Message from the Mayor



The Township is off to a great start in 2017! I would first like to congratulate Police Sergeant Joe Cieri on his retirement, newly promoted Detective Anthony Voorhees and newly hired Police Officer Anthony Kassis. Several new businesses in town celebrated their grand openings and for that, we're grateful that they are choosing to make Springfield their home. I would also like to thank all the public safety agencies for their excellent preparation in response to the coastal storm that was forecasted to bring significant hazardous weather to Springfield. Fortunately, it did not materialize but it was a reminder of our need to always be ready. That is why we are committed to being active participants in the Rahway River Watershed Flood Control Council with neighboring communities. We are investing in the financial resources necessary

to ensure the Army Corps of Engineers undertakes long-promised plans for flood relief and that Congress funds these improvements. On February 15, Deputy Mayor Maria Vassallo will be joining other officials on a trip to Washington D.C. to meet with our representatives and discuss this important project.

The team in Town Hall has been preparing the annual budget, which is still on track for adoption in April. In less than 2 months, I'm proud to say that we've implemented some cost-saving measures to reduce expenses by several thousand dollars. This will be very helpful to offset increases in other contractual obligations and lost tax revenue. The public is encouraged to attend our three budget hearings for more detailed information. Department heads will be available to explain their budgets and answer questions at a daytime session at 2 pm on Tuesday, March 14 and an evening session at 6 pm on Tuesday, March 14.

With three meetings already in the books, we've been busy at work and wasting no time. Before you know it, pool season will be upon us. In anticipation of that, we've been working with our Recreation Director to start getting the staffing in place and vendor agreements approved. In the coming weeks, we expect to receive a fiscal analysis report on our pool operations and the future plans for the pool capital improvement project announced last year. Once this is reviewed and a strategy put in place, we will chart a course for construction to begin at the end of the 2017 pool season. More details will be announced at Township Committee meetings and the public will be invited to offer feedback/input. As one of the few sources of revenue for the Township, it is important that we take necessary action to ensure the successful future of the pool.

SPRINGFIELD BID HOLDS REDEVELOPMENT MEETING WITH MORRIS AVE PROPERTY OWNERS

On Wednesday, February 8th, the Business Improvement District hosted a meeting with all the Morris Avenue Business and Property owners at Sofia's Restaurant in Springfield with over 30 + in attendance. Presenting was Business Improvement District Chairman, Mike Scalera, BID Executive Director Beth Lippman, Springfield Business Administrator Ziad Shehady and Redevelopment Attorney Matt Jessup. Topics discussed were the future of redevelopment on Morris Avenue, including the pending demolition and reconstruction of the "Lyons" building.

Also discussed was marketing strategies, the BID "APP", the streetscape project on Mountain Avenue, new way finding signs, Business Success Kit and window "wraps" for vacant buildings pending renovation. BID Chairman Mike Scalera addressed the group and told them "Redevelopment on Morris Avenue has been a 5 year + project, we have invested heavily in planning and now stand on the edge of seeing a new revitalized Springfield within the next couple of years". We reached out to the community 5 years ago and heard the frustration from both the residents and businesses that "nothing can or will be done". Our Board agreed that doing nothing was not an option. We understood that to get it done we needed to facilitate getting the property owners together to begin a dialogue. This process does not happen easily or quickly, but we have all pledged our time to make it happen."

THE MAYORS COUNCIL FOR THE RAHWAY RIVER WATERSHED FLOOD CONTROL GOES TO WASHINGTON DC

The Mayors Council for the Rahway River Watershed Flood Control Project will be heading to Washington DC February 15 to urge the Congress to appropriate in President Trump's first budget funds to begin the engineering and preconstruction work on the Rahway River Flood Mitigation plan.

Bolstered by the federal US Army Corps of Engineers draft environmental impact statement that said there are no impacts that can't be mitigated with reasonable actions, the Mayors will be asking that the Chief Engineers final report be completed and that plans for construction begin. The Mayors expect to meet with Congressman Leonard Lance; Congressman Donald Payne; Senator Corey Booker; Senator Robert Menendez, and senior staff of the US Army Corps of Engineers.

Cranford Mayor Tom Hannen said, "Over \$100 million of damages were faced by residents along the Rahway River during Irene. The Mayors have kept their eye on the ball to ensure progress and we appreciate our federal and state representatives who have been behind us all the way."

Alternative 4a includes modification to the Orange Reservoir, adding two 36 inch outfall pipes permitting the reservoir to be drained two days before a major storm to reduce significantly the water elevation downstream during the major storm event. There will be downstream channel improvements through Cranford with one and one-half mile of channel deepening with most of the channel work done in the river, not on land. Also there is expected to be lifting or acquisition of numerous properties in the City of Rahway. The plan had the strongest benefit cost ratio as part of the federal process meaning the project benefits (less flood damages) exceeded project costs. The Mayors Council includes 2017 Mayors of the affected communities: Cranford Mayor Thomas Hannen; Union Mayor Suzette Cavadas; Rahway Mayor Sam Steinman; Kenilworth Mayor Anthony Deluca; Springfield Mayor Diane Stampoulos; Millburn Mayor Cheryl Burstein; Maplewood Mayor Victor DeLuca.



AVOIDING MICROWAVE FIRES AND BURNS

Microwave ovens have simplified cooking and reheating foods in homes everywhere. However, according to the National Fire Protection Association, microwave use results in thousands of home fires each year. Microwave burns cause more emergency room scald burn injuries than any other cooking device. One third of these scalds involve children under five years of age.

With such widespread use of microwaves by people of all ages, it's important for consumers to know how to use them safely. The Springfield Fire Department wants to give you simple tips to help prevent microwave fires and scald burns:

- Read the manufacturer's instructions before using a microwave oven.
- Plug the microwave directly into an outlet. Using an extension cord can overload the circuit and cause a fire.
- Use only microwave-safe cookware.
- Open food heated in the microwave slowly, and hold it away from your face to prevent scalding from steam.
- Never heat a baby bottle in a microwave oven because it heats liquids unevenly. Heat baby bottles in warm water.
- Never use aluminum foil or other metal objects in the microwave.
- If you have a fire in your microwave, turn the oven off immediately and keep the door closed. Do not open the door until the fire is completely out. Have the microwave serviced before using it again. When in doubt, get out of the home and call the fire department.

Please be mindful that even foods cooked in the microwave present a risk of burns. If you are burned, this injury requires immediate attention. First, put the affected area in cool water for three to five minutes. Then, cover with a clean, dry cloth. If the burn is bigger than your fist, or if you have questions about caring for the injury, seek medical attention right away.

This month, we are featuring Dr. Gary Hecht



Born in Merrick, NY, Gary was civic minded from a very young age – active in student government and his college fraternity at SUNY Albany. After receiving his degree, Doctor of Chiropractic from the prestigious New York Chiropractic College, Gary began his practice in New York City. After two years, he relocated to New Jersey and in 1997 opened his first office in Springfield. It was then that he became very active in the Springfield Community and his involvement has continued to grow over the past 20 years.

It didn't take very long for Gary to become immersed in community service. In 1998, he joined the Springfield Rotary Club and currently serves as its treasurer. Around the same time, he became a leader of LeTip of Springfield – a business networking organization.

Through interaction with a couple of his new Springfield patients, Gary learned about various other activities unique to Springfield and expanded his community involvement. In 2009, Springfield H.O.P.E. was looking for a new point of contact for its clients. Gary stepped up to the plate, became a trustee and opened his office as the 'face' of H.O.P.E. to the community. Today, anyone seeking help meets confidentially with Gary at his office. Also in 2009, when the annual 'Toys for Tots' campaign transformed into 'Toys for Springfield Kids.' Gary opened his office and for many years transformed his office into Santa's Workshop and distributed toys to needy families in Springfield. Every Thanksgiving, in a joint initiative between H.O.P.E., the Springfield Rotary Club, Stew Leonard's and Shop Rite, Gary and other volunteers deliver food baskets to over 20 families in Springfield. In 2012, Gary joined the Board of the Springfield's Mayor's Day Scholarship Fund.

In an exclusive interview with the Patriot Times, Gary began by saying, "Why don't you do the article about H.O.P.E. – not me". PLEASE READ THIS TO RECOGNIZE THE "PHONY TAXMAN" IRS SCAMS

In my Patriot Times column this month, I would like to alert you to the increasing amount of bunco scams being committed against township residents by either telephone calls or via the internet. Variations of one scam that are ongoing year long but increase during the months leading up to April are commonly referred to as the "IRS Tax Scams" and this increase is obviously due to April being the time of year that we all have to pay our taxes. These crimes increase dramatically in the months prior to and during the month of April all across the country and unfortunately they also will increase in Springfield. The police department will receive calls weekly from residents who have either been targeted, or regretfully, fallen victim to these scams. In order to help you recognize the IRS scams and not be taken in by them I ask you to do what the heading of this column says which is to just take a moment to read this in order to recognize the "phony taxman"

IRS SCAM #1 (This is done by telephone)
Fraudsters, most operating outside of the United States, will contact an intended victim claiming to be from the Internal Revenue Service (IRS) or U.S. Treasury Department to inform the victim the he or she owes taxes and that a warrant for their arrest has been or is to be issued. The caller will "offer" a way to avoid arrest which will be by having the victim immediately pay a specified amount of money and if this is done the caller will indicate that the arrest warrant will be cancelled and or not issued.

If the victim initially balks at having to pay immediately, the caller usually will say that he or she is a special agent for the IRS and will threaten that government agents will be dispatched to the victim's home. In some occasions the caller may even say that officers from the Springfield Police Department are on the way to arrest the victim.

Once a victim agrees to pay the back taxes and or fines, the caller will require that the payment is either made by a loadable type of debit card sold at numerous convenience and drug stores known as a Green Dot VISA Money Pack or similar type of card where the funds can be loaded into the card and the fraudsters can retrieve the funds by merely having the victim read off certain numbers on the rear of the card. A secondary method of payment is by Western Union or Money Gram wires. If the victim agrees to make the payment, the fraudsters will even specify the nearest business to the victim's residence where the cards or money wire can be obtained.

Fraudsters are beginning to use robo-calls to increase the amount of persons who can be targeted. Instead of an actual person calling, the victim will receive an automated phone call where the message purports to be from the IRS and indicates there is a problem with your taxes or a recently filed tax return. A number is left for the victim to call which will go directly to the fraudsters. Listen to the message and you may notice accents, incorrect word usage or improper sentence structure as the callers are frequently from overseas.

IRS SCAM #2 (This is done by e-mail)

The victim will receive an e-mail that purports to be from the IRS. It will look very authentic and will have the logos for the U.S. Treasury Department and the IRS on the e-mail. The e-mail will indicate some type of problem much the same as the scams done by telephone and the victim will be prompted to click on a link to get the full information.

Most of these bogus links take you to a site where you will be told how to immediately make a payment by entering your credit or debit card account number while other links will try to obtain your identity information or may introduce a virus into your computer.

IRS SCAM #3 (Identity Theft to File False Returns)

Another problem that occurs this time of year is when an unknown person uses your true identity including your Social Security number (SSN) to file a fraudulent tax return in your name but where a tax refund is sent to a different address. As your annual tax return submission to the IRS is verified by your SSN, the minute you submit your real return the IRS will contact you once they discover two returns filed in the same year with the same SSN. In this case you may actually be contacted by the real IRS by telephone but mostly this is done by the U.S. Mail. The "real" IRS will understand if you may not believe the call is legitimate. They will explain the problem to you and tell you how to go about contacting the IRS off of their true website at www.IRS.gov and they will not require you to give out any personal information or account numbers on the telephone.

IMPORTANT TIPS TO REMEMBER.....

• The IRS will not contact you by telephone to request an immediate payment for back taxes, unfiled returns and any penalties. The IRS uses the U.S. Mail.

• Do not click on links from any e-mail purporting to be from the IRS where you are being required to make some type of immediate payment. Write down the information from the e-mail and contact the IRS yourself via www.IRS.gov or by getting the telephone number for the nearest IRS field office.

• The IRS, much like any other agency that has the power to seek the issuance of a warrant for your arrest, will never call you in advance to inform you of a warrant AND agree to dismiss a warrant in lieu of some type of monetary payment. Once an actual warrant is issued for your arrest you may be able to post bail but you will first be arrested.

Any telephone call offering you a way to pay to avoid being arrested is an outright scam.

• If you receive one of these types of communications supposedly from the IRS and you are unsure if it is legitimate or not, please just do one thing before opting to give away thousands of dollars. Please call the Springfield Police Department at 973-376-0400 so that we can help prevent you from falling victim to these scams.

"But that said, we can't think of another team in Springfield's history that was undefeated, untied and unscored upon. This may have been the best Minutemen football team the town has ever fielded. We are already looking forward to the 25th anniversary reunion."

A substantial amount of hours were performed on the Fourth of July. spent 200 hours at the Academy in training."



Winter Safety Tip: Before you Hit the Road, Clear Your Tail Pipe

If ice and snow have come your way, not all of the hazards of driving are on the road in front of you. Before you get in the driver's seat, check to be sure that your vehicle's tailpipe is clear of snow. If the tailpipe is blocked, carbon monoxide, an odorless, colorless, and deadly gas produced by your engine, can build up quickly inside your vehicle, poisoning anyone inside. Are You Prepared?

If a disaster strikes in your community, you might not have access to food, water, or electricity for several days. 
