CHAMBERS AND COURTROOM DEDICATED TO KENNETH FAIGENBAUM, **JANUARY 1 PROCLAIMED OFFICIAL DAY OF REMEMBRANCE**

Springfield proclaims January 1 as an Official Day of Remembrance honoring the late Mayor Kenneth Faigenbaum. At its regular meeting on Tuesday November 24th, the Township Committee dedicated the Committee Chambers and Municipal Courtroom in memory of the late Kenneth Faigenbaum.

On August 8, 2009, the Township of Springfield lost one of its most dedicated and prominent public servants. Kenneth Faigenbaum was born January 1, 1952 in New Jersey, raised in Newark and Union and is survived by his wife Alison, their son Jay and their daughters Marla and Amie.

Ken worked tirelessly as a Certified Public Accountant and committed himself to the Township of Springfield for nineteen years serving on the Board of Education and six years on the Township Committee.

Ken is recognized for his terms as Mayor and as President of the Board of Education, positions that he earned not only with his excellent credentials, but also with his experience and tireless efforts on various sub-committees, boards, and

Ken was an immensely concerned resident, neighbor who devoted 25 years of his life to serving the community. With his intellect, optimism, strength and humor, he inspired friends, family and colleagues.

In a packed chamber, friends, colleagues and elected officials took turns recalling their memories of Ken and thanking his family for sharing him with the community.

On behalf of Congress, Congressman Leonard Lance presented Ken's wife, Alison, with an American Flag that has flown over the United States capitol building in Washington, DC, he stated that local service like Ken's is the hardest as it is the closest to the public. He commended those who are willing to serve at great cost to family.

Assemblywoman Nancy Munoz, speaking on behalf of herself, Senator Tom Kean, Jr., and Assemblyman Jon Bramnick, said they all honored Ken for his service to the community. Assemblywoman Munoz, who was elected to office to fill her husband's unexpired term after he passed away, spoke directly to Alison Faigenbaum when she said "I understand your pain". She regretted that she hadn't had the chance to get to know Ken better, but she recalled that he was well respected by her late husband.

Union County freeholder Bette Jane Kowalski presented the family with a resolution from the freeholders and recalled that Ken was a good friend and dedicated public servant.

Former Mayor Sy Millman, visibly upset, stated "Kenny was the closest thing I've ever had to a brother; I will love and miss him forever. He was the most wonderful person, so devoted to this township's children and people."

Jackie Shanes, member of the Springfield Board of Education, recalled Ken as a mentor and a thoughtful dedicated member of the board.



Fire Chief's Column Chief James Sanford

TIPS FOR A FIRE SAFE HOLIDAY

The holidays are a time to enjoy family and friends and reflect on those things that are the most important to each of us. As Fire Chief, my primary goal is the safety of the Township's firefighters and residents. By 5. If using decorative, electric menorahs, use following these commonsense, but often overlooked, safety tips you will be able to enjoy a happy and safe holiday season with your family and friends.

Chanukah

- and lighters out of the reach of small children and pets and at least 4 feet away from curtains and other flammable objects.
- 2. When lighting and blessing candles, make when you put your hands over the flames. Never leave burning candles unattended.
- 3. Create a safe place in the house in which multiple candles can be lit and be aware of the large amount of heat the candles generate. Do not place candles under kitchen cabinets or on top of tablecloths and make sure all candles are in a sturdy base that will not tip over.
- 4. When frying latkes, keep all children away from the hot oil. Make sure all pan handles are turned inward on the stove so they can't accidentally be bumped and spill hot oil. A

- frying screen can help prevent grease splatters. In case of a grease fire, always have baking soda and a tight-fitting lid to your pan nearby. Never put water on a grease fire!
- only UL approved appliances and cords. Inspect all cords for frayed wires or broken sockets. Turn off the menorah when you go to bed or leave the house.

Christmas

- 1. Keep the menorah, oil, candles, matches 1. Artificial Trees Trees should be labeled "Fire Resistant." Although this label does not mean the tree won't catch fire, it does indicate the tree will resist burning and any flames should extinguish quickly.
- sure not to accidentally set your sleeves on fire 2. Live Trees Special fire safety precautions need to be taken when keeping a cut tree in the house. A tree can become engulfed in flames in less than 5 seconds, and the entire room can be engulfed in well under a minute. A burning tree will rapidly fill a room with fire and deadly both gases.

When choosing a tree, the needles should be green and hard to pull from the branches and the trunk should be sticky. Two weeks is about the most time a cut tree should spend in the house. Keep the tree stand filled with water at all times. Do not place the tree near a heat source. The heat will dry out the tree,

- causing it to be more easily ignited. When disposing the tree, never put tree branches or needles in a fireplace or wood burning
- 3. Decorations All holiday decorations should be non-flammable or flameretardant and placed away from heating vents. Never use lit candles to decorate a tree. If you use candles to decorate a room, make sure they are in stable holders and placed them where they cannot be easily knocked over. Never leave a burning candle unattended and always extinguish it before going to sleep.
- 4. Electricity Inspect holiday lights each year for frayed wires, bare spots, gaps in the insulation, broken or cracked sockets, loose bulb connections and excessive kinking or wear before putting them up. Limit the use of extension cords and avoid multi-adaptors. Follow manufacturer's instruction on how to use all lights. Generally, do not link more than three light strands. Make sure to periodically check all wires - they should not be warm to the touch. Unplug the Christmas tree lights when you go to sleep or leave the house. Don't run a cord under a rug or carpet and be careful when placing cords behind furniture--if pinched, cords can be damaged. Do not use indoor extension cords outside -- use only those that are made specifically for outdoor use. Keep outdoor extension cords above ground and out of puddles and snow.

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SPRINGFIELD VETERAN RECEIVES STATE'S TOP MILITARY AWARD

On November 9, 2009 Retired Army Col. Stephen G. Abel, Deputy Commissioner for Veterans Affairs, New Jew Jersey Department of Military and Veterans Affairs, presented the Distinguished Service Medal to Larry Burns, a WWII veteran from Springfield.

The ceremony was held at the Woodbridge Center shopping mall to honor and recognize the accomplishments of New Jersey Veterans. They are held in shopping malls nearly every month to bring greater awareness to the general public of the sacrifices they made. There is hope that the publicity helps in finding the more than 10,000 New Jersey veterans who are entitled to be receiving benefits but are not.

More than four dozen veterans from Middlesex (44) and Union (4) counties were honored at the mall's center court for their service in World War II, Korea, Vietnam, Operation Desert Storm / Desert Shield and Operations Iraqi and Enduring Freedom.

The New Jersey Distinguished Service Medal was originally issued in 1858 for those who distinguished themselves in the New Jersey Militia, but was used infrequently until reauthorized by then-Gov. Thomas Kean in 1988 for that purpose. The award is New Jersey's highest military honor. Since its reauthorization in 1988, more than 30,000 medals have been awarded to combat veterans in the state.

Veterans eligible for the award must be a New Jersey resident, have been a state resident at the time she/he entered military service, been honorably discharged and have proof of serving in combat while on active duty during wartime. The award can be given posthumously to the next-of-kin of veterans who meet the criteria. For more information please visit www.state.nj.us/military or call (609) 530-6980.

ALEXANDER STURM IS SPRINGFIELD'S NEWEST EAGLE SCOUT

Board of Review as Springfield's newest Eagle Scout, the highest rank in Scouting. He was presented with the award at a Court of Honor ceremony on Saturday, December 5th, at St. James the Apostle Church hall.

Sturm has been a member of Troop 73 for almost seven years, having "crossed over" from Cub Pack 73 in February of 2003. During those years, he and his Scouting friends have been on countless outings and engaged in many adventurous activities, including caving, climbing, backpacking, rifle shooting, archery, canoeing, and kayaking. He has served in leadership roles as Scribe, Patrol Leader, Troop Guide, Quartermaster, and Senior Patrol Leader.


In 2005, Alex was elected to the Order of the Arrow, Scouting's national honor society. He is very active in that organization, having served as a committee chairman, and contingent leader for the 2006 and 2009 national conferences. As a leader of the Lodge, he attended the OA's National Leadership Seminar in 2007. Currently, he serves as Vice Chief of Administration, one of the leading positions in Woapalanne Lodge. This past May, Alex was the recipient of the Vigil Honor, the highest honor in the Order of the Arrow. Fewer boys receive this honor every year than earn the rank of Eagle, and those are only about 4 percent of boys who register as Scouts. In addition, he now sits on the Patriots' Path Council's Youth Executive Committee.

In order to earn the Eagle Scout rank, a Scout has to have progressed through the hierarchy of lower ranks, served in leadership positions, and earned twenty-one Merit Badges, 12 of which are required. Those required badges include Swimming, Lifesaving, Camping, First Aid, Family Life, Citizenship in the Community, Citizenship in the Nation, Citizenship in the World, Personal Management, Personal Fitness, Communications, and Environmental Science. An Eagle candidate must also conceive of, plan, budget, and execute a leadership service project.

Sturm's project was to improve a trail in Washington Park, part of Union County's Rahway River Parkway. He planned to restore a trail that existed along the river, which had become overgrown with invasive plants. The project called for him to lead others in cleaning up the river adjacent to the trail, eradicate a 10' wide swath of Japanese Knotweed along the path for about 150 yards, transplant native trees to help prevent

On October 12, Alexander Sturm of BSA Troop 73, emerged from his erosion, build a bridge over a drainage canal, build a bench at trail's end, and build and mount several Wood Duck boxes in trees along the river. In all, 30 people worked over the course of a month, putting in 228 hours of work on the project. Local people who have used the cleared trail have praised the ease of using it and the beauty of the setting.

> Alex is a senior at Jonathan Dayton High School. He is a member of the winter and spring track team, throwing the shot put, javelin, and discus. He also belongs to the school orchestra and string ensemble, and competes with the Ouiz Bowl Team and Science League. Last year, he was inducted into the National Honor Society, and tutors other students in physics. In 2008, he attended the Hugh O'Brien Youth Leadership conference as the JDHS delegate. Apart from school and Scouts, Alex is very active in the St. James' CYO program. He plans to attend college next fall and major in mechanical engineering. Alex is the son of Chris and Maria Sturm, both of whom are teachers. With his parents, he has traveled to 38 states and six Canadian provinces.

For this performance, she will play fiery and poetic pieces from Beethoven, Chopin, Schumann, Liszt, and Skryabin.

Born in Ukraine, Ms Agranovich studied with Anna Stolarevich and Alexander Edelman, peers of Vladimir Horowitz. At ten she won the All-Ukrainian Young Artists Competition. At fifteen, Ms Agranovich immigrated to the USA and entered the Julliard School. She earned her Bachelor and Master Degrees while holding a Teaching Fellowship at Julliard, and later joined the faculty of the Town House International Music School in New York City. Ms Agranovich is a top prize winner of the Bergen Philharmonic Guild Competition and has performed abroad as will as here in the United States. DAYTON BOYS SOCCER TEAM SHARES STATE CHAMPIONSHIP

On November 21st the Dayton boy's soccer made sure the logo on the team jacket included team, considered underdogs all throughout the state tournament competitions, shared the Group 1 state championship with Palmyra after the teams played to a 0-0 tie following 80 minutes of regulation play and 20 minutes of sudden death overtime. A fun-loving coach of over fifteen years, Felix Fabiano does not share the same philosophy as most other coaches. It would be extremely difficult to find a player that did not enjoy playing for him because of his easy-going demeanor and friendly attitude. Recently he

If anyone has ever witnessed his practices they would be able to instantly understand the laidback feeling that he conducts them with. One rainy day, practice consisted of a 30-minute run indoors followed by the team watching "Kicking and Screaming", a family soccer comedy, in Coach Fabiano's Italian classroom.

The practice before the sectional final against High Tech, Coach Fabiano showed the team a VCR tape of all the goals from the 1990 world cup for, "inspiration." The players embrace his philosophy and work that much harder to stay fit and perform to the best of their abilities for him. The virtue that sets them apart is the amount of heart they take the field with, and that can be traced to everything they have to play for.

A year ago, senior captain Giuseppe Paternostro's father tragically passed away from a heart attack. He was a man loved by everyone (there were lines that stretched for blocks at his wake) and one of the biggest supporters of the soccer squad. The team has dedicated this season to him, playing in honor of his memory. Giuseppe, or Gius as most call him, wears a tshirt with the inscription, "RIP Dad" underneath his jersey at every game, and it is apparent that somewhere his father is watching over him, and the team, closely.


This team has rallied around his death to put together an unforgettable season this year with the leadership of Gius a major factor. During Dayton's improbable upset of Harrison, he exclaimed "We're not losing this game!" after Harrison struck early to take a 1-0 lead into the second half.

However, early in the season their leadership took a hit when their other senior captain and starting goalie Jordan Sack was lost for the season with a torn ACL in the first game. Every game he reminds the team how much he wishes he could be out there with them and implores them to leave everything on the field because,

"You never know which game is going to be your last." His injury has inspired the team to refuse to lose, aware that some people can only wish to experience the success that they have found on the soccer field. The weight of his absence has been lessened by the emergence of sophomore goalie Brandon Moss, a player that continues to surprise by stepping up in huge

It seems everyone has stepped up this season for Dayton with eleven different players scoring goals. Over the last four games, though, Andrey Zuniga, Kenneth Pereira, and Eytan Boclin have elevated their games to the next level. They have emerged as playmakers in the biggest moments, having combined to score the last 6 goals for Dayton in the state tournament. After failing to score until the final game of the regular season, Zuniga has been on a tear scoring 4 goals, including the game-winner in the final minutes of the sectional final, in addition to converting the opening penalty kick in the shootout against Glen Ridge. The only one hotter than him has been Boclin who seems to take advantage of every crucial moment, scoring the winning goal against Harrison and the decisive penalty kick in the shootout. Pereira has stepped up after being moved to striker when Jesus Montes was lost for the season, pushing the tempo and having an influence on every goal Dayton has scored in the state tournament. Central midfielders Brian Reina and Roy Cabrera are the workhorses that aid both the offense and defense, while CJ Moriello, Aaron Hinkes, Peter Bianco, and Daniel Osias are the glue that keep the defense together.

Through the soccer team's success and the resurgence of the football team, the town's support for sports has been revitalized. The student body and fans can be seen at all their games cheering even in the worst conditions giving the players even more to play for. It seems as if this Dayton boy's soccer team is determined to succeed, and it may even be their destiny.



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

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
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
