



Message from the Mayor

Dear Neighbors



The many weeks of dry weather and high temperatures have caused a drought. Currently, more than two-thirds of New Jersey (67%) are experiencing moderate drought conditions and nearly one-third (29%) have severe drought conditions. According to the U.S. Drought Monitor, Union County is in a "Severe Drought." This has put a strain on

our state's drinking water supplies. The New Jersey Department of Environmental Protection is reporting that several major reservoirs, which provide water to millions of homes and businesses across our state, are running at about 60 to 70 percent of their full capacity.

This means we need rain, and lots of it! Water conservation can also help. Besides reducing watering lawns, washing vehicles and cutting back hosing off driveways and sidewalks, here are a few more helpful tips from the New Jersey Department of Environmental Protection:

- Water flowers and landscaping with water collected in a rain barrel.
- · Consider switching your home irrigation system to a drip irrigation and micro-sprays, which use 30 to 50 percent less water than traditional sprinklers.
- · If you own a pool, use a pool cover when not in use to reduce evaporation rates.
- · Use water from dehumidifiers and air conditioners to water your plants.
- · Use native plants in your landscaping that require less water.
- · Raise your lawnmower blade to at least 3 inches to promote deeper grass roots which hold water better.

Every Drop Counts! Voluntary conservation measures can help avoid more serious and restrictive drought conditions. We can all do our part to conserve water.

Police Chief's Column Chief John P. Cook for readers of the Patriot Times

During the early morning hours of September 7, 2022, Springfield officers responded to a report from a resident who observed several subjects attempting to burglarize a vehicle. As officers approached the area, they observed a dark colored SUV driving quickly away. They immediately recognized this SUV matched the description of a vehicle involved in several home invasions and burglaries in our surrounding jurisdictions. The officers confirmed the license plate on the SUV was stolen, and attempted to stop the vehicle. The subjects began fleeing in the vehicle, and officers initiated a pursuit. The vehicle eventually came to a stop in Newark after crashing, and the subjects ran from the vehicle. Officers were able to capture the driver and place him under arrest. Detectives are currently in the process of identifying the other subjects. Inside the subjects' vehicle, which was determined to have been reported stolen several days prior, multiple key FOBs from various vehicles were located, along with what appeared to be proceeds of burglarized homes.

This was an excellent job by all officers involved, and the observant resident who immediately reported the suspicious activity to the police department should be commended for their quick actions. Unfortunately, cases such as this are occurring more and more frequently throughout our County. Incidents involving motor vehicle burglaries and motor vehicle thefts have skyrocketed over the past several years throughout New

Jersey, and in many parts of our Nation as well. Criminals simply scour residential areas, looking for unlocked vehicles or for vehicles with FOBs left inside. These vehicles are easy targets, with their valuable contents stolen, or the vehicles themselves stolen and utilized in other crime sprees.

Even more disturbing is the recent trend for criminals to locate and activate garage door openers found in the unlocked vehicles, and use them to gain access to the victims' homes. Recently, several burglaries and home invasions that occurred in neighboring towns have been facilitated by garage door openers in unlocked vehicles. Imagine, while sleeping in the middle of the night, you hear your garage door opener activate, and seconds later, criminals are ransacking your home.

The Police Department has repeatedly urged our residents and visitors to keep their vehicles locked at all times while parked, to always remove the FOBs from parked vehicles, and to remove valuables from parked vehicles. With this new trend in home burglaries and home invasions, it is more important now than ever to make sure your vehicles are properly secured when parked. Criminals will simply move on to look for the next easy target. I hope all readers of the Springfield Patriot Times, residents and visitors alike, understand the importance of this. And as always, I ask that anyone who sees anything suspicious to please call 911 and immediately report it to the Police Department.



IMPORTANT NOTICE OF UPCOMING CHANGES TO THE LIBRARY'S CIRCULATION POLICY

As most of our library patrons are aware, the library moved to a fine free policy in July of 2020 as a response to the health concerns associated with the Covid-19 pandemic. Even as things are getting closer to being back to normal at the library, the Library Board has voted to continue to operate on a fine free basis, effective September 7, 2022, with the following important exceptions:

1. All books that appear on the summer reading lists for grades 6-12 in Springfield's public school system will incur a fine of 25 cents per day for every day that they are kept out beyond the due date, to a maximum accumulated fine of \$5.00 per item. Fines will be incurred on these titles throughout the year, not just during the summer. These fines have been reinstituted as a way to get encourage the timely return of summer reading books so that they can be made available to as many students as possible.

2. Items which have been procured for our patrons from any library that is not a member of the Libraries of Middlesex Automation Consortium (LMxAC) will incur a fine of 25 cents per day for every day that they are kept out beyond their due date, to a maximum accumulated fine of \$25 per item. Fees for lost or damaged books and AV materials will be determined by the library that owns the items.

3. Library museum passes will continue to incur a fine of \$10.00 per day for every day that the pass is kept out beyond its due date, to a maximum charge equivalent to the cost to the library to replace that particular museum pass.

4. New adult fiction and new adult nonfiction with a 14 day circulation period will be assessed a 25 cent per day "extended usage fee" if these books are kept out beyond the due date, to an accumulated maximum fee

of \$5.00 per item. This fee is levied as a compromise between the library's need to encourage the timely return of items that are in high demand and the library user's wish to spend a little more time with a particular book.

Library patrons will continue to be responsible for paying the discounted replacement price, plus a \$5.00 processing fee, for library materials that are damaged or lost. This new policy does not supersede library fines that were accrued prior to September 7, 2022. 





Hurricane Safety Tips

Before a hurricane

If conditions are right for a hurricane in your area, this is how you can prepare:

- Stay tuned to local radio, official news and/or community websites, and TV for warnings, safety announcements or instructions.
- Have a bag ready and plan your evacuation route so you're prepared if leaving the area becomes necessary.
- Stock up on emergency supplies but be aware others will need supplies, too.
- Reinforce the outside of your home, particularly doors, windows, walls and roofs.
- Move anything inside that could become flying debris in high winds, but only if there's enough time and it's safe to do so.
- Anchor outdoor items that are unsafe to bring inside, such as fuel tanks.
- If emergency officials haven't directed you to a public shelter, get your family to the basement, a closet, a small room or a hallway away from windows. The more walls between you and the outside, the better.
- Review insurance policies and catalog your belongings, if there is time.³

During the hurricane

The decisions you make during the storm are crucial. Here are some actions you can take:

- Follow any guidance from local officials. If you're told to evacuate, follow the plan you made and do so. Make sure you bring essentials like the bag you prepared before the storm.
- Stay away from windows. Keep yourself to the lowest, most interior section of your home as possible.
- In the event of flooding, move to higher ground.
- Never attempt to walk or drive through floodwaters.³

After a hurricane has passed

If you and your family were evacuated from your home – or if it has been severely damaged from the hurricane – wait for authorities to give the all-clear to re-enter. Then:

- Look for flooding in the wake of a hurricane and avoid it. Never attempt to enter floodwater.
- Be on the lookout for downed power lines, trees and poles. Some may still be upright but could still be highly unstable.
- Do not enter your home until it has been inspected for damage to the electrical system, gas lines, septic systems, and water lines or wells.
- If dark, use a flashlight not matches, a candle or a lighter. An open flame could ignite leaking gas.
- Avoid drinking any tap water until you get confirmation it's safe from local officials.
- If there is water damage, consider hiring a professional water damage cleaning service.
- Begin your cleanup as soon as possible washing and disinfecting items that
 have been touched by floodwater or disposing of items that cannot be saved.
 Protect yourself with gloves and sturdy, thick-soled shoes. Do not attempt to
 remove any heavy debris by yourself.
- Once you've gathered necessary documents and evidence of your claim (photos or video), contact your insurance company or agent.3
