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FIREWORKS GO OFF ON THE FOURTH TO A RECORD CROWD DESPITE HURRICANE ARTHUR!

Hurricane Arthur could not dampen the spirit of celebration in Springfield on July 4th except for a few naysayers posting on the Town's Facebook page. According to Fourth of July Co-Chairman Scott Seidel, "We had a near record, if not record crowd that evening, no doubt due to the fact that many other surrounding towns called their shows off earlier in the day. I estimate probably 3,500 to 4,000 people came to see our show." Fourth of July Co-Chairman John Cottage Sr. noted,

"This year we had three bands performing, adding Dennis Tufano Original Lead Singer of the Buckinghams to the show for the 3rd act, following the 1910 Fruitgum Company and Barbara Harris and the Toys. Dennis, who flew in from California to do our show, did several of his number one hits, including 'Hey Baby' and 'Kind of a Drag' and the crowd loved it!" Seidel noted, "The musical portion of the show ran later than we'd hoped, pushing the fireworks back until 10 pm, a delay of about 20 to 30 minutes from our normal procedure. We did get a couple of complaints that it was getting late, but it really was a wonderful night with temperatures in the low to mid 60's, low humidity and a slight breeze. It's the best weather

John and I can recall we have had for a Fourth of July in our 36 years doing the show." If you missed Dennis Tufano's performance, he'll be back on the east coast on November 8 in Schenectady, NY, along with four other great artists from the Sixties, and \$55 will get you a ticket for that show. Last year we wrote about the \$5 per person cost for the celebration. CHIEF JAMES G. SANFORD RETIRES FROM FIRE DEPARTMENT

After 25 years of service to the Township of Springfield, Chief Sanford has decided to retire from the Springfield Fire Department. Chief Sanford began his career in Springfield as a firefighter in 1989. He was promoted to Captain in 2005, Deputy Chief in May of 2008, and Chief in July 2008.

During his career, Chief Sanford received commendations for two CPR Saves, Outstanding Service, and Honorable Service. Chief Sanford was deployed with the Union County Fire Mutual Aid Task Force to Staten Island during the aftermath of September 11th terror attacks to back-fill empty FDNY firehouses. After 9/11, Chief Sanford served as a NJ Urban Area Security Initiative – Neptune System Task Force Leader and as a NJ Regional Operations Intelligence Center Fusion Liaison Officer. Chief Sanford has secured \$336,875 in competitive grants for the Township.

"I grew up in Mountainside and joined the volunteer fire department there as soon as I became 18," said Chief Sanford. "I became an officer and held every rank from Lieutenant to Fire Chief during the thirteen years I served. I was working full time as a landscaper and going to college part-time."

"After joining Springfield as a career firefighter, I continued my education completing my Associate's Degree in Fire Science, Bachelor's Degree in Management Science, and most recently finished four years of graduate-level studies at the National Fire Academy, receiving my Executive Fire Officer Certificate."

"I have always felt that having as much training as possible would help me make the best fire-fighting decisions and would contribute to everyone going home safely to their families after a fire call. One of the things I am most proud of in my career is that my men trusted that I would never ask them to do something that I myself would not be willing to do. I appreciate their faith in my leadership and will miss working with them."

Although Chief Sanford will no longer be working in Springfield, he is not quite ready to give up his life-long passion just yet. All of us at the Springfield Patriot Times wish him well as he begins his next career.

"I will be continuing in the Fire Service by being an instructor at the fire academy. I've learned so much over the course of my career, and I'm eager to share my knowledge with new firefighters. Good leadership isn't all about having followers, it's more important to create future leaders. Training and education are the best ways to stay safe because fire service is constantly evolving. I learned a lot in the classroom, but I also would listen to the fire radio when other towns would have a large fire and would learn from those real life scenarios as they were happening. I would urge anyone considering a career in the fire department to get as much training as possible so you can safely dedicate yourself to the town you serve."

PAY YOUR AUGUST PROPERTY TAXES ON-LINE!

To make it easier for residents and property owners, you can pay your third-quarter, August property taxes on-line.

The Township of Springfield is offering the option to pay your property taxes conveniently on-line through Visa or MasterCard credit cards, or checking account ACH Payment (e-Check).

Using a credit card or an ACH payment is optional. It is intended as another option for paying your property taxes that may be more convenient than mailing or waiting in line to pay your taxes at Town Hall. On-line payment using ACH payment (bank debit) is free.

There is a credit card service charge. The fee that is charged is the cost that is passed onto the Township from the credit card provider/merchant and therefore must be passed onto the taxpayer. The Township doesn't make money on this service charge.

FIRST RAIN GARDEN COMPLETED. MORE TO FOLLOW!

The Township installed its first of several rain gardens at James Caldwell Elementary School located at 36 Caldwell Place in mid-June. The design and work was done by Toby Horton, Assistant Professor and Landscape Architect of Rutgers University and Robert Brennan, Master Gardener from the Township's Public Works Department *(pictured in photo)*. Additional staff Public Works employees assisted.

"The first rain garden will show how the design style of a rain garden can be adapted to the character of its context. Additionally, this garden will foreground the function of the garden as a piece of visible civic infrastructure by highlighting the inflow of water, the path of runoff through the garden and its reconnection to the storm sewer system at the overflow. By demonstrating the potential civic character and the mechanics of the garden's function, the project will show how green infrastructure can fit different contexts and be recognized as a beautiful and effective treatment stage in the flow of water from impervious surfaces to sewers and water bodies," said Toby Horton of Rutgers.

The \$10,000 grant was award to the Township by Sustainable Jersey. The goal is to utilize the rain gardens as educational tools to encourage residents, commercial property owners and developers to put them in on their own properties. Compared to a patch of lawn, a rain garden allows about 30% more water to soak into the ground. Rain gardens mimic natural hydrology by infiltrating and evapotranspiring runoff and act as versatile features that can be installed in most unpaved spaces and residents and commercial property owners of Springfield can adopt this best practice on their own properties.

Another rain garden will be built in late July or August at the Chisholm Community Center.



TOWNSHIP APPOINTS NEW RECREATION DIRECTOR

Adam Lieb is the Township's new Recreation Director. Adam grew up in Springfield and attended James Caldwell, Florence Gaudineer, and Jonathan Dayton schools. He graduated from Brandeis University and Columbia University.

Adam served as the Recreation Director in Florham Park since September 2008. Previously, he worked as the Assistant Recreation Director in Mountainside.

In an exclusive interview with the Patriot, Adam commented," Some of my favorite memories of Springfield include the Little League parade, summer tennis lessons, and the Mr. Peanut contest at the pool. As Recreation Director, I plan to continue the popular and successful programs, leagues, and traditions of the Recreation Department, as well as add new activities and develop positive communication with residents. My goal is to provide quality recreation programs, fields, and facilities to the youth, adults, and seniors of Springfield. I am looking forward to meeting staff and residents this summer."

PSE&G TO UPGRADE GAS FACILITIES IN SPRINGFIELD ON THE FOLLOWING STREETS

 Riverside Drive between Joanna Way and Washington Avenue

- Washington Ave between Riverside Drive and Morris Ave
- Battlehill Avenue between Riverside Drive and Morris Avenue
- Colonial Terrace between Joanna Way and Morris Avenue
- South Maple Avenue between Morris Avenue and Riverside Drive
- Marion Avenue to Morris Avenue
- Perry Place between Warner Avenue and Marion Avenue
- Warner Avenue to Morris Avenue
- Alvin Terrace to Morris Avenue
- Morris Avenue between South Maple Avenue and Washington Avenue

The utility will be installing new gas mains, as well as upgrading associated service lines that carry the gas to homes and businesses. Beginning July 7, work will take place Monday through Saturday between the hours of 7 a.m. and 8 p.m., conditions permitting. The project is expected to be complete in September. Customers will be notified when work is about to begin in their area. This upgrade is part of PSE&G's recently approved Energy Strong program to strengthen and protect the state's electric and gas infrastructure from severe weather.

As part of Energy Strong, PSE&G will replace 250 miles of older cast iron main with new plastic pipe in or near flood areas throughout its service territory. This year the utility will replace the first 88 miles, with the remainder scheduled for replacement in 2015. These new pipes will prevent water from entering the mains, increasing the reliability of gas service in these locations.

COMMUNITY POOL IMPROVEMENTS MAKE A DIFFERENCE!

With the support of the Township Committee, many capital improvements have been made at the Springfield Community Pool located at 44 Morrison Road early in the spring.

The improvements include: new state of the art filter for the large and children pools, the inside of pools have been painted and new pool tiles installed as well as all the surface concrete sealed, new bathroom fixtures (auto flush toilets and sinks), new ceramic tile floors in the bathrooms that are now pitched to allow for better drainage, new hand-dryers in the men's and women's bathrooms, new shower heads inside and outside, a new vortex slide, three colorful shade areas, new accessible ADA steps, new life guard stands, new pool vacuum, a new ice maker for concession stand and a new decorative fence will be installed later in July at the entrance of the pool building.

The improvements were from pool proceeds including pool membership and camps operating at the pool.



TOWNSHIP RECAP: CHANGES IN OUR TOWN

There are some changes occurring in the Township by the time the month of June has ended! The Township Committee has been advised that Fire Chief James Sanford is retiring as of June 30 after serving Springfield's Fire Department for 25 years. The Chief has seen many changes in the Department and has made huge positive contributions and we all wish him and his family well in his new life. Deputy Chief Carlo Palumbo has been appointed Acting Chief effective July 1 and the search is underway for a new Chief and Deputy Chief who will take over in the near future. Also, congratulations to Captain David Maas who has retired from the Springfield Fire Department after many years of service.

The Township Commitee has also accepted the resignation of Recreation Director Michael Tennaro after 17 years in that position. Mike and his family are moving to Florida and we wish them all the best as they settle into their new lives. Acting as Interim Department Head is Peter Wright, a veteran of the Bernards Township Recreation Department, who is in the post from mid-June until July 1. On that date, former Springfield resident Adam Lieb will be returning to town as the Recreation Director. Adam has served as Assistant Recreation Director in Mountainside and comes to us from Florham Park, where he has been the Dept Head for several years. Mike, Pete, and Adam have been working together to make the transition smooth. Thank you Pete, as you cycle off to Italy, and welcome, Adam! The Municipal Pool opened over Memorial Day

The Municipal Pool opened over Memorial Day weekend and is in full swing now, with several new amenities; the slide has been installed, a new fence erected, and several shade structures have been added. And the landscaping is beautiful, thanks to the Department of Public Works and Park workers. Both the pool camp and the Chisholm Summer camp programs are operating.

During June several new police and probationary firemen were sworn in and an Investigator, James Mirabile, was promoted to Detective which puts him permanently in the Detective Bureau whereas the Investigator positions are assignments and can be rotational. Congratulations to Chief Cook, Captain McLaughlin, Corporal Rachel, and Detective Lieutenant Levinson, who have worked on the accreditation process and were advised, after the department's on-site inspection in June, that the Springfield Police Department had passed and will be recommended for certification later this year. This is a great accomplishment, which has been achieved by only about 25% of departments in the state of NJ, and is well deserved.

At the June 24 Regular Session the Township Committee approved (among other items) a notification to the vendor that the Township will not be renewing the contract for the recycling bins with advertising on public property that expires at the end of 2015. Two additional lots were added to the Redevelopment area (one on Center Street and one on Blacks Lane) while the resolution adding the Sarah Bailey lot to the area was tabled until the August meeting. An employment agreement with the Township Administrator from 2014 through March 2017 was approved. A new employee was hired for Department of Public Works (replacing a retiree) and several part-timers were hired for various open positions.

A petition was presented to the TC regarding a new plan for the basketball courts and it will be considered by the Recreation Team and the TC when they have an opportunity to review.

PHONE SCAMS

In the past persons who were the victims of bunco scams or confidence schemes were looked upon as being somewhat complicit in the fraud acts committed against them under the old adage of "you can't cheat an honest man." Today that saying is no longer true as fraud scams are now designed to target unsuspecting persons through sophisticated cons with the use of modern technology. Nowadays the internet and the telephone make it extremely possible and sometimes very easy to "cheat an honest man." I would like recipients of the Springfield Patriot Times to be aware of some of the more prevalent scams that have been committed against township residents in the past several months. A review of this information may aid in preventing you from falling victim to these scams.

Most fraud scams that specifically target residents are done via the internet or via the telephone and are designed to obtain either money from or the personal identity information of the intended victim. This will be an attempt to have monies wired to the fraudsters or obtain credit account numbers or identity information such as a Social Security number.

- Any mail received or an internet e-mail or even a telephone call that indicates a resident is a winner of any type of sweepstakes or foreign lottery where some type of monetary fee is required to be paid is an outright scam. If you did not enter any sweepstakes or participate in any foreign lottery, there is no way you can be a winner. Whenever fees are required to be paid in advance in order to collect the supposed prize, this is a scam to con you out of your money. For any prize to be legitimate there cannot be any monetary fee requested in order to collect a prize.
- If you are selling an item over the internet or you advertise some type of service that you perform, be wary of persons who contact you wanting to purchase items you've listed for sale or wanting to pay you for the services you offer where the subject pays by check which is payable to more monies than were agreed to. This scam specifically wants the intended victim to believe that the check was made out in the inflated amount by accident and will attempt to have the victim wire any monetary difference before the actual check is discovered to be counterfeit. The suspects will always be out of state or in a foreign country but will claim to be in the process of moving into Springfield. The scam targets persons selling any item from a car to a couch or offering services from babysitting to piano lessons.

- Do not give out personal information to callers who claim to be representatives of your bank or any business you may have a credit account with. The fraudster may also pose as a law enforcement official with the call pretending to be some type of investigation into fraud on your account. This is done to con you into giving out a Social Security number or other personal information when the caller asks you to prove your identity. Remember that anyone who calls you should already know who you are and you do not have to give out confidential information in order to prove your identity. This same scam, known as "phishing" can also involve bogus e-mails purporting to be from a financial institution or governmental agency and is intended to con you into divulging your identity information.
- Be wary of the "one ring cell phone scam" as falling for this could cost you hundreds of dollars. Scammers will randomly call blocks of numbers and will only let the phone ring once as this is enough to cause a missed call message to pop up on your cell phone. If you call back the number you will actually wind up calling adult entertainment type phone services located in foreign nations in the Caribbean. The cheaper phone numbers charge you \$19.95 for an international call fee with an additional \$9.00 charged per each minute. Some of the area codes used with this scam are: 268, 284, 473, 809 and 876. In other scams you may receive a phone message where the caller leaves a generic message that a family member has been hurt or has died and you are asked to call a number that has one of the above area codes and when you call it back you are deliberately stalled and put on hold to accrue extra minutes with some of the foreign scam numbers being known to actually cost hundreds or thousands of dollars per minute. If you do not recognize the number do not call it and instead check it through Google to see if this number has been already reported as a fraud as it most likely will have been.
- Do not fall for someone who calls you claiming to be a police officer or a federal law enforcement agent AND who tells you there is a warrant for your arrest but that you can post the bail over the phone. The imposter will claim that instead of the officers coming to arrest you at your home or business you can "post bail" by either giving up your credit card number or by going to a store to purchase a Green Dot VISA money pack preloaded debit card. If you opt to do the latter you will purchase the card in the specified amount of the "bail" and then call the phone number you were given by the imposter to relay information from the card. If there is a reason, law enforcement may come to your house or business to arrest you but will never call ahead and then agree to accept bail money over the phone. Also businesses have been targeted in much the same way but where the caller claims to be from a utility company that threatens having the service shut down if a supposed unpaid utility bill is not satisfied immediately.

If you believe you have received a call or an e-mail for any of the aforementioned and or similar scams, you can contact the police department at (973)-376-0400 and an officer will meet with you to determine if this is a scam attempt. The one call that you make to your local police may save you hundreds if not thousands of dollars due to falling for one of these fraud calls that are being made more and more each year.



Envisioning the Future

This article will serve as my last submission to the Springfield Patriot Times. I have been contributing to the newspaper since its first publication in 2008 and hope that my columns have been informative. I wish to offer a contemplation of the past because learning from successes and failures is an important component of envisioning the future. I would like to leave a few of my thoughts for future community risk reduction.

The Springfield Fire Department has made a cultural transformation during the past six years. We have made community risk reduction a priority and have valued public education equally to suppression efforts. Through training, motivation, and a focus on "constant, regular, significant and positive interaction with the community," the Springfield Fire Department has achieved both low per-capita fire costs and a low fire-loss-and-injury rate.

With that being said, the most successful organizations know where they are going and have a strategic plan to take them there. The ancillary benefits are many, including creating a sense of organization and direction. The Springfield Fire Department will continue to seek new opportunities to serve the citizens. Taking on partnerships, grants, and making investments in technology will allow the department to take on new lines of service. Moving forward, the Springfield Fire Department will continue to monitor changes occurring locally and nationally and to anticipate the needs of our residents.

I am very proud of my 25 years of service to the Township of Springfield and am grateful for the opportunities I have had here. I have worked with many wonderful and supportive people over the years and have learned a tremendous amount about the fire service. I wish all of my fellow employees the best in their endeavors to make the Township a good place to live, work and raise a family.

(CONT. FROM COVER)

This year we'd thought we'd discuss the process that is used in deciding whether or not to postpone the show for weather related issues and how and what is involved in that process. For a few days leading up to the Fourth, The Fourth of July Committee is watching the forecast. Since weather forecasters can be wrong as much as they are right, in most circumstances, we really can't make the call until the day of the event. Even then, due to the complexity of the celebration, the call has to be made 12 hours before the fireworks go off and 7 hours before the gates open. The food vendors, ride providers, petting zoo and pony rides, sound engineers and the bands all need to know by 10 am if it's a go. Once they start moving, the call can't be undone. Food has to be loaded into vehicles. the petting zoo animals loaded into their trailers for the ride to Springfield, and the stage and sound system set up. The DPW needs to put out the tables and chairs for the gates, and trash receptacles and additional barricades for the streets. And of course, the Auxiliary Police, all volunteers who give up their 4th of July to make this happen, have to be on site between noon and three to get ready to close Meisel Ave.

So at 10 am on the 4th, the Fourth of July Committee and Senior Emergency Management Staff met at the OEM office and reviewed a number of weather forecasts and weather radar maps to try and determine if the 4th was the day. With Hurricane Arthur approaching from the southeast and a line of strong thunderstorms from the west, Seidel noted, "This was one of the toughest calls we've had to make as we have never had a hurricane in the picture on the Fourth." Cottage commented, "Our number one concern is running a safe event. We have to weigh all the variables and decide if it's a go. A number of other factors will come into play as well such as the band(s) and ride availability the next day. If we postpone a day (or more as our rain date is the next clear night), is it now on a weeknight when people will have to go to work the next day and maybe not come out?" At 10 am, Seidel called for a go/no go vote from the Senior OEM staff: Deputy OEM Coordinator Wally Schultz, Auxiliary Police Chief Angelo Palumbo, CERT Coordinator Jim Sedlak, Radio Officer John Cottage Jr. and OEM Chief of Staff Bobby Abraham. "Go" was the unanimous vote.

Sam emailed me some of them and the most amusing one was a complaint that the person was going to get wet sitting on the wet field because of the weather and our poor decision about having the show that day. About the only way someone would have gotten wet that night was if they sat in the brook!"



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MANAGING YOUR GARBAGE - WHAT YOU NEED TO KNOW AND DO

Almost everyone has had to deal with smelly garbage, a common annoyance. Garbage containers are some of the most useful household devices - although they can quickly become unpleasant.

Hot and humid weather always seems to bring out the worst in the most unpleasant odors. Garbage containers may smell at this time of the year if steps are not taken to minimize the potential odor. Any organic item like poultry and other meat wrappers can go from a slight smell to a strong odor within a few hours when the temperatures begin to increase.

Sometimes the garbage may leak out of the bag and into the garbage can. The smell may be hard to get rid of since it has soaked into your garbage containers. When hot water and soap will not remove the odor, there are natural ways to clean the area and eliminate the terrible smell.

A clean and odor-free garbage container is very important for the health of your home as well as the people in it. Garbage containers do not need to spread an aroma from the smelly garbage containers that are often placed in them. While these smells may be strong at times, they are relatively easy to manage and eliminate when they occur.

Here are a few natural suggestions that should leave your garbage containers smelling clean and fresh:

• Clean with Vinegar - Vinegar is a very effective cleaner and sanitizer. Vinegar works well at eliminating smells as well. Cleaning with vinegar is extremely safe and generally cheaper than cleaning with commercial cleansers. If you have a smelly garbage can or a smelly area from spilled garbage, simply dilute the vinegar with a little bit of water in a spray bottle, then apply the mixture to the area and wipe clean. This may take a few applications if the smell continues to linger. If you have an unpleasant odor that has spread to an entire room instead of a concentrated area, then simply leave a bowl of undiluted white vinegar in the room overnight to absorb the smell.

- Baking Soda Baking soda is a great product to use to absorb odors. If you have a metal trash can, it is suggested that you place the baking soda in a plastic container without a lid and leave that in the bottom of your trash can overnight to absorb odors. If you have a plastic trash can, you can place the baking soda directly into the trash can and replace it each time you empty your garbage containers.
- Citrus Peels Lemons, oranges and other citrus fruits have a wonderful clean aroma associated with them. Simply taking the peels of these fruits and placing them in your garbage can is a very effective deodorizer. Remember to make sure the peels are relatively dry before placing them into your trash can to prevent quick growth of bacteria.
- Coffee Grounds Coffee has a very powerful scent that can instantly mask the odor of smelly garbage. Adding some fresh coffee grounds to your trash can overnight can help mask the tainted odors within your trash can.
- Cleaning out your trash can every time you throw out the garbage will greatly reduce the odors you bring back into your house. If you do not clean your trash can regularly it begins to produce a very unappealing odor caused by the growth of bacteria. This may not be the most appealing job in the world, but it will make an exceptional difference in the cleanliness of your home.

When using plastic garbage liners inside your garbage containers, you should consider the earth friendly type.

Earth Friendly Trash Liners are intended to be composted in a municipal or commercial facility. Compostable trash liners make it easy to contribute to a cleaner environment.


What about animals that may be attracted to my garbage area?

An effective wild animal control program can employ methods that are relatively easy, inexpensive, and effective. The successful elimination of animal infestation in or around a dwelling usually depends on three separate procedures: sanitation, animal proofing, and the eventual elimination of animals. Sanitation conducted for the control of animals involves both the eradication of any food source for the animals as well as the elimination of all harborage areas. One of the most prominent food sources for animals is garbage. The routine storage of all garbage in animal -proof containers is a vital aspect of any animal control program.

A sufficient number of receptacles must be provided to hold all garbage that normally accumulates. The garbage containers should be rust resistant, water tight, have tight-fitting lids and kept clean. The interior of receptacles can be kept free of organic buildup by placing all garbage in plastic bags and tightly sealing them before placing them in the garbage containers.

This practice also effectively reduces fly breeding and odors. Other food sources in and around the home include fruits and nuts which have not been harvested or that have fallen from trees, garden vegetables and berries left to rot on plants, bird seed which falls from feeders and accumulates on the ground, and dog droppings not properly disposed of in the trash. A frequent source of food for animals is pet food which is not completely consumed or left out overnight. Outdoor pets should be fed only what they can readily consume at each feeding. Food dishes should be placed away from vegetation in areas which can be kept clean.

Elimination of harborage where animals hide or nest is a critical step in any successful animal control program. Tall grass, mature brush, ivy and other dense ground plants, and untrimmed shrubbery provide excellent harborage for animals. Residents should sufficiently thin ground plants, trim shrubbery to allow at least 12 inches of open area beneath plants, and remove dead leaves from the trunks of palm trees.
