LAW ENFORCEMENT OFFICERS FROM THE SPRINGFIELD POLICE DEPARTMENT WILL BE CRACKING DOWN ON DISTRACTED DRIVERS DURING APRIL AS PART OF NEW JERSEY'S UDRIVE. UTEXT. UPAY. ENFORCEMENT CAMPAIGN. UDRIVE. UTEXT. UPAY TO BE CARRIED OUT LOCALLY FROM APRIL 1 – 30, 2021

Beginning April 1 and running through the end of the month, the high visibility law enforcement initiative will target motorists who engage in dangerous distracted driving behaviors such as talking on hand-held cell phones and sending text messages while driving.

The National Highway Traffic Safety Administration reports that in 2018 alone, 2,841 people were killed in distracted driving crashes on our nation's roads and an estimated 400,000 people were injured. In New Jersey, driver inattention was listed as a contributing circumstance in 50 percent of the state's crashes in 2018. Driver inattention was in fact listed as a contributing factor in crashes at a rate seven times higher than that of the next highest contributing factor (speed).

Distracted driving is any activity that diverts attention from driving, including talking or texting on your phone, eating and drinking, talking to people in your vehicle, fiddling with the stereo, entertainment or navigation system — anything that takes your attention away from the task of safe driving. Texting is the most alarming distraction. Sending or reading a text takes your eyes off the road for five seconds. At 55 mph, that's like driving the length of an entire football field with your eyes closed.

New Jersey is one of eight states nationally to receive dedicated federal funds this year to tackle the issue of driver distraction. This federal funding will be used for police overtime enforcement grants at the local level as well as a statewide multimedia public awareness campaign on this important issue.

The Cadets will be presenting a CPR demonstration, aimed to give an introduction to CPR rescue, as well as basic facts about the goal and use of CPR. Along with the demonstration, there will be a booth for taking vitals. Cadets will be measuring visitors heart rate and blood pressure, and providing some basic information on what these vitals mean and what a healthy range is. Children are free to come and enjoy the fun zone, as well as a socially distanced ambulance tour. Come prepared with Covid questions, which can be answered at the Covid Health booth. All current information about the Vaccine and Covid guidelines will be provided here. Finally, anyone interested in joining Springfield First Aid Squad should stop by the recruitment booth!

Springfield BID is dedicated to supporting independently owned Springfield businesses during this unprecedented time. The Springfield Community Partnership (BID) is working to help our local businesses devastated by the Coronavirus Crisis.

Local businesses are an important part of our community's identity. Whether it is the jobs you create, the uniqueness you add, or the services you provide, you are truly the heartbeat of our Community. Our Grant Program is another way we are looking to strengthen our community, one business at a time.

Who is eligible?

Businesses eligible to apply include:

All Springfield businesses that own or rent a commercial space that pays a Business Improvement District assessment. (If you are not sure, ask your Landlord, or check your Township tax bill). If your property is classified as a 4A property, you are eligible.

What it can be used for?

If you qualify, you can obtain a grant up to \$1,000 as a reimbursement for expenses that were or are required to keep your business open and your customers safe during the Covid-19 virus crisis. This includes the following:

- Contactless payment platforms
- PPE equipment ie: Masks, gloves, No-touch thermometers
- Equipment to re-fit stores for Social Distancing- ie: plexiglass dividers, barriers, floor decals
- Signage for revised services offered: curbside pick-up, delivery, etc.
- Air Filtration equipment
- Cleaning/Disinfecting services
- Outdoor Dining equipment: Tents/Heaters
- Other <u>capital</u> expenses necessary to keep your business open

WHAT YOU CAN EXPECT

If you received a grant in the first round you will be considered only when all new applicants have been considered and only if monies from the grant fund are available.

Each grant is for an amount up to \$1,000 and must be applied toward the criteria outlined above. Receipts for the item/s listed above must be included with this application. *Receipts supplied must be dated from August 2020 through present.

Grants will be awarded until all funds have been used on a first come first served basis. Once the grantee has been notified and submitted payment information that meets compliance checks, we will process the payment.

The application deadline is May 14, 2021 so please apply now to be considered!

MEET SPRINGFIELD SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS RACHEL GOLDBERG



Springfield welcomed Rachel Goldberg as Superintendent of Schools on July 1, 2020.

She comes to Springfield with a long background in education. After obtaining her Bachelor's degree from Austin College in Sherman, Texas in 1999, she started her career in the private sector. She relocated to New Jersey in 2003, and began her career in education as a substitute teacher in a special education classroom in Elizabeth where she later became a high school English teacher. Her experiences led her to the Education Policy and Management program at the Harvard University Graduate School of Education where she earned a Master's Degree in 2007. Upon graduation, she returned to the class-

room and later served as the Supervisor and Director of Staff Development. During her time in Elizabeth Public Schools, she was recognized as a teacher of the year and led significant shifts in how professional development was offered and managed. Goldberg was chosen by the New Jersey Department of Education to serve on the NJ Achieve Advisory Committee and led the introduction of new evaluation systems in Elizabeth.

In 2014, she transitioned to the role of Assistant Superintendent of Curriculum and Instruction in Passaic Public Schools in Passaic, New Jersey, a PreK-12 public school system serving over 14,000 students. In Passaic, her work spanned from building early literacy in pre-kindergarten through the development of career pathways and dual enrollment programs for high school students. She is a mother of three, and is currently pursuing her doctorate at Seton Hall University.

Coming to Springfield during a pandemic has certainly made for a unique experience. Emphasizing safety and health, the District has gone from remote only to a hybrid learning model. Goldberg notes that the stress and anxiety of the pandemic made this school year complicated, and she credits the support from the Board of Education and the Community, and the commitment from staff members as the key factors for reopening the schools. She commented that in a "normal" year, one of the hardest decisions a Superintendent has to make is a "Snow Day". With the pandemic, every day seems like a snow day!

In an exclusive interview with the Patriot Times, Goldberg said "While this school year was a challenging way to start in a new district, I am so lucky to be in Springfield. Together, we have pushed through incredible circumstances and I am looking forward to building on these experiences to support a district where students love learning."





Over a hundred residents of Springfield and nearby communities marched down Mountain Avenue on Tuesday evening April 6th in a show of solidarity against a surge of anti-Asian violence and rhetoric across the nation.

Afterwards, some 200 people assembled on the lawn of Springfield Town Hall, hoisting signs that read "Hate is a Virus," "Stop Asian Hate." The rally was organized by the Springfield Unity Project, a non-profit grassroots organization committed to promoting positive change through education and fostering deeper and more meaningful understanding among diverse communities.

In front of the township municipal building, several Asian American speakers passionately addressed the crowd. They detailed anti-Asian acts throughout history and now, and encouraged everyone to fight such sentiments -- be they violent criminal attacks or hurtful words uttered in school and the workplace. Members of the Springfield Township Committee were on hand to show their support as well, Mayor Chris Weber, Deputy Mayor Alex Keiser and Township Committeewoman Erica Dubois.

"No one's born a racist, right?" said speaker Gabby Gutierrez, a Jonathan Dayton High School sophomore who reflected on her experiences growing up as a Filipino American. "You must be conditioned to become one...the main factor that discrimination and violent acts can stem from are the stereotypes. Or 'harmless jokes.' They're everywhere."

Ana Wang, a Chinese immigrant who has lived in town for the last seven years, described how she spent much of her life trying to ignore racist and xenophobic comments. But recent events have shown her that ignoring such behavior does not make it disappear, she said.

"I have two very young children," she said. "I don't want them to grow up in fear. I don't want them to feel ashamed of their Asian heritage. I don't want them to be called 'Kung Flu' or 'Chinese Virus' at school and get bullied or attacked. America is their home. Where they should feel safe and belong. America is every American's home. A harm against any one of us is a harm against all of us."

Readers of the Springfield Patriot Times may notice an increase in vehicle and pedestrian traffic, as well as increased enforcement of motor vehicle violations by Springfield police officers. Officers will we be conducting a variety of enforcement activities, including "cops in crosswalks" pedestrian enforcement, distracted driving and hands-free cellular device enforcement, and speeding enforcement. Traffic safety is a shared responsibility, and our goal is to educate drivers, pedestrians, and cyclists in the proper use of the roadways, and reduce the number of traffic-related incidents that occur in Springfield.

Motorists must come to a complete stop and remain stopped when a pedestrian is crossing in a marked crosswalk. This includes motorists who are making turns while pedestrians are crossing. Marked crosswalks are designated with painted lines and/or stripes, and have yellow warning signs posted as motorists approach. Marked crosswalks can be within intersections controlled with traffic signals, uncontrolled intersections, or mid-block. Crosswalks can also be unmarked, which include all intersections of streets normally considered to represent crosswalks but are not physically painted or striped. At these intersections with unmarked crosswalks, motorists must yield to the right-of-way of pedestrians and allow them to cross, but pedestrians must first wait for an adequate break in traffic that will allow them to cross safely before leaving the curb.

Pedestrians are reminded to cross only where legally permitted. At intersections with traffic signals, pedestrians must follow the signal, and cross only when the "WALK" symbol is displayed. If an intersection is not equipped with pedestrian signals, pedestrians should cross with the green light. At uncontrolled intersections or at mid-block crosswalks, pedestrians must remember to cross only when there is an appropriate gap in traffic. Pedestrians should never suddenly leave the curb and begin crossing into the path of a vehicle that is so close it would be impossible for the driver to stop or yield. Pedestrians should always be alert and wear bright reflective clothing (especially if walking at night or early morning).

Cyclists must remember that they have the same rights and responsibilities as motor vehicle drivers. Cyclists should always ride on the right side of the road, obey all signs and traffic signals, and ride with the flow of traffic. Cyclists should always be alert, wear bright reflective clothing (especially if cycling at night or early morning), and properly maintain their bicycles in good working order – including reflectors and lights. NJ law mandates that all riders 17 years and younger (including children strapped in attached child-seats) must wear an approved, properly fitting helmet, but it is recommended for all cyclists to use one to protect themselves.

Parents are reminded that their children should not be permitted to play on public roads, even on quiet cul-de-sacs or side streets. Public roads are intended for vehicular, bicycle, and pedestrian traffic only, and should never be utilized for children's games or other activities.

As our police officers will begin additional enforcement details, I remind motorists of NJ's "Move Over Law", which requires drivers to change lanes for stopped emergency vehicles...not only for police, but for fire department, first aid squad, and tow trucks/driver assistance vehicles as well. If changing lanes is impossible, or if the roadway is only one lane, drivers must slow down to below the posted speed limit, and prepare to stop as they approach the emergency vehicle.

Together, we can make Springfield's roads safer for everyone.

Whenever there is a major storm and there is damage to the electrical service on a home, the question always comes up, "who is responsible for fixing this?" I hope this guide from JCP&L will help residents through the process. Also, it would be a good idea to have you electrician's phone number handy as well as JCP&L's number. It's not a bad idea to periodically take a look at the electrical service and if something does not look right, or you see signs of damage, have your electrician check it out before it becomes a problem. A few weeks a ago a resident called and said JCP&L pulled their meter and they had no power. Turns out there was visible corrosion on the meter base and the resident had to get their electrician to repair it so they could get a new meter installed and have power restored.

Ownership Guidelines for Your Home's Electrical System

When your home's exterior electrical system is damaged, it's important to understand which components are our responsibility and which are yours.

If you receive overhead electric service, we are responsible for the following components:

- Service Drop The wires running from the utility pole to your home.
- Electric Meter Measure your electricity use in Kilowatt-hours.

You own and are responsible for repairing the

- Weatherhead and Insulator This is the point where our electric lines connect to your home.
- Service Entrance Cable The wire that extends from your weatherhead to the meter and from the meter to your fuse box and circuit breaker box.
- Meter Base Your meter is mounted in this box.
- Fuse Box or Circuit Breaker Box This is the main service panel that houses your fuses or circuit breakers.
- Household Wiring The interior wiring that distributes electricity through your home.

As a customer, it's also your responsibility to maintain open access to the meter and keep obstructions away from power lines that extend from the utility pole to your home, If trees on your property grow near power lines, don't prune or remove them yourself. Consult with a tree contractor who is qualified to work around electric equipment.


We asked Dr. Kronert, " Why do you think Springfield is the best town ever?"

ELECTRICAL FIRES IN HOMES

Electrical fires in homes claim the lives of 280 Americans each year and injure 1,000 more. Some of these fires are caused by electrical system failures, but many more are caused by incorrectly installed wiring and overloaded circuits and extension cords. There are simple steps you can take to prevent the loss of life and property resulting from electrical fires.

The winter months are the most dangerous months for electrical a fire which corresponds to more indoor activities and increases in lighting, heating, and appliance use. The bedroom is the leading area of fire origin for residential building electricalfires. However, electrical fires that begin in the living room/family room/den areas result in the most deaths.

Most electrical distribution fires result from problems with "fixed wiring" such as faulty electrical outlets and old wiring. Problems with cords (such as extension and appliance cords), plugs, receptacles, and switches also cause many home electrical fires. Many avoidable electrical fires can be traced to misuse of electric cords, such as overloading circuits, poor maintenance, and running the cords under rugs or in high traffic areas.

Safety Precautions:

- Buy only appliances that have the label of a recognized testing laboratory.
- Major and small appliances should be plugged directly into a wall outlet. Never use an extension cord. Unplug small appliances when not in use.
- If an appliance has a three-prong plug, never force it to fit into a two-slot outlet or extension cord.
- Keep clothes, curtains, and other items that can catch fire at least three feet from all portable electric space heaters.
- Use light bulbs that match the recommended wattage on the lamp or fixture.
- Avoid putting cords where they can be damaged or pinched by furniture, under rugs and carpets, or across doorways.
- Extension cords are for temporary use only. Have a qualified electrician determine if additional circuits or wall outlets are needed.
 - Call an electrician if you have any of the following:
 - o Recurring problems with blowing fuses or tripping circuit breakers
 - o A tingling feeling when you touch an electrical appliance

 - o Discolored or warm wall outlets or switches o A burning smell or rubbery odor coming from an appliance
 - o Flickering lights
 - o Sparks from a wall outlet
 - o Cracked or broken wall outlets

Finally, having a working smoke alarm dramatically increases your chances of surviving a fire. Remember to practice a home escape plan frequently with your family.
