Message from the Mayor

Memorial Day marks the unofficial beginning of summer. I would like to thank Mrs. Geri Bujinaski and Linda Donnelly for all their hard work in putting together the outstanding Memorial Day ceremony and parade. The support of our community is truly amazing. Memorial Day also marked the opening of the Springfield Community Pool. The pool underwent some major renovations this past winter. Some of those improvements you will see are redone bathrooms, freshly painted pool, new fixtures, were installed and new tiles were installed. The renovations to the pool, however, are not complete. Our Recreation Department are still working to install a new slide and some shaded areas.

Our Township budget was presented and approved last month. Currently the town part of the budget will be increasing about \$48 a household, while the county portion of the taxes will actually decrease by about \$46 a house-

hold. At this time, we are still waiting for the Board of Education portion of the taxes. The township also approved the hiring of two new police officers and also installed a new volunteer firefighter. On May 29th, the Springfield Fire Department also had a dedication ceremony at the Fire House, dedicating an area in front of the station in memory of former firefighter Joe Pepe. As I stated in a previous message, Joe was a career firefighter who passed away playing in a benefit basketball game 10 years ago. Many of us who knew Joe, knew just how much he loved the town of Springfield. I would like to thank our Fire Department for keeping Joe's spirit alive. Finally, the Army's Cord of Engineers had two presentations on what their plans were to help the flooding problems in our town. As summer quickly approaches, I remind everyone that our Recreation Summer programs are about to begin. If you have any questions, please contact our Recreation Department at 973-912-2226. QUITE A LOT HAS GONE ON IN SPRINGFIELD IN MAY

Quite a lot has gone on in Springfield this month. As we prepare for the retirement of Fire Chief James Sanford, we swore in another volunteer firefighter. With the resignation of Mike Tennaro as the Director of the Recreation Department, a search is being conducted for his successor so that the many activities of the summer, including the improvements and upgrades at the pool, will continue to go smoothly. There will be a new fence, a new slide, and two shade areas for everyone to enjoy.

Tuesday, May 13, was a special day at Town Hall. Each Department Head and the Township Clerk had two "shadows" for the day, students from Gaudineer. After learning how the Township functions daily, lunch was provided prior to a gathering led by Anthony Cancro and Maryellen Brennan during which the kids had an opportunity to share what they learned. Freeholder Bruce Bergen spoke about County government, building on the township experience. Several of the most enthusiastic students actually got to sit up on the dais with the committee members during the special 2 pm meeting and actually participate. All of those who participated were very excited about the day, which was a custom brought back this year by Mayor Huber. There were a number of ordinances and resolutions voted on during the meeting and several proclamations were presented. Deputy Mayor Barnett made a formal presentation of the Municipal Budget for the year; the average annual increase per household (municipal portion only) is approximately \$48, which is offset by the decrease of approximately the same amount in the county assessment.

This month also included presentation and discussion of the three options of the Army Corps of Engineers' recommendations for Flood Control. There will be further meetings for discussion upcoming. Also this month the Committee approved the promotion of one police officer and the hiring of two candidates as Probationary Police Officers to fill two openings as a result of retirements. Appointments were also made to fill openings on both the Board of Adjustment and the Environmental Commission.

Please note that all meetings are open to the public and your participation is welcomed and encouraged! The workshop meetings are held on the Monday night before the first executive session of the month at the Firehouse. The executive sessions are held on the second and fourth Tuesdays of the month at the Municipal Building. All meetings begin at 7:30 pm.

REDEVELOPMENT:

The Township will be approving two more parcels of land to be added to the redevelopment area. They are in the process of working with a property owner on the Redevelopment Plan.

Streetscape Design:

The BID is working with the Town to secure grant monies to help pay for the streetscape improvements on Mountain Avenue. The Township is submitting a grant proposal for \$1,000,000 that will go towards this project. The BID has committed \$100,000 towards this project as a match for this grant.

The BID contributed \$4,000 toward the Township's Gateway Project. They are improving the areas that are gateways into the town.

2014 SPRINGFIELD MUNICIPAL BUDGET ADOPTED

The Springfield Township Committee adopted the municipal budget on May 13, 2014. The 2014 Budget will result in a 1.49 percent increase; representing 13 cents per day or \$48.42 increase per year for the average home in the Township. The municipal budget represents only the municipal share of the total budget and does not include the county or Board of Education budgets.

The Township 2014 budget has several important objectives including:

- •Minimizing the tax burden to residents and commercial establishments
- •Maintaining a high level of municipal services to residents and businesses
- •Actively controlling spending and overtime
- •Reducing dependence on use of surplus and maintain a strong bond rating
- •Continuing efforts to improve operations and government effectiveness
- Staying focused on Business District redevelopment efforts

The budget also invests \$3,000,000 for long-term capital improvements for the future needs of Spring-field including:

- New Road Paving and other Road Improvements
- Renovation to Chisholm Youth Center
- Flood Prevention Upgrades
- New Jitney Bus
- Replace Obsolete Equipment and Vehicles
- Sewer and Storm Improvements
- New Fire Safety Equipment




SPRINGFIELD GARDEN CLUB PRESENTS COMPOST KIT TO WALTON SCHOOL

Springfield Garden Club's president, Faith Brancato, and program coordinator, Wendy Jones, presented the Walton School with a compost kit for their gardens on Thursday, May 29. In the kit, worms turn food scraps, leaves, and damp newspaper into nutrient soil. Dr. Hung, the principal, was so delighted with the compost kit that she ordered a second one for the school: "I wanted to make sure we had enough [good soil] for our gardens."

Walton, whose students range in age from 3 to 8, has eight courtyard garden beds. Students work in the garden as part of the Walton Environmental Club, which also includes all the teachers: Mrs. Turner, Mrs. Kirna, Mrs. Leonardis, Mrs. Alamorian and Ms. Stevenson. The children plant vegetables and flowers. They "love to observe how the vegetables grow over time and they take pride in harvesting the vegetables, tasting them, and donating them!" said Mrs. Kirna.

Every August the Community Food Bank in Hillside picks up the tomatoes and other vegetables for distribution to people in the area.

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Police Chief's Column Chief John P. Cook

Readers of the Springfield Patriot Times should be noticing an increase in the visible enforcement of motor vehicle violations by Springfield police officers with this being done to coincide with the school closings for summer recess. This enforcement is not done merely to cite motorists for violations but to hopefully educate both drivers and pedestrians alike in the safe and proper use of township roadways in an effort to reduce vehicle accidents. It is imperative that motorists operate their vehicles with extra caution during the summer months when more people are outdoors especially children playing in residential areas and local parks or walking or riding bicycles along township streets.

A law change went into effect in 2010 that has now changed the statute that originally only required motorists to yield to pedestrians who were legally crossing in a crosswalk to now require the motorist to come to a complete stop for a pedestrian in any crosswalk.

Both resident and business recipients of the Springfield Patriot Times are reminded that there are many intersections that are not controlled by a traffic signal and that are located on more heavily trafficked roadways so it is vital that motorists now come to a complete stop when approaching an intersection with crossing pedestrians.

Beginning in the month of May plainclothes police officers posing as pedestrians were crossing at various intersections throughout the township and motorists who failed to stop for the "crossing pedestrian" were stopped by uniformed officers and issued a summons for failing to stop for pedestrians. Police officers are operating at various intersections throughout the township where there have been past incidents of either pedestrians or bicyclists having been struck by automobiles and these also include intersections where pedestrians have been seriously injured or killed. This enforcement action will continue during the summer months in order to ensure the maximum safety of children and adults walking about the streets in the township.

This statewide enforcement program for this new law, known as Shared Responsibility, stipulates that not only are motorists expected to stop for pedestrians using a crosswalk but pedestrians are expected to only legally cross a roadway at an intersection with a traffic signal, a crosswalk, or where a crosswalk would be located. Any pedestrians crossing a roadway illegally can be subject to being stopped by police officers as well

Other police operations being conducted will target some of the major causes of motor vehicle accidents that occur within the township. Officers will be stopping motorists who operate a motor vehicle while using a cellular telephone that is not set up for hands free operation or are observed to be text messaging while driving. The other violations that contribute to a high number of accidents that are also being addressed are speeding, the improper use of specific turning lanes at intersections and overall aggressive driving.

Recipients of the Springfield Patriot Times are urged to make sure that any child under the age of 17 only rides a bicycle while wearing an approved properly fitted and fastened bicycle helmet. This law also applies to any child who rides upon a bicycle while in a restraining seat that is attached to the bicycle or in a trailer that is hooked up to and is towed by the bicycle. Despite the mandatory age requirement for the wearing of bicycle helmets, this is something that all bicyclists should do in order to prevent head injuries.

The daily rush hour traffic congestion combined with more and more motorists seeming to be rushing to get to their destinations and the summer months having more children being out and about makes it vital that motorists use common sense and caution when driving. Police officers know better than most about the tragic consequences that result from accidents caused by inattentive or careless drivers and hopefully by increased and visible traffic enforcement, accidents resulting in injuries or deaths can be prevented. I wish all readers of my Springfield Patriot Times column a safe and happy summer.

SPRINGFIELD POLICE DEPARTMENT JUNIOR POLICE ACADEMY

PLEASE NOTE: Applications will be accepted beginning May 15, 2014, and the deadline for applications will be June 30, 2014.

Springfield Police Department Chief of Police John P. Cook has announced the dates for the 2014 session of its Junior Police Academy. The academy will be running a one-week session from August 11-15, 2014, which will be held at the Springfield Police Department. Classes will run from 8:00 am to 2:00 pm daily.

This will be the inaugural session of this program, designed to provide area youth with the opportunity to gain an understanding of the role of the Police Officer.

While other youth academy programs provide a day camp setting, the Springfield Police Junior Academy has been modeled after today's police academy. Those accepted to the program will undergo physical training and daily training in Drill and Ceremony, will be instructed in criminal investigation techniques, evidence recovery, patrol practices, and effects of alcohol and drugs. In addition, the cadets will participate in field trips to the Union County Police Academy and attend demonstrations from various specialized units that are available to law enforcement, such as the police canine unit, SWAT team, and the bomb squad.

Each cadet will receive official Springfield Police Junior Academy uniforms to wear throughout the course. Upon successful completion of the course, the cadets will participate in a graduation in which they will be presented with a certificate of completion.

Acceptance into this program requires that the applicant be between the ages of 11-14. Those that

qualify will be selected based upon the return date of their application and tuition payment of \$100. These applications are to be dropped off to the desk officer at the Police Department. Please note, however, that preference will be given to Springfield residents. Anyone not selected for this program will receive their tuition payment back in full.

PREVENTING WEST NILE VIRUS INFECTION

Now that warm weather is approaching, so is the mosquito breeding season and concerns about West Nile Virus. In the past, peak West Nile Virus activity in New Jersey usually occurred in August/September. Since West Nile Virus is transmitted primarily by the bite of an infective mosquito, residents are advised to take precautions to reduce the risk of mosquito bites.

- When outdoors, use insect repellent containing an EPA-registered active ingredient. The gold standard for mosquito repellent is DEET, which may be used on adults and children greater than two months of age. Other repellents recommended by the CDC for use against mosquitoes that may transmit WNV include picaridin, IR3535 and some oil of lemon eucalyptus and para-methanediol products. Oil of lemon eucalyptus products should not be used on children less than three years of age. Be sure to apply insect repellent in accordance with the instructions on the product label.
- Limit time outdoors at dawn and dusk, when mosquitoes are most active, or wear long-sleeved shirts and long pants during those times.
 - Keep mosquito netting over infant seats and strollers.
- Eliminate standing water where mosquitoes can lay eggs, such as flower pots, tire swings, wading pools, wheelbarrows, buckets and cans. Change the water in birdbaths and pet dishes every few days. If you wish to save rainwater to use in your garden it should be used up within a week. Maintain gutters. and drain pipes to prevent clogs and standing water. Keep swimming pools chlorinated and pool covers tight to prevent creating pockets of stagnant water. Mosquitoes that breed around the home are primarily responsible for transmitting West Nile Virus to humans!
 - · Install or repair window and door screens.
- Support community-based mosquito control programs.

West Nile virus infection generally causes no symptoms or mild flu-like symptoms. About one in 150 people infected with WNV, or less than one percent, will develop a more severe form of the disease. Symptoms of the more severe disease can include severe headache, high fever, neck stiffness, stupor, disorientation, coma, tremors, convulsions, muscle weakness, paralysis and death. The elderly are at higher risk of more severe disease.

The West Nile virus is transmitted through the bite of an infective mosquito that has picked up the virus while feeding on an infected bird. In a very small number of cases, West Nile Virus also has been spread through blood transfusions, organ transplants, breastfeeding, and even during pregnancy from mother to baby. There is no evidence that would indicate that West Nile virus is transmitted directly from infected bird to humans. West Nile Virus can also seriously affect horses. Please contact your local veterinarian or New Jersey Department of Agriculture at http://www.state.nj.us/agriculture/westnile.htm for more information on West Nile Virus's effect on horses.

Local mosquito commissions are working hard with local health departments to monitor and control the spread of West Nile virus in the mosquito population. The Springfield Board of Health will continue to participate in the State-Wide West Nile Virus Surveillance program by collecting dead corvids (including crows and blue-jays), raptors (hawks), and thrushes (robins). Residents should contact the Springfield Board secretary at 973-912-2202 or the Madison Health Department at 973-593-3079 x1 to report dead crows, blue-jays, hawks, and robins. Dead birds in fresh condition will be picked up and sent to the state laboratories.

Springfield residents may report mosquito problems and standing water to the Union County Mosquito Commission at 908-654-9834. Additional information



Fire Chief's Column

Respect for Electricity

Electricity has become one of our basic needs and the Springfield Fire Department is encouraging you to get grounded in the basics of electrical safety.

According to the non-profit National Fire Protection Association (NFPA), electrical fires were involved in an estimated annual average of 47,820 reported home structure fires in 2007-2011. These fires resulted in 455 civilian deaths and 1,518 civilian injuries, with \$1.5 billion in direct property damage.

The best way to keep the home safe from electrical hazards is to take good care of appliances and to use all electrical equipment properly. Respect for electricity and the power it provides must occur every day throughout the year.

By reviewing the electrical safety tips below and taking action, Springfield Patriot reader can help reduce electrical fires in our community.

- When you are buying, selling or remodeling a home, have it inspected by a qualified electrician.
- If a fuse blows or a circuit breaker trips often, find out why and correct the problem. Replace fuses with the correct amp rating for the circuit they protect; never replace a fuse with a higher rated fuse. If the problem continues, call an
- Only plug one heat-producing appliance (such as a coffee maker, toaster, space heater, etc.) into a receptacle outlet at a time.
- Buy only appliances that have the label of a recognized testing laboratory.
- Replace cracked and damaged electrical cords.
- · Avoid pinching cords against walls or furniture or running them under carpets or across doorways. This can cause a fire.
 - Use extension cords for temporary wiring only.
- Follow the manufacturer's instructions for plugging an appliance into a receptacle outlet.
- Avoid overloading outlets. Plug only one high-wattage appliance into each receptacle outlet at a time.
- Consider having additional circuits or receptacles added by a qualified electrician.
- If an appliance is malfunctioning, unplug it if it is safe to do so. If necessary, cut off power by unscrewing a fuse or turning off the circuit breaker.
- Arc fault circuit interrupters (AFCIs) are a new kind of circuit breaker that shut off electricity when a dangerous condition occurs. Consider having them installed in your home. Use a qualified electrician.
- Use ground fault circuit interrupters (GFCIs) to reduce the risk of shock. GFCIs shut off an electrical circuit when it becomes a shock hazard.
- Test AFCIs and GFCIs once a month to make sure they are working
- Keep ladders away from overhead power lines including the electrical service into your home. Never touch a power line. Stay at a safe distance – you could be electrocuted.
- Report downed power lines to 9-1-1.
- Some power lines are underground. Call the NJ One Call at 800-272-1000 for an underground utility mark-out before you dig. It's free and it's the law.

SPRINGFIELD 8TH GRADER MAKES A DIFFERENCE

Marissa Steiner is no average eighth grade student: she also counts herself as a survivor. Before Marissa was born, her mother (Stephanie Steiner) developed preeclampsia, a dangerous pregnancy condition that can be life- threatening for mom and baby." Marissa was born at 34 weeks (weighing only 3 pounds) because of preeclampsia," said Stephanie Steiner. "I know that Marissa and I were some of the lucky ones to survive this life-threatening condition."

Since 2008, Stephanie Steiner has coordinated the Cranford, NJ area Promise Walk for Preeclampsia to support research and awareness of the condition through the Preeclampsia Foundation. In 2012, 12-year-old Marissa helped plan the Walk, and she has continued to help plan it every year since then. The Walk events have raised over \$100,000 for preeclampsia research since Marissa began co-coordinating.

For the 2014 event, Marissa organized local supporting fundraisers, contacted sponsors and in-kind donors about auction items, and spoke at township meetings to thank local mayors for issuing May as Preeclampsia Awareness Month proclamations. She had the opportunity to introduce U.S. Congressman Lance at the 2014 Walk. She also had the opportunity to meet New Jersey Governor Chris Christie in person recently and thank him for issuing a state-wide proclamation for the month.

Marissa's goal is that her generation will not face the same ignorance about preeclampsia that many of her mother's generation did. "Thanks to Marissa's efforts, the next generation of New Jersey moms will be well-educated on preeclampsia," commented Preeclampsia Foundation Director of Community Relations Laney Poye. "She has had an impact to support moms and babies around the world with preeclampsia."

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RAHWAY RIVER WATERSHED 1000 RAIN GARDEN PROJECT ON DISPLAY AT SPRINGFIELD LIBRARY MAY 27 TO JUNE 17 – DISCUSSION OF RAIN GARDEN BASICS JUNE 17 7PM LIBRARY MEETING ROOM

In response to the flooding Springfield experienced from hurricane Irene, Sandy, and the continual threat of flooding, Springfield, through the Mayor's Office, the Springfield Township Environmental Commission, and the recently formed Springfield Township Flood Mitigation Committee are working with municipalities within the Rahway River Flood Zone to develop plans and policies to mitigate regional flooding.

Such plans include the Rahway River Watershed 1000 Rain Gardens Project, sponsored by the Rahway River Watershed Flood Advisory Board. The project hopes to have



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municipal governments and town residents plant up to 1000 rain gardens. A typical rain garden will absorb approximately 25,000 gallons of runoff per year. The goal of this project is to keep 25 million gallons of storm water out of the river, along with the pollutants it carries.

Springfield has signed on to this project with plans to install demonstration gardens. Members of the Environmental Commission and Flood Mitigation Committee have taken training to become "Rain Garden Champions." Rutgers Extension Services in Westfield provided the training.

From May 27 to June 17, in the lobby of the Springfield Library, 66 Mountain Ave., is a display of the dramatic impact that rain gardens have on flooding. On June 17, 7pm in the library meeting room, there will be a discussion of Rain Garden Basics and how individuals can become involved. The meeting is free and open to the public.
