SPRINGFIELD RECEIVES COUNTY GRANTS OF \$30,000 FOR SPECIAL NEEDS PLAYGROUND EQUIPMENT AND \$8,000 FOR TREES



On Thursday, October 25th, Mayor Richard Huber, Director of Recreation Adam Lieb, Assistant Director of Recreation Michael Butrico, Director of Engineering Sam Mardini, and Supervisor of Public Works Robert Boettcher were presented with a \$30,000 grant from the Union County Kids Recreation Trust Fund and a \$8,000 grant from Greening Union County. Springfield's ceremonial checks were awarded at the meeting of the Union County Board of Chosen Freeholders by Freeholder Chairman Sergio Granados, Freeholder Bruce Bergen, and Freeholder Alexander Mirabella. The Township is matching the Kids Recreation Trust Fund grant to finance new special needs playground equipment at Chisholm Park. The second playground expansion project in two years -- to be installed in spring 2019 - will add a shade structure, ramp, wheel thru arcade, cruiser, and spinner. Matching grants from the Kids Recreation Trust Fund are distributed to municipalities across Union County that are looking to upgrade or build recreational facilities for children and families. 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
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Message from the Mayor





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

SPRINGFIELD ENVIRONMENTAL COMMISSION AND GREEN TEAM JOINS WITH OTHER UNION COUNTY GROUPS TO FORM REGIONAL HUB

Last month, the Springfield Environmental Commission and Green Team met with 17 representatives from other Union County towns' Environmental and Green Teams to explore the formation of a Regional Environmental Hub under the auspices of Sustainable Jersey. Springfield, Summit, Berkeley Heights, Rahway and Westfield were represented as was the Rahway River Watershed Association.

Lauren Skowronski, program director for community engagement for Sustainable Jersey, provided background on the formation of a regional hub and shared information about what the nine Regional Hubs are already undertaking. Lauren shared, that in her experience, "When Green Teams and Environmental Commissions join together, their collaborative efforts can have a broad impact on creating positive environmental change." She noted that recently the Mercer County Hub had a very successful Green Fair hosted by nine towns with more than 1,000 attendees. Other Hubs are looking at multi-community recycling campaigns, small business energy efficiency cooperation and mentoring.

Another presenter, Mike Furci, Springfield's Commissioner for the Rahway Valley Sewage Authority, discussed compositing and digestible recycling and how towns can cooperate on these initiatives to save money.

Marian Glenn, who represented both Summit and the Rahway River Watershed Association, covered another key issue for many Union County municipalities: storm water regulations and practices. Discussion centered on such effective tools as rain gardens and porous asphalt.

Other representatives talked about green roofs, what can be done about plastic bag recycling and trans town bicycle routes. The meeting concluded with a unanimous vote to move ahead in forming a Regional Union County Hub.

HOLIDAY SAFETY TIPS

With the holidays nearing, readers of the Springfield Patriot Times, both residents and business owners alike, are preparing for the season. For most, this includes some type of holiday shopping. Unfortunately, thieves will also be out "shopping" during the months of November and December by looking to see what they can steal from you.

Many people still prefer to use cash when paying for their holiday gifts. Shoppers should be careful when they are receiving money from banks or ATM machines. Cash withdrawals should immediately be put out of sight before exiting the bank branch or ATM machine location. While paying, avoid displaying large amounts of cash, and put your wallet away quickly.

If you decide to pay with a credit or debit card, always retrieve the card back from the cashier after making a purchase. During the rush of holiday shopping it may be inadvertently left behind at the register or deliberately retained by a dishonest employee, especially when businesses hire many temporary holiday workers. If you later discover that your credit or debit card was not returned, do not waste time attempting to contact the store to see if your card was located. Instead, immediately contact the issuing bank for your card and report it lost to prevent any unauthorized use.

Anyone carrying handbags or purses should hold onto them while in stores, such as supermarkets, and not leave them unattended in shopping carts. Coupons should be kept in separate envelopes or billfolds which can be left accessible in the upper part of a cart, while wallets containing currency, credit cards or checks should be safely kept on your person. Thieves will look out for unattended carts with handbags or wallets and will quickly snatch them when shoppers are busy looking at or removing items from a shelf.

Handbags should NEVER be worn with the strap across the chest. Some thieves will drive up to a person who is walking in a parking lot and pretend to ask for directions. This draws the person closer, allowing the thief to grab onto the handbag strap and then rapidly speed away. If the person's bag is worn with the strap across the chest, he or she will most likely be dragged by the speeding car before the handbag strap eventually gives way and breaks. By holding a purse with your hands, or by strapping it straight over one shoulder, the purse may be gone but you are less likely to be hurt.

As handbag thefts, purse snatches, and pickpockets increase during the holiday shopping time, you should not carry with you anything that cannot be replaced. Identification cards and other documents such as checks or credit cards can be replaced, but other documents such as your Social Security card should be left at home since thieves who obtain this can easily use your identity information to commit various types of identity theft related frauds.

Readers of my column in the Springfield Patriot Times should remember that smartphone thefts remain on the rise throughout the country and many thieves will merely walk up and grab a phone from someone who is texting, streaming or surfing the web. Using a smartphone tends to make some people unaware of their surroundings, which could make them a more attractive target for phone thieves. Be careful when using your phone while walking through malls, parking lots and other busy public places, and if possible, wait until entering your vehicle to make a call or text.

Shoppers should park their cars in main well lit sections of a parking lot and should make sure to close all windows and lock all car doors when exiting. Any

shopping bags should be placed in the trunk or in the rear of an SUV or van where they are not readily visible. Thieves will walk through parking lots looking for vehicles with visible shopping bags to break into and steal. Also, do not leave gifts inside of your car overnight, even in your driveway. Instead, bring them inside your home to store.

Businesses should increase the amount of times cash is removed from register drawers and make additional bank drops if necessary, to prevent large amounts of money from being left in register drawers during business hours or overnight. Bank drops should be done by multiple employees going together and the times/days should be staggered to prevent thieves from learning business routines.

Many residents will likely order some gifts online in the months leading up to the holidays. Thieves will drive around residential areas looking for unattended packages left by the front doors of homes. Residents should check the tracking and delivery information for their orders, and request a delivery date/time when they will home, if possible. If no one will be home for the delivery, they should ask a trusted neighbor to retrieve and secure their packages until they return, or request the carrier to leave any parcels at either a side or rear door of their home. Residents should be alert for slow moving vehicles driving through their neighborhood, and immediately call the police if they observe the vehicle occupants remove packages from a home.

Residents who go away for the holidays should remember to cancel their mail delivery and any newspaper delivery and should do everything possible to make their house look occupied. Interior lights on timers and external lights that are motion activated can greatly reduce the appearance that no one is home. In addition, residents can ask a neighbor or family member to park a car in their driveway and keep an eye on their home while they are away.

Scammers know that everyone wishes they had more disposable income to use during the holiday shopping season. Con artists will increase their letters, e-mails or telephone calls that fraudulently claim some type of lottery or monetary prize was won or is owed to you. You can easily recognize one of these scams, and know it is a fraud, if you are directed to pay some kind of a "fee" in order to collect the money.

During the holiday season the Springfield Police will have officers in marked and unmarked vehicles patrolling both residential areas and shopping areas in town, doing their best to deter thieves and their holiday schemes. I urge residents to immediately report any suspicious activity to the police department, and keep all of these safety tips in mind. Together, we can keep Springfield safe for the holidays.

I hope all of you and your families have a happy, safe, and enjoyable holiday season.



HOUDAILLE QUARRY WALK

CONTINUED FROM FRONT COVER

On November 18, from 1 to 3 pm, the Springfield Environmental Commission will sponsor the annual 2018 Houdaille Quarry Walk, a ninety minute guided tour of the quarry located in Springfield, N.J.

"This is a once a year event," says Alyson Miller, Chair of the event. "There is no public access to the quarry except on this day. We get to visit a completely natural, unspoiled area that is home to turkeys, raccoons, deer, foxes, coyotes, and birds. At the bottom on the Quarry there is a pond and a tunnel under Route 78."

The deposit at Houdaille Quarry was created by a lava flow from an ancient volcano. The material was mined and used for road building and is now a natural area with a Union County leaf composting facility located on part of the site. It is a vigorous walk not intended for young children or anyone who is physically challenged. It will leave at promptly at 1 pm, no late comers allowed. The event will be canceled in case of inclement weather.





Carbon Monoxide Kills Every Year

WARNING: During New Jersey's 2017 – 2018 heating season, the state's poison control center received approximately 250 calls related to carbon monoxide (CO). Of these, 162 victims were evaluated in emergency departments and many required hospitalization.

Don't be the poison center's next statistic. Exposure to carbon monoxide can produce headaches, sleepiness, fatigue, confusion and irritability at low levels. At higher levels, it can result in nausea, vomiting, irregular heartbeat, impaired vision and coordination, and death. During cold and influenza season, symptoms of carbon monoxide poisoning can easily be confused with symptoms of viral illnesses like the common cold and the flu.

Prevention and early detection are crucial in preventing poisoning injury and death from carbon monoxide. The sudden shift in frigid weather forces homeowners and landlords to turn on their heating systems earlier than expected; without having them properly serviced beforehand to prevent CO exposure.

"Carbon monoxide is called the "Silent Killer" because it is a gas that gives no warning – you can't see it, smell it or taste it. "Don't gamble with your family's health and well-being; CO detectors are a must." Battery-operated carbon monoxide detectors should be put on every level of the home and near every sleeping area. Always check the batteries of both detectors (fire and CO) when changing the clocks twice a year for daylight savings time.

Safety tips to help reduce your risk of carbon monoxide exposure:

- 1. If you do not have any carbon monoxide detectors, install them right away. If your detectors are old and/or not working properly, replace them immediately.
- 2. Don't remove the batteries from detectors to use somewhere else. The detector can only save lives if it works.
- 3. Gas appliances must have adequate ventilation. If need be, keep a window slightly cracked to allow airflow.
- 4. Open flues when fireplaces are in use. Have chimneys inspected periodically to prevent blockage.
- 5. Never use the stove to heat your home/apartment.
- 6. Only use generators outside. Keep them more than 20 feet from both you and your neighbor's home, doors, or windows.
- 7. Do not bring generators, pressure washers, grills, camp stoves, or other gasoline, propane, natural gas or charcoal-burning devices inside your home, basement, garage, carport, camper, boat cabin, or tent – or even outside near an open window or door.
 - 8. DO NOT cook with charcoal indoors.
- 9. DO NOT idle a car in a closed garage. Once you pull in, immediately turn off the engine. Be extra careful with "remote start" engines which may be on without your knowledge.

If you suspect a carbon monoxide exposure, take immediate action:

- 1. If someone is unconscious or unresponsive, get him or her out of the house and call 9-1-1 immediately.
- 2. Exit the house/building immediately. Do not waste time opening windows. This will delay your escape and cause you to breathe in even more dangerous fumes.
- 3. Contact Springfield Fire Department/energy provider.4. Call the NJ Poison Control Center at 1-800-222-1222 for immediate medical treatment advice. Do not waste time looking for information on the internet about carbon monoxide poisoning. Call for fast, free and accurate information.

Carbon monoxide poisoning is serious. If you have questions or concerns about carbon monoxide or suspect CO exposure, call the medical professionals at the NJ Poison Control Center. If someone is unconscious, not breathing, hard to wake up, or seizing, call 9-1-1 immediately. Poison control centers are a great resource for information and emergencies.
