On Tuesday, March 27, Springfield PBA Local 76 held a surprise luncheon at Town Hall for Captain Pat McLaughlin who is retiring from the Springfield Police Department. Joining the Department in February of 1991, Captain McLaughlin served 27 years and 2 months with the Township starting as a Patrolman. From 1995 through 2007 he was assigned to the Union County Emergency Response Team and in 2004 assigned to the Union County Auto Theft Task Force. In 2006 he was assigned to the Detective Bureau and promoted to Patrol Sergeant in 2008. In 2010 he was promoted to Patrol Lieutenant and in 2012 he was promoted to Captain. The PBA presented him with an appreciation award which read "In Appreciation for your years of dedicated service to the Township of Springfield and the Springfield Police Department" Chief Cook presented the award and commented "I am sorry to see Captain McLaughlin leave, but I am happy for him in his retirement, he will be missed in Town.' Many Police Officers attended, both current and retired as well as Township employees. Captain McLaughlin's wife was there as well. SPRINGFIELD FIRE DEPARTMENT DELIVERS BABY ON ROUTE 78

On March 20, 2018 at 8:14 a.m. the Springfield Fire Department was dispatched to Route 78 Westbound near milepost 50.2 for a report of a woman in labor.

Captain Mastroeni & Chief Palumbo were the first units to arrive and quickly recognized that the woman would be unable to make it to the hospital in time for delivery.

In the extreme weather conditions during rush hour traffic, delivery commenced. While the baby was being delivered, the umbilical cord became wrapped around the baby's neck. Captain Mastroeni was able to quickly remove the cord while coaching the mother with delivery procedures. Upon the final push the baby was successfully delivered at which time Chief Palumbo clamped and cut the umbilical cord.

Police Chief's Column Chief John P. Cook

Now that spring is finally upon us, though the weather may not be fully cooperating... warmer days will soon return, and people will be heading back outdoors to enjoy the season. Residents may notice an increase in vehicle and pedestrian traffic, as well as an increased enforcement of motor vehicle violations by Springfield police officers. Officers will we be conducting a variety of enforcement activities, including "cops in crosswalks" pedestrian enforcement, distracted driving and hands-free cellular device enforcement, and speeding enforcement. Traffic safety is a shared responsibility, and our goal is to educate drivers, pedestrians, and cyclists in the proper use of the roadways, and reduce the number of traffic-related incidents that occur in Springfield.

Motorists must come to a complete stop and remain stopped when a pedestrian is crossing in a marked crosswalk. This includes motorists who are making turns while pedestrians are crossing. Marked crosswalks are designated with painted lines and/or stripes, and have yellow warning signs posted as motorists approach. Marked crosswalks can be within intersections controlled with traffic signals, uncontrolled intersections, or mid-block. Crosswalks can also be unmarked, which include all intersections of streets normally considered to represent crosswalks but are not physically painted or striped. At these intersections with unmarked crosswalks, motorists must yield to the right-of-way of pedestrians and allow them to cross.

Pedestrians are reminded to cross only where legally permitted. At intersections with traffic signals, pedestrians must follow the signal, and cross only when the "WALK" symbol is displayed. If an intersection is not equipped with pedestrian signals, pedestrians should cross with the green light. At uncontrolled intersections or at mid-block crosswalks, pedestrians must remember to cross only when there is an appropriate gap in traffic. Pedestrians should never suddenly leave the curb and begin crossing into the path a vehicle that is so close it would be impossible for the driver to stop or yield. Pedestrians should always be alert and wear bright reflective clothing (especially if walking at night or early morning).

Cyclists must remember that they have the same rights and responsibilities as motor vehicle drivers. Cyclists should always ride on the right side of the road, obey all signs and traffic signals, and ride with the flow of traffic. Cyclists should always be alert, wear bright reflective clothing (especially if cycling at night or early morning), and properly maintain their bicycles in good working order - including reflectors and lights. NJ law mandates that all riders 17 years and younger (including children strapped in attached childseats) must wear an approved, properly fitting helmet, but it is recommended for all cyclists to use one to protect themselves.

Parents are reminded that their children should not be permitted to play on public roads, even on quiet cul-de-sacs or side streets. Public roads are intended for vehicular, bicycle, and pedestrian traffic only, and should never be utilized for children's games or other activities.

As our police officers will begin additional enforcement details, I remind motorists of NJ's "Move Over Law", which requires drivers to change lanes for stopped emergency vehicles...not only for police, but for fire department, first aid squad, and tow trucks/driver assistance vehicles as well. If changing lanes is impossible, or if the roadway is only one lane, drivers must slow down to below the posted speed limit, and prepare to stop as they approach the emergency vehicle.

Together, we can make Springfield's roads safer for everyone.

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
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TEMPLE BETH AHM YISRAEL COMMEMORATES YOM HASHOAH

SPRINGFIELD BUSINESS IMPROVEMENT DISTRICT MEETING HIGHLIGHTS MARCH 20, 2018

The minutes of the February Board meeting were unanimously approved. The Treasurers Report was unanimously approved.

Ziad Shehady reported to the BID Board the following:

• The Township Budget will be introduced and presented on March 27. There will be a public presentation of the budget on April 7. The budget will be adopted on April 24. The budget will maintain existing services along with new projects and initiatives. The increase in the budget is just under the 2% budget cap. Increases in the budget are due to the new garbage and recycling contracts which increased approximately \$400,000.00

• The Gomes Redevelopment Project on Morris Ave. is moving along waiting for State Approvals. They are waiting for official notification that the DEP has received all of the necessary elements to review the project. The Board discussed the process and the time frame for this redevelopment project to move forward.

- The Board discussed how to move forward with facilitating redevelopment and facade improvements to the properties on Morris Ave. The group agreed to develop a plan with different options to have an improved downtown. It was agreed that the Board needs to develop a plan that will incorporate the changes in driving habits in the future that will effect parking.
- Beth Lippman and MIke Scalera met
- with the landscape architect to discuss the construction plans for the remainder of the streetscape project on Mountain Ave. He will begin work on the drawings and develop an estimate for the construction work
- Window Graphics on the Gomes building will be completed and repaired once the weather breaks.

The Springfield Swim Team is open to girls and boys from 5-17 years old. The Swim Team will be divided into two groups: The Developmental Team will be made up of children 8 years old and younger who need more instruction and guidance. Developmental Team participants initially must be able to demonstrate the ability to submerge themselves underwater, swim freestyle for at least 15 yards, be able to swim on their back, and be willing and able to swim in the 5 foot and 12 foot sections of the main pool. Children who do not meet these expectations – or who the coaches feel are unable to do so without support – will be placed in group Swim Lessons (see previous page) that are not affiliated with the Swim Team. SPRINGFIELD CERT TEAM MAKES A DIFFERENCE

It seems like severe weather is becoming a more frequent occurrence these days and for Springfield, the Emergency Management CERT team is playing a more and more active role in helping residents get through these emergen-

CERT, the acronym for Community Emergency Response Team, was formed by former OEM Coordinator John Cottage and headed by long time OEM volunteer Mitch Janklow in 2006. Simply stated – its neighbors helping neighbors. Local residents were recruited and trained to help their neighbors in times of emergency. While the unit trained and assisted with various Township activities for several years, it was after hurricane Irene, in 2011, that residents stepped forward like never before and a more vibrant group took shape.

Today, the unit is headed by long time volunteer Jim Sedlak. During the recent storm "Quinn", the CERT team volunteers were very active manning the shelter at the Chisholm Community Center to assist residents who had no electrical power for several days. Two such volunteers are the husband and wife team of Karen and Jim Bonacorda. As residents of Marion Ave, the Bonacordas saw extensive flooding in their neighborhood during Irene and afterwards joined up along with several other neighborhood residents. Jim, a former member of the Auxiliary Police from 1992 to 2005, was familiar with OEM and was right at home joining the program.

During "Quinn", the Bonacordas reported to OEM HQ where they met upwith other CERT members Herb and Kristen Gersh and Craig Abrams.

Together they began to assess what was needed. They went over to Chisholm which was initially set up as a warming station but eventually became a full blown shelter that housed close to 25 residents for 2 nights and 3 days. In an exclusive interview with the Patriot Times, Jim Bonacorda said "I was overwhelmed by how the entire community came together, not just the CERT team, to help out". Karen commented "It took me back to Sandy where people offered what they had to help each other and be good neighbors".

POWER OUTAGES: BASIC SAFETY

BEFORE A POWER OUTAGE

- Build or restock your emergency preparedness kit, including a flash light, batteries, cash and first aid supplies.
- Make sure you have alternative charging methods for your phone and any device that requires power.
- Charge cell phones and any battery powered devices.
- Know where the manual release lever of your electric garage door opener is located and how to operate it.
- Purchase ice or freeze water-filled plastic containers to help keep food cold during a temporary power outage.
- Keep your car's gas tank full-gas stations rely on electricity to power their pumps. If you use your car to re-charge devices, do NOT keep the car running in a garage, partially enclosed space, or close to a home, this can lead to carbon monoxide poisoning.
- Learn about the emergency plans that have been established in your area by visiting your state's or local website so you can locate the closest cooling and warning shelters.
- If you rely on anything that is battery-operated or power dependent like a medical device determine a back-up plan

DURING A POWER OUTAGE: SAFETY TIPS

- Only use flashlights for emergency lighting, candles can cause fires.
- Keep refrigerator and freezer doors closed. Most food requiring refrigeration can be kept safely in a closed refrigerator for several hours. An unopened refrigerator will keep food cold for about 4 hours. A freezer will keep the temperature for about 48 hours.
- Take steps to remain cool if it is hot outside. In intense heat when the power may be off for a long time, consider going to a movie theater, shopping mall or "cooling shelter" that may be open in your community. If you remain at home, move to the lowest level of your home, since cool air falls. Wear lightweight clothing. Drink plenty of water; even if you do not feel thirsty.
- Put layers of warm clothing if it is cold outside. Never burn charcoal for heating or cooking indoors. Never use your oven as a source of heat. If the power may be out for a prolonged period, plan to go to another location. (the home of a relative or friend, or a public facility) that has heat to keep warm
- Turn off or disconnect appliances and other equipment in case of a momentary power "surge" that can damage computers and other devices. Consider adding surge protectors.
- If you are considering purchasing a generator for your home, consult a licensed electrician or engineer before purchasing and installing.
- Only use generators away from your home and NEVER run a generator inside a home or garage, or connect it to your home's electrical system.

A number of announcements also capped off the start of the Township Committee Meeting, most notably:

•Apu Mullick was named Deputy Emergency Management Coordinator via Proclamation. In an exclusive interview with the Patriot Times, Emergency Management Coordinator Scott Seidel commented "Apu will be a great benefit to our staff at OEM. He is a long time member of the Springfield First Aid Squad and is very familiar with our procedures and operations. He was a great asset to us during Winter Storm "Quinn".

•A presentation from StigmaFree Springfield, entitled "Hidden in Plain Sight." The event is scheduled for 6:30 PM on Wednesday, March 28 at Chisholm Community Center. Special Agent Timothy McMahon of the DEA will be the presenter.

•Municipal Offices are closed on Friday, March 30 in observance of Good Friday.

The committee also extended their condolences to Mayor Rich Huber and his wife Ginnie on the passing of Ginnie's mother, Dorothy Ruhrort, to DPW Supervisor Robert Boettcher and his family on the passing of his father, Sylvester "Pooch" Boettcher, and to the family of Richard Colandrea on his passing

The second half of the Township Committee Meeting was dedicated to a lengthy presentation of the budget. Beth Lippman, Consultant to the Springfield Business Improvement District, first presented the budget for the Springfield Community Partnership. The Springfield Community Partnership, funded by neighborhood businesses, includes monies for downtown redevelopment and local business promotion.

Following the short presentation of the Springfield Community Partnership, each department head of the Springfield Township had an opportunity to discuss the 2018 Municipal Budget. Prior to the reports by each department, Township Administrator Ziad Shehady noted that 30% of the overall property taxes are directed towards the municipality and most of the budget is fixed due to contractual obligations for salary and wages.

Shehady also noted that the total budget for 2018 is \$32.9 million, a \$1.2 million increase from 2017; however, the increase was offset by anticipated revenues of approximately \$700,000. The budget increase amounts to an average of \$70 per household.

During public comment, Police Chief John Cook read a proclamation for Captain

Captain Patrick McLaughlin, who is retiring after more than 28 years with the Springfield Police Department.
