

Message from the Mayor

Happy August Springfield!



69% of Springfield, voted to make cannabis legal in New Jersey, The Township Committee voted 4-1 in favor of allowing recreational sale within the Township of Springfield. The ordinance reads that sale of recreational cannabis will be allowed on our HC Zone / Highway Commercial Zone. This is located on the Route 22 corridor for Springfield. At this time, we feel that Route 22 is the best location for this type of retail. Springfield will be getting 2% from all receipt sales if a cannabis establishment does come to Springfield. Any money received will be placed right into our General Fund. We appreciate all the comments, questions and concerns from our Springfield residents on this. More details will be put out as we get them from the State.

A letter from myself is going to be mailed out with a breakdown of our taxes for the 2021 year. Please note, the final 2021 tax bill does not reflect the 2022 revaluations. The 2022 revaluation assessments will take effect January 2022 and will be reflected on the final 2022 3rd quarter (Aug) and 4th quarter (Nov) tax bills. This revaluation was mandated by the State of New Jersey, Division of Taxation, and all of Union County has participated in this revaluation.



LOCAL AUTHOR UNRAVELS MYSTERY OF THE ZODIAC

When local author and attorney Joe Cappa called me to say he has solved the mystery of the Zodiac, I have to admit I was a little confused. I didn't realize there was still a mystery about the Zodiac to be solved! I thought it had to do with astrology and was not a mystery at all! I read up a little bit on the Zodiac online and then went to interview Joe about his book, *The Zodiac Decoded* and the mystery surrounding it. While most people associate the Zodiac with astrol-

ogy or the "Zodiac Killer" from California, there is much more to it according to Joe. I sat down with him in his living room last month and he proceeded to explain the mystery of the Zodiac to me.

Joe says history tells us the zodiac was first written down by the Sumerians around 2,400-3,000 BC. It must have been important as it was one of the first things we humans wrote down. Not only that, it was then passed down to the Babylonians who invented astrology around 1,200 bce. After the Babylonians, the Greeks adopted the zodiac, and then the Romans, and then to the rest of the world. During the "dark" ages, it became punishable by death to study the zodiac. The zodiac was revived during the Renaissance but only as the pseudo-science of astrology. The question remains, "What was the zodiac for a thousand years before the invention of astrology that was so important that it has been passed down from empire to empire and throughout the ages"?

Fire Chief's Column Chief Carlo Palumbo SEVERE WEATHER BLACKOUTS

Severe weather and storms can cause power outages and restoring power can take time. In some instances, such as during extended periods of hot weather, power companies may schedule periods of power outages to help conserve power across the board.

Before

- Conserve energy to help reduce the threat of a power outage.
- Have flashlights, a battery-powered or hand-cranked radio, and extra batteries on hand.
- Set aside extra water and buy or make extra ice.
- If you have space in your refrigerator or freezer, keep plastic containers filled with water, leaving about an inch of space in each one. The chilled or frozen water will help keep food cool during power outages.
- Be prepared to cook outside.
- If you take any medications that must be refrigerated, check with your doctor or pharmacist to determine how long medications can last.
- Back up computer files regularly.
- Have some form of phone that does not require electricity, either a standard telephone or a cellular phone, rather than a cordless telephone.
- Keep your vehicle's gas tank at least half full.
- If you have any specific needs or disabilities that require electrical equipment, make plans for dealing with a power outage.

During

- Never use candles for emergency lighting, use flashlights.
- Turn off any electrical equipment you were using when the power went out. Leave one light on so you know when the power returns.
- Avoid opening the refrigerator and freezer.
- Use generators safely. Don't run a generator inside a home or garage. Connect the equipment you want to run directly to the generator. Do not connect a generator to a home's electrical system. Keep instructions with the generator and be familiar with its use.
- Use the telephone only for emergencies.
- Listen to the radio for updates.
- Eliminate unnecessary travel.
- If it is hot outside, take steps to remain cool. If it is cold, take steps to remain warm.
- If you are in your car when a power line falls on it, stay in the vehicle and do not touch anything on the outside of the vehicle. Use your horn or cell phone to signal for help.
- Short-term power outages usually occur during peak energy usage times, usually between 4:00 and 7:00 pm on weekdays, and typically last one hour.

A fter

- Stay away from downed power lines.
- Do not refreeze any dairy products, seafood, or food that has thawed completely and been above 40° for more than two hours, or anything with a questionable texture or smell. If in doubt, throw it out.

There were plenty of free giveaways as well. Six Food trucks offered a wide range of food to snack on and there was a bounce house and obstacle course, the cost of which was sponsored by Mike Scalera of State Farm Insurance, Scott Seidel of Cardinal Land Properties and the Springfield Unity Project. The Springfield Patriot Chamber of Commerce coordinated setting up the children's attractions.

National Night Out enhances the relationship between neighbors and law enforcement while bringing back a true sense of community. Furthermore, it provides a great opportunity to bring emergency responders and neighbors together under positive circumstances. The best way to build a safer community is to know your neighbors and your surroundings. Event organizer Scott Seidel noted: "All too often someone may only interact with the Police or Emergency Responders when something is going wrong, an accident, natural disaster or other situation requiring emergency response. NNO is a great opportunity to interact with first responders in a relaxed friendly and fun setting. National Night Out is an excellent program and builds relationships within the community and first responders."

The event was organized by Springfield Emergency Management in cooperation with the Springfield Board of Education and Springfield Recreation department.

Apu Mullick, Springfield OEM Deputy Coordinator and EMS Chief commented to the Patriot Times:

"Parents and their children have the opportunity to see police cars, various emergency response vehicles, and even a medical helicopter. They can learn about a wide variety of safety topics and partake in numerous interactive family friendly activities. There were even two new front end loaders from the Department of Public Works for the kids to climb on. While not emergency vehicles, they have been used to rescue people from flooded homes."

OEM Coordinator Scott Seidel commented: This is the first time Springfield has hosted their own event. In the past Union County hosts the event at Meisel Field and a few towns, including Springfield, would join them at their event. I found out just after July 4th that the County was not hosting the event at Meisel Field this year so my Deputy Apu suggested we try to host our own NNO. Apu even arranged for a flyover of the State Police Medical Helicopter "Northstar". I reached out to Adam Lieb of the Recreation Department to see if he could line up a movie on a big outdoor screen for us—something typically done by the County at the event. My Administrative assistant, Jennifer Sherman lined up six food trucks, the bounce house and obstacle course. The Police, Fire, OEM, EMS and DPW all supported the event as well with personnel, free handouts and vehicles on display. The Union County Prosecutors Office and SWAT Team also had tables. The Springfield Police Department provided a free fingerprinting service for parents to have their children's fingerprints taken and then the cards are given to the parents for safe keeping. OEM Deputy Coordinators Police Sergeant Ryan Westover and Frank Applegate lined up the logistical support and helped position all the participants.

At the conclusion of the Emergency Vehicle display, at around 830 PM, approximately two hundred residents gathered in the back of the high school to watch *Toy Story 4* on a giant 28 foot wide screen.

Seidel noted he would like to see the Town continue hosting their own NNO as it was so well received.



INTERNET CLASSIFIEDS SCAMS AND CRIMES – HOW TO PROTECT YOURSELF

More and more people are utilizing web-based classifieds sites such as Craigslist, OfferUp and Facebook Marketplace to buy and sell personal items. Most of the transactions that take place after people "connect" through these sites are done in person, but some may involve some type of electronic money transfer or mailing. Either way, things sometimes go wrong with these transactions, and the police become involved. Here are a few tips to keep in mind and red-flags you should look out for whenever you consider buying or selling an item this way. There are many criminals who browse these websites regularly looking for their next victim.

As a seller of an item, you should always be wary of the following:

· A "buyer" who is interested in purchasing your item sight-unseen, and immediately offers your full asking price without getting more details from you. Most real buyers will ask a lot questions and want to see the item in person (especially it it's expensive) before finalizing the deal.

A "buyer" who wishes to send you a check or money order for your item and have one of their "agents" pick up the item. The check or money order will most likely be fraudulent, and you won't find out until after your item is gone.

· A "buyer" who sends you a check or money order for an amount much more than your agreed upon price. The "buyer" will ask you to deposit the check and return the difference to them. You will most likely later find out the payment was fraudulent or lacked sufficient funds, and your money will be gone. The "buyer" was never actually interested in your item.

If the item you are selling is valuable, be especially careful of fraudulent checks or fake currency. It may be a good idea to complete the transaction at your local bank, where they can help you verify if the payment is legitimate. It can also be helpful to keep track of all emails and telephone numbers used during the transaction, as well as jotting down the license plate of the person you meet. As a buyer of an item, you should always be wary of the following:

· A "seller" who advertises brand-new items for sale, or who has multiples of the same items for sale. There is a good chance these items are stolen goods.

· A "seller" who advertises brand name items for very low prices. If it sounds too good to be true, it probably is. These items will most likely be low-quality knock-offs, imitations, or counterfeits.

· A "seller" who has trouble describing or provides sketchy background information on an item. This could be a sign that the item is stolen. Most legitimate sellers know exactly what they have when they list it for sale.

A "seller" who is overly eager to get rid of their item. If the price agreed upon is abnormally low, this could be another sign of a possible stolen item – or a defective item.

If you are purchasing a valuable item, do your research ahead of time, and have the seller provide documentation on the item. If buying a vehicle, consider using a vehicle history check service, such as CarFax, to avoid getting scammed.

Most importantly, whether you are buying or selling, you should NEVER meet an unknown person in a strange or isolated area. Always have someone else come along with you, or at least let someone else know where you are going. Use common sense – stick to busy public places that you are comfortable with, such as a shopping mall, a busy coffee shop, or even outside of your local police department.
