COUNTY". The purpose of a mitigation plan is to rationalize the process of determining appropriate hazard mitigation actions. Hazard mitigation is often defined as actions taken to reduce the effects of natural hazards on a place and its population. Union County decided to develop the original 2010 Plan because of increasing awareness that natural hazards, especially flood and wind, have the potential to affect people, physical assets and operations in Union County. The 2015 Union County HMP update included a re-evaluation of the original hazards, the risk assessment, mitigation goals, strategies, and mitigation priorities. As part of the update process, these sections of the Plan were re-assessed to identify changes and updates that may have occurred since approval and adoption of the original Plan. This plan involves coordination within the Township with Police, Fire, First Aid Squad, Department of Public Works, Engineering, Building and other Departments to identity potential hazards.

If I remember right, I called from Vietnam to a HAM radio operator in the states who then connected me to my girlfriend in NYC. The connection was terrible and half the time the connection was lost but it was a connection, and it was great to hear her voice. On a more pertinent topic, I read where the VA is getting the COVID vaccine and will be calling veterans to arrange for the inoculation. This is another source for getting the vaccine. If you get a call from the VA be sure to answer it or you may lose you place in line. Happy New Year.



Police Chief's Column Chief John P. Cook

I would first like to wish all of the readers of the Springfield Patriot Times a happy, healthy, and safe New Year.

The police department continues to deal with reports of incidents involving fraudulent activity targeting the public. While these scams may unfold in different ways, the end result is always the same – the perpetrators defraud the victims of their money. Luckily, many financial institutions will rectify fraudulent transactions, but full resolution of these situations can turn in to major hassles for victims. Thieves may attempt to use their victim's breached personal information to open unauthorized accounts or make fraudulent purchases for a long time after the initial fraud is detected.

One type of fraud that continues to occur frequently involves criminals utilizing their victims' stolen identities to open cellular phone accounts, then fraudulently purchasing high-end cellular phones and tablets through the accounts. These accounts are often created on the internet, and the phones and tablets are shipped to the victims' actual addresses. The criminals will closely watch the tracking information for the packages, and attempt to intercept the deliveries before the victims are able to retrieve the packages. In some cases, the criminals will fabricate false ID cards, displaying their photo along with the victim's personal information, and ask the delivery drivers to hand the packages over directly to them. Often times, if the criminals are successful in intercepting the packages, the victim will have no idea this type of fraud took place until they receive notification from a collections service or run a credit check. Luckily, most of the large mail and parcel services are now aware of these types of scams, and their employees are on the lookout for vehicles following them through their routes. However, some companies utilize smaller delivery operations, or subcontract their deliveries to smaller companies during times of high volume. Residents and business owners should be aware of any suspicious vehicles which are parked and occupied for extended periods during times when their mail or other packages are normally delivered, and contact the police department. It is a good idea to periodically run your credit report to verify your open accounts and check for any unauthorized activity. Many banks and credit card companies offer this to their clients free of charge, but if yours doesn't, don't worry -- everyone is entitled to one free copy of their credit report every 12 months from each of the three nationwide credit reporting companies (https://www.ftc.gov/faq/consumerprotection/get-my-free-credit-report).

Another scam that has sustained popularity involves individuals posing as social security agents who contact potential victims via telephone and falsely report that their social security numbers have been compromised. People that fall victim to these scams not only breach their personal information by providing it directly to these scammers over the phone, they are also defrauded out of thousands of dollars as the scammers direct them to purchase gift cards, bitcoin, or other electronic currency for payment of "fees" to resolve their accounts. Scammers will threaten their victims that US Marshalls or other law enforcement officials will show up at their residence and arrest them if the payments are not made within a certain time frame. According to the Social Security Administration, you will always receive prior notification by mail or telephone before a personal visit is made by one of their agents. You can call them at 1-800-772-1213 (TTY 1-800-325-0778) to verify the identity of the Social Security employee who has contacted you.

Very few instances exist in which you may have to provide confidential personal information over the phone, text message, or email. You should take every precaution to safeguard your social security number, bank account numbers, credit/debit card numbers, and other personal identifying information. If something doesn't seem quite right, you should initiate contact with the company or agency directly by looking up the telephone numbers yourself, to verify the situation.

If you feel you may have fallen victim to one of these scams, contact the Police Department for assistance and for more information.

Yes Gerry you remember correctly! MARS stands for Military Auxiliary Radio Service, and is operated by Ham Radio operators to this day. A ham operator in Vietnam, contacted one in the states, who was able to use their telephone to make the call and connect his radio to the the "Bell" telephone system with a "phone patch". I'm sure it's hard for many people today to relate to not being in instant communication with someone--where off the grid was your normal state! Atmospheric and radio conditions affected communications and it would not always be clear, but it was contact! The Military Auxiliary Radio System is a civilian auxiliary program of the Department of Defense and is composed of licensed amateur (Ham) radio operators who are interested in assisting the military with communications on a word wide level when access to normal forms of communication are not available.
