SPRINGFIELD AUXILIARY POLICE GAINS FOUR NEW OFFICERS

The Springfield Auxiliary Police swore in four new members on May 12th. The Officers, all volunteers, completed a comprehensive training class at the He John H. Stamler Police Academy which runs the class in cooperation with the Union County Office of Emergency Management. They train civilian volunteers to serve as Auxiliary Officers, who, under the New Jersey Civil Defense and Disaster Control Plan, can be appointed to augment the forces of the regular police departments in the event of emergencies.

An Auxiliary Police Officer is a civic-minded resident who volunteers his or her time to the local Police Department. These officers serve as the "eyes and ears" of the police department. In addition, an Auxiliary Police Officer provides police presence in the community. In uniform, the Auxiliary Officer can conduct both foot and vehicle patrols, as well as assist with special events, such as festivals, parades and holiday activities. The Auxiliary Officer also serves the extremely important role of support during a state of emergency or other time of crisis

Although the Auxiliary Police Officer volunteers his or her personal time, the officer upholds the same personal and professional standards as any law enforcement officer. Upon graduating from the Auxiliary Academy, the Auxiliary Police Officer is administered the Oath of Honor that is taken by all law enforcement officers.

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Message from the Mayor



Hello Springfield Friends and Neighbors,

The 2016 PGA Championship will be here July 25 through Sunday July 31 hosted at Baltusrol in Springfield. This is one of golf's four annual Majors and will be televised in over 200 countries. This event will attract thousands of visitors into our community from all over the world. It is an honor to be the host town. Baltusrol and Springfield have had many major golf events over the years, the last being 2005.

As expected with this type of event, there are substantial impacts to our community during that week. Baltusrol and the PGA have been working for over a year with State Police, Homeland Security, the County, and Springfield to address some of the challenges that come with an event this size. Safety and security are the top concerns along with operational and logistic considerations.

We have had many meetings and negotiations leading to this event and we feel we have worked hard to make sure this event will be successful while trying to mitigate the impact to our residents. Baltusrol has always been a great contributor to our community and always a good neighbor. Baltusrol and the PGA have paid and will pay Springfield for any expenses that arise, and usage of Township property. They have paid for building permits, inspections, Police and Fire Department staffing. There will not be a negative impact to our budget based on the Championship.

The 2016 PGA Championship Transportation sub-committee working with State, County and Local law enforcement along with NJ DOT traffic Specialist have proposed a traffic plan that includes road closures, detours and parking restrictions. This was all based on safety issues for everyone involved and attending the event.

At this time FULL ROAD CLOSURES planned for the event are

- Shunpike Road for duration of event
- Hillside Ave from Mountain to Irwin street during operational hours
- Adams Terrace during operational hours

Roads closed to local traffic only

Briar Hills Circle, Ashwood Road, Wentz Avenue, Gregory Road, Sherwood Road, Jefferson Terrance, Edgewood Ave, Remer Avenue, Ronald Terrance, Madison Terrance, Mapes Avenue, Irwin Street, Kipling Avenue, Adams Terrance

Irwin Park will serve as the only general public gate. The entrance on Shunpike Road will be restricted for other uses.

Ticket availability is limited, and Baltusrol has informed me that the PGA Championship Executive committee will allocate complimentary tickets only to local residents in Springfield whose home/property border the Baltusrol Golf Club. They have sent out letters to those meeting that criteria. The town has not been notified on which residents these are.

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

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Police Chief's Column Chief John P. Cook

Readers of the Springfield Patriot Times should be noticing an increase in the visible enforcement of motor vehicle violations by Springfield police officers. This is being done to coincide with the school closings for summer recess. This enforcement is not done merely to cite motorists for violations, but to hopefully educate both drivers and pedestrians alike in the safe and proper use of township roadways in an effort to reduce vehicle accidents. It is imperative that motorists operate their vehicles with extra caution during the summer months when more people are outdoors, especially children playing in residential areas and local parks or walking or riding bicycles along township streets.

A law change went into effect in 2010 that has now changed the statute that originally only required motorists to yield to pedestrians who were legally crossing in a crosswalk to now require the motorist to come to a complete stop for a pedestrian in any crosswalk.

Both resident and business recipients of the Springfield Patriot Times are reminded that there are many intersections that are not controlled by a traffic signal and are located on more heavily trafficked roadways. It is vital that motorists now come to a complete stop when approaching an intersection with crossing pedestrians.

Plainclothes police officers may be posing as pedestrians while crossing at various intersections throughout the township. Motorists who fail to stop for the "crossing pedestrian" will be stopped by uniformed officers and issued a summons for failing to stop for pedestrians. Police officers will specifically target intersections throughout the township where there have been past incidents of either pedestrians or bicyclists having been struck by automobiles. These will also include those intersections where pedestrians have been seriously injured or killed. This enforcement action will continue during the summer months to ensure the maximum safety of children and adults walking about the streets in the township.

This statewide enforcement program for this new law, known as Shared Responsibility, stipulates that not only are motorists expected to stop for pedestrians using a crosswalk but the pedestrians are expected to only legally cross a roadway at an intersection with a traffic signal, a crosswalk, or where a crosswalk would be located. Any pedestrian crossing a roadway illegally can be subject to being stopped by police officers as well.

Other police operations being conducted will target some of the major causes of motor vehicle accidents that occur within the township. Officers will be stopping motorists who operate a motor vehicle while using a cellular telephone that is not set up for hands free operation or are observed to be text messaging while driving. The other violations that contribute to a high number of accidents that are also being addressed are speeding, the improper use of specific turning lanes at intersections, and overall aggressive driving.

Recipients of the Springfield Patriot Times are urged to make sure that any child under the age of 17 only rides a bicycle while wearing an approved, properly fitted, and fastened bicycle helmet. This law also applies to any child who rides upon a bicycle while in a restraining seat that is attached to the bicycle or in a trailer that is hooked up to and is towed by the bicycle. Despite the mandatory age requirement for the wearing of bicycle helmets, this is something that all bicyclists should do in order to prevent head injuries.

Daily rush hour traffic congestion, combined with more and more motorists rushing to their destinations, and the summer months having more children out and about, makes it vital that motorists use common sense and caution when driving. Police officers know better than most about the tragic consequences that result from accidents caused by inattentive or careless drivers. Hopefully by increased and visible traffic enforcement, accidents resulting in injuries or deaths can be prevented.

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MAYORS COUNCIL RAHWAY RIVER WATERSHED FLOOD CONTROL REPORTS MAJOR STEP FORWARD IN RAHWAY RIVER FLOOD MITIGATION PLAN

Mayors Council Rahway River Watershed Flood Control reports good news that the US House of Representatives introduced HR 5303, the Water Resources Development Act of 2016, this past week which includes an amendment to authorize the construction planning and engineering of the Rahway River Flood Mitigation plan. The priority given to the project was represented by the House Committee approval of the amendment that affects only eight such projects nationwide.

After an extensive evaluation of ten different flood control alternatives, the US Army Corps of Engineers and NJ Department of Environmental Protection are expected to recommend the best alternative from a benefit-cost perspective in the next month to proceed to a final plan.

Earlier in 2016 the Mayors went to Washington DC to make the case before the US Congress for construction funding of the Rahway River flood mitigation plan. This was the third visit which reflected the commitment of these officials to urge action.

Cranford Mayor Andis Kalnins said, "We wanted to thank Congressman Leonard Lance for his instrumental effort to represent us by working to get support for the important amendment. The Congressman has been a strong advocate for local residents. Maplewood Mayor Victor DeLuca said, "The bipartisan regional effort to bring the federal and state governments to bear on a serious public safety issue has been critical. He also thanked Congressman Albio Sires for his role in supporting the measure for residents."

Also recently received as well was \$774,000 (federal with state match) in funds

Also recently received as well was \$774,000 (federal with state match) in funds included in FY 2017 for the continuing investigation work. That legislation remains to be adopted by the full US Congress and signed by the President. Mayors expressed appreciation to Senators Booker and Menendez and Congressman Lance and Payne for their continued efforts on this.

The Mayors Council Rahway River Watershed Flood Control includes: Union Mayor Manual Figueiredo; Former Millburn Mayor Robert Tillotson; Cranford Mayor Andis Kalnins; Millburn Mayor Ted Bourke; Rahway Mayor Sam Steinman; Springfield Mayor Jerry Fernandez; Maplewood Mayor Victor Deluca; and Kenilworth Mayor Anthony DeLuca.

Over \$100 million of damages was faced by residents along the Rahway River during Irene and no improvement in the situation has yet been done. The Federal and State Rahway River Flood Mitigation Plan has significant flood mitigation benefits including material water elevation reductions from Millburn to Rahway.

The plan includes modification to the Orange reservoir to store more water during peak storm conditions and there is proposed channelization improvements from Lenape Park through Cranford; and investigations are ongoing for improved storage in the Robinson Branch part of the Rahway River in the City of Rahway.

There has been a steady decline in the average number of gasoline fires in homes each year since 1980 when there were 15,000 fires.

FACTS & FIGURES

In 2003-2006, municipal fire departments responded to an estimated 2,400 gasoline structure fires in U.S. homes, annually. These fires resulted in 110 civilian deaths, 313 civilian injuries, and \$105.9 million in direct property damage.

49% of home gasoline structure fires each year between 2003 and 2006 were categorized as intentional. Almost three-quarters of civilian injuries resulted from unintentional causes. Fuel spills or releases, using gasoline to kindle fire, and gasoline too close to a heat source, were the leading factors contributing to ignition in home gasoline structure fires.

Spark ember or flame from operating equipment was the most common ignition source in home gasoline structure fires, followed by matches and lighters.

SAFETY TIPS

• Keep gasoline out of children's sight and reach. Children should never handle gasoline.

If fire does start while handling gasoline, do not attempt to extinguish the fire or stop the flow of gasoline. Leave area immediately, and call for help.

- Do not use or store gasoline near possible ignition sources (i.e., electrical devices, oil- or gas-fired appliances, or any other device that contains a pilot flame or a spark).
- Store gasoline outside the home (i.e., in a garage or lawn shed) in a tightly closed metal or plastic container approved by an independent testing laboratory or the local or state fire authorities. Never store gasoline in glass containers or non-reusable plastic containers (i.e., milk jugs).
- Store only enough gasoline necessary to power equipment, let machinery cool before refueling it.
- Never use gasoline inside the home or as a cleaning agent.
- Clean up spills promptly and discard clean-up materials properly.
- Do not smoke when handling gasoline.
- Never use gasoline in place of kerosene.
- Use caution when fueling automobiles. Do not get in and out of the automobile when fueling. Although rare, an electrical charge on your body could spark a fire, especially during the dry winter months.
- Only fill portable gasoline containers outdoors. Place the container on the ground before filling and never fill containers inside a vehicle or in the bed of a pick-up truck.
- Follow all manufacturers instructions when using electronic devices (those with batteries or connected to an electrical outlet) near gasoline.



The Auxiliary Police Color Guard led the parade as it proceeded from Veterans Park to Jonathan Dayton High School. The Kean University trolleys were












again on hand to ferry our veterans along the parade route.

While the exact date and origin of the first observance of Memorial Day may not be known for certain, it was originally referred to as "Decoration Day" after the Civil War and then to "Memorial Day" in 1882. The observance became officially named by federal law in 1967. On June 28, 1968, Congress passed the Uniform MondayHoliday Act, moving four holidays, including Memorial Day, from their traditional dates to a specified Monday, creating a three-day weekend. This change moved Memorial Day from its traditional date of May 30 to the last Monday in May effective in 1971





The defense, which played extremely well, was led by Daniel Munoz, Cole Kebea, Sam Roth, Brandon Doren, Evan Kay, and team MVP candidate Nicholas Stampoulos in goal. Nick had his first shutout and only gave up 1 ½ goals per game. Coaches Brady Hendrickson and Ted Stampoulos are commended for what they accomplished with their team. This group of boys — combined with a much improved 8th grade team and a new girls team — has made the 2016 season a remarkable one for the Lacrosse Club of Springfield. I hope you will be able to celebrate the accomplishment of these students and encourage them in person for taking this small step toward their future in movie making, television production, news media and other related fields. Thank you!




SUSAN G. KOMEN NORTH JERSEY'S STUDENTS FOR THE CURE AMBASSADORS
