

First I would like to congratulate the Dayton Bulldogs football team. At the time of this writing the team has started the season with two impressive shutout wins over South Hunterdon and Manville. The entire coaching staff and especially the players should be commended for their

success. It's great to see high school football back in Springfield. I would also like to mention that our Minutemen football program is a great starting point for anyone interested in football. SPRINGFIELD SQUAD TRAIN FOR AIRPORT INCIDENT

Going to the airport, unless for a vacation, is a chore most of us do not look forward to doing. Giving up a Saturday afternoon and night to do that is even a worse prospect. But, on Saturday, September 13th., several of the Springfield Volunteer First Aid Squad Members did just that, spending several hours participating in a major incident exercise.

This drill simulated a full-scale incident: a jetliner on a working runway, with mass casualties and fatalities on-board. Multiple agencies participated, including those near the airport such as Springfield that would respond immediately to a real emergency and those from elsewhere in the state that would respond later to that incident. There was also Port Authority personnel and over 100 volunteer "patients." At an airport the size of Newark, a full-scale drill is required at least once every twelve months. The scope of the drill is determined by the largest type of aircraft permissible at the airport.

The Springfield Volunteer First Aid Squad participated in several aspects of the exercise which included being first on scene, setup the rehabilitation rehab station, emergency medical treatment and transportation of victims as well as "rehab" for all those involved.

The Springfield Volunteer First Aid Squad is prepared for this major incident exercise as a result of the time and training invested in their own Special Operations Group.

The Group is comprised of those volunteer members of the Squad that volunteer for additional training and responsibility.

OCTOBER IS NATIONAL FIRE PREVENTION MONTH

PREVENT HOME FIRES

Many people believe that their home is a castle, a place of comfort and

security. But do people regularly check for home fire hazards? If not, there is the potential for danger. In the United States, fire departments responded to nearly 400,000 home fires in 2006. That's why this year's theme for Fire Prevention and Education is Prevent Home Fires!

From October 5th through 24th, the Springfield Fire Department will visit both the public and private schools to spread the word to the communities that, with a little extra caution, preventing the leading causes of home fires — cooking, heating, electrical and smoking-materials — is within their power.

- Stay in the kitchen when frying, grilling, or broiling food.
- Keep space heaters three feet from anything that can burn.

- Turn space heaters off when you leave the room or go to bed.
- Have your chimney and heating equipment inspected every year.
- Blow out candles when you leave the room or go to sleep.
- Keep matches and lighters up high in a locked cabinet.
- Have smoke alarms on every level of your home, inside each bedroom, and outside each sleeping area. For the best protection, interconnect the alarms so that when one sounds, they all sound.

In the past, we have relied on the children to take what they have learned from our school visit back to families. This year the Springfield Fire Department will be holding an open house at Fire Headquarters on Saturday, October 25th from 1pm to 4pm. We hope that the children will motivate their families to come down to the firehouse and learn more about home safety.

Special congratulations should go to Sgt. John Cook, of the Springfield police department, for representing us so well, in addition to the other members of the county team.

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
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
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WALTON SCHOOL "RECESS RUNNERS"



After completing a survey of earlobes, hand characteristics and colorblindness, the students were able to add their findings to those of classes in Italy, Australia, Iran and the United States. Using laptop computers in the classroom enabled each

student to view the compiled data and post comments to the discussion section of the project.

Learning through real-world projects is a way to increase student interest and participation, according to their teacher Mrs. Irene Ornovitz. By extending the learning beyond the classroom, students can apply the content to the real world.

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

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AUTUMN LEAVE CLEAN-UP RULES - Department of Public Works

Autumn is approaching and with it comes the tradition of clearing our lawns and yards of the leaves that have fallen. The Township of Springfield collects leaves that are in trash can or paper biodegradable bags throughout the year. However, beginning on October 25 residents will be allowed to place their loose leaves in the curb area for collection by the Department of Public Works.

Each year the Department attempts to make this endeavor as easy as possible for our residents. There are however, certain mandates set forth by the State that we must adhere to. We must now operate within certain parameters to remain in compliance with these mandates that have been enacted. By cooperating with the simple rules set forth below we can be assured of problem free collection process.

area before October 25. They can however be placed in trash cans or paper recyclable bags for collection through October 31 as part of our regular grass collection program.

2. Please place only leaves in the curb area. No branches, stumps, logs, rocks, etc. will be collected. Piles of leaves with such debris will not be collected until the prohibited material is removed. The reason for this is that the Union County Compost facility where the material is taken only accepts leaves and grass. All truckloads are examined and if there is prohibited material within the load the entire load is rejected and reloaded onto the truck which is then returned to the Township where it must dump the load and the material must be separated. Obviously, this is a time and money consuming process that must be avoided.

3. No piles of leaves shall be placed within ten feet in either direction of a storm sewer/catch

1. Leaves cannot be placed loose in the curb basin. State regulations are quite explicit concerning the placement of material in the curb area adjacent to catch basins. The obvious reason for this is that material placed adjacent to a catch basins and storm sewers will eventually end up in the sewer lines and cause blockages that result in a possible flooding condition. Considering there are areas within the Township that are prone to flooding we trust that all residents will cooperate with this particular mandate. Another reason for not placing any debris or materials near a catch basin is that they drain into water supplies and can cause a pollution or contamination problem.

> **4.** This is a very important rule that allows the Township to remain in compliance with the current stormwater regulations. Once leaves have been collected on a particular street residents must wait a period of five days before anymore leaves are placed curbside. Residents who employ landscapers must advise them of this very important rule. Although he may not be happy about this rule it is a rule that must be adhered to. If he has any questions he is free to call the Department for an explanation. Keep in mind that he is working for you and must adhere to your wishes and the State mandates and Township rules that apply to the collection process. The reason for this rule is so we can comply with the State mandates dictating that we have a certain amount of time to collect leaves that are placed loose in the streets. In order to accomplish this task with the amount of manpower available we require a five day window once your street is cleaned.

PARKING REGULATIONS

Many new residents in the township are not familiar with the various parking regulations that deal with the parking of motor vehicles on township streets. The following areas discussed below are some common concerns and areas that all residents should be aware of that address parking. These are not all inclusive of the parking regulations but, are the more common problems the police department deals with daily and seasonally.

NO PARKING 2 A.M. TO 6 A.M.

No parking is allowed on any township street between the hours of 2:00 a.m. to 6:00 a.m. The township police department realizes that certain situations will arise that will necessitate temporary permission being granted to residents to allow parking of vehicles on the streets to accommodate specific problems. Some appropriate reasons for permission to be granted are: a paving or re-paving o driveway, an occasional visitor to the residence and the driveway is filled with other vehicles. The resident must contact

Following last month's police headquarters on the business phone (973-376-0400) and request permission. Be prepared to provide the make and color of the vehicle, the license plate number of the vehicle and the period of time being requested. If deemed appropriate, the request will be honored for the specified period of time. Please Note! Should you be granted permission to leave a vehicle on the street overnight and it snows, your permission is automatically rescinded and you must remove the vehicle to allow for snow plowing.

TEMPORARY PARKING PROHIBITION FOR SNOW PLOWING AND REMOVAL

Whenever snow or other precipitation has fallen and the accumulation is such that it covers any roadway, highway, or street in the township, an emergency shall thereby exist, and no vehicle shall be parked on or so as to cover a street, roadway, highway, or any portion thereof. The restriction shall remain in effect after the snow has ceased until any such roadway, highway, or street has been plowed sufficiently, or in any other manner cleared, so that such parking will not interfere with the normal flow of traffic or with the removal of snow. A vehicle in violation may be removed (towed) at the owner or operators cost after reasonable attempts have been made to contact the owner.

BOARD OF HEALTH JOINS FLU PROGRAM



Springfield residents can attend any of the following programs as a matter of convenience. Proof of residency may be required. Participants will be taken on a first come/first serve basis.

Anyone that is Medicare Part B eligible must please bring their card to the program

The following are groups recommended to receive influenza vaccine (i.e., the flu shot):

- Persons aged 65 years and older, with and without chronic health conditions
- Residents of long-term care facilities
- Persons aged 2–64 years with chronic health conditions
- Children aged 6–59 months, who attend any licensed child care center or pre-school activity
- Pregnant women
- Health-care personnel who provide direct patient care
- Household contacts and out-of-home caregivers of children aged <6 months
