PLANNING BOARD APPROVES DOWNTOWN REDEVELOPMENT PROJECT

The Planning Board conducted a public hearing on the Redevelopment Plan for Block 706, Lots 10-17 at their meeting of March 4, 2015. The plan was presented to the Board by Keenan Hughes, AICP, PP of Phillips, Preiss, Grygiel, LLC. The Board heard comments from their members, the Board's professionals and the public and reviewed copies of the plan. At the conclusion of the presentation the Board recommended adoption of the plan and also made few recommendations to the Township Committee. Although redevelopment of the downtown area has been in the works on and off for 30 years or more, this is the closest the Township has ever come to a developer getting a shovel in the ground. One other redevelopment project is getting closer to be scheduled for a hearing in the next few months as well.

Message from the Mayor Greetings Springfield friends and neighbors! As

Greetings Springfield friends and neighbors! As winter is finally turning to spring, I'm excited to share not only the progress that the township has made in the last few weeks, but also the great things that we can all look forward to in the next few months.

Downtown Redevelopment Continues to Take Shape

When I came to office, I made the redevelopment of our downtown area one of my highest priorities. I'm happy to report that we are getting closer and closer to having a revitalized downtown. Following the release of the Morris Avenue Vision plan in January, we saw the largest progress towards this goal in decades last month. Below is a description of what was involved in making this vision plan a reality.

First, the Township Committee voted to accept a redevelopment plan for the 80,000 square foot property along Morris Avenue between Center and Caldwell streets. Working with the property owner, our township professionals and the BID, we came up with a plan to turn this property into a mixed-use building with retail on the ground floor and apartments on the upper floors. The plan calls for completely rebuilding the property, increasing the depth of the sidewalk and creating a façade that is in line with new design standards for our downtown.

The next step was for the plan to be sent to the Planning Board. The Planning Board determined that the project fits the township's Master Plan, has adequate parking and offered several other helpful recommendations. The last step for the plan is for it to come up for an Ordinance, ratifying it next month. Members of the public are welcome at our Township Committee Meetings, as well as your comments on this topic.

Grand Opening of Chisholm Youth Wing

Renovation of the Chisholm Community Center is almost complete. The entire building will be officially open on March 21, 2015 at 11 am. This great facility has undergone a complete renovation and will be home to all township recreation activities. The senior wing was completed in 2013 and is getting much use. The youth wing features a completely refurbished gym with viewing area, upgraded kitchen, brand new bathrooms and redone activity rooms. I hope you will join me at the opening ceremony at 11 am on March 21st.

Lastly, as the snow melts and the weather warms, on behalf of the entire town, I would once again like to thank the DPW workers, OEM staff, Police and Fire departments for all they did on removing the snow and keeping the residents of Springfield safe. Springfield Township Committee Approves Downtown Redevelopment

The revitalization of Downtown Springfield has been a longstanding objective within the Township. The establishment of a Business Improvement District (BID) in 2011 was an important step in the Township's efforts to build a destination-oriented retail environment along Morris Avenue. A market analysis commissioned by the BID in 2012 revealed that a significant portion of consumer spending of the residents of Springfield was occurring outside of the community. In addition, downtown Springfield captured very little spending from consumers in surrounding communities. The study presented a major opportunity to increase consumer spending in the downtown by increasing the residential population, developing new modern retail spaces, and instituting a retail recruitment program.

The Morris Avenue Vision Plan, released in January, was created in conjunction with the Township's on-going redevelopment planning process, and recommends creating a vibrant downtown area that is attractive to residents, businesses, and commuters alike.

Springfield's downtown has the essential components for creating a great place with unique character: mixed uses, community facilities, an interconnected street and sidewalk network, and access to transportation.

Recently, the Mayor and Township Committee approved the Redevelopment Plan for the property along Morris Avenue between Caldwell and Center Streets. The plan provides downtown living opportunities for residents interested in a walkable downtown lifestyle, creates modern retail space, and promotes a pedestrian-oriented streetscape along Morris Avenue. The existing structures will be demolished in order to create a mixed retail and residential building on the approximately 80,000 square foot piece of land. "This redevelopment plan, which follows the Morris Avenue Vision Plan, is integral to advancing the community's vision for downtown," said Mayor Barnett. "From a planning viewpoint, the key to establishing downtown Springfield as a destination for shopping, dining and entertainment is to implement physical improvements that help create a traditional, walkable mixed-use environment along the Morris Avenue corridor."

The intent of the Redevelopment Plan is to enhance the economic base of downtown Springfield by providing retail commercial activity at the street level along Morris Avenue, with multifamily residential units on the upper floors. By incorporating smart growth planning principles and offering quality building design and a strong visual presence, the project also aims to attract additional private investment and redevelopment activity within downtown Springfield.

The goals of the approved Redevelopment Plan are to:

• support business activity within downtown

- support business activity within downtown Springfield and provide additional job opportunities
- encourage the development of attractive housing options for singles, young couples, empty

nesters and others interested in participating in the revitalization of downtown Springfield

- promote land uses that support and enhance the retail environment in downtown Springfield
- create modern retail spaces suited for destination-oriented restaurants and stores

The approved plan will be sent to the Planning Board on Wednesday, March 4, 2015 so they can review the plan details, and the Planning Board will send their recommendations to the Township Committee

Township Of Springfield Supports Use Of Wind And Solar Power

In 2010, the Township passed ordinance 2010-31 entitled "Wind and Solar Energy". The purpose of this Ordinance is to promote the safe, effective and efficient use of small wind energy systems and solar energy systems to reduce the onsite consumption of utility-supplied electricity. The Township of Springfield believes that wind and solar energy are abundant, renewable, and nonpolluting energy resources. Converting wind and solar energy to electricity will reduce our dependence on nonrenewable energy resources, which will also decrease

air and water pollution that results from the use of conventional energy sources. Distributed small wind and solar energy systems will also enhance the reliability and power quality of the power grid, reduce peak power demands, and help diversify the State's energy supply portfolio. Small wind and solar energy systems make the electricity supply market more competitive by promoting customer choice

Up until this ordinance was adopted, the Township's existing local zoning regulations did not address wind or solar power, which while not intended to discourage the installation of small wind turbines or solar panels, the lack of specific regulations to address these systems tended to increase the time and costs required to obtain necessary local landuse permits. As such, the Springfield Township Committee found it necessary to standardize and streamline the requirements for small wind and solar energy systems so that this clean, renewable energy resource can be utilized in a cost-effective and timely manner within our municipality. 

WINTER 2015 DAN AND 1ST GUP EVALUATIONS

The Korean Martial Art Soo Bahk Do Moo Duk Kwan possesses four levels of color belts. Between each belt, they must test for blue stripes. In this art, the color belts are known as Gup Members. The highest rank a Gup member can reach is that of first Gup. This rank is indicated by two bright blue stripes on the left side of the belt. As first Gups, they are also required to attend quarterly evaluations to assess their knowledge of their testing requirements. It is also to determine if they are ready to test for their Cho Dan, midnight blue belt. The Dan members are also required to attend evaluations.

On January 31, 2015, Hwang Karate of Millburn hosted its winter 1st Gup Evaluations. The Winter Dan Evaluations occurred on the same date. This event began at 1 p.m. following the end of the Saturday morning adult class. It lasted until 4 p.m.

For this event, Master Paul Del Sordo, the head instructor at Hwang Karate, served as one of the

examiners. Master Paul Eng Wang, an instructor at Hwang Karate, also served as an examiner along with Master Denise Mullen. Master Mullen serves as a regional examiner for the United States Soo Bahk Do Moo Duk Kwan Federation. This organization oversees the Moo Duk Kwan schools in the United States. Also in attendance was Master Erik Orella, who is an instructor at Hwang Karate. During the first half of the evaluation he called for basics and kicking.

After the kicking drill finished, the candidates were broken up into three groups. Master Del Sordo took the first Gups next door to review their required forms. The Dan members were split up to work on their forms. Master Eng Wang worked with the E Dan and Sam Dan members on their forms. Master Orella and Master Mullen both worked with the Cho Dans. During the second half of the evaluations, Master Mullen worked with a group of Dan members on sleeve grips. Master Eng Wang worked with the Cho Dans on one step sparring. Afterwards, with the assistance of Master Orella, he worked with them on knife defense.

TOWNSHIP COMMITTEE RECAP

The Workshop meeting of Monday, February 9 heard many items discussed. Among them were updates on the Mayors Council on the Rahway River which recently received confirmation from Senator Menendez of the \$500,000 allocations included in both the 2015 and 2016 Federal budget which enables the Army Corps of Engineers to proceed with planning for flood control issues in our area. An agreement with Bergen County Tech for IT services and an agreement with Wizards of the Mind regarding use of the Municipal Pool were also discussed, along with a lengthy discussion of a Bond proposal for the pool. Also discussed was proposed contract for anitorial services for the Chisholm building, which will be seeing increased activity with the upcoming opening of the new Teen Center and the much used Senior Center. A number of resolutions were also reviewed as part of the continuing efforts of the Township and the Green Team to become a certifed Sustainable New Jersey community.

The Regular Session of the Township Committee meeting on Tuesday, February 10 included extended discussion of several of the topics listed above. Our Redevelopment attorney, Joseph Baumann, provided a report on the proposed Plan of the Township for Redevelopment of the portion of Morris Avenue located between Caldwell Place and Center Street. Several minor modifications have been made and the plan will be referred to the Planning Board for approval probably at the March meeting. That meeting is open to the public and the plans are available at the Engineering Office, so please plan to attend to hear the proposal and ask questions or make comments. If the plan is approved by the Planning Board, it will be referred back to the Township for final approval.

Ordinances in support of extending smoke-free areas to municipal parks and for a bond ordinance in the amount of \$242,000 had a first reading; they will be up for a final vote on March 10, so once again, please come to the meeting to be heard.

The Workshop meeting in March will beheld at 7:30 in the Firehouse on March 10; the next regular meeting of the Township Committee will be on March 11 in Town Hall and March 24, 7:30 in Town Hall.

At the Regular Session of the Township Committee on Tuesday, February 24, the Township Committee had the pleasure of presenting Amy Roselle with a Volunteer Service appreciation award. Amy works in the office of Dr. Gary Hecht, the head of Springfield HOPE, and is a major reason for the success of the organization. Dr. Hecht spoke about her contributions and a plaque was presented by Mayor Barnett. The Township Committee wants to recognize the contributions of otherwise unsungheroes who work toward the betterment of the communitiy, so if you have any nominations, please let us know. There were two well-deserved promotions in the police department, so congratulations go to Kimberly Raguse, now the first female Sergeant in the department, and to Lieutenant William Cieri. The retirement of Sergeant Walter Brooks was also recognized.

In addition to routine business conducted, two ordinances were approved providing for background checks on everyone working in recreation programs and expanding weight restrictions for several streets in the townships. A first reading of an ordinance adjusting some fees for the Springfield Community Pool Camp and Playground programs was held; the second reading and public discussion is scheduled for March 24. There were a number of resolutions approved as well.

Next Workshop Meeting of the Township Committee will be held on Monday, March 9 at the Firehouse at 7:30 followed the next night, March 10, by the Regular meeting on Tuesday at 7:30 at Town Hall.

15 POUNDS OF OUTDATED PRESCRIPTION MEDICATIONS DISPOSED OF

On Thursday, February 12, Chief John Cook visited the Senior Meeting at Chisholm Community Center with the portable Prescription Drug Drop-Off box. The seniors were able to dispose of approximately 15 lbs. of outdated prescription medications through this program, which guarantees confidentiality and safe disposal of the drugs. This prevents the drugs from being accessible in the home to theft or misuse, and allows them to be disposed of in a way that prevents them from getting into any water sources (they should never be flushed!) or land fills.

Chief Cook has been working for many months to bring this program to Springfield, and Deputy Mayor Margaret Bandrowski has worked with the Chief to incorporate the Drop-Off program into a Sustainable New Jersey action. Once certified as a Sustainable New Jersey Community, the township will have extended grant opportunities as well as the recognition that comes from completing the rigorous qualification process.

SPRINGFIELD CHISHOLM COMMUNITY CENTER SPREADS ITS WINGS

Thanks to the continued support and funding by the Springfield Township Committee, the newly renovated Raymond Chisholm Community Center Youth Wing will have a grand opening on Saturday, March 21st, at 11:00 am.

The beautiful new wing features a Teen Lounge with wall-mounted TVs for gaming and television watching; pod style seating areas where teens can gather in small clusters to chat, use their laptops, and study; air hockey, foosball, and billiards tables; twomeeting rooms that can be used by township committees, clubs, organizations, non-profit groups, and scouting groups; a Fitness Studio with mirrored walls for various exercise classes; a party room attached to the gym where town clubs, sports clubs, and families can hold parties; and one brand-new and two gut-renovated bathrooms.

In addition, all rooms and hallways feature new tile and paint; new cabinets; new closets with shelves; new window treatments, furniture, and bulletin boards; electrical upgrades; new wall safety pads along the perimeter of the gym; a relined and refinished gym floor with new base molding; new adjustable basketball backboards; newwater fountains; new emergency and exit lights; and a new door security access system. Most exterior light fixtures were replaced with long-life LED bulbs, which offer better security and reduce operating costs. The Recreation Department offices were also reconfigured to increase efficiencies, and received new carpet; the HVAC system was upgraded, and the old radiators were repurposed as recessed and lighted wall presentation cases.

The renovations were made possible by two generous grants from the Union County Kids Recreation Trust Fund, with additional funding from the Springfield Township Capital Improvement Budget. Cornerstone Architectural Group, who also designed the senior wing that was dedicated in 2013, managed the project design. Pharos Enterprises served as the general contractor for the project. The Township Engineering Department provided engineering support services, as well as day-to-day oversight from Adam Lieb, Recreation Director. Monthly meetings with the entire project team assured that the renovations were completed on time and within budget.

"We are thrilled with the new Youth Wing," said Lieb. "We are planning to host hundreds of kids per week, in addition to parents, coaches, instructors, and community members. These renovations will help us achieve our goal of becoming the center of community activities within the township. The new wing provides a fun, safe place where kids can gather after school, as well as for Teen Nights, Lounge Nights, and new sports and fitness programs. Everyone who participated in the planning and oversight of the renovation project should be proud of their hard work and feel rewarded now that it's come to fruition. This project highlights the commitment that the township has made to provide social and fitness opportunities for our young residents. We invite everyone to visit our beautiful new facilities!"

Police Chief's Column

In the past, persons who were the victims of bunco scams or confidence schemes were looked upon as being somewhat complicit in the fraud acts committed against them under the old adage of "you can't cheat an honest man." Today that saying is no longer true as fraud scams are now designed to target unsuspecting persons through sophisticated cons with the use of modern technology. Nowadays, the internet and the telephone make it extremely possible and sometimes very easy to "cheat an honest man". I would like recipients of the Springfield Patriot Times to be aware of some of the more prevalent scams that are committed against township residents every month. Taking a few moments to review this information may prevent you from falling victim to these

Most fraud scams that specifically target residents are done via the internet or via the telephone and are designed to obtain either money from or the personal identity information of the intended victim. This will be an attempt to have monies wired to the fraudsters or to obtain credit account numbers or identity information such as a social

• Any mail received or an internet e-mail or even a telephone call that indicates a resident is a winner of any type of sweepstakes or foreign lottery where some type of monetary fee is required to be paid is an outright scam. If you did not enter any sweepstakes or participated in any foreign lottery, there is no way you can be a winner. Whenever fees are required to be paid in advance in order to collect the supposed prize, this is a scam to con you out of your money. For any prize to be legitimate, there cannot be any monetary fee requested in order to collect a prize.

• If you are selling an item over the internet or you advertise some type of service that you perform, be wary of persons who contact you wanting to purchase items you've listed for sale or wanting to pay you for the services you offer where the subject pays by check which is payable to more monies than were agreed to. This scam specifically wants the intended victim to believe that the check was made out in the inflated amount by accident and will attempt to have the victim wire any monetary difference before the actual check is discovered to be counterfeit. The suspects will always be out of state or in a foreign country but will claim to be in the process of moving into Springfield. The scam targets persons selling any item from a car to a couch or offering services from babysitting to piano lessons.

• Do not give out personal information to callers who claim to be representatives of your bank or any business you may have a credit account with. The fraudster may also pose as a law enforcement official with the call pretending to be some type of investigation into fraud on your account. This is done to con you into giving out a social security number or other personal information when the caller asks you to prove your identity. Remember that anyone who calls you should already know who you are and you do not have to give out confidential information in order to prove your identity. This same scam, known as "phishing," can also involve bogus e-mails purporting to be from a financial institution or governmental agency and is intended to con you into divulging your identity information.

• Be wary of the "one ring cell phone scam" as falling for this could cost you hundreds of dollars. Scammers will randomly call blocks of numbers and will only let the phone ring once as this is enough to cause a missed call message to pop up on your cell phone. If you call back the number you will actually wind up calling adult entertainment type phone services located in foreign nations in the Caribbean. The cheaper phone numbers charge you \$19.95 for an international call fee with an additional \$9.00 charged per each minute. Some of the area codes used with this scam are: 268, 284, 473, 809 and 876. In other scams you may receive a phone message where the caller leaves a generic message that a family member has been hurt or has died and you are asked to call a number that has one of the above area codes and when you call it back you are deliberately stalled and put on hold to accrue extra minutes with some of the foreign scam numbers being known to actually cost hundreds or thousands of dollars per minute. If you do not recognize the number, do not call it and instead check it through Google to see if this number has been already reported as a fraud as it most likely will have been.

• Do not fall for someone who calls you claiming to be a police officer or a federal law enforcement agent AND who tells you there is a warrant for your arrest but that you can post the bail over the phone. The imposter will claim that instead of the officers coming to arrest you at your home or business you can "post bail" by either giving up your credit card number or by going to a store to purchase a Green Dot VISA money pack preloaded debit card. If you opt to do the latter you will purchase the card in the specified amount of the "bail" and then call the phone number you were given by the imposter to relay information from the card. If there is a reason, law enforcement may come to your house or business to arrest you but will never call ahead and then agree to accept bail money over the phone.


Also, businesses have been targeted in much the same way but where the caller claims to be from a utility company that threatens having the service shut down if a supposed unpaid utility bill is not satisfied immediately or the caller will claim to be from the Internal Revenue Service demanding you pay supposed unpaid taxes immediately or

If you believe you have received a call or an e-mail for any of the aforementioned or similar scams, you can contact the police department at (973)-376-0400 and an officer will meet with you to determine if this is a scam attempt. The one call that you make to your local police may save you hundreds if not thousands of dollars due to falling for one of these fraud calls that are being made more and more each year.

SAINT JAMES THE APOSTLE SCHOOL STUDENTS HELP PREPARE "A BABY FOR GRAM"

On February 9, 2015, Saint James the Apostle School in Springfield was pleased to welcome back Union County Volunteer Advocate Linda Mainker to the 5th grade classroom. In conjunction with the State's Office of the Ombudsman for the Institutional Elderly (O.O.I.E.) Mrs. Mainker developed a program called A Baby for Gram, which is baby doll therapy for memory care residents at nursing homes. Fifth graders were able to choose a baby doll and then diaper, dress, and swaddle the doll in a blanket. Mrs. Mainker and other Volunteer Advocates then deliver the dolls to several counties throughout the year to residents in need of this therapy. Residents who are "caring" for the realistic baby doll tend to be more focused and less agitated during routine care and their attitude towards other residents and facility staff is improved. Over the last 10 years, Mrs. Mainker and the Volunteer Advocates have delivered over 300 babies to memory care residents in Union, Hudson, Essex, and Morris counties. She was thrilled to get the help from the Saint James 5th grade class and the 5th graders were equally thrilled to prepare these babies and help those in need.

Ten-year Life of Smoke Alarms

Working smoke alarms detect and alert people to fire in its early stages, providing the warning needed to escape safely. According to the nonprofit National Fire Protection Association (NFPA), *working* smoke alarms cut the risk of dying in reported home fires in half. However, smoke alarms don't work forever.

The Springfield Fire Department is concerned that the presence of smoke alarms in Springfield residents' homes (most U.S. homes have at least one) may give them a false sense of security. Oftentimes, people don't know how old their smoke alarms are, if they're still functioning properly, or at all. That lack of awareness can have deadly consequences: nearly two-thirds of all home fire deaths result from fires in homes with no smoke alarms or no *working* smoke alarms.

Smoke alarms more than 10 years old no longer offer a reliable level of safety. Springfield Fire Department urges all *Springfield Patriot Times* readers to determine how old their smoke alarms are. (The date of manufacture is located on the back of the alarm.) If they're 10 years old or older, replace them immediately! This includes smoke alarms that use 10-year batteries and/or are hard-wired.

In accordance with NFPA, Springfield Fire Department offers the following recommendations for buying and installing smoke alarms:

- Purchase combination smoke alarms or both ionization and photoelectric alarms.
- Make sure smoke alarms have the label of a recognized testing laboratory.
- Install smoke alarms in every bedroom, outside each sleeping area and on every level of the home, including the basement. (Some older homes may not have smoke alarms installed in bedrooms, but it's important that these locations include them to provide adequate warning.)

Time and time again, the Springfield Fire Department has witnessed the life-saving impact of smoke alarms. But we also know tragedy can result from smoke alarms that aren't working properly. We strongly encourage all *Springfield Patriot Times* readers to inspect their smoke alarms today, and to replace them, if necessary, as soon as possible.
