Message from the Mayor



Greetings!

As we end the summer months move into the fall season, we have seen a major development in progress downtown. Excavation of the Gomes Redevelopment site began and approximately 80 truck trips per day have been carrying excavated soil off the site. Permits have been issued for construction of the new building foundation. Demolition of two residential structures will be performed in the near future. A Redevelopment agreement has been prepared and unanimously passed by the Township Committee.

The Larkin redevelopment project located at the corner of Morris Avenue, Church Mall and Walnut Court is under construction. Foundation, floor, and steel construction has been performed. Upper floor framing has commenced and will continue over the next 2-3 months.

Our Department of Public Works has completed cleanup of curbside debris, streams and culverts that were completely blocked from storm debris. Blockages were also cleared at the Morris Ave bridge, in addition to trees that fell further down the Rahway River. We are proud to report that the DPW cleanup was done with no overtime costs to the town. We are always appreciative of their efforts!

The State of New Jersey approved our request of an extension to complete our Revaluation of Springfield. The Union County Board of Taxation will monitor the progress of the program and ensure necessary steps are taken to successfully complete the update for the 2022 tax year. Our objective is to resume the revaluation once protocols indicate it is safe to do so.

The Springfield Free Public Library began to offer entry inside the library building to Springfield residents ages 18 and older. Library patrons may sign up for thirty minute time slots. All guests entering the library will be required to wear a mask and have their temperatures taken upon entering. To register, please call the library at (973) 376-4930, ext. 221. Vote by mail ballots will be mailed in waves very soon. All registered active voters will automatically get a vote by mail ballot, regardless of party affiliation. For more information, or you have a question, contact the Union County Clerk's Office at ucvote@ucnj.org or 908-527-4996. Please don't forget to vote.

Lastly, please be aware garbage collection returns to it's regularly scheduled pickup on Thursdays and Fridays. Recycling remains on Wednesday. If you should have any questions, please contact the Department of Public Works at 973-912-2225.



FIRE PREVENTION WEEK

October 4, 2020 thru October 10, 2020 Serve Up Fire Safety in the Kitchen

The National Fire Protection Association (NFPA), the official sponsor of Fire Prevention Week for more than 95 years, has announced "Serve Up Fire Safety in the Kitchen" as the theme for Fire Prevention Week, October 4th thru 10th, 2020. NFPA's focus on cooking fire safety comes in response to home cooking fires representing the leading cause of U.S. home fires, with nearly half (49 percent) of all home fires involving cooking equipment; unattended cooking is the leading cause of these fires.

"Cooking continues to be a major contributor to the home fire problem," said Lorraine Carli, NFPA vice president of Outreach and Advocacy. "The good news is that the vast majority of these fires are highly preventable. This year's Fire Prevention Week campaign works to better educate the public about where potential cooking hazards exist and basic but critical ways to prevent them."

This year's focus on cooking safety is particularly timely. "As the public may continue to avoid restaurants for some time and opt instead to do more cooking and entertaining at home, the potential for home cooking fires will likely increase as well." Key messages around this year's Fire Prevention Week campaign, "Serve Up Fire Safety in the Kitchen" will include the following:

- Keep a close eye on what you're cooking; never leave cooking unattended
- Keep anything that can catch fire oven mitts, wooden utensils, food packaging, towels or curtains at least three feet away from your stovetop.
- Be on alert. If you are sleepy or have consumed alcohol, don't use the stove or stovetop.

For more information about Fire Prevention Week and this year's theme, "Serve Up Fire Safety in the Kitchen," along with a wealth of resources to help promote the campaign locally, visit fpw.org.

Springfield Fire Department will get a jump on the message during the month of October, with presentations among classrooms throughout the Township of Springfield. SPRINGFIELD LIBRARY OFFERS VIRTUAL FOREIGN FILM SERIES W/LECTURES AND DISCUSSION

The Springfield Free Public Library has found a way to continue its annual foreign film series, even as the COVID-19 pandemic keeps us from meeting in person inside the library. In a slight departure from its usual format, the library has scheduled virtual lectures by Gerard Amsellem, an artist, educator and filmmaker who has made the study of international films his passion. Scheduled for 7:00 pm one Thursday evening a month from September through December, the series will cover the following topics:

September 24 – French Cinema, with a specific focus on the 2007 film The Diving Bell and the Butterfly

October 8 – Italian Cinema, with a specific focus on the 1988 film Cinema Paradiso

November 12 – German Cinema, with a specific focus on the 2005 film Sophie Scholl

December 10 – New Zealand Cinema, with a specific focus on the 2002 film Whale Rider

Although the library will not be able to provide in-house screenings of these movies due to the current pandemic, Springfield Library patrons have free access to all four of these films through the library's participation in Hoopla. People interested in viewing these films are encouraged to watch them in advance of each of the scheduled programs and there are no limits on the number of library patrons who are able to view the film through the library's Hoopla account at any one time. For library patrons who already have a library card but are not yet registered with Hoopla, registration can be accomplished within about thirty seconds by going to https://www.hoopladigital.com/ and then clicking on the link to get started. If you are not already registered as a patron at the Springfield Free Public Library, you must first go to www.springfieldpublic-library.com where you will see a link on the picture stream that will get you started with a temporary library

These films are accessible through Hoopla to residents of other communities that belong to the Libraries of Middlesex Automation Consortium (LMxAC). In addition to Springfield, other libraries in Union County that are members of LMxAC include Elizabeth, Kenilworth, Plainfield, Roselle and Roselle Park. Residents of other communities may check with their libraries to see if these films are available for viewing through digital or streaming services or in DVD format.

The links for the subsequent programs in the series will be publicized during the week before each session.

Each of the four sessions that Mr. Amsellem will present will cover the history of cinema in the country

being spotlighted, followed by a discussion of the film itself, including the background of the director. This will be followed by a question and answer session with those in attendance.

Raised in France, Gerard Amsellem moved to the United States in 1982 after having studied painting at the University of Paris and after having earned Master's Degrees in both French Literature and Art History. He then studied film at the Tisch School at New York University. He is passionate about getting people to understand film as an art form and teaching them how to "read" a film. His non-profit organization, New Wave Productions (www.NewWaveProductions.org), focuses on art history and film.

This program is made possible by funding from the Union County Office of Cultural and Heritage Affairs, a partner of the New Jersey State Council on the Arts. Funding is also provided by a generous donation from the Friends of the Springfield Free Public Library.



At 9:03 am, the time when Flight 175 crashed into the south tower there was a second salute and ringing of the bell commenced again.

After the Salute, Mayor Christopher Capodice read a Proclamation and the group moved to Patriot Park to the Adler-Heltibridle Community Garden named after the two Township residents that perished in the Tower collapse. Police Chief John Cook and Fire Captain Michael Mastroeni placed the wreath at the garden.

In total, 2,595 people inside and near the towers were killed, along with the 157 people who were aboard the flights on September 11, 2001.





Police Chief's Column

(ALMOST) BACK-TO-SCHOOL SAFETY

Even though some of the local school districts have started this school year fully virtual, some are back in session, and students are traveling back and forth to school each day. Hopefully in the near future, as we make more positive progress in dealing with this pandemic, all schools will be operating in-person again. So despite the limited in-person school openings, and with anticipation that more and more schools will soon move toward in-person classes, I want to take this opportunity to remind the readers of the Springfield Patriot Times of some back-to-school traffic safety tips that will help keep everyone safer while on the road. While the police officers and crossing guards who are posted throughout town do their best to keep our roadways safe, EVERYONE must do their part to ensure we all reach our destinations safely.

All motorists must bring their vehicle to a complete stop at least 25 feet away from a school bus with flashing red lights. This applies to traffic in both directions. Vehicles must remain stopped until the bus deactivates its red lights and continues. The only exception to this rule is if the bus is on the opposite side of the road with a median in the middle, you must then slow down to 10 mph.

As per NJ motor vehicle law, the speed limit is 25mph when passing through a school zone during recess, when the presence of children is clearly visible from the roadway, or while children are going to or leaving school during opening or closing hours. In Springfield, most of our school zones have reduced speed warnings with flashing signs when this 25mph limit applies, as a reminder to motorists. However, drivers should always slow down and be extra cautious anytime they pass through school areas when school is in session. Sports events and other extracurricular activities often run after the regular school day ends, and some activities are held before the normal school day begins.

Anyone driving on school properties should drive slowly and with extreme caution, especially during the times students are being dropped off or picked up. Children lack auditory localization, and may unexpectedly dart in front of oncoming vehicles if they're not paying full attention. In addition, idling of vehicles for more than 2 minutes is prohibited on all school properties. This applies to vehicles waiting in a large queue within the school lots (such as the Walton School line in the morning and afternoon), but not for vehicles stuck in traffic on the main roadways who are waiting to enter the lot. These vehicles must remain running, with the proper turn signal activated, until traffic begins moving again.

Pedestrians are reminded to utilize crosswalks and obey traffic signals when crossing the street, and to only cross when it is safe to do so. Motorists must come to a complete stop for pedestrians in crosswalks. Crossing guards are posted throughout the town during the school year to ensure children pedestrians cross safely. Even though crossing guards are only responsible for children pedestrians, I urge adults to set a good example for their children and obey the crossing guards' directions as well.


