### **OCTOBER 8 TRIP THROUGH SPRINGFIELD'S PAST**

Springfield Hadassah will host an exciting event devoted to Springfield's history on October 8. Deputy Mayor Margaret Bandrowski will lead the group through Springfield's historical past beginning with the Revolutionary War.

An expert in Springfield's history, Ms. Bandrowski will begin with a tour (weather permitting) of the Daughters of the American Revolution cemetery on Mountain Ave., site of the oldest know burial ground in Springfield. It began as a burial ground for the Stites family and expanded to include others. The tombstone art carved in many of the standing stones will be explained.

The tour will move on to the Cannon Ball house. Built in approximately 1760, it has changed little. It survived burning by the British after their defeat in the historical Battle of June 23, 1780. Many fascinating articles used in every day life are on exhibit. Ms. Bandrowski will also speak of the role played by the eighteenth-century First Presbyterian Church--in both the Revolution and the development of the Township.

The event will include lunch at a location to be determined. The public is invited. However, since both Springfield Hadassah and the Springfield Historical Society are non profit organizations, a donation in exchange for admission to the event, which includes lunch, will be appreciated.

### PJ COOK WINS GOLD AT 2015 DOD WARRIOR GAMES FOR WOUNDED, ILL & INJURED

Major Peter J. Cook, USMCR Retired, a native son of Springfield, NJ, graduate of Dayton High School, and local high school sports photographer, returned home a winner from the 2015 Department of Defense Warrior Games for Wounded, Ill & Injured Servicemen and Servicewomen held from June 19 – 28. Major Cook earned a spot on the Marine Corps Team as one of 40 athletes competing against teams from the Army, Navy/Coast Guard, Air Force, Special Operations Command (SOCOM) and Team Great Britain.

In his disability category of upper extremity amputee, he earned a gold medal in the 50 meter Breaststroke, setting a new Marine Regiment record at 49.43 seconds. He also earned bronze medals in the 50 meter Freestyle and the 200 meter Freestyle Team Relay as well as placing fourth in the 100 meter Freestyle.

At 55, a non-combat injured amputee, Major Cook felt fortunate to compete so well against so many fellow servicemen/women athletes who were significantly younger. He noted that there was a broad range of disabilities amongst the competitors. All showed tremendous heart and determination in their events, sometimes at great physical and mental cost. They may have been exhausted or totally spent at the end, but he saw no one give up or quit, showing the grit and determination that made each and every one a member of America's and Britain's Finest no matter their service.

The 2015 Warrior Games were held at Marine Corps Base Quantico, VA. This is the first year that the Department of Defense hosted the annual event

which was previously run by the U.S. Olympic Committee and held at the Olympic Training Center in Colorado Springs, CO. The competition is for wounded, ill, and injured service members and veterans. More than 200 service members and veterans participated representing the Army, Marine Corps, Navy/Coast Guard, Air Force, Special Operations Command (SOCOM) and Great Britain. The teams competed in seven sports: archery, cycling, shooting, sitting-volleyball, swimming, track & field and wheelchair basketball. The games are designed to introduce injured service members and veterans to Paralympic sport competition and encourage them to stay physically active when they return to their local communities following the event.

"Peter is a force to reckon with in the pool and on the firing line as he hones his skills and shatters the barriers of his perceived limits, emerging triumphant," said Nathan Lynch, Semper Fi Fund Sports Coordinator.

Major Cook started his swimming career at the Springfield Pool as a member of the summer swim team at the age of seven and held titles in breaststroke for many years. He was encouraged to return to the pool this past year by his youngest son, York Cook, and continues to train at the Summit YMCA.

# WARNING TO MSM COMMUNITIES AT LARGE GET VACCINATED FOR MENINGOCOCCAL DISEASE

Newark, NJ – Recent reports of a growing outbreak of meningococcal meningitis in MSM (men who have sex with men) communities in Chicago, New York and Los Angeles have health officials around the country warning men who have sex with men to talk to their healthcare providers about getting vaccinated as soon as possible. Meningococcal meningitis is a very serious disease that can be fatal if not treated quickly.

HIV weakens the immune system; therefore, HIV infected men who have sex with men are at greatest risk of developing serious complications from meningococcal meningitis. This disease is caused by a bacterium (Nneisseria meningitides) spread by close personal contact with an infected person's saliva (spit) or nasal secretions - kissing, living in the same household/roommates, intimate sexual acts, sharing utensils/cups/smoking objects, coughing, etc. It is not spread through casual contact or simply breathing the air where an infected person has

Symptoms such as high fever, stiff neck, severe and persistent headache, nausea, vomiting, confusion, drowsiness, and joint pain often develop suddenly, within days of being exposed.

MSM should heed the warning of health officials and get vaccinated as soon as they can. Getting vaccinated will help prevent possible outbreaks in other parts of the country. If you or someone you know is experiencing the symptoms above, seek medical attention immediately. The quicker you receive medical attention, the better off you will be.

# Police Chief's Column Chief John P. Cook

### THE POLICE AND THE COMMUNITY NEED TO WORK TOGETHER TO COMBAT CRIME

In my Patriot Times column this month I would like to highlight the need for the police and the community to work together to prevent crime in Springfield. In the months of June and July, officers of the Springfield Police Department, working in conjunction with the Union County Prosecutor's Office, were able to arrest four separate individuals who were trafficking in various types of narcotics within the Township of Springfield. In each of these successful police operations a local resident of our community was arrested and charged with multiple crimes including both the possession and distribution of controlled dangerous substances and in two cases the subjects were actually using their residences to also manufacture the narcotics they were distributing.

In all of the arrests that I will briefly highlight, a police investigation was initiated by the Springfield Police Department together with the Union County Prosecutor's Office due to suspicious activity that residents of our community observed which they then reported to the police. By its very nature, drug dealing is a very secretive and covert business where the drug dealer will go to great lengths to not call attention to themselves with the police but frequently find it difficult to not arouse the suspicions of members of the public. By calling the police to report suspicious activity, members of the community alert the police to a criminal activity in residential neighborhoods that might have continued undetected.

Springfield, like every other community, large or small, is touched by the drug epidemic affecting our country, but you will see from these recent arrests how the observations by members of the public can enable your police department to identify ongoing criminal activity such as persons who are engaged in either dealing or manufacturing illegal narcotics and that these observations made by members of the public can lead directly to the arrest of criminals who may be operating right in their own neighborhoods.

Based upon information that had been received from the public, officers and detectives from the Springfield Police Department conducted a search at an apartment located in the Summit Hill apartment complex on Stone Hill Road on 06/09/2015. The tenant Jonathan Fruchter was arrested and charged with both the possession and the distribution of large amounts of Marijuana, Tetrahydrocannabinol (liquid THC) and Psilocybin, which are hallucinogenic mushrooms. It was discovered that he was selling both the controlled dangerous substances as well as a vast array of drug paraphernalia via the internet.

On 06/11/2015, the Springfield Police Department along with members of the Union County Prosecutor's Office investigated the report of suspicious activity at an apartment in the General Green Village complex off of Wabeno Avenue. Information received from the public reported suspicious activity involving an apartment in the complex. Pursuant to a surveillance set up of this apartment, officers were able to observe Marijuana being sold to a 16 year old juvenile resident of town. The tenant, Jeremy Lowengard, was arrested and charged with possession of Marijuana as well as both the distribution of Marijuana and the distribution of Marijuana within 1000 feet of a school zone.

On 06/18/2015, the prosecutor's office received information concerning a resident of the Park Place condominiums on South Springfield Avenue and this information was then shared with the Springfield Police Department. Kurt Romondt was arrested by police after a police operation, for manufacturing and distributing Gamma-Hydroxybutyrate (GHB) which is commonly referred to as a "club drug" or a "date rape drug." He was charged with both the possession and distribution of GHB and was further charged with operating a drug facility as he was using his residence to manufacture this narcotic.

Finally, on 07/27/2015 Springfield police officers and members of the prosecutor's office executed a search warrant at a rented condominium unit at the Troy Estates located on Troy Drive. This operation resulted from information that was received from the public concerning suspicious activity and suspicious persons at this residence. Based upon the initial information and the police investigation, the tenant John Howlett was arrested for using his rented property to manufacture Methamphetamine. Howlett was charged with possession and the possession with intent to distribute Methamphetamine. Afterwards in excess of 11 ounces of the narcotic was recovered along with other quantities of prescription narcotics and suspected Heroin. He was further charged with the operation of a drug facility, a

first degree crime, after it was discovered that the condo on Troy Drive was being used as a "meth lab" to cook and manufacture the Methamphetamine. Due to the various types of volatile and flammable chemicals and gases used in the manufacture of Methamphetamine that were found inside of the condo, it was necessary

members of the NJ State Police, the DEA Clandestine Lab Unit, the Union County Hazmat Team and the Springfield Fire Department to assist in safely dismantling this drug location.

As you can see, these arrests were the product of good police work along with multiple law enforcement agencies working together to eliminate some local drug operations in various residential neighborhoods in Springfield. Law enforcement agencies must rely on the members of the public and the business community to observe and report anything that may seem suspicious, unusual or out of the ordinary. This is commonly known in police jargon by the catch phrase of.....SEE IT, SAY IT......and these recent police operations and arrests demonstrate how just a simple call to the police on activity that is believed to be suspicious can actually lead to uncovering and eradicating drug dealing and drug manufacturing crimes being covertly carried out in residential neighborhoods.

The actions of concerned and observant members of the public led to the arrest of persons involved in dealing drugs to juveniles, manufacturing "date rape" drugs or manufacturing drugs such as Methamphetamine with the latter involving chemicals that posed a hazard to not only the suspect but to the neighbors living nearby. In closing, please never feel that observations you make about something that you may feel is suspicious are0 not worth reporting as you do not want to "bother" the police or feel that nothing will be done. Only by working together can the community and the police stop those persons who may seek to turn our residential neighborhoods into safe havens for their illegal activities.

### SPRINGFIELD CRYSTAL METH LAB DISMANTLED FOLLOWING NARCOTICS INVESTIGATION

A narcotics investigation has resulted in a Springfield man being arrested and charged with maintaining a crystal methamphetamine production facility in his apartment, acting Union County Prosecutor Grace H. Park and Springfield Police Chief John Cook jointly announced Tuesday.

John Howlett, 42, is charged with first-degree maintaining a narcotics production facility, first-degree possession of methamphetamine with the intent to distribute, two second-degree weapons offenses, and a third-degree drug offense.

A joint investigation initiated by the Springfield Police Department that grew to involve the Prosecutor's Office's Guns, Gangs, Drugs, and Violent Crimes Task Force resulted in the execution of a search warrant at Howlett's home on Troy Drive in Springfield Monday afternoon. Along with what appeared to be a makeshift methamphetamine laboratory, arriving detectives encountered a toxic odor in the apartment, prompting the evacuation of several nearby housing units and the dispatching of the Springfield Fire Department and the Union County Hazardous Material Response Team.

An evaluation of the apartment then was conducted by the New Jersey State Police Hazardous Materials Response Unit and the Drug Enforcement Administration's Clandestine Laboratory Enforcement Team, which jointly determined that it was safe for a search of the apartment to proceed. Recovered from the apartment and an adjacent garage were approximately 11 ounces of crystal methamphetamine, more than 160 oxycodone pills, approximately 220 various prescription pills, 20 folds of heroin, and numerous pieces of narcotics production equipment, including instructions on the production of methamphetamine, packaging materials, several boxes of pseudoephedrine tablets, iodine, batteries, heating sources, glassware, digital scales, Tyvek protective suits, a money counter, and a filtration system wired directly to an electrical box. Also found in the home were \$13,000 in cash, a sophisticated video surveillance and computer system, a Sig Sauer airsoft gun, and a BB gun.

Howlett was arrested in his vehicle outside the apartment while 24-year-old Elana Garman was arrested inside; she later was turned over to the custody of the Bergen County Sheriff's Office after being found to have outstanding warrants out of Bergen County. Howlett was lodged in Union County Jail, with bail set at \$600,000 by state Superior Court Judge William Daniel.

Convictions for first-degree crimes commonly carry penalties of 10 to 20 years in state prison.

These criminal charges are mere accusations. Each defendant is presumed innocent until proven guilty in a court of law.



#### **AVOIDING MICROWAVE FIRES AND BURNS**

Microwave ovens have simplified cooking and reheating foods in homes everywhere. However, according to the National Fire Protection Association, microwave use results in thousands of home fires each year. Microwave burns cause more emergency room scald burn injuries than any other cooking device. One third of these scalds involve children under five years of age.

With such widespread use of microwaves by people of all ages, it's important for consumers to know how to use them safely. The Springfield Fire Department wants to give you simple tips to help prevent microwave fires and scald burns:

- Read the manufacturer's instructions before using a microwave oven.
- Plug the microwave directly into an outlet. Using an extension cord can over load the circuit and cause a fire.
- Use only microwave-safe cookware.
- Open food heated in the microwave slowly, and hold it away from your face to prevent scalding from steam.
- Never heat a baby bottle in a microwave oven because it heats liquids unevenly. Heat baby bottles in warm water.
- Never use aluminum foil or other metal objects in the microwave.
- If you have a fire in your microwave, turn the oven off immediately and keep
  the door closed. Do not open the door until the fire is completely out. Have the
  microwave serviced before using it again. When in doubt, get out of the home
  and call the fire department.

Please be mindful that even foods cooked in the microwave present a risk of burns. If you are burned, this injury requires immediate attention. First, put the affected area in cool water for three to five minutes. Then, cover with a clean, dry cloth. If the burn is bigger than your fist, or if you have questions about caring for the injury, seek medical attention right away.

These safety tips can help make sure that you are using your microwave oven safely.
