

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Message from the Mayor



Dear Neighbors,

I would like to take this opportunity to highlight the capital improvement projects the Township is considering funding through our latest bond ordinance.

The bond ordinance authorizes the Township to borrow and spend money, through the issuance of municipal bonds, to finance long-term capital improvement projects.

Bond Ordinance 2022-08, introduced at the February 22nd Township Committee meeting, authorizes a total appropriation of \$2,767,932

\$1,827,931.64 of the total \$2.7 million appropriation is money the Township received from the Federal Government as part of the American Rescue Plan Act of 2021. This money does not need to be borrowed and has been earmarked for sanitary and stormwater sewer infrastructure improvements.

The remaining \$940,000 will be borrowed and allocated as follows:

\$500,000 for road, curb and sidewalk improvements. We aim to resurface 21 local roads.

\$70,000 for upgrades to local parks. We plan on applying for a matching grant from the County and use the funds to refurbish several tennis courts and line a new pickleball court.

\$200,000 to purchase a new dump truck for the Department of Public Works.

\$100,000 to purchase two new police vehicles.

\$70,000 for various improvements to public buildings

The final hearing on the bond ordinance is scheduled for March 22nd. I anticipate the ordinance will pass on that date and these significant improvements can move forward.

Police Chief's Column

Readers of the Springfield Patriot Times may soon notice an increase in motor vehicle violation enforcement by the Springfield Police Department. Each year, the police department participates in local and nationwide enforcement campaigns focusing on seat belt usage, pedestrian safety, and distracted driving. Some of these "crackdowns" offer state and federal grant assistance which supplements the cost for extra officers to participate in these efforts, so we can maintain a full force of regular on-duty officers at all times.

Since the law changed in 2010, motorists must come to a complete stop for pedestrians in any crosswalk. Everyone is reminded that there are many intersections on heavily trafficked roadways that are not controlled by traffic signals, so it is vital that motorists be aware of pedestrians and come to a complete stop when approaching an intersection with crossing pedestrians. As part of the pedestrian safety enforcement initiative, plainclothes officers pose as pedestrians while crossing at various intersections throughout the township, and motorists who fail to stop for the "crossing pedestrians" will be stopped by uniformed officers and issued a summons for this violation. Police officers will specifically target the busiest intersections throughout the township where there have been past incidents of either pedestrians or bicyclists having been struck by automobiles, which also include intersections where pedestrians have been seriously injured or killed.

For many years now, NJ law has mandated all occupants of a motor vehicle must wear seat belts. The law also mandates proper restraint systems must be used for children and infants while riding in a vehicle. As part of the "Click it or Ticket" program, plainclothes officers act as "lookouts" at intersections and other busy areas throughout the township and report seat belt violations to uniformed officers who are waiting down the road to stop these motorists and issue summonses.

To focus on distracted driving violations, officers will monitor traffic specifically looking for motorists who operate their vehicle while using a cellular device that is not set up for hands free operation, or who are observed to be text messaging while driving. For several years in a row, distracted driving continues to be the leading cause of fatal crashes in NJ, with cellphone use/texting being a top distraction.

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RESPECT FOR ELECTRICITY

Electricity has become one of our basic needs and the Springfield Fire Department is encouraging you to get grounded in the basics of electrical safety.

According to the non-profit National Fire Protection Association (NFPA), electrical fires were involved in an estimated annual average of 47,820 reported home structure fires in 2007-2011. These fires resulted in 455 civilian deaths and 1,518 civilian injuries, with \$1.5 billion in direct property damage.

The best way to keep the home safe from electrical hazards is to take good care of appliances and to use all electrical equipment properly. Respect for electricity and the power it provides must occur every day throughout the year.

By reviewing the electrical safety tips below and taking action, Springfield Patriot reader can help reduce electrical fires in our community.

- When you are buying, selling or remodeling a home, have it inspected by a qualified electrician.
- If a fuse blows or a circuit breaker trips often, find out why and correct the problem. Replace fuses with the correct amp rating for the circuit they protect; never replace a fuse with a higher rated fuse. If the problem continues, call an electrician
- Only plug one heat-producing appliance (such as a coffee maker, toaster, space heater, etc.) into a receptacle outlet at a time.
- Buy only appliances that have the label of a recognized testing laboratory.
- Replace cracked and damaged electrical cords.

Avoid pinching cords against walls or furniture or running them under carpets or across doorways. This can cause a fire.

- Use extension cords for temporary wiring only.
- Follow the manufacturer's instructions for plugging an appliance into a receptacle outlet.
- Avoid overloading outlets. Plug only one high-wattage appliance into each receptacle outlet at a time.
- Consider having additional circuits or receptacles added by a qualified electrician.
- If an appliance is malfunctioning, unplug it if it is safe to do so. If necessary, cut off power by unscrewing a fuse or turning off the circuit breaker.
- Arc fault circuit interrupters (AFCIs) are a new kind of circuit breaker that shut off electricity when a dangerous condition occurs. Consider having them installed in your home. Use a qualified electrician.
- Use ground fault circuit interrupters (GFCIs) to reduce the risk of shock. GFCIs shut off an electrical circuit when it becomes a shock hazard.
- Test AFCIs and GFCIs once a month to make sure they are working properly.
- Keep ladders away from overhead power lines including the electrical service into your home. Never touch a power line. Stay at a safe distance you could be electrocuted.
 - Report downed power lines to 9-1-1.
- Some power lines are underground. Call the NJ One Call at 800-272-1000 for an underground utility mark-out before you dig. It's free and it's the law. For more electrical safety tips, please visit www.nfpa.org.

On March 1, 2022 the Motor Vehicle Commission opened its newest office in Springfield on Route 22 in the shopping center anchored by Olive Garden.

This facility replaced the smaller, older, cramped facility which had been located on Center Street in Springfield near the Town Hall. A few years ago MVC split the processing of drivers licenses and registrations off to separate locations. Springfield did titles and registrations. Elimination of the cameras and other equipment and additional traffic flow for licenses allows MVC to focus on just one type of transaction and become more efficient.

The old location was known for long lines both inside and outside as well as a small pay parking lot which could get you a ticket if you didn't pay at the parking meter. During COVID it was even worse with people lined up at the crack of dawn—or earlier.

This new, open well-staffed spacious location opened in the Springfield Plaza at 271 Route 22 east on February 28th. The parking is free, convenient and close to the entrance. Numerous staff and security people check you in and direct you to the appropriate windows—giant TV sign boards note the number of people in the Que. A well-oiled machine!

Sue Fulton, MVC chief administrator commented to the Patriot Times: "This is a much better facility. It's cleaner, we have brand new modular furniture and we don't have issues with the roof and the floor that we did in the old facility," "This is a brand new space."

Assemblywoman Nancy Munoz, R-Union, said she's been going to the old agency for 33 years and knows its issues.

"The building was old, I had to fight for parking... the other place had lost its spark," she said. "My son moved to Connecticut and the motor vehicle facility he went to was sparkling new. This reminds me of that."

Fulton commented "The new agency on Route 22 east is 6,800 square feet, 21% larger than the old agency. "Bigger means more efficient for drivers since the MVC can handle more customer transactions in the larger space."

Customers commented that the new facility is spacious, clean and they operate very quickly.

Fulton further noted: "The MVC spent \$670,000 to renovate the new agency and outfit it with 30% more customer service windows and 33% more identification check widows than the old agency. The layout is designed to be more efficient, down to a large, green, "Start here" desk, where drivers can start their transactions.

The new agency can handle 2,000 transactions a week, to help meet the "historic demand" that saw the MVC set a record in recent years, Fulton said. The old facility handled roughly 1,500 transactions a week."

Last year, the MVC processed nearly 12.3 million transactions in 2021, the first time the agency topped 12 million, said William Connolly, an MVC spokesman.

Mayor Alex Keiser, a lifelong resident of Springfield said "Springfield is "on the map" because of the motor vehicle agency. For a long time it needed a new space. This is an improvement for the residents of Springfield and the state."

Springfield is the second new agency the MVC has opened in less than a year, having reopened an agency that handles driver's license business in Elizabeth in October of 2021.

I've mentioned this before, but it is still an important topic for Township Residents, MAKE A PLAN!

Make a plan today. Your family may not be together if a disaster strikes, so it is important to know which types of disasters could affect your area. Know how you'll contact one another and reconnect if separated. Establish a family meeting place that's familiar and easy to find.

Step 1: Put a plan together by discussing the questions below with your family, friends or household to start your emergency plan.

- 1. How will I receive emergency alerts and warnings?
- 2. What is my shelter plan?
- 3. What is my evacuation route?
- 4. What is my family/household communication plan?
- 5. Do I need to update my emergency preparedness kit?
- 6. Check with the Centers for Disease Control (CDC) and update my emergency plans due to Coronavirus.
 - Get masks (for everyone over 2 years old), disinfectants, and check my sheltering plan.

Step 2: Consider specific needs in your household.

As you prepare your plan tailor your plans and supplies to your specific daily living needs and responsibilities. Discuss your needs and responsibilities and how people in the network can assist each other with communication, care of children, business, pets or specific needs like operating medical equipment. Create your own personal network for specific areas where you need assistance. Keep in mind some these factors when developing your plan:

- Different ages of members within your household
- Responsibilities for assisting others
- Locations frequented
- Dietary needs
- Medical needs including prescriptions and equipment
- Disabilities or access and functional needs including devices and equipment
- Languages spoken
- Cultural and religious considerations
- Pets or service animals
- Households with school-aged children

Step 3: Fill out a Family Emergency Plan





A 2012 graduate of Jonathan Dayton High School who went on to star for four years at Rutgers University, Anthony has had several stops along the way in Pro Football.



In addition to these campaigns, our officers continue to aggressively enforce motor vehicle violations which contribute to a high number of traffic incidents. These include speeding, improper use of marked turning lanes at intersections, careless or aggressive driving, and failure to stop/yield violations. Some of this enforcement targets specific areas of Springfield where traffic issues have been identified. Whenever the police department receives complaints about traffic concerns, traffic studies are conducted first to determine the extent of the problem. The information gathered in these studies helps us to develop enforcement strategies and determine if other forms of traffic remediation are necessary.

Police officers know better than most about the tragic consequences resulting from accidents caused by inattentive or careless drivers. Through increased and visible traffic enforcement, accidents resulting in injuries or deaths can be prevented. With nicer weather hopefully just around the corner, and with more children, pedestrians, and cyclists being out and about, it is vital that motorists use common sense and caution while driving.

SPRINGFIELD STANDS WITH UKRAINE

On a cool Tuesday evening on March 7th, a group of about 100 people turned out to show their support for Ukraine and their people in their struggle with the Russian Federation. Mayor Alex Keiser introduced a number of dignitaries that attended the event, Jon Bramnick, a member of the NJ Senate, Union County Commissioner Bette Jane Kowalski, Union County Clerk and Former Springfield Mayor Joanne Rajoppi Yuriy Symczyk COO/National Secretary at UKRAINIAN NATIONAL ASSOCIATION, INC. and Roman Myhal who donated his family Ukrainian Flag for the Township to fly on their flagpole.

Mayor Keiser read a proclamation in support of Ukraine and its people in their fight against the Russian Federation. Senator Bramnick commented that we will always fight against evil and his comments were echoed by all the individuals that spoke at the ceremony.

Yuriy Symczyk commented to the group:

"For more than 125 years, the UNA has promoted unity, democratic ideals and the principles of benevolence and charity within the Ukrainian diaspora in the United States of America and Canada. As a fraternal association, we have served our members, immigrants from Ukraine who survived two world wars and several political and economic crises. As a result, the unfolding global crisis must be managed on an international level by organizations with appropriate expertise - supporting a No-Fly Zone over Ukraine, additional sanctions against Russia and mass efforts, on all levels, to provide humanitarian aid to Ukraine and Ukrainians.

For the past 100 years, Ukraine's history has been one filled with trauma and continued suffering. Comments from observers worldwide note the stoic, even calm demeanor of the Ukrainian people. Ukrainians love their land, their culture and their country. Despite many horrific efforts to break their spirit, Ukrainians have survived and they are determined to keep their country whole and undivided." He further noted: To donate, we encourage everyone to visit the Ukrainian Congress Committee of America (UCCA) website - www. ucca.org.

The UCCA is a national umbrella organization that has represented the interests of the up to 2 million Americans of Ukrainian descent since 1940. The Ukrainian National Association, Inc. is a proud member organization of the UCCA.

While the flag was being raised, Deputy Mayor Chris Weber talked about his grandparents and their struggle during World War Two in trying to stay alive against similar aggression. "My grandmother Emilia was born in Ukraine in 1930. As Hitler invaded Europe, her family was taken from their home and brought to a German refugee camp by German soldiers in 1939. They were able to survive this for 6 horrible years. In 1945 they were freed by American soldiers. The U.S.relocated my family to South America and from there they were able to make their way to the United States. Like many Springfield residents, we still have family over there. Ukraine is a proud country filled with very strong people. They have the world behind them and they will fight to keep their country free, safe and beautiful.






